

Pedestrians.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-Drivers of vehicles in his city are either unaware of their responsibilities or wilfully disregard the law. The driver of a vehicle cannot legally drive where he pleases, but a pedestrian may walk where he likes. It is the custom for drivers of milk waggons, carters and outport people to drive pedestrians from the road and often into the deep snow threatening to run over them. On Christmas Day and the days following, because some snow lay in the middle of the road, at the junction of the King's Bridge Road with the Circular Road, drivers of vehicles used the narrow sidewalk and drove pedestrians into the road.

This sort of conduct would not be tolerated in any other country, and nedestrians ought to note the names of any drivers who use the sidewalks, and hand them to the police, as the Municipal Regulations, Chapter 36, Section 1, provides that: "Any person who shall, in any city, town or settlement in this Colony, draw, drive or carry any truck, sleigh, wheel-barrow or other vehicle in or upon any way used or appointed to be used as a footwalk or sidewalk, except directly across such footwalk or sidewalk on unnecessary occasions, or lead, ride or drive on any such footwalk or sidewalk any beast, etc., etc., shall be liable for every offence to pay a penalty not exceeding twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment for a period not exceeding thirty days."

A Weman Doctor's Adventure.

She Describes The Tragedy of The Sinking of an Italian Emigrant Ship By a Torpedo.

(By French Official Wireless.) Signor Orlando, the Keeper of the Seals to the Italian Government, made a speech on Sunday at Palermo in the presence of the President of the Italian Chamber, Signor Salandra, in which he said:-

"We were fighting up to now without hatred, and certainly not through a spirit of revenge, but now that our hearts have been so cruelly torn by the agonised cries of our drowning womenfolk, now that we have seen before our very eyes those mothers turned to raving lunatics, because of these little children's hands raised in piteous appeal to Almighty God, now that all these innocent victims have sunk in the bottomless depths of the sea, we will fight with hatred and through a spirit of revenge to our last penny and to the last drop of our blood."

Mrs. Cecile L. Grelle, of Cornell Medical College, in the United States, was a passenger on the Ancona, the Italian emigrant ship which was torpedoed by a German or Austrian submarine. She has written for the Daily Mail a narrative so remarkable for its word-picture of what actually happened on board before the vessel sank that we give the story at length. It was to this tragedy the Italian Minister referred.

It Was Noon.

"Lunch was just finished. It was noon. We were five first cabin passengers-four Italians and myself, the only American in the saloon, and the two ship's doctors.

"The captain was absent. No one had seen him since dinner the evening before, when he was hurrledly summoned from the tables by an urgent call to the bridge. We were quietly finishing our coffee when I heard the rushing of persons outside the dining-room and the machinery slowing down.

"I thought something was wrong. I saw one of the doctors rush from the table, and not realizing what was wrong I started for the fore deck. Almost immediately, I heard the whizzing of a shell, which with a tremendous crash fell on the deck aft. Looking out on the sea I saw clearly outlined a huge submarine dangerously near. I could see ten or a dozen men. She had four huge guns on the conning tower and another on the fore part. I was not able to distinguish clearly the flag, but I saw it had horizontal red and white stripes. I saw and heard enough to know we were being bombarded.

No Warning.

"We received no warning to stop. The first shot crashed into the fore part of the ship, shattering the bridge and deck. The ship immediately slowed down. Shots followed in rapid succession, although the Ancona stopped immediately. Huge timbers were falling. Part of the rail near me gave way. The first person I saw killed was a man who fell into the sea with the rail

"All was confusion and panic. Everyone lost his head. I saw dozens fall dead and wounded on the deck. I remained perfectly calm, and started to go down to the second class deck, where I had deposited all my money with the purser. I had difficulty in getting down because the stair was partly shot away and debris obstructed the floor. But I reached the purser's office, to find him lying prone dead before his desk. The second cabin was evidently the place where the first shot struck with greatest intensity. Whole parts had fallen into the sea, and wounded and dead lay everywhere, including many babies, women and children.

Chaos Reigned.

"I decided to return to my cabin to look for my passport, but it was a journey amid falling shots and the screams of women who were grasping my ankles and begging me for aid where aid was powerless. When I got back to my cabin I tried to open my trunk, which was under the bed. I had found my keys, and as I bent Baker's Onion Relish. I asked to be taken in. Someone said, 'Jump.' had on a white serge tennis costum and flat-heeled tennis shoes. I may the jump-it was at least 20 feetand, gauging the distance exactly, 1 landed in the centre of the boat on a rolling water barrel but absolutely uninjured, my box of trinkets still in

my hand. "A moment after I jumped, a young woman, an emigrant, threw herself head foremost from the deck, struck the side of our boat, and fell into the sea. She was so near to me I could drag her into our boat. She was soaked through, faint, and had both legs bro-

Revolver and Compass

"We started to pull off from the Ancona, expecting every moment to be killed, for shells struck many of the small boats and injured or killed the passengers. Fortune favored me, for our boat had an officer of extreme courage to guide us. Carlo Lamberti. He took the tiller, ordered the rowers, put his revolver beside his compass in front of him, and started us toward the west. We picked up five women and one man from the sea. "It was 12.30 as we drew away. I saw the track of the torpedo that had been fired from the submarine. It hit the Ancona with a terrific explosion, accompanied by a great mass of steam and water, which rose high above the vessel. She listed, turned turtle, and sank after seven minutes. I saw the officers' boat leave the Ancona a few moments before she disappeared.

"The sea was calm, so that our seven small boats stood out clearly. We went in different directions, ours making for Messina. It was leaking badly, however, and while the women ildren shrieked hysterica and some clung around me, I helped

to bail and tried to quieten them. Mad Mother's Baby.

"After about four hours we noticed boat sending distress signals to us. We rowed towards it, and found its leak so bad that it was going down rapidly. It had few oars and no rowers. Carlo Lamberti, our officer. calmly pointing his revolver, ordered the men to help the women and wounded men into our boat. One woman, mad with fright, dropped her baby into the sea. I picked the little thing out-it was tightly rolled up in swaddling clothes-wrapped m y sweater around it, and cared for it

"Evening fell, our lanterns were lit, we fired Bengal lights, and just as the sun was setting we glimpsed a long black speck on the horizon. We rowed towards her, and finally perceived she was a French cruiser, which signalled us to come near. At p.m., wet, cold, wretched, but our lives spared, we got on board. We met with every kindness from the French naval and civil authorities. The captain of the cruiser showed me the utmost courtesy, gave me his cabin, and after giving my professional services to all the wounded I rested until the morning."



Naturalization of Brave Man's Widow. After the death at Messines in Ocober, 1914, of Squadron Sergeant-Major H. W. Baker, 11th Hussars, who had served for 19 years in the British Army, it was discovered that he was a German, and during the past few days the Home Office have granted a certificate of naturalization to his widow, Mrs. Joan Mowat Bredalbane Sutherland Baker, of Godalming.

Mrs. Baker was born at Loch Fyne in Argyllshire, but her marriage made her a German and, according to the law, an "alien enemy." It was only after her husband had been dead eight months that the discovery that ne was a German was made. It then became necessary for Mrs. Baker to Pushthrough, per J. Camp, register and she also forfeited her pension. Now her nationality has Bell Island Patriotic Combeen restored together with arrears of

Mrs. Bak nationality through reading in ewspaper that a Mrs. Leibold, German, had been prosecuted for failing to register. It was stated that Mrs. Leibold had a son, a Squadron sergeant-major in the British Army. who in the name of Baker had served in the 11th Hussars and had been killed in action. Mrs. Baker afterwards found that her husband was brought to England by his mother before he was three years old. He always appeared to dislike anything German: he even objected to his little girl having toys marked "made in Germany." He was killed while taking a message from his squadron to headquarters. In recording his death the regimental magazine stated that he was a fine type of soldier, a capable N. C. O., a crack shot with Mons rifle and revolver, and a splendid; horseman and swordsman."

Stenographers.

A stenographer is a young lady who takes down the hard thunk thoughts of her employer in a notebook and afterwards edits and improves them on a typewriter, as soon as she has done up her cuffs, revised her hair, manicured her nails and modified her complexion.

There was a time when there were no stenographers, and business offices were gloomy places, in which men swore and wore hats, smoked cigars and kept their feet on the tables and their coats on hooks in the closets. Then the cheery stenographer was invented and through her coming, most of the gloom has been dispelled.

Stenographers are manufactured by business colleges out of shop girls, farmers' daughters and assistant housekeepers, with now and then a high school graduate as a prize package. They have good educations and can spell almost any small word by ear. However, the memory of the average stenographer is somewhat defective, which makes it almost impossible for her to understand her notes after they have stood for a few min-

Stenographers are great linguists and are forever inventing new words and phrases. A stenographer will write "Supreme Cuff," "snuborgination," "Witness be noses and says" and other remarkable improvements on the language, without giving it a thought. Indeed most of them are very modest over these achievements and will take half an hour of their employer's valuable time to convince him he is entitled to all the credit of the improvement.

Stenographers get from \$3 a week to \$10,000 a year and earn less and more than this. A poor stenographer is dear at \$3 a week, while there is always a waiting list of eager employers for the \$150 a month stenographer who sharpens her pencils in her spare time, and writes letters which can be "signed but not read."

Stenographers should always dress modestly and refrain from anything but business conversation during office hours. Unless they do this, they are very likely to become millionaires' vives, or to meet some other equally

Money Alone is **Necessary Now** to Win Victory.

London, Dec. 22.-A manifesto to the people of the country was issued co-night, over the signature of a score of leading English bankers and financiers, on the subject of the country's financial position. The signatures are headed by George Anderson, treasurer of the Bank of England. The manifesto in part follows:

"As this is a time of great national danger, it is imperative that every citizen realize the vastness of the work Great Britain has to perform. In a long war success depends mainly upon the respective financial resources of the combatants and the consequent power of one of them to maintain or add to its fighting strength, while the others are de-

clining. "It is not in doubt that the Allies' financial resources, when fully mobilized and wisely controlled, will be

vastly greater than the enemy's. . The Allies' success in defeating the enemy's efforts to cripple them in men, munitions, and money before they could assemble their full strength has now brought the war

near to its final stage. "Indeed, only one thing is now needed to command victory, namely, to provide all the money needed to support the vast armies of new men and pay for the vast quantities of arms and munitions being manufactured in all parts of the world.

National Income Maintained.

"The task of finding the greater part of the immense sums of money needed by the Allies is the especial duty of the British people, for they, in particular, possess the necessary financial resources. Their manufacturing power is unreduced by invasion; their cities undestroyed; their

ports not shut off. "The income of the British people has been maintained at a high level. Exports, though not so great as before the war, are greater than in 1909. The income from capital invested abroad has been reduced but little; the earnings of shipping are greater than ever, and the factories are work-

ing full time. "Moreover, the effect upon production of the great army's mobilization has been largely neutralized by the more vigorous and effective work of the civilian population, particularly the women. The average individual income is much in excess of any to-

tal heretofore reached. Co-Operation is Needed.

"In the current calendar year, the British people will spend £1,300,000,-000 on war and Government, next year £1.800.000.000. To raise this sum is a stupendous task, which will try the mettle of the nation as it has not been tried in a hundred years. The task demands the strenuous co-operation of every man, woman, youth and maiden—that the nation's energies be concentrated on the production of really essential things, that the production of all non-essentials be

wholly stopped. "The nation must avoid the consumption of all non-essentials and even restrict the consumption of essentials to the limits of efficiency. Individuals possessing securities marketable abroad must sell them to pay for goods and munitions, for which no other means of payment can be

provided. "Only by all classes adding to and carefully husbanding their income, by selling foreign securities, by creating foreign credits, will it be possible to provide the vast sum needed by the nation and its Allies."

Attempt to Blow Up Quarters.

London, Dec. 21.-A 33rd Battalion signalling officer, writing to his parents from Quebec, says that on Saturday night last fifty-seven sticks of dynamite were found under the building in which he and his men are quartered.

Two suspected German spies are under arrest, and full investigation is being made.


