This firm have during the past month gone largely into the manufacture of flannel-ties, and the re-sult is that Messrs. Wm. Parks & Sons are rushed with orders to such an extent that the r-mill has to be run to its utmost caracity, even a night crew being called into equisition. into canisition.

The hotel at Whitby Junction station, one of the oldest buildings in the town, owned and occupied by Wm. Foy, was burned last Monday. In 1895 the shipments were nearly double that quantity, and the present output is 100 tons per day, of an average value of \$10 per ton. The company owning this mine has paid the sum of \$175,000 in dividends. Regular slopments of ore from the War Eagle muccommenced in January, 1895, the shipments to the 30th ultimo being 12,65 tons. 



A well known patent lawyer is authority for the statement that 90 per cent of inventions fail to make money for their inventors. This is chiefly due to the invention itself being not needed, or being too intricate or too expensive, but it is also often due to the poverty or want of eleverness of the inventor in letting go his rights to those whose superior capital or sagacity make a success of them. The greatest successes are aften made in the simplest devices. The rubber muts used on counters to assist in picking up change and the "pigs in clover" are famous for the fortune brought its owner. The idea of a card-board ring around the hole of a shipping tag made paper available for that purpose, and brought a fortune for the Dennison Tag Company. The brass spring uprights that hold a lamp chimney gave the inventor an income equal to the salary of the President of the United States. The inventor of the 1000-mile railtoad ticket is said to draw \$20,000 a year from that little arrangement. Copper toes for shors made a humble Maine farmer a millionaire, and another man who patented the metal button fasteners for shoes also became wealthy. The patent tin can openers and the tin cap on bottles made fortunes for their inventors. The chesp mechanical toys and hundreds other simple little things could be cited that have been immense successes.






