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



The Army Pageant, which will be eld in the grounds of Fulham Palace rom June 20 to July 2, has been for unate in securing an ideal Joan of Arc in Mrs. Henry Hohler, of York. This lady is the second daughter of

Fir George Wombwell, Bart., the amous Yorkshire squire and Crimean eteran who rode with the 17th Laners in the gallant charge of the Light rigade and came unscathed out of the valley of death."

Mrs. Hohler is the sister of the ountess of Dartrey and niece of Lord Jersey. Ever since she could ride she has been known as a daring horsewoman and a member of the York and Ainsty Hunt, of which her father was or many years master.

In the York Pageant of 1909 Mrs. Hohler was a beautiful Queen Isaella Riding astride on a magnifient grey, she was the embodiment grace and dignity.

As the Maid of Orleans in the Army ageant Mrs. Hohler will require al er nerve and skill as a horsewoman estriding a spirited white horse, class n armour, and possibly bearing landard, she must head a charge of rench knights on the Field of Patay cattering and overwhelming an op osing force of Englsh. "Typhoid Mary."

A Curious Menace to Publis Health. New York, Feb. 21 .- 'Typhoid Mary,' whose real name is witheld at the re quest of the New York health authorities, is a free woman again. after having been confined in charity hospitals, off and on for three years, beause physicians said that she was a living receptacle for typhoid germs and a menace to public health. She was formerly a cook, and considered particularly dangerous in that capacity as likely to transmit disease. With the understanding that she is to cook no more, Mr. Lederie, the health commissioner, announced to-day that the department had decided to release

'Typhoid Mary' had of late been confined in a charity hospital on an island in the East River. Her case is unique in medical records. After repeated cases of typhoid were discovered in families for which she had cooked, the authorities made an investgation, resulted in her detention on the theory that she was a walking reservoir for typhoid germs, harmless to herself, but easily communicated to those whose food she cooked.

More Protection Urged for Women.

BOSTON, Feb. 25 .- The Massachus setts House heard many and various pleas to-day for new legislation for the moral protection of woman. The principal issue of the day on the part of the petitioners who appeared before the committee on legal affairs of the Chinese restaurant, in many of which it was alleged, that scandalous and disgraceful scenes were often enacted.

A Bill offered by Representative John L. Donovan would prohibit women under 21 years of age, and women above that age unless accompanied by a male escort from going into or patronizng a Chinese restaurant. The Bill had almost as many opponents as supporters, the arguments in its favour being that much of the accusation was unjust, and that the measure was unconsti tutional.

Kilmainham Has No Longer Any Gnests.

Known History Goes Back to the Troublesome Times of '98, But An Story-Entertained Politicals.

It is Kilmainham, in the outlying township of that name in the city of Dublin. Thirteen years ago in that tiny volume called 'Kilmainham Memories' I wrote of it: "The place is not great, but it has a great air. Of its external features the lofty grey wall of Irish limestone about one third of a mile in circumference is the most imposing. It is evidence also of a certain antiquity, since walls of this height are not given to modern prisons. Except for its strength the small main gateway is juite unpretentious; over it are the Five Devils of Kilmainham'-five writhing scorpins symbolical of no one knows what."

When next some polished Britisher has an ugly word for Ireland pray let him reflect before he gets it off that in the year of salvation, 1909 he General Prisons Board was obligd to close Kilmainham because there vere not in Dublin or the neighboring counties criminals enough to keep the staff employed. But Kilmainham leads us back to the Irish Parliament and to the pikes of '98. With the earlier annals of the prison I have not the least acquaintance. Illuminative documents rest no doubt among the archives of Dublin Castle awaiting the scrutiny of somebody No government of our day is concerned-at least, none need be concerned to keep the secret of its prisons: for in the rule of to-day (its imperfections notwithstanding) the foolish cruelties of the past are fairly blotted ut. Somebody will presently take

from them we shall surely be the richer by a sheaf of stories that may perhaps recall some memories of the prisons of the French Revolutions. In the modern history of Kilmainham one episode stands out peakwise. The political weather of 1880 and onwards was, in the simple but sufficing phrase, "rough, with wind." The Land League was to the fore. Great in those days were the names of Gladstone. Parnell, and "Buckshot" Forster, the Irish Secretary-each name stablishment of Kilmainham is no a battle-word. The celebrated act

for the Better Protection of Persons and Property of Ireland was the order of the day; under this act hundreds of persons of all kinds, orders, and qualities, became suddenly a suspect and into prison the suspects were kept in batches. Kilmainham entertained them. The crowd of common prisoners was emptied out somewhere -into Mountiov one may supposeand the old jail was cleaned up for the reception of the suspected leagners, members of Parliament, priests, lawyers, docters, newspaper men, cappen. Crime as we know it in farmers, cattle-dealers, horse-dealers, England is practically non-existant shop-keepers, and peasants from their ragged plots, Kilmainham, totally transformed, no longer recognized it-

abitual leviers of blackmail, bogus Kilmainham "entertained" this extra oblemen, parsons, and the ladies of ordinary assemblage of politicals. Loss of liberty is serious in varying degrees to all men, but to the dunseened suspects their captivity was tempered. The Ladies' Land League saw to it. The "victims of British tyranny" were fed and wined from without the walls: I might almost say that they were garlanded, for their board was decked with flowers. Arests and detentions, unjust enough no doubt, there often were, but of the rue and uncustomary pains of prison not one of these suspects ever had taste. For some few light remarks I passed upon the subject (fresh from a tour of local and convict prisons in England-where the real thing was to be seen) I was mauled by one or two Dublin papers; but most of the quondam suspects, I fancy, had a relish of the joke. Certain among them had the time of their lives in the dungeons of Kilmainham. Had they been curious enough to know what it meant to breathe the real atmosphere of prison-not in Irish Kilmainham, but in English Portland-poor Micheel Davitt could have turned the gas

Their Majesties' Servants.

What Work They Have to Do an Who They Are.

Servants in the royal establishment hold what, in a large number of instances, are almost hereditary posi-

The Doddses, Jacksons, Chandlers. Warrens and others now in the employment of Their Majesties are the children or grandchildren of those who lived and died in the royal employ. An outsider rarely has a chance of entering the royal service

Quite 90 per cent. of the servants at Buckingham Palace, and other royal residences, are the sons or daughters of people employed in some capacity or other by royalty, or of tenants the royal estates.

The whole staff of maidservants, o whom there are over 50 at Bucking ham Palace, are under the control of Mrs. Rosalie Dodds, the head house keeper. The maids rise at 6 a.m. in the winter and 5.30 a.m. in the summer. Breakfast is served in the large maidservants' hall at seven o'clock and three of the maids are selected in turn each week to wait on the others at meals.

From eight to noon the maids are at work in the different sets of rooms allotted to their charge. Each room s then inspected by one of the assistant housekeepers, of whom there are six, to see that it has been but proper v in order, and at half-past twelve ; report is made to Mrs. Dodds by the assistant housekeepers that what is called the "morning walk" has been finished.

In the afternoon a certain number of the maids are allowed off duty beween 3 and 6 p.m. The maids off duty have a large and extremely comfortable room to sit in, where they can read, write, or do their own work, and where, with the consent of the head housekeeper, they can see heir friends.

The 'outings" of the maidservants are arranged by the head housekeeper. Each maid is allowed out once a week rom 6 to 10 p.m., and she can go out when off duty in the afternoon by pernission of Mrs. Dodds. A whole day outing" is given to each maid-serant, from ncon to ten o'clock, once

Each girl on entering service at Buckingham Palace is given a printd copy of the rules and regulations he will be required to obey, and with which she must make herself thorughly acquainted.

For the first month a maid at Buck ngham Palace is regarded as a probationer. If, at the end of that time she is not strong enough for the erally found employment at one of the other residences of royalty.

But as the maids who are promoted o the best paid positions in the roy al service are usually selected from the staff at Buckingham Palace, girl always does her best to' qualify for service under Mrs. Dodds.

Six of the maids are on what i called the "travelling staff," and always travel with Queen Alexandra and attend to the packing and unpacking of the royal luggage. A travelling maid speaks French fluent v. and most of them speak German





Dr. Ingram on England's Drink Bill

annual meeting of the London United Temperance Council recently. The Bishop referred to the great increase in the strength of the temperance cause which had come from what he called "the conversion of the doctors." Mr. Pearce Gould, Sir Thomas Barlow, and Sir Frederick Treves Lords. (Laughter and cheers.) But were, said the Bishop, good enough for him. "People may not notice us temperance fanatics," he said, "but they do begin to take notice when medical men of European reputation tell us that alcohol is actually harmful, and prevents us doing our work as well as we can, or living as long as we might do."

Teetotalers, said Dr. Ingram, used to be called "bad lives" by the insurance companies. Now they were coming into their own, and the insurarce companies were running after them, and bribing them on 10 per cent. better terms. 
In March of this year the Corporation of London purchased a site which had long been occupied by a fruitstall in Ship Tavern Passage, Grace Church Street, at approximately \$150 per square foot, while land in Lombard Street ranges anywhere from \$185 to \$250 the square foot.

One of the most notable sales in recent times was that of the splendid site in Cornhill on which the Commercial Union offices now stand. This contained an area of about 2,500 feet. and sold as vacant land for \$225 a foot. About three years ago a site in Lombard Street, containing 1,600 feet, was let by auction at \$15,000 per annum, which, calculated at twenty-five years' purchase, represents about \$235 per foot for the freehold of the vacant site.


