

## SOLIGNUM.

**A Remarkable Test! Locally made by  
Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.**  
To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the at-  
tacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet  
in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the  
balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the  
centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, imme-  
diately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf  
(which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first)  
for Three Months.—On taking it up at the end of that time we  
found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance  
in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had pen-  
etrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly  
begun boring before coming in contact with it.  
Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we  
handled, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends,  
leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same  
place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and  
Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but  
the centre was riddled with worm holes.  
Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by  
those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other  
wood work.

Mother of Mercy! open her eyes! and the worthy man, falling upon his knees, prayed for the wife of Oscar Anateau, the Anarchist and infidel."

The Anarchist stepped from out the prison walls a free man. None of his associates were there to meet him, none knew the time when he would be released; and although he spoke at the meetings of the Brotherhood, he had no friends among the many who applauded the threats he uttered against society, and for speaking which he had just undergone a period of imprisonment. He looked round, dazed somewhat, like one coming from the night into the noise and bustle and light of noonday. Then a young girl sprang forward, and

with a mingled sob and cry of joy, clasped him in her arms, while he strained her to his breast.

"My Joan! My wife!" was all he could say at first; and then, seeing a small crowd gathering, some of whom were beginning to threaten the Anarchist—who was well known to many—he led Joan away, and hailing a cab, drove to their squalid rooms in a low quarter of the city; for the Anarchist was not to find lodgings elsewhere but amid the haunts of criminals.

"And how did you find out the time when I was to be discharged?" Oscar asked, as soon as the cab moved on, followed by the hoots of the onlookers.

"I waited for you," was the simple reply, but one which told him, were the information wanting, of her great love.

She had waited by the prison gates for the past three weeks from dawn to evening, ready to be the first to greet him.

Oscar Anateau was unlike the popular idea of an Anarchist. He was a well-set-up, military-looking man, who had served with distinction in the Army, and since he had left it he had proved a good honest worker, and clever at his trade, which was that of an engineer. When he had married Joan he had saved a little money, and she had her small dot, and married life began happily enough

with them. He used to go to church with her sometimes, and to confession. Politics be never troubled his head about; his wife was his world, and he did not look further.

But when he had been married two years, one of the partners in the great engineering firm where he was employed raised up a man to be foreman who was known as a bully. This man—Black Michael he was nicknamed—was as soon as he obtained power, became the tyrant of the works. If he took a dislike to any man, the poor fellow was discharged at a moment's notice, without a character, and left to starve. Good workmanship was no security; he was fickle in his likes and dislikes, and no man in his department knew from one week to another how long he would stay on.

So a number of them, headed by Oscar Anateau, whose kind heart was inflamed at the injustice done, waited on the partners, and begged them to intercede. But these gentlemen chose to uphold the bully. They even went further, and discharged all the hands forming the deputation.

A riot on a small scale, followed by a lock-out was the result, and Oscar saw men hungering, and women and children pining to death; and after a vain appeal to the capitalists he began to speak publicly against them.

Then all the employers closed the workshops against the locked-out men. Some went to the bad, some died, and Oscar's kind heart became hardened—but never to his Joan. He listened to the lectures of the Atheists, and refused to believe in a Deity because he had seen helpless men and women die of cruel starvation; and at length he joined the extreme Anarchist section, and openly preached war against capitalist.

### Rash Judgment.

What's the cause of rash judgments? The first cause is that perversity so common in this world and in one sense it is the least unworthy of an upright mind. The world knows and esteems itself at its just value; it knows that in the life of workings appearances are often most deceitful when they look best, and therefore it finds a difficulty in believing in virtue.

But this general reason of the depravity of the world will not justify a Christian in tarnishing his neighbor's reputation when he has no good reason for believing in the existence of evil. I may think that the world is a sea of corruption, and I should not be far wrong.

Still, I may not extend this conclusion to any individual in particular without proof. But where the world is most liable to grave and continual errors is when it seeks to judge the virtuous, applying to them this general rule which the corruption of the world

has introduced into a perverted state of society.

The world does not know, or rather it malignantly feigns not to know, that in spite of the corruption of the age, there does exist a race of men for whom virtue is not a vain word, but who habitually make justice, goodness, and holiness the rule of their conduct, even although some passing defects, from which no one is exempt, may be pointed out in their lives. But these defects do not by any means authorize us in condemning and tarnishing the whole of an irreproachable life, nor in conceiving evil suspicions of the most virtuous actions.—Mgr. Landriot, Archbishop of Rheims.

Garber for the Prince.

STATELY CEREMONY.

We are enabled to publish details of the stately ceremony of investing the Prince of Wales with the Garter, which took place in the Throne Room at Windsor on Saturday, June 10, at midday.

The Sovereign, being seated in the chair of state, and the Queen being on his left hand, King Manoel, Prince Arthur of Connaught, the Duke of Connaught and Prince Christian in their seats at the upper end of the table, the Sovereign will command Garber (Sir A. Scott-Gatty) to summon the Knights Companions, who will enter the throne room as their names are called over.

The Knights Companions will take their seats at the table. The Prelate (Bishop of Winchester), will take his stand to the right hand of the Sovereign, the Chancellor (Bishop of Oxford) on the left hand of the Queen, and the Register (Dr. Elliot), Garber, Black Rod (Admiral Sir H. Stephenson), and Secretary (Colonel Sir D. Dawson) standing at the foot of the table.

The Prince of Wales will then, by the Sovereign's command, be conducted from his apartments to the throne room, between the Duke of Connaught and Prince Arthur, preceded by the Secretary, carrying the Star and Collar of the Order, Black Rod carrying the Riband and Garter, and Garber carrying Garter. On entering the throne room his Royal Highness will be received by the Sovereign, the Royal Knights, and the Knights Companions standing.

His Royal Highness will then be conducted before the Sovereign, who will indicate to him the seat upon his (the Sovereign's) immediate right hand.

Black Rod will next present in like manner the Riband and Garter to the Sovereign, who, assisted as before, will adjust the same on the left shoulder of his Royal Highness, the Chancellor pronouncing the Admonition. The Secretary will then present in like manner the Star of the Order, which the Sovereign will affix to his Royal Highness's left breast.

The Sovereign will thereupon give the Accolade to his Royal Highness, who will then proceed round the table, receiving the congratulations of each of the Knights in turn. The Chapter being ended, the following procession will go to St. George's Chapel:—

- Officers of Arms: York Herald, Richmond Herald, Windsor Herald, Somerset Herald. Knights Companions: Lord Minto, Lord Selborne, Lord Northampton, Lord Carrington, Duke of Wellington, Duke of Bedford, Duke of Portland, Lord Elgin, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Rosebery, Lord Cadogan, Duke of Norfolk, Lord Durham, Lord Crewe, Duke of Richmond, Duke of Marlborough, Lord Roberts, Duke of Northumberland, Duke of Buccleuch, Lord Breadalbane, Duke of Abercorn, Lord of Londonderry, Lord Aberavenny.

- Royal Knights: Prince Arthur of Connaught, King Manoel, Prince Christian, Duke of Connaught. Prince of Wales: Black Rod, Register, Garber, Chancellor, Prelate, The Queen, The Sovereign, Mistress of Robes, Equerry, Equerry to King Manoel.

The procession thus formed will pass down the Grand Staircase to the Sovereign's Entrance, where it will meet, and be preceded by the Deputy Constable of Windsor Castle (Lord Esher), the Constable (Duke of Argyll), and the Military Knights. The procession will then pass, by way of the visitors' entrance, the Norman gateways, the Winchester Tower, the Middle and Lower Wards, and the gateway of the Horse-Shoe Cloisters, to the west door of St. George's Chapel, where it will be met, and preceded by the canons, minor canons, lay clerks and choristers.

The five collects at the service will be for St. George's Day, for the Sovereign and Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, for the Chapter and College of St. George, for England and the King's Dominions at large, and for all in woe or sorrow. The procession will return by the same route to the Waterloo Chamber.—Daily Mail.

**REAL BARGAINS IN LADIES' SHOES**



While the hour hand on your clock crawls twice round the dial, between twenty and thirty men, women and children have become "missing" in London. In between twenty and thirty homes anxious ears are strained to catch the sound of a footstep that does not come—to hear a familiar knock at the door, the sound of a voice. Close upon ten thousand people a year disappear in the modern Babylon! Slightly over half of these are ultimately traced or return to their friends and relations.

What becomes of the others? No one will ever know, perhaps, what is the fate of many of them. Most of the "missing" ones disappear, however, from some cause well known to their relations and friends. There is nothing mysterious as to how they come to be missing. They have disappeared deliberately. People who vanish for no cause that can be ascertained only form about a third of the missing role.

Some three thousand people, however, disappear each year mysteriously—"as if the earth had opened and swallowed them up"—and for no cause that can be guessed. They are the persons who are the least likely to be heard of again. Only about one in four returns or is traced.

"Something has happened!"

The anxious one has waited till his fastness has ripened into anxiety and anxiety into certainty of evil. "Something has happened!" At first the expected one was "late." A misadventure, or a hundred trivial things may account for him, or her, being delayed. But the hand of the clock crawls on, and day gives place to night, or day to day, and the expected one does not come. "Something has happened." The terrified one seeks the police.

The officer in charge of the police station has had abundance of experience in such matters. He takes the name and address of the inquirer and the name and age, and description of the missing person. He demands particulars of the most minute details from the person seeking aid. The particulars are taken in a "recognised order": 1. The name of the person missing; 2. The name of the person who has been missing; 3. Particulars of the complexion, hair, eyes, whiskers, moustache, and shape of face; 4. Any personal peculiarities or distinctive marks; 5. The clothing.

"Do you know of any reason which might explain his disappearing?" he asks.

The cause, if there is one—or on the inquirer will reveal—frequently supplies the clue to the missing one's discovery. The officer seeks as much information as he can get as to the vanished one's business, habits, friends, haunts, and pleasures, and the inquirer is often amazed at the seeming absurdity of the questions. But the examiner has a reason "at the back of his head" for each. Every police officer in charge of a station becomes a species of expert in information gathering respecting missing persons. He has enough experience.

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Click—click—click. The police station telegraph operator is at work flashing the particulars of the missing person to all the other stations in London. In an hour or so the appearance of the missing individual will be pictured in the mind's eye of thousands of policemen, for that description will be read by the chief of police at each station to all constables setting off on their rounds.

Telegraphed to Scotland Yard, the particulars are forthwith set up in type and printed in the private news sheet that the "Yard" distributes to the police stations—perhaps three or four times a day. If anyone has a photograph of the missing one it may be there reproduced. Something like eighteen thousand pairs of police eyes will be on the look-out for that wanted one.

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The Unknown Fate.

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In one of London's asylums a short time back was a man named Holmes. He had been a sturdy young fellow till the blow fell upon him—the disappearance of his little golden-haired child a girl of seven years. The most thorough search revealed no clue to her. At the end of three months her father was mad.

"The unknown fate" of a beloved one is more terrible than death. Beneath the torture of that uncertainty strong men and women have become physical and mental wrecks in a very short space of time.

One pathetic case was that of a boy named Johnson who was carried off by a travelling showman, and who was discovered and returned to his mother some six months later. He was taken back by his rescuers to the house of his mother, a widow, and as they drew near to the house, ceding the little fellow by the hand, he mother's face was seen looking eagerly out of her bedroom window on the first floor. Then the face disappeared. She did not come to meet him. At last one went to call her. They found her on her knees beside her bed, and waited quiet and still not daring to interrupt that prayer of gratitude for her child's return. But she did not move. They grew alarmed. The woman was dead! Joy had been too much for that heart that had borne so much all those dreary months of waiting.

**S. S. Titanic Launched.**

New White Star Liner is Now Afloat. Belfast, May 31. — Enthusiastic crowds lined the banks of the River Laffan and cheered lustily as the White Star Line's great steamer "Titanic" was launched with appropriate ceremonies this morning.

The "Titanic" will enter the White Star's New York-Southampton service late in the year, but her sister vessel, the "Olympic," steams from Southampton two weeks hence for New York, and these two sea monsters, each 45,000 tons register, 882½ feet long and 92½ feet broad, boast the distinction of being the largest and finest vessels in the world.

These massive ships are also notable for the enchanting beauty and the unusual spaciousness of their passenger accommodations, and in first, second and third class the greatest comfort is promised. On both steamers swimming pools, tennis and handball courts, and Turkish and electric bath establishments are among the innovations introduced for the pleasure of the passengers.

Coronation Regulations

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Acting under powers conferred by the Act, recently passed by Parliament, the Home Secretary, Mr. Churchill, has issued an order prohibiting the navigation of any air-craft of any description over the County of London on the three days of the Coronation processions and over Windsor and London on three other days devoted to events connected with the Coronation. Then penalty is imprisonment for six months or a fine of a thousand pounds. The police regulations to insure public safety on Coronation Day are becoming so rigorous as to be almost calculated to deter the general public from any attempt to witness the procession. It is now announced that all the barrier gates will be closed not later than 8 o'clock in the morning and that all street-holders must be in their places by seven o'clock. The Admiralty announces that Coronation Day will be observed in the Navy by a revival of ancient custom, known as "Splicing the main brace," which means the grant of an extra allowance of grog to the men.

**Cable News.**

**WASHINGTON, June 12.**  
 Reciprocity will go through the Senate, said Senator Lodge of Massachusetts at the White House today. Whether Senator Root's amendment goes through is not so material. Even if it does, the agreement will be just as effective. Lodge said that he had abandoned the idea of offering an amendment for the protection of the fishermen.

**LONDON, June 12.**  
 Experts on behalf of large British Railroads have reported favourably upon the invention of a safety appliance which is a modification of the logic principle invention, and practically makes the derailment of trains, while rounding curves, an impossibility, thus allowing increased speed, which will enable trains to make the run of 185 miles between London and Manchester in 2 hours.

**PARIS, June 12.**  
 Official confirmation is given to the statement, published here, that France has notified the Powers, that were signatories to the Algeiras Treaty, that she has informed Spain she cannot approve of the Spanish occupation of the El Araish territory in Morocco. For the moment, France will treat with Spain.

**NEW YORK, June 12.**  
 Five are dead and five missing, as a result of today's storm in the city and environs. A tornado was followed by a downpour of rain and lightning. The property loss is a million dollars.

**LONDON, June 12.**  
 Oxford University to-day conferred the degree of Doctor of Civil Law (D.C.L.) upon Sir Edward Morris, of Newfoundland; Sir J. G. Ward, of New Zealand; and Premier Louis Botha, of South Africa.

**OTTAWA, June 12.**  
 Mr. Gooding, of the Barbados Legislature, who is here to-day, states that there is every indication that reciprocity between Canada and the West Indies is a thing of the near future.

**HALIFAX, June 12.**  
 John House, a Newfoundlander, was lost overboard from the schooner Vagabond. The body has not been recovered.

**Coronation Concert.**

Last Evening's Meeting — Citizens Asked to Illuminate.

The Coronation Committee met again last evening in the Judges' Chambers, His Lordship Chief Justice Horwood occupying the chair. All the unfinished business standing over from the previous meeting was disposed of, satisfactory reports were received from the sub-committees, and arrangements generally pretty well finalized.

Letters of acceptance, from the ladies and gentlemen, invited to sing solos, and from the four Brigade Bands, were received and read by the Secretary, who informed the Committee that he had, as requested, written Lieut.-Commander Atlay, of H. M. S. "Calyso" intimating to him the pleasure it would afford them to have some of his men to assist in decorating the interior of the Rink. No reply had yet been received from the Commander, as he was out of town; but the Committee had the indirect assurance that he would be glad to comply with their request.

The "great big building" will be brilliantly lit and beautifully decorated with evergreens, flags of the Empire, red, white and blue bunting and Chinese lanterns, the latter enclosing electric bulbs, so as to obviate all risk of fire and make the thousands of people assembled there feel perfectly safe.

On the immense platform, which has a frontage of about forty feet, will be rows of seats, one above the other, to accommodate the singers, while the comfort and convenience of the players will be equally well provided for by the Rink Committee—Messrs. Bennett, Slattery, Howley and Barber.

His Excellency the Governor and suite, the officers of the warships in port, the Judges of the Supreme Court, members of the Executive Government, representative prelates and clergymen of the different religious denominations, and other distinguished guests of the Committee will occupy seats in the galleries. As many of these will appear in uniform or court dress, and as the ladies will be elegantly attired — with the back ground arranged so as to produce the best possible effect—the view from the auditorium will be a brilliant and imposing one.

To add to the general interest, handsomely printed programmes, such as would likely be preserved by those present as souvenirs of the Coronation, will be freely distributed among the audience, and in sufficient numbers to enable every one to obtain a copy. Other pleasing features of the event will be announced after the next Committee meeting, when, it is hoped, the work of preparation will be finished.

Before the meeting closed, the Committee unanimously decided to "light up" their residences on the nights of the Coronation festivities, and ask their fellow-citizens to do the same. Most of us still remember the splendid effect of the general illumination here in 1901, when their Majesties, as the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, visited Newfoundland and Britain's other Dominions beyond the Seas.

**Hints to Householders**

**PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS** in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said:—"Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for offices, consulting rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had nothing else in my office for the last thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to them."

Gas fires are universally used by medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients.

The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainment, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests with gas fires, etc., in May and June, 1906.

**Woman Attacked.**

Sunday night at 10.30 a woman who resides on Scott Street, in coming from the home of a friend, was attacked and insulted by two scamps whom she first met opposite Mrs. Mitchell's, Queen's Road. As she passed them they jostled against her, and when she remonstrated they laughed and passed swiftly on. The night was wet and the street was deserted, and as she went along near Victoria Street the same brutal tactics were adopted and the woman became greatly frightened. She ran and they pursued her and on Harvey Road, near the Parade Rink, they attempted to detain her, when seeing a man coming along they ran away. Both were respectably dressed but would be known by the lady if she saw them again. It is a pity such a trace of scoundrelism could not be rounded up and given the punishment they so justly deserve.

**Infant Died on Intercolonial Train.**

Coroner Decides an Inquest Unnecessary.

The death of an infant a few months old took place under particularly pathetic circumstances on the Halifax express, which arrived in the city early this morning. The child, whose name was Peter Cahill, was put to sleep by his mother on the train Thursday night. Everything was thought to be well with the child, but later he became quite weak, and when the train was in the vicinity of Rochesay the young child quietly passed away. Coroner Berryman met the train on its arrival in the city, and after examining the little body, decided an inquest was unnecessary. The mother was travelling from Newfoundland with her three children to join her husband in Cambridge, Mass. The little boy who died this morning was a twin, whose little mate died under similar circumstances only two weeks ago. Mrs. Cahill was much grieved over the sad affair. The remains were placed in the waiting room and were later removed to Chamberlain's undertaking rooms.—St. John (N.B.) Globe, June 9.

**700 Pound Halibut.**

Largest Ever Brought to Billingsgate.

The largest halibut on record was landed at Billingsgate Market yesterday. It weighed 700 lbs., or nearly a third of a ton, and was part of a catch of 100 tons of fish from the White Sea, North Russia, landed by the trawler Macfarlane, of Hull.

The mammoth fish was brought from the trawler into the market on planks borne on the shoulders of six porters. It was offered for sale by auction by Messrs. Peter Forge, but such is the glut of fish just now that it only realised £2 5s., or just over three farthings per lb. It was purchased by Mr. Taylor, fishmonger, of Watney Street, Stepney.

"A fish of this enormous size," said Mr. Forge, a member of the firm of salesmen, "is quite as palatable and nutritious as any of smaller size. The travelling of the White Sea has been successful. There are now fifty vessels going to and fro, and their cargoes have had a very material effect upon the prices of fish in London. The Russian Government, however, has recently shown a disposition to shut out the English trawlers by imposing a 12-mile fishing limit.—Daily Mail, May 27.


