Paid \$2,500 For a Vote

Senator Declares He Received Money for Supporting Senator Lorimer. Chicago, Sept. 29.—State Senator D. W. Holstlaw, of Iuka, Illinois, one of the fifty-three Democrats who helped to elect William Lorimer United States senator, took the witness stand yesterday before the Lorimer investigating committee, and testified that after he had voted for Lorimer he received \$2,500, and that he supposed the money was paid because of his vote.

Senator Holstlaw, who until recently was a banker in his home town and had some prominence in the Baptist denomination, was the second witness to be heard by the committee and the second legislator to tell the committee that money was paid for a vote for the junior senator from Illinois. Senator Holstlaw told his story to the Sangamon County Grand Jury at Springfield some time ago, but never testified in a public hearing.

"The night before the election of Senator Lorimer," said Senator Holstlaw, "I met State Senator John Broderick outside the Saint Nicholas Hotel in Springfield, and he said to me, 'They are going to elect Lorimer to-morrow.' I replied: 'Yes, I think so and I am going to vote for him.' He replied: 'Well, there is \$2,500 in it for you.' That was all there was said. I intended to vote for Lorimer anyway, and had made up my mind three or four days before that, and did not know there was a thing in it for me."

"Were you offered anything?" he asked, and the witness replied: "He did not offer me anything, as simply said, 'There was \$2,500 in it for me.'"

Ambulance Association

The St. John's Ambulance Association held its first annual meeting yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms, according to the rules, which calls for that meeting to be held in October. His Excellency the Governor presided. The Secretary read the report, which is as follows: Your Excellency, Ladies and Gentlemen:—

The Newfoundland Centre of the St. John A.A. was inaugurated at a public meeting presided over by Sir Ralph Williams, who graciously consented to become Patron of the Centre, on April 11th, 1910. We therefore have less than six months work of which to report—to be exact it is only four months since the supplies to be used in the conduct of the Classes arrived from England. The work of organizing has been somewhat arduous, owing to the fact that we were all new to the working of the Association. In the future we may hope as a larger number co-operates that it will become less tedious.

On the whole the Association has a report to show for this four months work of which we are not ashamed. Six classes have completed their course of Lectures and been examined. The total number enrolled in classes . . . . . 138 Number who went up for examination . . . . . 107 Number who passed examination . . . . . 73

By Medical men in giving gratuitous lectures. Those who have given four complete courses are entitled to be made Honorary Life Members of the Association, this special mark of distinction having been instituted by the Committee in recognition of the valuable services rendered by the Medical profession. They can also become eligible for other honors.

Postage is likely to prove the largest drain on our resources. An application for free postage was made to the Government, who unfortunately could not see their way to granting it last April. Possibly if the request is again made it may meet a more favourable reception.

Our plans for the winter campaign are briefly, to prepare a pamphlet, if this meets with the approval of the Committee. This will contain in addition to the reports given here to-day, all information necessary to the starting of classes, a list of articles required and a price list, which may

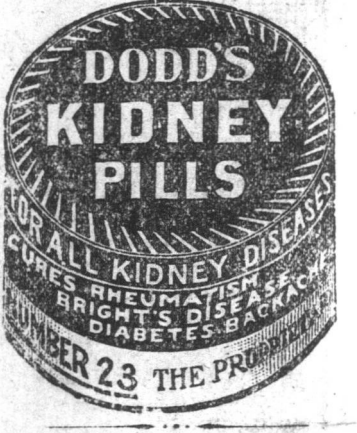

Also some drowning tackle has been imported, but not yet placed. This was accomplished through the Municipal Council voting \$20 to be used for that purpose.

His Excellency next addressed the members, pointing out the good work done elsewhere by the St. John Association and the particular value of an Association in Newfoundland to teach First Aid and to provide simple means of saving life. He expressed his pleasure at the interest manifested by citizens generally in the work. He then presented the certificates.



A Remarkable Billiard Player.

George Gray, the 18-year-old Australian billiardist, established a new English billiard record, recently at Leeds, with a break of 985. Gray is the talk of England, and was recently entertained at luncheon at London, attended by fifty or sixty people well known in the billiard world, including the professionals.

In appearance he is little more than a boy, fairly tall (5ft. 8in.), and still growing. He is the holder of the largest break record ever made under the present rules, scoring 836 (531 off the red) in a game with F. Lundrun in September last year, and another 800 in the same match, a feat which has never been equalled. In his 800 break his average was 105 points every seven minutes.

### The Evening Chit-Chat

"Half the unhappiness in the world comes from thinking other people are happy."

That epigram, which I read in 'Life' the other day, appealed to me as one of the best things I have ever run across in that delightful candy-box medicine chest of humor-coated truths.

But I think it's converse, or is it "opposite"?—I'll have to leave that to the geometry students, I guess—is even truer.

That is, half the happiness in the world is caused by thinking other people are unhappy.

Perhaps you think that's a very wild statement.

I don't, and maybe you won't when I tell you just how I mean it.

Whether they admit it to themselves or not, I thoroughly believe that a very great part of many people's enjoyment of valuable opportunities and possessions is in thinking that not everybody can have them.

In other words, a great deal of the pleasure they receive is founded on other people's envy, which is certainly a very poignant kind of unhappiness.

Why else is it that a pretty model or an attractive style, which the rich madame is delighted with and regards as very beautiful as long as it is hers exclusively, is relegated to limbo as soon as it becomes sufficiently in-

pensive for a few other people to have it?

What else is it that makes the possession of a diamond seem infinitely more desirable than the possession of its paste imitation, even in the eyes of those who could not probably tell the difference between the two?

How few values are determined by beauty and utility and not at all by rarity—that is the possibility of general ownership.

Brussels net stocks are seen in black, white or black and white, trimmed with tucks, Persian printed nurl or lace edging.

Just as much false hair is being worn as ever, in spite of the fact that the new coiffure styles do not tolerate the pompadour.

Brocaded silks and satins of all kinds are much admired; so are the printed chiffons and the bordered ribbons and marquisettes.

The newest fad in footwear this autumn and winter will be fur-trimmed boots, to be worn with fur and fur-trimmed garments.

A charming fall coat for a little girl is made of gray corduroy, pleated and finished with a broad leather belt of the same shade.

### Bird That Never Flies.

The ostrich, because of its resemblance to the camel, has been said to be the connecting link between the beasts and the birds. There is a horny excrescence on the breast of both the dromedary and the ostrich, on which they lean while resting; they have similarly formed feet; the same muscular neck; their food is much the same, and both can go an incredibly long time without water.

Moreover, an ostrich never flies, nor is it possible for it to lift itself from the ground in the slightest degree by the use of its wings; but, like the camel, it is very swift-footed. In its native country the shells of the eggs afford almost the only household utensils used. An egg will weigh from three to four pounds, and it is equal to two dozen hen's eggs. It requires thirty-five minutes to boil one, and longer if required hard. A fresh egg is worth twenty-five dollars.

The keeper of an ostrich farm says he birds are the only thing he ever bred that he has not succeeded in taming. They are known to live to be seventy-five years old, and some think they will reach a hundred. They are about eight feet in height. Their hearing and sight are very acute, and these seem to be about all the senses they are blessed with. Their legs are very powerful, and are the only weapon of defence; when they attack an enemy, they do so by kicking, but always strike forward and never backward.

The choice "ostrich feathers" are found only in the wings; the unadorned feathers vary in price, having been as low as twenty-five dollars per pound and as high as three hundred dollars, and there are from seventy to ninety feathers in a pound. A single bird rarely furnishes more than a dozen fine feathers, and the birds themselves, if fine ones, are valued at one thousand dollars per pair.

### Motoring Comes High in England.

Driving a high-powered motor car in England is now an expensive amusement, for under the new license act, which has recently gone into effect, a license for a car of more than sixty horse-power costs \$210. By the new law the charge for license is graded according to horse-power, as is the practice in Massachusetts, but the classification is more detailed, and the charges much higher than here. The new English license rates are as follows:

Motor cycle or tricycle, \$5; motor cars under 6 1/2 horse-power, \$10.50; 6 1/2 to 12 horse-power, \$17.75; 12 to 16 horse-power, \$21; 16 to 25 horse-power, \$31.50; 25 to 33 horse-power, \$42; 33 to 40 horse-power, \$52.50; 40 to 50 horse-power, \$105; over 50 horse-power, \$210. Although this law has been in effect only a few weeks it has resulted in an increased demand for low-powered cars, and it is reported that many high-powered machines have been put on the market at very low prices. The old system of licensing was graded according to the weight of cars, the price for a car not exceeding one ton in weight being \$10.50 and for a car from one to two tons in weight being \$21.

The net proceeds of the automobile licenses, which it is estimated will be large, will be applied, together with the gasoline duties, for road improvement. Medical practitioners who keep motor cars for use in connection with their profession are entitled to a reduction of one-half of the license fees.

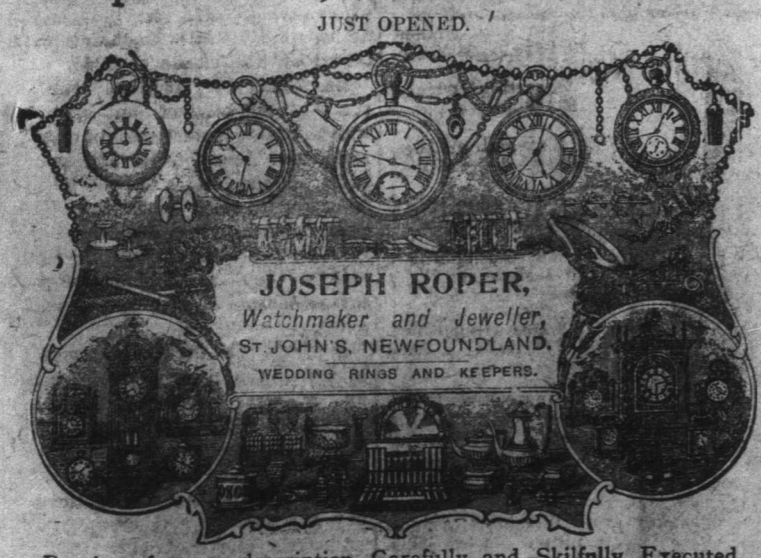

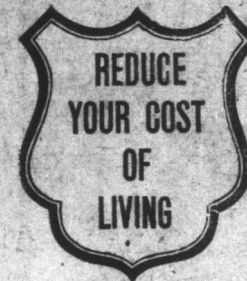

## Portuguese Revolution.

### Bloody Battle on Tuesday—Public Buildings of Lisbon in Hands of Republicans—Revolution Not Extended to the Provinces—The Army Divided—Fear for King Manuel's Life.

Special Evening Telegram. LISBON, Oct. 6. The number of casualties, as a result of the fighting in Lisbon, is very large. The dead exceeded one hundred in the early skirmishes of the outbreak, according to advices brought here by the steamer Cap Blanco. The steamer was lying off Lisbon when the rioting within the city began. The first authoritative news of the outbreak reached the outside world by wireless message from the Captain. According to the story told by the passengers of the Cap Blanco, the revolution broke out immediately after a banquet at the Royal Palace in honour of the President-elect of Brazil. Persons on the steamer witnessed stirring scenes in the streets. Twice they saw the cavalry charge the mob, and also watched the bombardment and storming of the palace. Crowds of dock laborers who were watching the bombardment cheered repeatedly, as they saw shells drop within the walls of the palace.

Special Evening Telegram. VIENNA, Oct. 6. Duke Michael of Boulogne, Pretender to the Portuguese Throne, is now in Bavaria with Prince Von Lovenstein, his brother-in-law. One of

flag of the republic to the peak of the flagpole, and saluted it with the guns of the warships. Early to-day the Government received further advices, confirming the information that the revolutionary movement, originating in Lisbon, had gained no ground in the Provinces. The Radical Club last night illuminated its building, in celebration of the uprising, and members sang the Marseillaise. Members of the Cabinet went to the Palace, and implored the King to seek safety, saying that they were unable to answer for his life.

(Daily News Message.) LONDON, Oct. 6. The Portuguese legation is still without news of the situation in Lisbon. No connected account of the fighting is yet available. By an old Treaty alliance, confirmed seven years ago, Britain is bound to come to the assistance of the King of Portugal, should he be deposed by a rebellion, but this succour must first be applied for; therefore, in the opinion of British Statesmen, no difficulty is likely to arise in the present case, although should King Manuel claim protection, he would be removed on a British warship to British territory.

(Daily News Message.) MADRID, Oct. 6, 9.30 A.M. The struggle between the revolutionists and royalists in Lisbon is continuing to-day.

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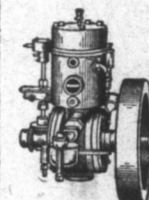
