Mr. Disraeli on the Situation. The customary festivities connected with Lord Mayor's day in London ing members of Mr. Disraeli's Govern ment including the Premier himself, who at the banquet replied to the toast of Her Majesty's Ministers. In the course of his speech he drew a pleasant and gratifying picture of the state of affairs in Britain. His remarks with regard to the colonies, grity of the empire are significent The following is a synopsis of his

The following is a synopsis of his speech:

Mr. Disraeli referred to the tranquility England had enjoyed for the last six years. The reasons were not far to seek. People were now contented. The working classes of Great Britain inherited rights and privileges not yet possessed by the nobility of other lands. They had no fear of arbitrary Ministers and domiciliary visits. They possessed the right to combine for the protection of the interests of labour. Justice was pure, and no respector of individuals or classes. Although the service of the Sovereign was open to combine for the protection of the interests of labour. Justice was pure, and no respector of individuals or classes. Although the service of the Sovereign was open to all, no one was liable to le dragged unwillingly from his home employments. It was not wonderful that a hation possessed of such privileges wished to preserve them. Under such circumstances was it to be wondered at that the working classes were Conservative. Mr. Disraeli looked back to the last session of Parliament with satisfaction, but avoiding making any political forceast, said, as far as the present was concerned, the country had seldom been more prosperous. He had good authority for stating that there was a considerable revival of trade, and great promise of an increase of commercial transactions, and that the police revenues would realize all the Government anticipated. He praised Lord Northbrook, Viceroy of India, and the Marquis of Salisbury, the Indian Secretary, for their sagasity in dealing with the famine in India. Referring to the recent outcry for the separation of the colonics, he distinctly declared himself in favor of the maintenance of the integrity of the Empire. Of this policy, the annexation of the Fiji Islands was a proof. The tovernment was resolved to consolidate the Empire and establish an identity of interest and sympathy with the Colonics. He thanked the French Ambassador for the fright sentinents he expressed when replying to the toast to the diplomatic body.
