Monarch of the Sea. THE WHALE'S TWO HUNDRED

TONS OF FLESH.

It is an erroneous idea that the animals of past ages-mammoths, mastodons, and the gigantic reptiles whose fossils have been found-were far bigger than any living creatures

The mammoth was not bigger than its living representative, the great elephant of Africa, which often stands eleven feet high at the shoul-

ders and weighs five tons. Again, the skeleton of a species of reptile of past ages, which has been given the name of diplodoca, and which can be seen in the Natural History Museum in London, is eighty-four feet long—almost three times the length of the biggest crocodile.

Misleading Measurements.

But, as Sir Ray Lankester points out in "Secrets of Earth and Sea" (Methuen), we must not be misled by this measurement as to the creature's actual bulk, for the tail is forty feet long and whip-ike, whilst the neck is twenty-three feet long, and carries a smal head not bigger than that of a horse. The body, apart from the neck and tail, was really only a little bigger than that of a large ele-

No extinct animal approached the existing whale in either bulk or weight. He is eighty to ninety feet ong, and has neither neck nor any length of tail. His outline is eggike. He weighs two hundred tonsforty times as much as a big elephant
—and is supported without any strain
on his structure by the water in which he floats.

Probably he cannot exceed some ninety feet in length and two hundred tons of bulk on account of the relatively great increase of proportional size and power required in the heart to propel the blood through such a wast mass of living tissue and keep him going as a warm-blooded mammal



The vessel was compelled to retur to Gibraltar twice for refitting, having been caught twice in a hurricane in the Mediterranean. The Commissioners consider the loss in output under these circumstances not excessive. It was in cold storage from the 15th of February to the 15th of October, 1921. The proceeds of the cargo remitted to the Government amounted to \$25,949.43. The total cost leaving a loss in realization of \$66,to the Government was \$92,425.00

The Minister of Marine and Fisher fes whose actions are the subject this enquiry is also President of the Fishermen's Union Trading Company Ltd., and it is suggested that he used his position as Minister of Ma-rine and Fisheries to the advantage of the Trading Company. A most searching enquiry has been held by the Commissioners, all the evidence available in connection with the pur-chase of the fish and the sait in question, and the storage of the latter, has been obtained and all documents bearing on these matters have been put in evidence. After the fullest consideration the Commissioners as unanimously of the opinion that ther is no foundation for the suggestion or charge that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has been guilty of wrong doing, or has used his public office for the benefit or advantage of imself or the Company of which he
