

The Newfoundland Centre of the St. John A.A. was inaugurated at a learned. public meeting presided over by Sir Ralph Williams, who graciously consented to become Patron of the city for his help so generously given Centre, on April 11th, 1910. ext week. We have sufficient applications for he Course in hand to form several classes in January, when the stores close in the evenings. The Principal of one of our Colleges informs me that he expects to have a double class, 60 boys ready to take the course, and arrangements have been made for a Surgeon Instructor, who is giving his services free of charge Rev. Mr. Barton, Principal of Queen's College has enrolled himself and all his students for the course.

We aim to establish a Section on Bell Island, and Dr. Carnochan has support. now in hand an outfit for Class Instruction.

The importance of the instruction of the Constabulary in First Aid cannot be over estimated. Inspector General Sullivan has taken up this work in a whole souled manner. He and Supt. Grimes started the course with the men, the latter qualifying the Inspector General being prevented by illness from continuing. The Police and Firemen have taken the keenest interest in the work and 39 including almost all the non-commissioned officers have qualified.

A striking instance of the benefit esulting to the public from the instruction given the Police was atforded in the resuscitation, on Tuesday last, of an apparently drowned, and wholly unconscious man, by Const. Fred Churchill which was fulreported in the daily papers. The certificated pupils have already

reported a number of cases in which they have rendered "First Aid." These include several fractures, sprains, contusions, scalp wounds epileptic fits, cuts, bites, and fish hooks embedded in hand extracted. The past summer has seen a chapter of accidents, many of them show ing the necessity of First Aid training. The Long Pond tragedy cost the life of one, William Joyce, who but a week before had qualified in First Aid. His certificate is here on the table and is to be sent to his widowed mother.





Motoring Comes High in England.

Driving a high-powered motor ca n England is now an expensive amusement, for under the new finance act, which has recently gone into effect, a license for a car of more than sixty horse-power costs \$210. By the new law the charge for licenses is graded according to horse-power, as is the practice in Massachusetts, but the lassification is more detailed, and the charges much higher than here. The new English license rates are as

Motor cycle or tricycle, \$5; motor ars under 61/2 horse-power, \$10.50; 61/2 to 12 horse-power, \$17.75; 12 to 16 horse-power, \$21; 16 to 26 horse-pow er, \$31.50; 27 to 33 horse-power, \$42 33 to 40 horse-power, \$52.50; 40 to 60 horse-power, \$105; over 60 horse-pow er, \$210. Although this law has been in effect-only a few weeks it has resulted in anincreased demand for low powered cars, and it is reported that many high-powered machines have been put on the market at very low prices. The old system of licensing was graded according to the weight of cars, the price for a car not exceeding one ton in weight being \$10 .-56 and for a car from one to two tons in weight being \$21.



King Emmanuel Had Narrow Escape

Milan, Sept. 28.-King Emmanuel and his cousin, the Count of Turin, had a narrow escape from a serious accident to-day while inspecting the aeroplanes at the Aerodrome here. The aviator, Simon, failed to observe that the King and Count were walking directly in front of him and started his machine. It swept toward them at full speed. There were loud cries from the alarmed spectators and a warning call to lie down. The Sovereign and the Count threw themselves to the ground and the machine just cleared them.


