

"On board Empress of Canada

Tuesday, Sept.. 4, 1923
"Well Dear Folks, I do wonder what you are hearing and thinking these days. There is no way to send a message and we do not know when we can mail a letter but I'll have one written anyway when the time does come.

"We have been through an experience which to us personally is dreadful only because of the suffering and horror we have come in contact with, not because we, oudselves

"I'll try to tell you a little about it, but it will really be very little." HEAR OF DISASTER

mentioned in my letter written of a great disaster in Japan. Its extent and horror we did not sense ed slowly into Yokohama harbor. They did not know how much the ottom of the harbor might have een changed so they took it very The fortifications were quite shattered.. Next we saw great columns of smoke and were inform ed that it was the arsenal at Yokosuka, the great naval training And then we came nearer to Yokohama and could see that it was razed to the ground and mostly on fire. Finally, quite in the harbor, we anchored, where messenger came aboard and told us of the extent of the disaster ..

"They soon beg". bringing refugees to us. The Empress

12. This meant that almost all of

"This ship, the Empress of Australia, was turned into a relief attention. They cared for so many foreigners, rescued from the ruins of Yekohama, as possible to this vessel for care, food , and medical attention. They cared for so many that in thirty-six hours they had almost exhausted their supplies for a ten day's trip. So when we came in they were glad indeed to pass over as many as possible to us

MANY LACK CLOTHES

"All day long they came in boat loads... Some with almost no clothing—a night town or some equally inadequate garment—wet and dirty. Some fully dressed, who had sat or stood in mud and water of flooded parks or canals or some such place for hours.

"Very soon I found that my best place was in the dispensary where wounds of every description, from slight scratches to dreadful burns. tractures and so on, were being cared for by several passenger doctors who were assisting the ship's doctor and a few nurses and

volunteers.. There I worked until nearly midnight. I was very glad to do this bit to help out. We fished out all the clothes we could and some dispensed these..

"Everybody was helpful generally

and kind. The ship's hands worked 'tremendously. We, so safe on our beautiful ship, cannot send relief, and relief from other countries must be so slow because People came aboard yesterday who had had nothing to eat since the disaster—two whole days. Last night the cabins were all full and the decks were full. The passen gers made up a purse of \$6000 for those left so destitute by the

"Thursday—Well, after a day in the harbor doing all we could ,we left on Tuesday morning for Kcbe. I helped in the dispensary again all day Tuesday... It was fearfully hot tool is yet.

"We arrived at Kobe on Wednesday morning, and left for Shizuoka that evening, not knowing at all whether there was any Shizuoka. It seemed impossible to get any authentic information, but I found Shizuoka had escaped the earthquake.

I hear there is a chance to mail this, so will send it along. We are envious to hear about our property in Tokio, and from Miss Robertson"


