

After describing their sunny sleeping apartments, the Queen concludes that she jealously guards the happiness of the King to herself, sharing it with no one.

**LADY ABERDEEN'S WORK.**  
There is at least one of the several cynical charges brought against the woman philanthropist that cannot be said of Lady Aberdeen. She is not selfish or inconstant. Whilst in Canada she laid the basis for the cottage hospital system and Victorian nurses and established the Aberdeen society for distributing reading matter among settlers in the west.
