ALLIED ADVANCE.

LONDON, July 25. On the western front of the Soisons-Rheims salient the Allied forces ave advanced to an average depth of three miles on a 12-mile front during the first two days. There were not new developments this morning in the battle area according to the advices from the field of the fighting received. in Lendon up to noon. The situation: was considered quite satisfactory for

CLOSING THE PINCERS.

LONDON, July 28. (Yla Reuter's Ottawa Agency,) The latest war communication shows that General Feeh is methodically continuing to close the pincers which are gripping the Germans between the Aisne and the Marne. The capture of Armentieres increases the envelopment of Duchy-le-Chateau and the capture of Oureg brings the Allies only five miles from the important road centre at Fere-en-Tardenois, from where, according to the Paris reports to-day, the Germans are hastily removing all their material that has accumulated there since the beginning of June. The Allies are thus relaxing the hold of the enemy on the Chateau Thiery-Soissons road and gradually linking up the front toward Duchy-le-Chateau, Fere-en-Tardenois and Montagne-de-Rheims where a strong line will be established. On the eastern side of the triangle the British advance north of the Ardre River is important, threatening the German left flank with envelopment, while the Franco-American troops advancing from the Marne are a menace to the German centre. The British success at Vrigny threatens Fismes, an other important centre, hence the desperation of the Germans who are attempting to prevent the Allied advance in this direction. Their defence of Soissons is also beginning to become formidable, as the Allied advance continues towards Soissons, the pivot of the German position. It is estimated that there are 400,000 Germans fighting within the wiangle, the sides of which are being squeezed by the Allied forces. Obstinate resistance and the rugged nature of the country constitute obstacles in the way of closing the pincers at the narrow opening between Rheims and Soissons, but the relentless pressure of the Allies is gradually emptying the triangle of the enemy masses.

UNDER RANGE OF ALLIED GUNS.

LONDON, July 25. It no longer is proper to speak of the pocket as running from Soissons to Rheims, for the newest advantage of the Allies has pulled the eastern edge of the pocket eight miles to the westward and making Mery Premecy the marker for the eastern rim. The mouth of the pocket is now only 21 mouth of the poears in miles wide and the whole district between the two sides is under the range of Entente Allied guns.

> FRENCH CONTINUE ATTACKS WITH SUCCESS.

LONDON, July 25. The French are continuing their abtacks between the River Ourcq and the River Marne. They advanced last night for a distance of a mile capturing the southern part of Fere Forest, and they now occupy a barn on the main road from Fere-en-Tardenois to Jaulgonne. The town of Fereen-Tardenois is now within eight thousand yards of the French lines. The French last night pushed well forward along the south bank of the River Ourcq, but this morning they found they were in an isolated position and they were compelled to fall back. East of Rheims a Polish contingent attached to the French, made a successful enterprise and captured 213 prisoners.. On the west side of the pocket the Franco-American troops have straightened out their lines at the expense of the Germans during the past twenty-four hours, this involving a loss to the enemy of about 40 square miles of territory between Armentieres and Vinceles. The line in the lowest west part of the pocket now runs straight southeast from Armentieres, and along this line the Germans have been compelled to give up the little angles and corners which they had held onto as observation posts or strategic points. The enemy's nerve centre at Fere-en-Tardenois, which as the junction of several great roads, was the most important storehouses and distribution points of the enemy, is now under cross fire from the Franco-American artillery and must be well nigh untenable, in fact no place in the whole pocket is a very comfortable position with the Allied long range guns sweeping back and forth.

Cable News

General Foch has taken a leaf out of the book of the German strategy and ordained the use by the Allied armies of the pincers system of offensive in the Soissons-Rheims salient. Both jaws of the pincers are moving smoothly with the pivot along the Marne working in unison, and the process of attempting to capture many of the nearly half a million Germans in the big pocket, is well on the way to what seems like possible success The Germans evidently don't intend to permit themselves to be entrapped without fighting. Having thrown thousands of reinforcements into the already congested salient, they have started a counter offensive of great violence along the semi-circular front from the Ourcq River to the region immediately southwest of Rheims and their men are said to have orders to stem the Allied tide of advance at all costs. Nevertheless, at last accounts the British, French, American and Italian troops, themselves well reinforced to meet the new turn in affairs, were steadily pressing forward at nearly all points on the battle line to Rheims, while east of the cathedral city a Polish contingent, the first of the Poles to enter the combat, is declared to have carried out successfully an enterprise against the enemy in which more than 200 Germans were made prisoners. The west jaw of the pincers continues to move east along the Ourcq River on both sides of the stream, and the Franco-American troops now are virtually knocking at the gates of Fere-en-Tardenois, the important railway junction and store houses for Germany's war supplies. Further south to the Marne, new advances in keeping with these in the north, have been attained. At the pivot of the pincer north of the Marne midway between Chateau Thiery and Rheims, the French have extended their line north into the forest of Fer, in the Ris forest and north of Dormans, while the east jaw of the pincer under the pressure of the British, has noticeably moved forward in a northwest direction for about a mile and a half over a three mile front to Mery Premecy and Queux. The latter village is five miles west of Rheims and a scant mile and a half from the Rheims-Fismes road. At Mery Premecy the Allied line now stands about ten and a half miles southwest of Fismes, which is the central station on the railway running between Soissons and Rheims. For a week and a day the Allied troops have hammered against the Soissons-Rheims salient until its width across between the cities has been narrowed to about 21 miles from an original width of 37 miles, while the triangular salient has been welded into a semi-circle cul-desac. Over the entire pocket the Allied artillery continues to rain shells from all sides and airmen are keeping up their intense bombing of troop formations and military works. As yet, notwithstanding the inroads of the Allied troops, there has been no sign of an impending general retreat on the part of the enemy, and if he elects to stand and fight it out and the Allied gains continue with the same success as heretofore, it seems that with the daily narrowing of the neck of the pocket the enemy necessarily will lose many men when the time comes to make his way northeast. Some perturbation is being caused in England through a strike in several cities, of munition workers. The workmen threaten a further extension

of the strike unless their demands

are met.

FRENCH HEADQUARTERS. July 25. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)-The position of the enemy on the salient south of the Aisne has become untenable. On the western side the enemy is fighting a retreating battle, depending upon the machine guns placed in advantageous positions to hold up the Allied advance while the enemy is busily engaged in removing material. There is little left of the enemy artillery on this front. Fereen-Tardenois is about the centre of the salient. An advance of a few kilometres such as the Allies made to-day would enable them to sweep with the long guns the whole remaining area to the east of the fronts where the Germans are engaged with the British and French between Vigny and the Marne. The French victory on the Avre resulted in the capture of a large number of prisoners which was made in the space of a few hours, significant of the feeble quality of the troops with which the enemy was obliged to hold sections where he did not expect an attack. Half his shock divisions have been shot to pieces between Soissons and Main de Massages. The divisions holding quiet sectors, divisions which have been systematically drained of their best men for storm units, are no match for the French infantry. The French are now within three miles of Fere-en-Tardenois, the meeting point of eight roads, and the centre of the German communication in this region. The town is being heavily shelled daily and bombed by air squadrons.
