TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN.

DRAN SIR.—Mr Havelock Coy's communication in the ACADIAN of the 29th ult., characterizes my letter in the Acadia Orchardist of Nov. 5th, as "incorrect in several particulars." In his attempt at correction or explanation, he substantially agrees with my letter until he makes the accusation characterizing my allusion to that part of his letter referring to the restriction clause in the deed as "false."

I said in my letter of Nov. 5th, to which Mr Coy in the above refers as follows: "Mr Coy suggested that the word architecture and the sentence referring to the sale of intoxicating liquors be left out. I declined to execute a deed with his requested restriction." I am quite as willing as Mr Coy to leave it to "your readers" whether they know him better than I do or not.

The restriction clause in the deed sent to Mr Coy and in substance if not in letter in the same as in every deed given by the Company reads as follows: "Architecture of buildings required to meet the approval of the Company, no fences permitted on these grounds. The Company hereto prohibits forever the sale of intoxicating liquors in this residential Park."

A FAMOUS REFORMER.

Rev. C. J. Freeman Speaks of His Life and Work.

He Has Written and Preached on Both Sides of the Atlantic—Recently the Victim of a Peculiar Affliction from which He Was Released in a Marvelous Manner.

From the Boston Herald.

No. 157 Emerson St., South Boston, is the present home of Rev. C. J. Freeman, B. A., Ph. D., the recent rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church at Anacosta, Mont. During the reform movement which has swept over Boston, Dr. Freeman has been frequently heard from through the various newspapers, and although a resident of a comparatively recent date, he has exerted much public influence, which has been increased by the fact that he was ten years ago on a commission appointed in England to investigate the troublesome question of the vice of great cities.

He has preached before cultured audiences in the old world, as well as to the rough pioneers in the mining towns of the Rocky mountains, and his utterances as well as his writings have been in the line of progress and liberality, well-seasoned with practical common sense. Dr. Freeman has written, this paper a letter which will be read with interest. He says:—

"Some five years since I found that deep study and excessive literary work, in addition to my ordinary ministerial duties, were undermining my health. Convention Echoes.

The following extract was among the

good things that were said at the recent

Convention of the National W. C. T. U.

in Baltimore.

Do you know that we have to-day

2,000 members of the W. C. T. U. in

South Africa? Do you know that we

have twenty branches of the Young

Woman's Christian Temperance Union in

South Africa? Do you know that we

have 12,000 pledged children in South

Africa? With one million and a quarter

of white inhabitants in South Africa out

of that number the women of the Dutch

Reformed church have sent out twenty

young women to work among the natives

of that country, and every one of those

twenty is a member of the W. C. T. U.

or the Y. We have from 1,400 to 1,600

active women, some of whom have just

been converted to Christianity as auxil-

iary members to the W. C. T. U.

Every missionary and every Christian

worker that I have met upon that great

continent has said to me, "We can never

evangelize the world as long as Christian

countries legalize the rum trade." How

do you think we can reach three-fifths

of the population of the world and sup-

port the rum traffic as it is being sup-

ported to-day in the United States of

America? Do you know that Maryland

ranked seven in the production of whisky

in the United States, that there is to-day

thirty-six million dollars worth of whisky

in the bonded warehouses of the state of

Indiana—the product of one year? The

great Methodist denomination sent out

\$1,250,000 last year to carry on the work

of the gospel, less than one-thirtieth as

much. Now I have one proposition

which I wish to make to this great

audience. There are to-day three thou-

sand young people that propose, through

the students' volunteer movement of the

United States, to fit themselves and go

out into the different countries to take

the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. Do

not let them go with any mistaken im-

pressions about the power of the legal-

ized liquor traffic. Let them go under-

standing that alcohol is a dangerous and

seductive poison that has not any place

on the face of the earth under the sanc-

tions of God. Let those young women

and the local members to send them out

thoroughly prepared to do this great

work for the Woman's Christian Tem-

perance Union. It is not worth while

to send them with the Bibles in one hand

if they do not take the Union Signal in

the other—After Future.
