The French aviator, Lieut. Garros, A On the evening of the 17th we exwas forced to the ground yesterday at Nigelmunster, 12 kilometres north of Ypres, connecting with the railway to West Zwartelene. This was followed up by an attack which gained possession of the whole of the enemy's trenches on the Hill. The enemy suffered heavily from the explosion and we took two officers and fifteen nen prisoners in spite of heavy bombardment, toward the morning, and followed this at 6.30 a.m. with a determined counter-attack. This at tack was pressed home, and stiff hand-to-hand fighting followed. Our infantry with great gallantry and determination, and well supported by artillery, drove off the enemy with complete success. Our losses were very heavy, but the Germans suffered still more severely from our machine gun fire which caught them in close order in the open.

On April 17th the enemy renewed their attacks, making desperate efforts to regain their positions, which was of great importance. At one time they succeeded in gaining a foothold on the southern slopes of the Hill, but were driven back again. At night the whole Hill was in our hands, and the ground gained had

been consolidated. This morning the enemy's attacks ceased, but they continued to bomhard the Hill. In the latter fighting two more officers and 30 men were captured, making a total of four officers and forty-five men.

A BERLIN REPORT.



KEEPING THE MOUTH HYGIENIC

Each morning the grooming and horough brushing of the teeth and cleaning of the mouth should be accomplished with vigorous perseverance. The morning cleansing gives a purer and more healthful breath and A Skeleton in the Closet. takes away the accumulations that Brandon Coyle's Wife. may have gathered on the teeth during the sleeping hours.

Before using a new tooth brush, i should be allowed to soak for two hours in cold water, as this prevents the usual shedding of the bristles, and the tooth brushes should be kept clean and antiseptic and frequently renewed, and the brushes should a!ways be placed with bristles down after using until the water has been drained from them.

Teach children never to crack nuts or bite bread with their teeth, for be t understood that once the enamel which is a thin shell covering the tooth structure and not the tooth itself, is injured, cracked or worn,

trouble is bound to ensue. It is not enough to brush the teeth and gums every morning, though this is important; one should use an antiseptic mouth wash, and one of the most beneficial washes for daily use is a weakened boric solution, and this is prepared by dissolving onehalf ounce of boric powder in on pint of warm water.

Great care should be given to the selection of powder or pastes used for cleansing the teeth, as some powders have sufficient roughness in the material to wear the enamel, and the best way is to make a good powder at home. An excellent and safe powder is made by mixing well together one-half ounce each of white Castile soap powdered, boric powder and pulverized sugar and two ounces of prepared chalk, one ounce powdered or ris root and one-half drachm powder-

ed winter-green. If this powder is used daily and the mouth rinsed out with the boric solution after brushing the teeth at night, it will tend to prevent chemical changes, which during sleep take place without hindrance, unless som






