VISIT BY JAPANESE MINISTERS TO CANADA

Mr. Hiroshi Mitsuzuka, the Japanese Minister of International Trade and Industry (MITI) visited Ottawa on May 4 and 5, 1990, where he met with the Minister for International Trade as well as with the Ministers for Energy, Mines and Resources; Industry, Science and Technology; and, Consumer and Corporate Affairs.

Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu visited Ottawa on September 6 to 8, 1989 where he met with Prime Minister Mulroney and Secretary of State for External Affairs, Joe Clark. He was accompanied by the Foreign Minister, Mr. Taro Nakayama. Before returning to Japan, Prime Minister Kaifu visited Vancouver on September 9, 1989 where he met with Premier Vander Zalm. The Associate Minister for National Defence, Mary Collins accompanied the Japanese delegation during its Vancouver visit.

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SOME CANADA/JAPAN TRADE SUCCESS STORIES

A. AGRICULTURE, FISHERY, FOOD PRODUCTS

- * Mr. Crispy's Ltd., a Toronto area company which manufactures french fry vending machines announced in 1989 a \$45 million contract with Tiokai Boecki to ship 4,400 machines to Japan over the next 3 years.
- * Canadian exports of french fries increased 60% in 1989 and hold 15% of the entire Japanese market.
- * Bread mix (contents which include skim milk powder, wheat flour and sugar; all items highly protected individually) exports were introduced to the Japanese market in 1986. Since then, these exports have risen to the level of 6,000 MT per year.
- * Pet food sales doubled between 1988 and 1989 to reach \$4 million.
- * There was a rapid expansion in bottled water sales in 1989. Exports are now valued at \$2 million.
- * The Canada Beef Export Federation opened an office in Tokyo in November 1989 and is developing a full scale promotion program. Canadian beef exports increased by 70% to \$32 million in 1989.
- * Canola sales set volume and value records in 1989.

 More oil is now crushed in Japan from canola than from U.S. soyabeans.
- * Sea urchin exports have jumped from \$0 to \$10 million in the space of 2 years.
- * Newly launched Nova Scotia surf clam exports continue to rise rapidly and are expected to reach the \$10 million level shortly.
- * The "dry" beer fad in Japan resulted in the doubling of Canadian malt sales from \$40 million in 1988 to \$80 million in 1989.
- * McCain Foods of Florenceville, N.B. has decided to establish a frozen and chilled food manufacturing plant and sales centres in Japan. Production of a line of frozen potato-based foods will begin in July 1991.

B. MANUFACTURED PRODUCTS

- * Biosig Instrument Inc. (Montreal, Quebec), a pioneer in commercial-market pulse monitors, physical fitness computers and original equipment components built into exercise bicycles and other fitness equipment is now having its products distributed in sports and fitness clubs throughout Japan by Sony.
- * Through the efforts of Thought Technology Inc.'s Japanese distributor, Pollux Overseas Inc., Japan has been identified as one of its strongest export markets. The company manufactures biofeedback performance aids which help improve various kinds of performance through relaxation and visualization techniques combined with feedback of galvanic skin response and other physiological functions.
- * Seeburn Metal Products Ltd. (Orillia, Ontario) is supplying car jacks to Japanese auto manufacturers on an OEM basis.
- * Glas-Aire Industries Ltd. (Langley, British Columbia) is supplying sun roof assemblies and other acrylic components on an OEM basis to Honda Motor Company.
- * Three structural engineering and architectural firms, the RAN Consortium, have teamed up with the large Japanese construction and engineering firm, Kumagai Gumi to market Skydome's design and technology. This effort is among the first by Canadians to develop a marketing presence in the construction and related architectural/engineering services in Japan.
- * Bell Helicopter Textron (Ste. Therese, Quebec) has reported that nearly 25% of its total production or 20 Jet Ranger 206B and 20 Longer Ranger, have been purchased by its Japanese distributor, Mitsui, making Japan its largest offshore market.
- * CAE Electronics Ltd. (Montreal, Quebec) has been awarded an estimated \$35 million contract by All Nippon Airways Co. Ltd. of Japan to develop and build two flight simulators and a maintenance training simulator for the Boeing 747-400 aircraft. The simulators will be delivered in the fall of 1990 and the spring of 1991.

- * Nintendo of Japan has signed a six year licensing agreement with Archer Communications Inc. of Calgary, for their new computer software-hardware system called Q-sound, which promises to "revolutionize" audio visual recording and playback. A system that enables engineers to place sound elements exactly where they will be heard, Q-Sound works with virtually any 2-speaker stereo system.
- * Litton Systems Canada Ltd., Etobicoke, Ontario has supplied flight inspection systems valued at \$11.5 million (1990).

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CANADA-JAPAN BUSINESSMEN'S COOPERATION COMMITTEE

(CJBCC)

The CJBCC was formed in 1977 to provide a forum in which Canada's captains of industry could discuss, with Japan's most senior business leaders, the strategic issues which frame Canada's relationship with Japan.

Mr. David Culver, former Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Alcan was Chairman of the CJBCC until his retirement in 1988 when Mr. Allan Lambert, Group Chairman of Edper-Brascan became Chairman.

The CJBCC has no permanent Secretariat. Mr. W. Dimma, Royal LePage, and his staff provide the services of a Secretariat.

Annual meetings of the CJBCC alternate between Japan and Canada. In 1990, the annual meeting was held in Hiroshima, May 13 to 16; and in 1991, the annual meeting will be held in Halifax, May 12 to 15.

At its 1990 annual meeting, the CJBCC exchanged views on Canada's bilateral relationship with Japan in the context of the Canada-USA Free Trade Agreement. Japan's efforts to globalize its commercial interests through increased direct investment and joint venture activity in Canada and other foreign markets also formed part of the meeting's agenda.

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KOREA

VISITS BY MINISTERS TO CANADA

No ministerial visits are planned for 1990.

SUCCESS STORIES: KOREA

In 1988, AECL was engaged as the principal contractor/consultant for a 30 MW multi-purpose research reactor (KMRR), valued a \$30 million. Based on the Canadian MAPLE concept, the KMRR can be utilized for isotope production, material research, neutron radiography and fuel examination.

In January 1988, the Hyundai automotive plant in Bromont, Quebec began production of the new Sonata. 30,000 vehicles per year are to be supplied to Hyundai dealers in Canada and the United States. In 1989, 1,000 units were exported to Taiwan. Commencing in 1991, Chrysler Corporation has agreed to purchase an additional 30,000 Bromont manufactured vehicles per year to be marketed through its dealer network in the United States.

SPAR has sold one of its "TIGER EYE" night landing, runway illumination systems to the Korean military. Contract value: \$6 million.

Raytheon Canada has signed a contract for the supply of six tactical radars, for the Korean military. Contract Value: \$60 million.

Sammi Steel recently announced their intention to purchase Atlas Steel from Rio Algom for \$250 million. Sammi also plans to spend another \$200 million for expansion on one of the plants in either Quebec or Ontario.

In early 1989, Alcan began to sell cylinder heads to Dae Woo out of their St. Catherines office.

Manufacturer's Life Insurance Company (Manulife) and their joint venture partner, Korea Zinc, received approval from the Korean Ministry of Finance to operate a life insurance business in Korea. Manulife is the first Canadian company to receive such approval.

Atomic Energy of Canada Limited (AECL) has been invited to submit a proposal for the construction of a second CANDU nuclear reactor at Wolsung. Negotiations are expected to begin following an analysis of the bid by the Korea Electric Power Corporation (KEPCO) sometime this spring.

The second "Canada Week", of which the Canadian Products Show was the central event, introduced several Canadian "hitech" companies to the Korean market and similarly Koreans to Canadian technological capabilities. Many companies reported excellent contacts with several reporting impressive on-site contracts in such areas as microchip processing, telecommunications, and aerospace.

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KOREAN INVESTMENT IN CANADA

Han Yang Chemical Corporation, a member company of Korea Explosives Group, has signed a joint venture agreement with a Canadian counterpart to invest in a "greenfield" project to build a \$16.5 million PVC window frame plant in St. John's, Newfoundland. The investors anticipate sales in 1989 of \$18 million with a doubling of plant capacity in the near future.

Shinho Group of Korea has plans to invest up to \$120 million in a new pulp mill in the Thunder Bay area, to be completed by 1990. It will supply 100,000 tons/year of pulp 50% of which will be exported to the Korean market. Initial investment is \$30 million, should create 100 jobs. They also purchased Kakabeka Falls timber plant for \$3.3 million.

Hyundai Motor Company of Korea has a head office and distribution centre in Markham, Ontario, a \$20 million automobile aluminum wheel manufacturing plant and a \$350 million automobile assembly plant in Bromont, Quebec.

Hyundai Engineering and Construction Co. owns a majority interest in a joint venture with Kerkhoff Bridge Ltd. of B.C., formed in late 1986 for construction related to the Vancouver Advanced Light Rapid Transit "Skytrain" and diversion tunnels for the Old Man River Dam project in Alberta.

In 1979, POSCO (Pohang Iron and Steel Co. Ltd.) and Westar Mining established a joint venture to produce both metallurgical and thermal coal, much of which is exported to Korea. The Korean investment totalled \$3 million.

Korea Electric Power Corp. (KEPCO) has a joint-venture with Canadian Mining and Energy Limited in an uranium mine development project at Cigar Lake and Key Lake located in Saskatchewan. Investment is \$2.5 million.

Another \$4 million uranium mining project at Baker Lake, N.W.T., involves Daewoo Corporation and Urangesellshaft Ltd.

Sammi Steel recently announced their intention to purchase Atlas Steel from Rio Algom for \$250 million. Sammi also plans to spend another \$200 million for expansion on one of the plants in either Quebec or Ontario.

Daesung Industrial Co. (DIC) and KOCA Co. Ltd. (KCL) in a joint venture under the name Daesung Canada Inc., is investing US\$ 3.5 million in a plant in Prince George, B.C. to produce semifinished chopsticks. Plant construction is to begin in August 1989, with production commencing in early 1990.

Samsung Electronics has purchased a 20 percent interest, valued at \$2 million, in Norpak of Ottawa, a videotext firm. Norpak has had a licencing agreement with Samsung since 1983. Noranda Enterprises also owns 20 percent.

Kil Hoon Construction Co. has established a joint venture with MAHA International Petroleum Inc. to build a waste oil refinery at Sheet Harbour Industrial Complex in Nova Scotia. Value of Plant will be \$20 million with \$2 million coming from Korea.

Chonju Paper Mfg. Co., a division of Samsung Corp., is in a joint venture with CK Fibres Corp and Environmental Technology Ltd of New Westminster B.C. to operate a paper recycling plant in Richmond B.C. The plant has a value of \$1.2 million and represents the first joint venture in North America for Samsung.

Sum Jin Petroleum of Pusan plans to invest \$13.5 million in an asphalt, solvent and roof shingle facility with their joint venture partner Sheet Harbour Industrial Petroleum Company. This project, near Bathurst, New Brunswick, will employ 260 workers.

CHINA

VISITS BY MINISTERS TO CANADA

No ministerial visits are planned for 1990.

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EXPORT SUCCESS STORIES

Following the tragic incidents in Beijing in June 1989, Minister Clark issued a policy statement which called for the scaling down of certain key aspects of the bilateral trade relations, such as the suspension of high-level visits, downgrading Canadian trade representation in Beijing, withdrawal from participation in all Chinese-sponsored trade fairs, and establishment of the China Project Review Committee, in order to assess all EDC projects. At the same time, however, the June 30th policy provided for the continuation of export credit and development assistance in line with new criteria: maintenance of existing links, promotion of people-to-people exchanges, and avoidance of activities which benefit the military or propaganda apparatus.

Since January 1, 1990, the following negotiations and sales agreements have been reached between Canadian companies and the Chinese authorities.

- The Canadian Wheat Board announced the signing of an agreement with the PRC's Cereals, Oils and Foods Corporation for the sale of one million tonnes of wheat for delivery in May, June and July. The contract value is approximately \$180 million. Projected wheat sales to China for 1990 are approximately 4.5 million tonnes for a total value of \$800 million.
- Magna International has signed its first contract worth approximately \$6 million, to supply plastic molds to the First Auto Works in CHangchun.
- Spar Aerospace has signed a \$2.0 million contract to supply a satellite earth station to Qingdao. This contract is viewed as key to Spar's bid on over 10 other upcoming earth stations, valued at more that \$50 million.
- Champion Road Machinery, of Goderich, Ontario, have completed negotiations for the sale of two road graders to Jiangxi Province, valued at approximately \$250,000.
- Inc. Tobacco Company of Charlottetown negotiated several contracts in China for sale of tobacco and tobacco processing technology.

Economic Situation

It seems that China has entered a period of re-centralization, implementation of economic austerity policy and consolidation, during which time the Government will assess the impact that several years of decentralization of decision-making have had on its overall economic performance. While the overall thrust of the reform movement has been blunted, and the economic slowdown is expected to continue over the next two to three years, China's

"open door" policy will likely continue in one form or another. In response to the events of June, 1989, the World Bank - a major source of development funds and policy advice for China - suspended all loans. It is belived that in 1990, the World Bank and the G-7 countries may resume funding to China on a project-by-project basis, with careful monitoring, to assure that projects benefit China's people, and support the economic reform initiated in the past decade.

Members have found this office a cost-effective alternative to maintaining their own permanent staff in China, and have deemed the on-site representation and liaison service especially valuable.

All major sectors of the Canadian economy having business interests in China are represented in the Council.

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HONG KONG SUCCESS STORIES

- -Northern Telecom, in partnership with Motorola, won in 1988 a contract worth \$65 million for the supply of an integrated communication system for the Royal Hong Kong Police Force.
- -Hutchison Mobile Data Ltd. chose, in 1989, to use 100% Canadian technology for its new public mobile data service in Hong Kong. This represents a contract of more than \$2 million.
- -The 1989 version of the in-store Canadian Food and Beverage Festival in Hong Kong resulted in direct sales of \$7.3 million and follow-on sales of another \$1 million.
- -Canadian Astronautics Limited of Ottawa, entered, in September 1989, into an export sale agreement with Hong Kong authorities for the supply of a SARSAT system (Search and Rescue Satellite).
- -The broadly defined Building and Construction sector has generated export opportunities including the supply of a vault and a high-rise window-cleaning system for the new Bank of China building, and the provision of design technology for structural components such as curtain walls. We will follow up on this through participation in the IBEX Construction Show May 31-June 2,1990. It is estimated that \$9 million in Building Product/Equipment sales will be generated for Canadian Exhibitors over the next 12 months.
- -Accugraph Corporation from Ontario won contracts expected to reach \$2.5 million in 1989 for provision of software.

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CANADA-HONG KONG INVESTMENT RELATIONS

-Hong Kong is an important source of investment for Canada, with a significant potential for increase. In 1989, the total flow of investment from Hong Kong to foreign countries was estimated at \$12 billion. The Canadian share is estimated to represent 20 percent or \$2.4 billion. The value of the estimated outflow of capital from Hong Kong in 1990 is \$20 billion. Of this amount, one-half is considered portfolio investment. Investment figures by province are not available.

-Hong Kong investment in Canada is concentrated in certain sectors: Electronics - high-tech capabilities in Canada coupled with vast consumer electronics manufacturing in Hong Kong; Textiles-Hong Kong's largest industry, with proven success in Canada; Telecommunications (telephone, broadcasting networks) - good technology available in Canada with manufacturing ability in Hong Kong; Plastics (toys, games, household goods) - Hong Kong dominates in a wide variety of consumer products; Tourism - hotels (especially downtown major urban properties) have the highest priority in the tourism sector and Hong Kong is a specialist in this market.

-Some of the largest investments that Hong Kong has made in Canada are: the Hong Kong and Shanghai Banking Corporation purchase of the Bank of B.C. and recently the Lloyds Bank of Canada, Li Ka Shing's acquisition of a significant share percentage in Husky Oil and the purchase of the Expo 86 site. Further, Hong Kong commercial investments have concentrated on hotels and commercial properties especially in Vancouver and Toronto.

-Compared to major competitive destinations such as U.S.A, Australia, Thailand, Malaysia, and China, Canada is perceived in Hong Kong as having the following advantages: low-cost energy, the Canada - US Free Trade Agreement; immigration and longstanding connections with Hong Kong; available land; and political and social stability. On the other hand, the constraints perceived by potential Hong Kong investors are: a complicated tax regime (fear of high taxes); relatively high cost of labour; scarcity of certain skills; fear of labour unions; and questions regarding the Canadian work ethic.

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HONG KONG-CANADA BUSINESS ASSOCIATION (HKCBA)

The Association has ten sections in St. John's, Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, and Vancouver. With a total membership of 4000, the HKCBA is the largest bilateral association in the country. Although based on strong local committees, there is a national president, Bob Issenman of the Law firm of Martineau Walker in Montreal. He chairs an executive committee composed of the presidents of the local chapters.

The Association meets annually with the members of Canada Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong, their overseas counterparts with a membership of more than 700 business persons.

No ministerial visits from Taiwan are scheduled for 1990.

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SUCCESS STORIES: TAIWAN

The Shell Company of Canada has recorded a growth in export sales of petrochemical products from zero in 1986 to over US\$50 million in 1988. Shell is currently exploring the possibility of a joint venture with their sister company in Taiwan to expand their petrochemical facility in Alberta.

De Havilland Aircraft Co. of Canada recently sold several Dash-8 aircraft to Taiwan for use by their new regional carrier Great China Airways, based in Taipei.

The International Nickel Company (INCO) reports ever-expanding sales of nickel to the Taiwan Nickel Refining Corporation, its largest single customer.

Vantai Development Corporation of B.C. is selling through the Chinese Automobile Co., six timber frame wood homes for display purposes.

Hyundai Canada has shipped 1000 Bromont-assembled Sonatas to Taiwan.

Polysar Incorporated is negotiating a \$120 million joint venture with China Synthetic Rubber Co. Ltd. to be located in Kaosiung.

Home OIl sold 1 million barrels of Alberta crude oil to Taiwan in 1988.

500 000 B.C. apples were sold to Taiwan last year despite severe import restrictions on Canadian apples.

TAIWAN: INVESTMENT IN CANADA

China Steel is currently examining and evaluating locales for the establishment of a \$4 billion steel mill. Countries under consideration include Canada, Australia and Indonesia. Australia has enacted protective legislation as incentive for China Steel to locate in that country. The province of B.C. is considering similar legislation as it is beyond the jurisdiction of the federal government to pass such legislation.

Taiwanese investors are reported to have put \$10 million into a ceramic tile plant in Maple Ridge B.C. following the twinning of that city with the city of Ying Ko in Taiwan.

The Ritz Hotel of Taipei purchased the Westbrook Hotel in Vancouver and will convert it into a 4-star operation.

International Pacific Properties of Taipei operates a real estate operation in Vancouver.

The International Commercial Bank of Cathay has been established in Toronto.

EXPORT SUCCESS STORIES

INDONESIA

Canadian Astronautics Ltd., have signed a contract with Indonesian authorities for a ground station related to a Satellite based Search and Rescue System. value - \$10 million

General Motors, Diesel Division, concluded a sale of locomotives, in December, to the Indonesian Railway. Value of contract - \$25.5 million.

MALAYSIA

The Malaysian Railway Authority (KTM) awarded a contract worth \$2 million for two shunting locomotives manufactured by G.M. Diesel, London Ontario. This was followed in September 1989 by a contract for the suppply of an additional 10 diesel locomotives for on-line service.

Defence Services Asia '90 March 20-21, 1990 was attended by 8 Canadian firms. Anticipated (potential) sales over the next year are expected to be \$65 - 70 million.

British American Bank Note Inc., Ottawa Division, was recently awarded a \$6.5 million contract to print Malaysian 50 Ringgit bank notes.

The Royal Canadian Mint through its official agent in Malaysia, the Bank of Nova Scotia, has sold over 20,000 ounces of gold in the form of a Gold Maple Leaf bullion investment coin, which was introduced into the Malaysian market in 1989.

PHILIPPINES

Canadian exports to the Philippines continue to increase significantly, reaching \$204.7 million in 1989 compared with \$49.5 million in 1986.

Since the Canadian Wheat Board re-entered the Philippine market place in 1987, sales of wheat continue to increase, reaching the highest annual level in 1989 of \$50.5 million.

SINGAPORE

Asian Aerospace '90, Feb. 14-18, 1990 attracted 13 Canadian company participants. Almost \$10 million in sales contracts were finalized at this event.

A contract in the amount of \$6.1 million was awarded to UTDC, Toronto, and a Singapore joint venture partner to build an ultra-modern 1 km underground baggage train, connecting airport THAILAND terminals.

Carrier and participation

Export sales to Thailand increased to \$340 million in 1989, while imports were \$420, giving a two way trade total of \$760 million. With this level of exports, Thailand became Canada's largest export destination in ASEAN.

Lavalin International Inc. continues to pursue the \$2.025 billion contract for the supply, construction and operation of the 36 km mass rapid transit system in Bangkok.

INDONESIA

The Canada-Indonesia Business Council (CIBC) organized seminars in Vancouver, Calgary and Toronto on joint ventures and investing in Indonesia. The seminars were held in August 1988.

In March 1990, the CIBC organized a Trade Mission to Indonesia.

MALAYSIA

As a result of a Canadian Manufacturers Association (CMA) mission to Malaysia in 1988, a co-operation agreement was signed with the Federation of Malaysian Manufacturers (FMM). Negotiations are ongoing to formalize consultations and review commercial opportunities of mutual interest.

The Malaysia-Canada Business Council was fully established in 1989 in Kuala Lampur in order to give greater impetus to private sector linkages.

PHILIPPINES

The Manila based Canadian Chamber of Commerce, as it is called, held its inaugural meeting in October, 1989

SINGAPORE

The 300 member Canadian Business Association of Singapore provides an opportunity for Canadian business to meet informally with their Singaporean counterparts in order to strengthen Canada Singapore business relations.

A Thai-Canadian Business Club has expanded its membership and activities significantly since its establishementin November 1988 in Bangkok. The club arranges monthly luncheon meetings, guest speakers, a newsletter, business Directory, with the basic goal of capatalizing on business opportunitues.

EXPORT SUCCESS STORIES 89/90

INDIA

Metchem of Montreal signed a contract for the development of the Rajmahal coal mine (\$166 million).

Canpotex of Saskatoon signed a long term potash supply agreement with MMTC (average annual sales \$30 million).

CAE Electronics of Montreal sold a third flight simulator to Indian Airlines (\$9 million U.S.).

EICON of Montreal sold a network adapter and software to Zenith Computers of Bombay. The companies have also signed a distributorship agreement aimed at introducing EICON's communication products to India.

MDA of Vancouver sold a satellite data processing station to the Indian Meterological Department, in collaboration with CMC India (\$10 million).

Dataradio of Montreal entered into a ten year technical exchange agreement with Hindustan Computers Ltd. The potential market for Dataradio's proprietary products is promising.

Cardwell of Edmonton sold three drilling rigs to ONGC (\$9 million).

International Pipeline Engineering Ltd. of Calgary, sold an internal pipeline inspection system to Indian Oil Corporation (\$1.2 million).

HIR International, a small but dynamic trading company based in Winnipeg, has established steady repeat business in India covering a number of products. One of its client companies, Cubex, a Winnipeg based manufacturer of mining equipment, made several sales in 1989.

The ultra-modern Nhava Sheva Port in Bombay, designed by Howe International of Ottawa, was officially opened by the Indian Prime Minister on May 26, 1989.

Joint venture agreements signed in 1989 covered incubators for poultry (V.J. Equipment Ltd/Jamesway Co.), Aluminum ingots (Indian Aluminum/Alcan), and mapping equipment (Optomech Engineering/Gregory Geoscience).

PAKISTAN

Several companies were successful in 1989 in winning

Asian Development Bank projects in Pakistan. Technifluids of Calgary won the Second Pirkoh Gas Development Project, and Garneau Pipeline International of Nisku was awarded the Indus Right Bank Pipeline Capacity Extension Project. Agrodev and Kenting Earth Sciences of Ottawa will be undertaking the Rural Development Strategy for the Sind Arid Zone, and Reid, Collins and Associates secured the Forestry Sector Master Plan.

Westar Mining of Vancouver was awarded a five year coal supply contract with Pakistan Steel (U.S.\$60 million over five years).

BANGLADESH

Pratt and Whitney of Montreal sold eight aircraft engines to Biman Airlines (U.S.\$3.3 million).

The Canadian Commercial Corporation, acting on behalf of Global Thermoelectric Power Systems of Calgary, won a World Bank Project to supply thermoelectric generating systems for cathodic protection of the North-South Gas Pipeline (\$1.25 million).

Three contracts were awarded to Canadian firms in 1989 under ADB loans to Bangladesh:

- Global Thermoelectric for the Bangladesh Gas Transmission and Distribution Project
- Novacorp International Consulting for the Second Natural Gas Development Project
- Canadian Blower/Canada Pumps of Kitchener for the Chittagong Urea Fertilizer Project

Candecom International won the ADB financed Second Technical Education Development Program.

INDIA

Planned Activities of Bilateral Business Council

In November 1988 the Vancouver Board of Trade signed a co-operation agreement wit the Indian Merchants' Chamber, Bombay India for the widening and improvement of the economic co-operation and trade between the Canada and India. Under the agreement both parties agree to mutually contribute for the consolidation and expanding of commercial ties between the foreign trade enterprises of Canada and India.

A Memorandum of Understanding for co-operation and technology exchange between the Ontario Ministry of Industry Trade and Technology and the Automotive Component Manufacturers Association was signed on February 21, 1989. Of particular interest to MITT and ACMA is the establishment in India of a Centre for Automotive Parts Technology, similar in objective and mandate to that of the Ontario Centre for Automotive Parts Technology, which will lead to the improvement of product and process technology to the benefit of the Indian Automotive Parts Industry.

Under the umbrella of a Memorandum of Understanding between the Canadian Manufacturers' Association (CMA) and the Confederation of Engineering Industry (CEI) both parties agree to expanding on the joint activities of trade and industrial cooperation by exchanging and sharing experiences in the areas of (i) Industrial Competitiveness (ii) Quality (iii) Energy management (iv) Human Resources Development (v) Research & Development. Joint meetings are held annually, alternating between Canada and India. In February coinciding with the second meeting of the Joint Committee, the CMA organized a high powered Industrial Delegation from Canada to India.

The Canada-India Business Council (CIBC) has an industrial cooperation program which include, Canada-based activities to feature business Luncheons, visiting Speakers (from the government and private sectors) and Conferences on trade and investment opportunities in India. The CIBC hosted an incoming industrial cooperation mission from India in September 1988 organized by a sister organization in India - The Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry. The CIBC also organized in February 1988 a technical seminar series to highlight Canadian expertise in a number of industrial sectors of interest to India. The CIBC also provides information services to encompass a wide range of services such as the publication of a newsletter, trade enquiries and the dissemination of other relevant business information to the Council's membership.

PAKISTAN

Planned Activities of Bilateral Business Council

The Canada-Pakistan Business Council has an ambitious industrial cooperation program which will include:

- 1) Canada-based activities to feature Business Luncheons, Visiting Speakers (from the government and private sectors) and a major Business Conference on trade and investment opportunities in Pakistan (to be held in September, 1989);
- 2) Pakistan-based activities to include two Industrial Cooperation Missions (1989 and 1990), a Technical Seminar Series (1991) and other liaison activities (including the massive distribution in Pakistan of a CPBC Business Directory);
- 3) Information Services to encompass a wide range of services such as the publication of a newsletter (in both countries), trade enquiries and the dissemination of other relevant business information to the Council's membership.



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
