The following Members, having previously taken the Oath according to Law, and subscribed the Roll containing the same, took their seats in the House:—

Honourable George Burpee Jones, for the Electoral District of Royal. Joseph Jean, Esquire, for the Electoral District of Maisonneuve.

Mr. Bennett, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill No. 1, An Act respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy which he read to the House as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

I welcome you to your duties at this season for my Ministers deem it expedient that you should consider, without delay, the Agreements made at the Imperial Economic Conference recently held in this City of Ottawa, between Canada and the other countries of the Empire. My Government are of opinion that these Agreements provide the means by which will be developed an enduring and mutually beneficial scheme of closer Empire Economic association, and that their early approval is advisable in the national interest.

The Report of the Royal Commission on Railways and Transportation will be laid before Parliament. In view of the conclusions and recommendations contained in that Report your attention will be invited, at the earliest possible date, to a Bill designed to ensure more effective and economical operation of Canadian railways upon the basis of fair competition, secured in such manner

as will avoid extravagant and harmful duplication of services.

Since the last session of Parliament, my Ministers have entered into a Treaty with the Government of the United States of America for the completion of the St. Lawrence Waterway. Upon its ratification by the duly constituted authority of the United States, this Treaty will be submited to you for approval.

A Committee has been appointed by Order in Council to inquire into the operation of the Pensions Act so that my Ministers may have before them all

information necessary to determine whether further action may be required to discharge the country's obligation to those who served in the Great War.

The problem of unemployment continues to receive the anxious attention of my Ministers. Under the powers granted them at the last session of Parliament, they have been able to develop further, in co-operation with the Provinces and Municipalities, a scheme of direct relief to be put into operation during the autumn and winter months to the extent required by prevailing conditions. Plans for the re-establishment of the unemployed in various parts of the country are in preparation and will become operative as soon as, in the opinion of my Ministers, the public expenditure incident thereto will be productive of commensurate benefits.

It is a matter of gratification to us all that in those large areas of the west, where, during recent successive years, crop failure was followed by widespread distress, this season's bountiful harvest forecasts greatly improved conditions and makes possible a corresponding reduction of relief measures.

In accordance with the provisions of the British North America Act, you will be invited to consider a Bill for the redistribution of representation of the

Provinces in the House of Commons.

There will also be brought before you for consideration other measures

which my Ministers deem to be in the public interest.

You will be invited to extend Canadian Bank Charters for one year in order that Parliament may be informed of the results of the proposed World Economic and Financial Conference, to be called to consider financial, economic and monetary problems, before undertaking the decennial revision of the Bank Act.

When you have considered the matters requiring your immediate attention, it is proposed that Parliament shall adjourn, until early in the new year, then to proceed with the ordinary business of the session.

Members of the House of Commons:

The public accounts for the last fiscal year and the estimates for the coming year will be submitted after Parliament has reassembled. These estimates will reflect the continuance of the policy of my Ministers to exercise every economy, compatible with the proper administration of the state, until more favourable economic conditions shall have materially augmented the current national revenues.

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

While the economic situation still weighs heavily upon all classes of the community, there are at last definite signs that the acuteness of the depression is passing. I rejoice that the wisdom of your steadfast policy of retrenchment and constructive development, which has ameliorated the hardships of Canadians and maintained the enviable financial position of this country, is still more fully manifest with approaching prosperity. The strength of our financial structure, the resourcefulness of agriculture, and the integrity of industry have enabled us to take quick and profitable advantage of improved conditions. The ratification of Empire trade agreements and your approval of the proposed economies and reforms in railway transportation are means by which Canada's favoured position will be more fully secured among the nations of the world.

The unity, fortitude and capacity of the Canadian people, without which all your labours would have been in vain, shall be now the foundation upon which, with co-operation and faith, we will build a Canada greater than we have yet known. I pray that Divine Providence may guide you in your exalted

task.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, it was ordered, That the Speech of His Excellency the Governor General to both Houses of Parliament, be taken into consideration on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, a Special Committee was appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed, Lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this House under Standing Order 63, said Committee to be composed of Messrs.: Rhodes, Dupré, Simpson (Algoma West), Stewart (Edmonton West) and Casgrain.

Mr. Bennett, delivered a message from His Excellency the Governor General, which was read by Mr. Speaker, as follows:

BESSBOROUGH:

The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons a certified copy of an approved Minute of Council appointing the Honourable E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance; the Honourable D. M. Sutherland, Minister of National Defence; the Honourable T. G. Murphy, Minister of the Interior and Superintendent General of Indian Affairs; and the Honourable M. Dupré, Solicitor General, to act with the Speaker of the House of Commons as Commissioners for the purposes and under the provisions of Chapter 145 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, intituled: "An Act respecting the House of Commons".

Mr. Speaker laid before the House the Report of the Librarian of Parliament, which is as follows:—

To the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons:

The Parliamentary Librarian has the honour to submit the report on the Library for 1932.

The Supplementary Catalogue of books donated and purchased during the present year will be issued as soon as possible in 1933.

The undersigned records with regret the passing of Mr. J. de L. Taché. Mr. Taché, whose health had been far from satisfactory for some time, died on the 21st of March last. Born in St. Hyacinthe, Que., he lived there and in Quebec City until removing to Ottawa after accepting the position of King's Printer. Twelve years ago he was appointed one of the Joint Librarians of Parliament. A great lover of Canada, he devoted special attention to the collection of literary material relating to the early history of the country. Kindly and courteous, he will be long remembered by the staff of the Parliamentary Library.

Reference was made in the last Report to the transfer of a large number of books to the room in the West Block kindly provided by the Department of Public Works. The undersigned has the honour to point out that the room in question has now been filled and houses some thirty-five thousand volumes of Sessional Papers, Hansard, and so on, thereby greatly relieving the congestion in the library proper.

The library shared in the general reduction made in the departmental appropriations last Session. The Parliamentary section has, however, been kept supplied with the new books relating to the special needs of Parliament, but necessarily, there has had to be curtailment in the purchases of general literature.

Also,—Copies of Agreement made the 11th day of July, 1932, between the Dominion of Canada and the Province of Ontario, concerning the development of power in the International Rapids Section of the St. Lawrence river. (English and French.)

"The House regrets that, except the dole, the Government has no policy

with respect to the relief of unemployment.

"It also deplores the Government's obvious endeavour, by postponing the revision of the Bank Act, to avoid immediate consideration by Parliament of the all-important subjects of banking, credit and currency."

And the Debate continuing;

Mr. Coote seconded by Mr. Mitchell, moved that the proposed amendment be amended by adding thereto the following words:—

"And urges, that the Dominion control of currency and credit should be so

exercised as to provide and maintain sufficient purchasing power to;

"(a) Raise the price of agricultural products and other primary commodities to an equitable level in relation to the cost of production and the settlement of outstanding liabilities, public and private;

"(b) Increase consumption, thereby stimulating industry, and providing

employment for our people;

"And that the issue of this currency and credit should be based upon the natural wealth and productive capacity of this country, not, as at the present

time, upon one single commodity, gold, and that its volume should be determined by the goods and services to be dealt with, and the legitimate require-

ments of the people;

"This House is further of opinion, that this step should be taken in the immediate future, pending other fundamental changes, and as an integral part of a system of planned economy, which is becoming generally recognized as essential, in order that the natural wealth and productive energy of this country may be utilized to provide a satisfactory standard of living for all our people."

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Vallance, adjourned.

Mr. Ralston, seconded by Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre), moved in amendment thereto:—

That all the words after "That" be struck out and that the following words be inserted instead thereof:—

"1. In respect of the Trade Agreement entered into at Ottawa the 20th day of August, 1932, between representatives of His Majesty's Government in Canada and of His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom, this House welcomes such terms of the Agreement as propose the reduction of existing duties, as well as those which in any way tend to increase the possibilities of greater demand for Canadian products.

"2. This House emphatically condemns the features of the Agreement

which show increases in an already unreasonably high tariff.

"3. This House disapproves in the strongest terms of the effect of the Agreement whereby the present Government has precluded Canada from exercising the right which is vital to prosperity of the Dominion of making trade agreements for the marketing of her products abroad.

"4. The House learns with greatest concern that the Agreement gives no definite assurance that regulation by Order in Council, imposing arbitrary

and wholly unwarranted restrictions on trade, will be abandoned.

"5. This House reaffirms the principle of British Preference which has been the policy of the Liberal party since 1897 and is convinced that had the tariff provisions of May 1st, 1930, prevailed, Canadian products would have enjoyed advantages in British markets immeasurably greater than any which they can hope to obtain under the proposed Agreement."

Mr. Speaker declared the said proposed amendment out of order.

Mr. Speaker: "There is no doubt in my mind that under Standing Order 48 this motion can be amended. The criginal motion before the House approves the Trade Agreement entered into at Ottawa, 20th August, 1932, between representatives of the Government of Canada and of the Government of the United Kingdom. The amendment proposed both approves and disapproves in part of the agreement. It is out of order for the following reasons:-

"Paragraph 1 expresses approval of part of the agreement and is already covered by the main motion. It suggests no change in and does not alter the

main motion. It is not an amendment.

"Paragraphs 2 and 3 are direct negatives of part of the main motion and so are not in order. Authority for this may be found in May, 13th edition,

"Paragraphs 4 and 5 affirm general principles which cannot be moved as amendments to motions of this sort but which could be moved on other occasions. May, Bourinot and Redlich indicate that the only motions upon which amendments declaratory of principle may be moved are motions for an Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne, motions to go into Committee of Ways and Means and Supply and for the second reading of Public Bills.

"This will be found in: May at pages 173, 390 and 525; Bourinot at pages 97, 419, 510, Redlich, 3rd vol. at pages 89 and 137.

The Debate on the main motion was then resumed.

And the Debate continuing; the said Debate was on motion of Mr. Stirling, adjourned.

Mr. Hepburn, from his place in the House, asked leave under Standing Order 31, to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, and stated the subject to be:—

"The necessity of immediate action being taken by this House to investigate the present financial position of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada and the conduct of its senior officials, as disclosed by the recent police court investigation in Chicago into the affairs of Samuel Insull and Martin Insull, now indicted by the United States government on charges of embezzlement and larceny."

Mr. Speaker: "I have had an opportunity of considering the above motion and will not need to delay the House further by examining the statement. Under Standing Order 31 leave may be obtained to present a motion for the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance. The procedure is as follows: At the proper time the Member rises in his place, asks leave to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, and states the matter. He then hands a written statement of the matter proposed to be discussed to the Speaker who, if he thinks it in order and of urgent public importance, reads it out and asks whether the member has leave of the House to move the adjournment for the purpose stated. A motion under this Standing Order must be restricted to a single specific matter of recent occurrence. The authority for that statement will be found in the Thirteenth Edition of May at page 247.

"In my opinion this is not a matter of recent occurrence, nor is the matter urgent. There must be a prima facie case of urgency. I refer again to May, Thirteenth Edition, page 247. The matter is not so urgent that the proceedings of the House should be halted so that it may be discussed now. The rules

provide other opportunities for discussing such a matter.

"For these reasons I hold that the application is not in order and should not be granted."

From this decision Mr. Woodsworth appealed to the House.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Excellency for the gracious Speech which Your Excellency has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And the proposed motion of Mr. Mackenzie King in amendment thereto: That the following be added to the Address to His Excellency:—

"Whilst reserving any expression of view upon the merits of the agreements concluded at the recent Imperial Economic Conference, this House is of the opinion that the tariff policies of the present Administration have seriously injured the trade of Canada and have intensified the economic depression, and that the Government has wholly failed to afford a remedy for unemployment and agricultural distress as pledged by the Prime Minister.

"The House regrets that, except the dole, the Government has no policy

with respect to the relief of unemployment.

"It also deplores the Government's obvious endeavour, by postponing the revision of the Bank Act, to avoid immediate consideration by Parliament of the all-important subjects of banking, credit and currency."

And the proposed motion of Mr. Coote in amendment to the said proposed amendment: That the said proposed amendment be amended by adding thereto the following words:—

"And urges, that the Dominion control of currency and credit should be so

exercised as to provide and maintain sufficient purchasing power to;

"(a) Raise the price of agricultural products and other primary commodities to an equitable level in relation to the cost of production and the settlement of outstanding liabilities, public and private;

"(b) Increase consumption, thereby stimulating industry, and providing

employment for our people;

"And that the issue of this currency and credit should be based upon the natural wealth and productive capacity of this country, not, as at the present time, upon one single commodity, gold, and that its volume should be determined by the goods and services to be dealt with, and the legitimate requirements of the people;

"This House is further of opinion, that this step should be taken in the immediate future, pending other fundamental changes, and as an integral part of a system of planned economy, which is becoming generally recognized as essential, in order that the natural wealth and productive energy of this country may be utilized to provide a satisfactory standard of living for all our people."

Government resident outside of Canada be made liable for income tax.

2. That when the assets or shares of a company, having on hand undistributed income at the end of 1929, are sold directly or through an intermediary to a company, which company issues shares, bonds, notes or other like documents as fully paid up by capitalizing the said undistributed income, then on the redemption of such documents the company redeeming shall pay a tax of four per centum on the amount of such document redeemed.

3. That the time of filing information returns be advanced from March

31st to the last day of February in each year.

4. That the provisions of the said Act with respect to personal corporation be amended to make them more certain in their application.

Decision of Mr. Speaker on point of Order raised in respect to the proposed amendment of Mr. Heaps to the motion for Mr. Speaker to leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Ways and Means:—

Mr. Speaker: "The Motion is that the Speaker leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Ways and Means. To this an amendment is moved by Mr. Heaps as follows:—

"'In the opinion of this House it is desirable that a committee or commission be appointed to consider the economic situation in the Dominion with special reference to unemployment and to report back during the present session of Parliament.'

"A point of order has been raised that the amendment is out of order on the ground that it again introduces a matter that was debated and disposed of when the Right Honourable the Leader of the Opposition moved as part of an amendment to the address:—

"'The House regrets that, except the dole, the Government has no policy with respect to the relief of unemployment.'

"I have carefully considered the arguments presented on the question of order, examined the authorities and precedents of both the British and Canadian Houses of Parliament. In the debate on the amendment of the Right Honourable the Leader of the Opposition to the Address I find that he suggested that a committee or commission be appointed and given charge of the whole question of unemployment relief which shows that the subject matter of the proposed amendment was then open to discussion and actually debated. If this amendment is allowed it inevitably follows that there will be a repetition of the debate on unemployment.

"The ordinary rules of debate are applicable on this occasion, for instance, a matter already decided by the House cannot be discussed. Bourinot 420.

"This amendment is offered on the Motion to go into Committee of Ways and Means and not being accepted by the Government is a Motion of want of

confidence and the fact that it provides for the appointment of a commission or committee with special reference to unemployment is in effect a condemnation of the Government's policy on that question.

"The House has refused to condemn the Government's policy on unemployment by rejecting the amendment moved to the Address by the Leader of

the Opposition.

"In view of that decision by the House I cannot find that this amendment being a Motion of want of confidence dealing also with unemployment is in order."

From this decision Mr. Lapointe appealed to the House.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker: Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained; it was decided in the affirmative, on the following division:—

Mr. Rhodes then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 13, An Act to amend the Customs Tariff, which was read the first time.

Mr. Rhodes moved,—That the said Bill be now read the second time.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to, on division.

The said Bill was accordingly read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed, on division.

The Order being read for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Supply;

Mr. Rhodes, by leave of the House, moved,—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

And the question being proposed:

Mr. Mackenzie King, seconded by Mr. Casgrain, moved in amendment thereto: That all the words after the word "That" to the end of the question be omitted and the following substituted therefor:

"Whereas parliament has been in session since October 6, of the present year, and is shortly to adjourn until January 30, 1933;

"And whereas, since parliament assembled the government has not made any statement of policy with respect to the relief of existing agricultural conditions:

"And whereas, the position of agriculture in Canada has become increasingly deplorable and, unless relieved, will bring about a condition of distress hitherto unparalleled;

"This house is of the opinion that the government should immediately announce what policy, if any, it has with respect to the relief of agricultural distress, and permit full consideration of the same before parliament adjourns over the months of December and January."

And a Debate arising thereon;

A point of Order was raised on the ground that the subject-matter of the proposed amendment had been discussed on the amendment moved to the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

Mr. Speaker: "The motion before the House is that the Speaker leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself into Committee of Supply. An amendment concerning agricultural conditions in Canada and agricultural relief has been offered. The point of order has been raised that the amendment is out of order on the ground that it again introduces matter that was debated and disposed of when the Right Honourable Leader of the Opposition on October 10 moved an amendment to the Address including the words 'the government has wholly failed to afford a remedy for agricultural distress.' Whatever the object of the amendment may be and whether it concerns past, present or future policy of the government seems to me to be beside the point. The question for the Speaker to consider is: Has the matter raised by the amendment been discussed and debated? The subject-matter of the amendment now proposed was undoubtedly discussed and debated upon a former occasion, and to allow a discussion of this question now would be simply to repeat the debate that has been held on agricultural conditions. The amendment moved has not been accepted by the government, and so is a motion of want of confidence. The House refused to condemn the government's policy on agriculture by

rejecting the amendment to the Address. In view, therefore, of that decision and in view of the precedents I find that this amendment, which deals with the questions of agricultural conditions and agricultural relief to be not in order."

From this decision Mr. Mackenzie King appealed to the House.

And the question being put by Mr. Speaker: Shall the ruling of the Chair be sustained; it was decided in the affirmative, on the following division:—

And the question being again proposed on the main motion;

Mr. Irvine, seconded by Mr. Speakman, moved in amendment thereto: That all the words after "That" be struck out, and the following substituted therefor:—

"Whereas, the prices for farm products now prevailing are the lowest on record and do not bring returns to the farmer sufficient to meet the cost of the current year's operations; and

"Whereas, farmers have in years past obligated themselves to pay large sums of money for goods and services and to repay loans advanced for the purchase of farm equipment and the carrying on of farming operations; and

"Whereas, the principal sums of such debts had a relation to price the farmer was receiving for his products; and

"Whereas, such debts are being greatly increased by unpaid interest charges and through the depreciated values of their products by which alone debt can be paid;

"Therefore be it resolved: In the opinion of this House, the Government, as emergency measures, should,—

"(a) Take such action as will lead to the writing off of all accumulated interest charges outstanding and to effect a substantial reduction in interest charges for the future; and

"(b) Bring the Canadian dollar at least to that point where Canada will have a parity of exchange with her chief competitors in the British market; and

"(c) Immediately consider the advisability of again paying a bonus on wheat, either on a bushelage or acreage basis; and

"(d) That this House is further of the opinion that the Government should create a 'Marketing Board' competent to supervise and control the marketing of farm products."

And a Debate arising thereon;

A point of Order was raised on the ground that the proposed amendment was substantially the same as a Notice of Motion now standing on the Order Paper in the name of Mr. Speakman.

Mr. Speaker declared the point of Order well taken, and ruled the said proposed amendment out of Order for the following reasons: First, because it entailed discussion on the subject of agricultural distress and the relief of agriculture which were to-day ruled to be out of order, and, second, because it involved a matter of which notice had been given and which stands upon the Orders of the Day as it does under number 6 on to-day's Order Paper as a Notice of Motion standing in the name of the honourable member for Red Deer, Mr. Speakman, in which the matters raised in the amendment are set forth and similar remedies are proposed.

The Debate on the proposed motion: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair was then resumed.

And the Debate continuing, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Ralston, adjourned.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that he had received from the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Canada, a certified copy of the Judgment of the said Court in the matter of the appeal made from the judgment of the trial judges in the court below, relating to the Electoral District of Yamaska.

And the same was read as follows:-

YAMASKA CONTROVERTED ELECTION

IN THE SUPREME COURT OF CANADA

In the Matter of The Dominion Controverted Elections Act
In re the Election of a Member of the House of Commons for the Electoral
District of Yamaska, held the 28th July, 1930.

BETWEEN:

AIME BOUCHER (Defendant in the Court below),

Appellant,

(SEAL)

and

NAPOLEON VEILLEUX (Petitioner in the Court below),

Respondent.

The (Petitioner) Respondent, by the conclusions of his petition, sought or demanded three things:—

(Translation)

- "(a) that the election of the defendant, Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons, for the electoral district of Yamaska, be declared void to all intents and purposes;
 - (b) that the defendant be liable to the penalties, sanctions and disabilities which the law prescribes; and
 - (c) that the seat for the electoral district of Yamaska be given to Paul François Comtois."

The Trial Judges, by their Judgment dated 23rd June, 1932,

(Translation)

"Declare void to all intents and purposes the election of the defendant Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons, for the electoral district of Yamaska, held July 28, 1930, and dismiss all the other conclusions of the said petition as unfounded in law and in fact."

A true copy of the said Judgment of the Trial Judges is hereunto annexed and marked "A".

The (Defendant) Appellant, Aimé Boucher, appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada from the said Judgment of the Trial Judges, on the following question of law, namely:—

(Translation)

"Whether the Trial Judges could deliver judgment voiding the election of the Appellant upon the petition as entered, and whereby the Respondent claimed the seat on behalf of the candidate Comtois."

The Appeal came on for hearing before this Court on the 10th November, 1932, and on 23rd December, 1932, this Court delivered judgment dismissing the said Appeal with costs. A true copy of the formal Judgment of this Court is hereunto annexed and marked "B"; and a true copy of the reasons for Judgment of the Judges of this Court on the said Appeal is also annexed and marked "C".

Hereunto annexed and marked "D" is the original report and Certificate of the Trial Judges to the Supreme Court of Canada, pursuant to sections 67 and 59 of The Dominion Controverted Elections Act.

And I, the undersigned, Registrar, do hereby, pursuant to section 68 of The Dominion Controverted Elections Act, certify to the Speaker of the House of Commons the Judgment and decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, confirming this decision, report or finding of the Trial Judges upon the question of law upon which the appeal was made.

And I do also certify, as to the matters and things as to which the Trial Judges would have been required to report to the Speaker, that they are hereby left unaffected by such decision of the Supreme Court of Canada.

SUPERIOR COURT

Dominion Controverted Elections Act, Chapter 50 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, and amendments.

June 23, 1932.

PRESENT: The Honourable Louis Coderre and the Honourable J. J. Denis, J.S.C.

In re:

Election of a Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska, held on July 28th, 1930.

Napoleon Veilleux, blacksmith, domiciled and residing in the village of Pierreville, in the judicial district of Richelieu,

Petitioner.

VS.

AIME BOUCHER, notary, domiciled and residing in the village of Pierreville, in the said district,

Respondent.

The Trial Judges, after hearing counsel for the parties, their witnesses, examined the proceedings and the record and deliberated:

Whereas the petitioner alleges in substance in his petition as follows;

The petitioner was a properly qualified elector at the election held on July 28th, 1930, in the electoral district of Yamaska and to which the present petition refers;

The name of the said petitioner appeared on the electoral list used at the said election;

The said petitioner was entitled to vote and did vote at the said election;

At the said election, Mr. Aimé Boucher, the above described respondent, and Paul François Comtois, farmer, domiciled and residing in the parish of St. Thomas de Pierreville, district of Richelieu, were candidates and the returning officer was Louis Véronneau, notary of Yamaska, county of Yamaska, judicial district of Richelieu;

The said returning officer following a computation of the votes given at the said election made both by himself and by one of the judges of this Honourable Court, declared the respondent elected by a majority of one vote Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska, and he accordingly submitted his return to the Chief Electoral Officer, who published same in the Canada Gazette on August 16th, 1930;

The said returning officer has not yet received the return and declarations which the respondent and his official agent are required to make respecting the election expenses of the said respondent;

The said election was not held freely and cannot be considered as the free and spontaneous expression of opinion of the electors of Yamaska;

The election of the respondent was irregular and the petitioner complains of illegal acts and corrupt practices enumerated and mentioned both in the petition and in the particulars furnished by the said petitioner, that the respondent and his official agent committed, and that the other agents and representatives of the respondent committed with the latter's knowledge and consent;

Seeing the above-mentioned facts, the petitioner is entitled to demand the voiding of the return of the returning officer declaring the respondent elected, as well as the voiding of the latter's election;

Seeing the above-mentioned facts, the petitioner is entitled to claim the seat of the electoral district of Yamaska in the House of Commons on behalf of the candidate Paul François Comtois above mentioned.

Seeing that the respondent was guilty personally and through the agency of other persons acting in his name, as aforesaid, of corruption, and of having treated the electors and used undue influence with respect to numerous persons who voted at the said election; and seeing that numerous other persons were retained and employed for reward by the respondent, and in his name for the purpose of the said election as agents, clerks, messengers, and in any other employment to vote at such election, the petitioner has the right to ask that there be struck off from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the respondent, one vote for every person who voted at such election and who was bribed, treated and unduly influenced and who was retained and employed for a reward, as aforesaid.

Wherefore the petitioner prays that the election of the respondent Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons, for the electoral district of Yamaska, be declared void to all intents and purposes; and that the said respondent be liable to all the penalties, sanctions and disabilities that the law prescribes; and that there be struck off from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the respondent, one vote for every person who voted at the said election, and who was bribed, treated, unduly influenced and who was retained and employed for a reward, as aforesaid; and that the candidate Paul François Comtois, farmer, domiciled and residing in the parish of St. Thomas de Pierreville, judicial district of Richelieu, be declared elected Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska; the whole with costs against the said respondent, including incidental costs and other costs incurred in connection with the present contestation;

Whereas the respondent has by a motion raising preliminary grounds in opposition to the contestation on the merits and the hearing of the petition, demanded the dismissal of such petition with costs;

Whereas by virtue of a judgment delivered by the Honourable J. J. Denis under date of November 8, 1930, the said motion of the respondent was dismissed with costs, but reserving to the latter the right to raise all the same grounds in due time and place according to law, in his written answer to the petition;

Whereas the respondent for answer to the petition of the petitioner alleges in substance the following:—

Whereas each and every provision of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act and amendments thereto are absolutely imperative and must be rigidly followed and applied, under pain of nullity;

Whereas the formalities which precede, accompany and follow an election petition under the above said Act, are each and every one of them absolutely essential to the existence of the proceedings and the petition;

Whereas the petition, the proceedings of the petitioner, and the summoning of the respondent are illegal, null and void and must to all intents and purposes be so declared for the following reasons among others:—

Because the service was not made upon him personally or by a proper official;

In fact, there is nothing in the record to show that he was personally served;

One Odilon Salvas who is supposed to have acted as bailiff of the Superior Court was no longer in office on September 13, 1930, not having filed at the office of this Court the renewal receipt of his surety policy, nor filed at the said office nor in the hands of the prothonotary any surety nor bond whatsoever;

Moreover, there is nothing in the affidavits of Messrs. Joyal and Michaud (exhibits B and C of the petitioner), in the certificates of registration (exhibits D and E of the petitioner), or of record to show that a copy of the petition and of the receipt had been sent to the respondent at the address indicated for the service of documents in the nomination papers of the said respondent;

Because the petitioner was not a person qualified to vote at this aforesaid election and hence is not properly qualified to enter the present petition, such petitioner having been treated at the central committee of the candidate Paul François Comtois in the village of Pierreville;

And subsidiarily and without prejudice to the grounds above alleged, the defendant adds:—

Paragraphs 7, 8, 15, 16, 21 and sub-paragraphs a, b, c, d, thereof, 22, 23, 24, 31, 44, 59, 61 and 64 are null and void and must be so declared and struck from the petition for the following reasons among others:—

- (a) because the said petition with respect to these said allegations is not in accordance with form "B" in the schedule of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act, or in accordance with an equivalent form;
- (b) because the said petition with respect to these said allegations contains no complaint to the effect that the election or the declaration of election of the respondent is irregular;
- (c) because the said petition with respect to these said allegations contains no complaint of unlawful acts or corrupt practices;
- (d) because the said petition with respect to these said allegations does not contain the particulars of any complaints requisite to avoid surprise or unnecessary costs to the respondent and ensure a proper and fair hearing.
- (e) Paragraphs 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, 17, 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 60, 61, should be struck out because the facts pleaded have lapsed and are prescribed and cannot be the subject of a petition;

Paragraph 6 should be struck out as the grounds pleaded therein are premature;

And without prejudice to the grounds herein above alleged and pleaded and those alleged and pleaded by motion to reject certain parts of the allegations of the petition and of certain particulars furnished and filed by the petitioner the respondent denies paragraphs 1 to 63 of the petition;

With respect to paragraph 63e of the said petition, the respondent pleads specially in reply to such allegation and to the whole petition as well as against the conclusions thereof;

Seeing that the petitioner claims the seat for the person of the candidate Paul François Comtois, the respondent pleads specially, seeing that the said Paul François Comtois was guilty, by himself, and by other persons acting on his behalf, of corruption and of treating the electors and using undue influence with respect to numerous persons who voted at such election; and seeing that numerous persons were retained and employed for reward by the said Paul François Comtois and on his behalf for the purposes of the said election as agents, clerks, messengers, and in any other employment to vote at the said election, the respondent is entitled to ask that there be struck off, at the trial of the petition, from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the said Paul François Comtois, the other candidate, one vote for every person who voted at the said election, and who was bribed, treated or unduly influenced or so retained or employed for reward as aforesaid;

As a matter of fact, during and in the course of the said election, the candidate Paul Francois Comtois did, by himself, by his official agent, and by the intervention of other persons: his agents, advisers, counsellors, organizers, clerks and messengers, commit corrupt acts and fraudulent and unlawful practices mentioned and enumerated in the respondent's answer;

Seeing what is above alleged, without admitting in any manner that there is cause to strike off any vote given to the respondent, there should be struck off, at the trial of the election petition, from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the candidate Paul Francois Comtois one vote for every person above described, that is to say a total of 1,250 votes from the total of 3,529 votes appearing to have been given to the said Paul Francois Comtois;

Wherefore, reserving unto himself all other lawful recourses, against whomsoever may be concerned and, should occasion arise, the right to adopt any further conclusions, the respondent prays:—

A.—that the so-called service made by Odilon Salvas be declared null and void and that the return of service made and signed by the said Odilon Salvas and filed as Exhibit B of the petitioner be declared null and void, to all intents and purposes, and be struck from the record;

B.—that the so-called service made by registered mail be also declared null and void and that the affidavits of Messrs. Joyal and Michaud filed as Exhibits C and D of the petitioner and the certificates of registration filed as Exhibits E and F be declared null and void to all intents and purposes and struck from the record;

C.—that it be, hence, declared that the respondent was not served with the said petition within the five days following the date of presentation of the petition;

And subsidiarily:-

That the said petition be dismissed to all intents and purposes, with costs;

And subsidiarily and without prejudice to the foregoing conclusions and reserving unto himself all other lawful recourses, the respondent prays:—

- (a) that paragraph 6 be declared premature to all intents and purposes, and struck from the record;
- (b) that paragraphs 7, 8, 15, 16, 21 and sub-paragraphs a, b, c, thereof, 22, 23, 24, 31, 44, 59, 61, be declared null and void and struck from the record to all intents and purposes;
- (c) that the facts and reasons pleaded in paragraphs 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, 17, 18, 19, 20, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 32, 33, 34, 35, 37, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 60 and 61 be perempted and prescribed

and incapable of being the subject matter of a petition and that accordingly the said paragraphs, be struck from such petition, the whole with costs saving unto the petitioner any new recourse, should there be grounds therefore;

That it be declared by this Court that the petitioner is a person who was treated during the aforesaid election, and hence is disqualified from voting and from acting as petitioner;

And subject to these reasons, that in accordance with and by virtue of section 48 of chapter 50, R.S.C. 1927, Dominion Controverted Elections Act, there shall be struck off from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the candidate Paul Francois Comtois, namely from the number of 3,529 votes, one vote for every person who voted at the said election, as aforesaid, and is proven to have been bribed, treated or unduly influenced or so retained or employed for reward as aforesaid, namely the number of 1,250 votes; and that the present answer be maintained and that the said petition be dismissed; the whole with costs.

Whereas issue was joined by a general reply on behalf of petitioner;

Whereas by a judgment of March 10, 1931, the date of the trial of the petition was definitely set for March 17, 1931, at the courthouse, in the City of Sorel, district of Richelieu;

Seeing the judgment dated March 26, 1931, adjudicating upon issues of law raised by the respondent in paragraphs 9 and 10 of his answer;

Whereas the issues of law raised in paragraphs 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 of the answer were reserved for adjudication at the time of the final judgment;

ADJUDICATING ON THE MERITS OF THE CAUSE

Whereas an election petition may be served in two manners: (a) upon the respondent personally and (b) by sending a copy of the petition and of the receipt in writing, by registered letter, according to law;

Whereas the petitioner submits he served the petition by using the two methods provided by law;

Whereas the respondent claims the first service is irregular, illegal and null, because of the incapacity of the officiating bailiff, and that the respondent seems to be right on this point; but, on the other hand, the second service is in the opinion of the Trial Judges good, valid and sufficient;

Whereas the petitioner followed the essential provisions of the act in connection with the second service;

Whereas the mailing to the respondent of a copy of the petition and of the receipt by registered mail has been proven by relevant and legal evidence;

Whereas the act is silent as to the manner of proving service by registered letter and that, hence, such proof may be furnished by witnesses and in writing:

Whereas it is proven the respondent received the registered letter containing a copy of the petition and of the receipt in writing and sent within the lawful period;

Whereas the irregularities of which the repondnt complains with respect to the service of the petition, even if they did exist, would be but insignificant irregularities causing no prejudice to respondent and an election petition should not be dismissed on grounds of informality unless such informalities cause a substantial and real prejudice;

Whereas the issues of law raised by the respondent as to the validity of the service of the petition are unfounded;

Doth dismiss the said issues of law;

Whereas the petitioner submitted relevant and legal proof as to his right to act as petitioner in the present election petition;

Whereas the aforesaid decisions dispose of the issues of law raised by the respondent in his answer and with respect to which there has been no adjudication until this day (see judgment of March 26th, 1931);

Whereas the petitioner, in the conclusions of his petition, demands three things: (a) that the election of the respondent, Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons, for the electoral district of Yamaska, be declared void to all intents and purposes; (b) that the respondent be liable to all the penalties, sanctions and disabilities which the law prescribes; (c) that the seat for the electoral district of Yamaska be given to Paul François Comtois;

Whereas, as regards the claim to the seat, this claim should be dismissed because the proof on this point does not justify this part of the conclusions of the petition and also because of the admission of the petitioner himself filed of record;

Whereas, as regards the penalties, sanctions and disabilities to which the respondent might be liable, this part of such conclusions should also be dismissed, for want of proof;

Whereas the respondent submits that, in the present case, the question relates to an election petition claiming the seat and that, if the petitioner fails in his claim to the seat, he must fail on the whole, notwithstanding any evidence of corruption that may be established, in the cause, against the respondent;

Whereas there exists in law no election petition the sole object of which is to claim the seat for a person other than the person declared elected by the returning officer, the claim to the seat being merely an incidental claim which is joined, in cases that admit of such procedure, to one of the petitions recognized by law;

Whereas, in his election petition—excluding for the time being whatever concerns the claim to the seat—petitioner has made such allegations only as may tend to cause the ensuing judgment to declare the respondent's election irregular and void on account of illegal acts and corrupt practices committed by the respondent personally and by his agents at the said election;

Whereas petitioner had the option to add to this principal claim a claim to the seat on behalf of the defeated candidate, but whereas this second claim was not of the essence of the petition itself, being, on the contrary, as stated above, only an incidental and optional claim in no way affecting the nature and import of the petition itself;

Whereas the issue of the claim to the seat in no way affects the issue of the petition itself, which remains complete and intact, notwithstanding that the petitioner fails in his said claim to the seat;

Whereas, from the standpoint of law and of procedure, the election petition may be declared founded if the evidence submitted regarding the alleged corrupt practices justifies such a conclusion: whereas the petitioner submitted a mass of evidence with a view to proving corrupt practices; and the greater part of

that evidence was manifestly legal and was presented without objection being taken to it; while another part thereof was accepted subject to the respondent's objections; but whereas the Trial Judges are of opinion that the evidence of which the legality was disputed, while illegal on certain minor points, is nevertheless legal on all the other points and must be accepted as evidence at the trial;

Whereas proof has been made that on the occasion of the respondent's election a rather large number of corrupt acts, which cannot be called trivial or unimportant, were committed by the respondent's agents; the said acts not having been committed by the respondent personally or by his official agents;

Whereas the respondent could have, either personally or through his official agent, given orders enjoining all his other agents and in general all persons working on his behalf at the said election to abstain from all corrupt practices, and, had he done so, he could now plead the provisions of Section 54 (a) of the Dominion Controverted Elections Act; but, unfortunately for him, he did not prove that he had given such orders;

Whereas the respondent, not having seen fit to protect himself in the manner provided by the said Section 54 (a) is responsible for the said acts in so far as they affect the validity of his election;

Whereas these acts are sufficient, in number and in importance, to cause the voiding of respondent's said election, since the latter, as stated above, cannot plead the exception provided by the said Section 54;

Whereas the election of respondent Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska, must be declared void to all intents and purposes, as requested in the said petition; while all the other conclusions of the said petition must be dismissed;

ADJUDICATING AS TO COSTS

Whereas, as above stated, petitioner had the option of adding to his petition a claim to the seat, and did make such a claim;

Whereas the claim to the seat, while being purely incidental, has in the present case taken on considerable importance as regards the time required for the trial and as regards costs in general;

Whereas, had it not been for this claim to the seat, the trial would have been shortened to such an extent that it is not too much to say that its duration and cost would have been reduced by more than half;

Whereas, at the request of the Trial Judges and in order to determine the portion of the costs to be borne by each party, the prothonotary of this Court has prepared two statements as follows: a statement amounting to \$4,603.90 showing all fees and disbursements of the petitioner, and a statement amounting to \$3,916.50 showing all fees and disbursements of the respondent;

Whereas a judgment ordering each party to pay his own costs would cause the petitioner to pay about seven hundred dollars more than the respondent, the difference representing about eight per centum of the aggregate costs of both parties; and whereas it is proper that it should be so, for, as stated above, the claim to the seat more than doubled the duration and the cost of the trial;

Whereas, for these reasons, each party is to pay his own costs, fees and disbursements, for whatever cause incurred, except however the costs awarded by judgments rendered during the course of the trial.

THEREFORE:

Do maintain the respondent's answer as regards the part thereof asking dismissal of the claim to the seat and dismiss said answer as regards the remainder thereof; maintain the petition in part and dismiss it in part as follows: Declare void to all intents and purposes the election of the respondent Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska, held on July 28th, 1930, and dismiss all the other conclusions of the said petition as unfounded in law and in fact; order the prothonotary of this Court to return to petitioner or his attorneys the deposit of \$1,000 made in this case, less the sum of \$75 which the said prothonotary shall pay to the following persons: to Mr. Osias Cousineau, joint prothonotary, the sum of \$50, and to Mr. Alphonse Prévost, shorthand writer, the sum of \$25, the said sums being due to them respectively for special services rendered in the present case to the Trial Judges at the request of the latter; and as to the remainer of the costs, concerning which no other award has been made prior to this day, each party to pay his own.

This Court did order and adjudge that the said judgment of the above named trial Judges of the Superior Court for the Province of Quebec, sitting at Sorel in the District of Richelieu, should be and the same was affirmed, and that the said appeal should be and the same was dismissed with costs to be

paid by the said Appellant to the said Respondent.

Smith J.—(Concurred in by Rinfret, Lamont, Cannon and Crocket J.)

At a Dominion election held on the 28th of July, 1930, the appellant and one Paul François Comtois were the candidates in the Electoral District of Yamaska and the appellant was returned as elected.

A petition against the appellant was presented under the Dominion Controverted Elections Act (R.S.C. 1927, ch. 50) by the respondent, a duly qualified elector of the said electoral district.

This petition, after numerous allegations of corrupt and illegal acts, committed on behalf of the applicant, concludes as follows:—

(Translation)

Wherefore the petitioner prays that the election of the defendant Aimé Boucher, notary, as Member of the House of Commons, for the electoral district of Yamaska, be declared void to all intents and purposes; and that the defendant be liable to all the penalties, sanctions and disabilities which the law prescribes; and that there shall be struck off from the number of votes appearing to have been given to the defendant, one vote for every person who voted at such election, and who was bribed, treated, unduly influenced and who was retained and employed for reward as aforesaid; and that the candidate Paul François Comtois, farmer, domiciled and residing in the parish of St. Thomas de Pierreville, judicial district of Richelieu, be declared elected Member of the House of Commons for the electoral district of Yamaska; all of which with costs against the said defendant, including incidental costs and other costs incurred in connection with the present contestation.

Sections 48 and 49 of the Act are as follows:—

- 48. If, on the trial of an election petition, claiming the seat for any person, a candidate is proved to have been guilty, by himself or by any person on his behalf of bribery, treating, or undue influence with respect to any person who voted at such election, or if any person retained or employed for reward by or on behalf of such candidate, for all or any of the purposes of such election, as agent, clerk or messenger, or in any other employment, is provided on such trial to have voted at such election, there shall, on the trial of such election petition, be struck off from the number of votes appearing to have been given to such candidate, one vote for every person who voted at such election, and who is proved to have been so bribed, treated or unduly influenced, or so retained or employed for reward as aforesaid.
- 49. If it is found by the report of the trial judges that any corrupt practice has been committed by a candidate at an election, or by his agent, whether with or without the actual knowledge and consent of such candidate, or that any illegal practice has been committed by a

candidate or by his official agent or by any other agent of the candidate with the actual knowledge and consent of the candidate the election of such candidate, if he has been elected, shall be void.

Section 9 provides that the petition may be in form "B" in the schedule to the Act: and the concluding clause of that form reads as follows:

Wherefore your petitioner prays that it may be determined (that ______was duly elected or returned or that ______ought to have been returned or that the election is void, as the case may be) (the words "as the case may be" are in italics.)

The trial judges found that the claim to the seat on behalf of the candidate Comtois should be rejected because the proof on this point does not justify this part of the conclusions of the petition and also because of the admission of the petitioner himself in the record.

They further found the appellant guilty by agents of corrupt practices sufficient to void the election and declared same void accordingly. From this decision voiding the election the appeal is taken.

The ground of appeal is that because the seat is claimed for the defeated candidate the function of the trial judges was limited by striking off votes from the number given for each candidate as provided by S. 48 and to finding by this means who "had" the majority of lawful votes and of declaring the candidate, so found to have the majority, elected.

It is argued that a claim to the seat on behalf of a candidate defeated according to the return and a claim for the voiding of the election are incompatible claims that cannot be set up side by side; or, in the alternative, because, if the election of Boucher is first declared either valid or void, it is not then possible to reverse this on a computation of votes under section 48; and, on the other hand, that if such computation under section 48 is first made, the Court must award the seat to the candidate having the majority by such computation, and cannot then proceed to void the election because, the judges having eliminated all the votes of each candidate tainted with illegality, there are left only the good or untainted votes, and the party having the majority of these is entitled to be declared elected; and all the illegal votes cast for him having been disallowed, these and the means by which they were procured cannot be made a ground for unseating him.

I am of opinion that this reason is not tenable. It means that if the seat is claimed by or on behalf of a candidate who has been defeated according to the return, the trial judges, quite regardless of any large amount of corruption and illegality practiced on behalf of both candidates, must declare one of them elected.

To confirm the successful candidate according to the return in the seat under such circumstances would be directly contrary to the provisions of section 49.

Section 10 (5) of the Act provides that the sitting member, whose election and return is petitioned against, may file a petition, complaining of any unlawful and corrupt act by any candidate at the same election who was not returned or by his agent with his privity, and section 47 provides as follows:—

On the trial of a petition under this Act complaining of an undue return and claiming the seat for any person, the respondent may give evidence to show that the election of such person was undue in the same manner as if he had presented a petition complaining of such election.

The language of this section is peculiar, inasmuch as it treats or speaks of any person for whom the petition claims the seat as an elected person whose "election" may be attacked in the prescribed manner. It seems a misnomer to speak of the "election" of a candidate who by the return is not elected. I am of opinion, however, that the section means that a candidate who has not been declared elected, on whose behalf a petition against the candidate returned as elected claims the seat, may be proceeded against in the same manner as if a counter petition had been filed against him under section 10 (5) referred to.

It follows that a defeated candidate for whom the petition claims the seat is in the position, so far as corrupt or illegal practices are concerned, as the successful candidate against whom the petition has been filed. Where, therefore, the evidence establishes against the candidate declared elected, and also against the candidate for whom the seat is claimed, corrupt and illegal acts sufficient to void an election, the trial judges are not bound to declare one of them elected on a computation of votes pursuant to section 48, but may declare the election void.

Section 57 provides that at the conclusion of the trial, the trial judges shall determine whether the member whose election or return is complained of or any and what other person was duly returned or elected, or whether the election was void.

The trial judges here, as expressly empowered by this section, have declared that neither the appellant nor Comtois, for whom the seat was claimed, was duly returned or elected, and that the election is void.

I am of opinion that there was jurisdiction so to declare, and, this being the only question submitted to us, the appeal should be dismissed with costs.

REPORT AND CERTIFICATE BY THE TRIAL JUDGES TO THE SUPREME COURT OF CANADA

Pursuant to Sections 67 and 59 of Chapter 50 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, being the Dominion Controverted Elections Act, we, the trial Judges, do hereby beg to submit the following report to the Supreme Court of Canada:—

Section 67 of the said Act provides that we shall make, to the Supreme Court of Canada, the Report and Certificate with respect to corrupt and illegal practices, provided for by Section 59 of the said Act.

Accordingly, under said section 59, we report as follows:-

UNDER SECTION 59 (a)

We are of the opinion that no corrupt or illegal practice was proved to have been committed by or with the knowledge and consent of any candidate at the said election.

UNDER SECTION 59 (b)

A list of the names of the persons who have been proved, at the trial, to have been guilty of any corrupt or illegal practice would necessitate a very long, ardous and difficult work, which we have not undertaken to do up to the present time.

The record of the evidence produced is enormous and each page of that evidence should be carefully scrutinized in order to comply with the said Section 59 (b). Moreover none of these persons could be reported as having been heard on their own behalf.

For these reasons, we have refrained thus far from making a list of such persons.

However, we wish to state very clearly that, under the provisions of the Statute, we are and remain at the entire disposal of the Supreme Court of Canada. Should the Supreme Court think fit, in the public interest, to issue an order that such names be given out, we will most willingly comply with such order.

Under Section 59 (c)

We are of the opinion that corrupt and illegal practices by both parties have extensively prevailed at the election to which the petition relates.

UNDER SECTION 59 (d)

We believe that the enquiry into the circumstances of the election has not been rendered incomplete by the action of any of the parties to th petition, and that no further enquiry as to whether corrupt or illegal practices have extensively prevailed is desirable.

2. Age of each of such boats, and the reason for disposing of them respectively.

3. What disposition was made of each of the boats so disposed of, and in

the case of those sold, what the sale price was.

4. Names of the boats acquired by the preventive service in 1932, and the

age of each boat so acquired.

5. As to the boats so acquired, whether they were purchased, leased or how otherwise acquired, and in the case of those purchased what the purchase prices were respectively.

6. Whether any of the boats acquired this year have been conditioned or repaired since being so acquired, and if so, the cost of such conditioning or

repairs of each.

Also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 23rd November, 1932, for a Return showing:-

By Mr. Gott:—Address to His Excellency the Governor General, for a copy of the agreement between the Government of Canada and the Government of the United States of America regarding the operation and maintenance of a patrol in the lower Detroit river during the course of channel construction and the closing of the West Channel to navigation.

Mr. Boulanger, seconded by Mr. Roberge, moved,—Whereas French-speaking Canadians constitute approximately one-third of the population and have always

evinced their attachment to the Throne and British institutions;

And Whereas their language, one of the languages most commonly used in international relations, is coupled with their culture and traditions, one of the essential elements of Canadian nationality, and establishes a characteristic that differentiates and protects our country against the dangers of Americanization;

And Whereas the Fathers of Confederation had in mind and the federal

pact demand the equality of the two languages: English and French;

Therefore be it Resolved:—That, in the opinion of this House, in order to more clearly establish the distinctive character of the Canadian people and to better ensure its preservation, all state currency, notes or bonds should be in both official languages.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Gobeil, seconded by Mr. Spence, moved,—That the said Debate be adjourned.

Mr. Speakman, seconded by Mr. Lucas, moved,—Whereas; the question of public and private indebtedness has become one of our greatest and most perplexing problems, enhanced during the past years by the extremely low price level of all primary commodities, through which this indebtedness must be in large part met, and the effect of which has been to double and treble the actual burden of these liabilities; and,

Whereas; this fact has been recognized in respect of certain international obligations, and has become a practical issue in respect of the public obligations

of many countries; and,

Whereas; no such recognition has as yet been given to the heavy private indebtedness within this country, although these, together with the high interest rates which prevail, constitute just as heavy and impossible a burden to the individual, as do national and international obligations to the countries concerned; and,

Whereas; this situation is one of the greatest factors in the present economic depression, and is one of the greatest barriers to the financial recovery of agriculture and industry, and as such, deserves and commands the immediate atten-

tion of this parliament;

Therefore be it Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should give serious and immediate attention to the question of debts and interest rates within this country, and the possibility of their reduction, either by way of direct action, or by the submission of the entire problem to a special committee of this House, in order that the subject may be fully enquired into, and if possible, some solution found.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Coote, seconded by Mr. Kennedy (Peace River), moved,—That the said proposed Resolution be amended by striking out the words "a Special Committee of this House" and substituting therefor the words "the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce."

And the question being put on the said proposed amendment; it was

agreed to.

And the question being put on the main motion as amended; it was agreed to.

Mr. McIntosh, seconded by Mr. Sanderson, moved,—That, in the opinion of this House, a special committee be appointed for the purpose of considering the advisability of adopting a Canadian flag, representing Canada as a whole, and in which the British flag shall occupy the position of honour, thus symbolizing the Dominion as an equality partner in the commonwealth of British nations.

After Debate thereon, the said motion was, by leave of the House, with-

drawn.

By leave of the House, on motion of Sir George Perley, the House reverted to Motions, under Routine Proceedings.

Sir George Perley, a Member of the King's Privy Council, then laid before the House,—Copy of Order in Council, P.C. 228, dated the 6th February, 1933, appointing the Honourable George Herbert Sedgewick, a Justice of the High Court of Justice of Ontario, Toronto, Ontario; Milton Neil Campbell, Esquire, M.P., Pelly, Saskatchewan; and Charles Hébert, Esquire, B.A., of the City of Montreal, P.Q., Wholesale Grocer, members of the Tariff Board as constituted by Chapter 55 of the Statutes of Canada 1931. The said Honourable Mr. Justice Sedgewick to be Chairman of the Board, and the said Milton Neil Campbell to be Vice-Chairman.

By leave of the House, on motion of Sir George Perley, the House returned to Notices of Motions.

Mr. LaVergne, seconded by Mr. Pouliot, moved,—That in view of the Statute of Westminster, the traditions of the Canadian people, and the Constitution of the Country, this House is of the opinion that the name of Canada should be changed from that of "The Dominion of Canada" to that of "Kingdom of Canada."

After Debate thereon, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Stitt (Selkirk), adjourned.

Mr. Munn, seconded by Mr. Reid, moved,—Whereas the question of securing proper returns from taxpayers so that no revenue properly taxable is to escape taxation becomes of utmost importance, especially in times of decreasing revenues such as at present;

Whereas the securing of revenue from these sources is difficult inasmuch as bonds to the extent of hundreds of millions of dollars have been issued by the Dominion and Provincial Governments as well as industrial companies, power and public utilities companies, the majority of these being bearer bonds transferable by delivery pass from hand to hand without any available record as to

who holds them at any particular time.

Therefore be it Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, legislation should be introduced providing that banks, trust companies and other agents in making payment of interest coupons on bearer bonds shall deduct from the amount of each coupon the tax returnable to the federal or provincial governments interested and be responsible for the deposit of the same in the federal or provincial treasury.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was

agreed to.

Mr. Barrette, seconded by Mr. Duguay, moved,—Whereas this House will soon be called upon to effect a redistribution of electoral ridings in the various provinces constituting the Canadian Confederation;

Whereas; the number of electoral ridings in each province other than the Province of Quebec is based on the population unit of this latter province; and,

Whereas; the parliamentary representation of the Province of Quebec with a population of 2,874,255 comprises 65 members, or a quotient of 44,219 per unit of representation; and,

Whereas; the parliamentary representation of the Province of Ontario now comprises 82 members, with a population of 41,849 per unit of representation;

and,

Whereas; notwithstanding the fact the population of the Province of Ontario shows an increase in numbers but a decrease proportionally to the increase in the population of the Province of Quebec, the latter province taking as a basis the unit of representation of the Province of Ontario would be entitled to 69 members, New Brunswick 12, Manitoba 17, Saskatchewan 22, Alberta 18, British Columbia 17;

Therefore be it Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, in order to promote harmony among the Canadian people, the Parliament of Canada do grant to the provinces a just and equitable representation based on the unit of

representation of the Province of Ontario.

After Debate thereon, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Stewart

(Edmonton West), adjourned.

Mr. Duranleau, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 28th October, 1932, for a copy of all correspondence including letters, telegrams and other documents, passing between any person or persons in the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Acting Minister of Fisheries, or any of his officials, regarding the lobster season from Cole Harbour to Grand Manan, changing said season from the 1st of March to the 31st day of May, to the 1st of December to the end of May; also copy of order in council making said change and specifying the size limit of lobsters.

On motion of Mr. Murphy, it was resolved,—That the Orders in Council which have been published in the Canada Gazette between the 17th day of December, 1931, and the 9th day of September, 1932, in accordance with the provisions of Section 75 of the Dominion Lands Act, Chapter 113, R.S. 1927, and which were laid on the Table on the 7th day of October, 1932, be approved.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed Resolution to continue in force the provisions of An Act to amend the Income War Tax Act, chapter 44 of the Statutes of 1932, etc.

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,—That it is expedient to continue in force until March 31, 1934, the provisions of An Act to amend the Income War Tax Act, chapter 44 of the Statutes of 1932, and to provide that the persons therein described shall be liable to pay the tax thereby imposed in respect of salaries or pay paid to them by the Dominion of Canada during or in respect of the fiscal year 1933-34, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Rhodes then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 20, An Act to amend the Income War Tax Act (Special Tax), which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Rhodes moved,—That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee of the Whole to consider the following proposed Resolution:—

That it is expedient to continue in force the provisions of the Salary Deduction Act 1932, until the 31st day of March, 1934, and to provide that the provisions of the said Act shall apply to the indemnities of members of the Senate and House of Commons for the session of Parliament which commenced on the 6th day of October, 1932.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was

agreed to.

The House accordingly went into Committee of the Whole on the said proposed Resolution, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again at the next sitting of the House.

The Order being read for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Supply;

Mr. Speaker: "There is in our Journals one precedent of an amendment moved on the second reading of a bill which proposed that 'further consideration of the bill be deferred until the Tariff Bill has been disposed of '. It was a declaration of principle covering not only the second reading, but also the third reading and the final adoption of the bill, and it was moved as a disapproval of the measure.

"But the present amendment is different in as much as it proposes a postponement of the second reading pending a definite declaration of the House.

"It does not purport to be adverse to the bill, but it makes suggestions for adding to its provisions by amendments which can only be moved after

'It is competent to a Member who desires to place on record any special reasons for not agreeing to the second reading of a bill to move as an amendment to the question a resolution declaratory of some principle adverse to or differing from the principles, policy or provisions of the bill.'

"As this amendment has not the effect of disagreeing with the principle of the bill, it does not come within the class of amendments referred to by May.

"The allegation that nothing in the bill should be taken to divest Parliament of its rights or to take from the House its primary duty to control expenditures is a declaration of general principles which can be moved as a reason for not agreeing to the second reading of a bill dealing with the constitutional rights of Parliament, but which is beyond the scope of, and therefore irrelevant, to the present bill. May says at page 391 that the principle of relevancy in an amendment governs every such proposed resolution.

"At page 391, May says further:-

'Such an amendment may not deal with the provisions of the bill upon which it is moved nor anticipate amendments thereto which may be moved in Committee.'

"The words 'nothing therein shall be taken to authorize any amalgamation of the Canadian National Railways with the Canadian Pacific Company' anticipates an amendment which may be moved in Committee.

"The proposition that the bill shall be read in the light of certain declarations and be construed in a certain manner, and that its provisions shall be amended accordingly is in the nature of an instruction to the Committee which cannot be moved as an amendment to the second reading.

"For these reasons, the amendment is out of order.

"See May 13th Edition, Page 391; Bourinot, Page 509; Redlich Vol. III, Page 89."

The Bill No. 55, An Act respecting Relief Measures, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, and ordered for third reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 40, An Act respecting Visiting Forces of His Majesty, and the exercise of command, discipline and attachments of Commonwealth Forces when serving together, was read the third time (Title changed to "An Act to make provision with respect to Forces of His Majesty from other parts of the British Commonwealth or from a colony when visiting the Dominion of Canada; and with respect to the exercise of command and discipline when Forces of His Majesty from different parts of the Commonwealth are serving together; and with respect to the attachment of members of one such force to another such force, and with respect to deserters from such forces"), and passed.

Mr. Ralston, seconded by Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver Centre), moved in amendment thereto,—That all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor:—

"the proposals of the government as set forth in the budget presented to this House by the Minister of Finance make no provision for the fundamental changes in existing policies regarding trade, credit and employment which are required to cope with the present economic situation. They imply a continuance of fiscal and other policies which have not only signally failed to afford any solution of our national problems, but have been proven to have the effect of diminishing trade, of decreasing revenue, of increasing unemployment, and, without any corresponding reduction in expenditures, of increasing taxation, and debt, thereby aggravating the existing depression and distress.

"The increases in taxation proposed in the budget resolutions will fall most heavily upon those least able to bear the burden thereof, and, combined with other unjust exactions, will serve to intensify the distress already experienced

in many homes throughout the Dominion.

"The absence, at this time, of any provision in the budget indicative of Canada's desire to negotiate trade agreements with countries willing to trade with Canada on a reciprocal basis is further evidence of the lack of a definite constructive policy in meeting the needs of the present situation.

"For these and other reasons, this House is of the opinion that the present

government no longer possesses the confidence of the country."

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

At six o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at eight o'clock, p.m.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate in the following words:—

"In His Majesty's name, the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General doth assent to these Bills."

"the proposals of the government as set forth in the budget presented to this House by the Minister of Finance make no provision for the fundamental changes in existing policies regarding trade, credit and employment which are required to cope with the present economic situation. They imply a continuance of fiscal and other policies which have not only signally failed to afford any solution of our national problems, but have been proven to have the effect of diminishing trade, of decreasing revenue, of increasing unemployment, and, without any corresponding reduction in expenditures, of increasing taxation, and debt, thereby aggravating the existing depression and distress.

"The increases in taxation proposed in the budget resolutions will fall most heavily upon those least able to bear the burden thereof, and, combined with other unjust exactions, will serve to intensify the distress already experienced

in many homes throughout the Dominion.

"The absence, at this time, of any provision in the budget indicative of Canada's desire to negotiate trade agreements with countries willing to trade with Canada on a reciprocal basis is further evidence of the lack of a definite constructive policy in meeting the needs of the present situation.

"For these and other reasons, this House is of the opinion that the present

government no longer possesses the confidence of the country."

And the Debate continuing;

Mr. Lucas, seconded by Mr. Woodsworth, moved in amendment to the said proposed amendment: That all the words after "therefor" in the said proposed amendment be struck out, and the following substituted therefor:—

"Whereas, the present depressed condition of Agriculture, Industry and of business generally, with its consequent unemployment, is the direct result of fundamental defects in our economic system, accentuated during recent years by the policies of deflation and of credit restriction which have been followed by different Governments and financial institutions, and

"Whereas, while it is recognized that the present budget contains certain commendable features, including the proposed appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate banking and finance, and a measure of assistance to agriculture, it must also be recognized that it is based in principle upon a continuance of the aforesaid ruinous policies of deflation and an increased restriction of purchasing power, and

- "Whereas, the continuance of these policies, accompanied as they must be by a constantly increasing burden of debt, recurring budget deficits, and a decrease of purchasing power, and therefore of consumption, must inevitably result in a condition of still greater depression, and increasing unemployment, and
- "Whereas, it is imperative, in view of the foregoing facts, that such policies be inaugurated as will have the effect of restoring the price level of agriculture, and other primary products, increasing purchasing power, reducing the burden of interest bearing liabilities, encouraging consumption and raising the standard of living amongst our people;

"Therefore be it resolved,—That in the opinion of this House the Government should give immediate consideration to the introduction of such measures

as may-

- "(a) Make available the real credit of the Nation through the instrumentality of a National Central Bank, and render possible the utilization and control of this credit for the legitimate needs of the people of this country;
- "(b) Bring about such a degree of controlled inflation as would stabilize the price level of our chief commodities at a point where it would bear a reasonable relation to costs of production and to incurred obligations;
- "(c) Provide employment and purchasing power to our people, through the above-mentioned means, and where necessary, by the direct use of our national credit in the construction of public works of various kinds, and in other ways which might be suggested including the construction of houses, etc.;
- "(d) Ensure a more equitable distribution of the National Income through well considered methods of taxation, and the legislative control of interest, profits and investment;
- "(e) Nationalize our Insurance Systems, including the establishment of such systems of social insurance as may be necessary for the protection and well being of our people."

And the Debate still continuing, the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Cowan (Port Arthur), adjourned.

Mr. Speaker: "On Friday, April 7th, the Right Honourable the Leader of the Opposition raised the point that the House having control of its own records, the House should, before any statements are expunged from the official reports of the debates, pass a resolution to that effect and he submitted that the Speaker being the servant of the House in this, as in all matters, the House itself should determine whether anything is to be deleted from any of its records.

"In the case in point, the first opportunity I had of fully understanding the words complained of was when I saw the official report, and since I should have ruled them out when they were uttered I consider I was justified in ruling them out from the Chair as soon as the House sat again. I agree that in dealing with Hansard the Speaker's authority is subject to the approval of the House.

"Instructions for any alteration in the official reports of the debates should not be given without communicating them to the House in session, and for this reason, whenever I have deemed it advisable to direct that certain statements be expunged, I have done so from the Chair, thus giving a ruling which under Standing Order 12, is subject to an appeal to the House. I have followed the precedent established by one of my predecessors who, on April 6th, 1925, decided that an answer given by the Government should be expunged, and he did so in the following words:—

"'I therefore rule that the answer be expunged from Hansard, and if the

question is put again, a distinct answer should be given.'

"I have dealt with all such cases as questions of order subject to the ordinary rules of parliamentary procedure."

Mr. Cahan, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 20th March, 1933, for a copy of all letters, petitions, complaints, correspondence and other documents exchanged from 1925 to 1930, between the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa or any of its branches at Ottawa and the Civil Service Commission, or any branches of the said department in the various provinces of Canada or the various officials of the department at Ottawa, or elsewhere, respecting Miss Ruth Edwards, her work, conduct or transfer to Ottawa, Montreal, or elsewhere.

Mr. Sauvé, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 20th March, 1933, for a copy of all documents, letters, petitions, correspondence, and proceedings of inquiries, respecting the resignation of Mr. Victor Robillard, as postmaster of the town of Ste-Therese, county of Terrebonne, covering the year 1932 and the current year to date.

Mr. Murphy, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 22nd March, 1933, for a copy of all correspondence between the Minister of the Interior or any departmental official, and Mr. Sidney J. Webber, of Golden, British Columbia, regarding lot 10550, G. I. Kootenay district, on the east shore of Kimbasket Lake, on Big Bend Road.

Mr. Guthrie, by leave of the House, introduced a Bill, No. 74, An Act respecting Extra-Territorial Operation of Acts of the Parliament of Canada, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Stevens, a Member of the King's Privy Council, laid before the House, —Annual Report of the Board of Grain Commissioners for Canada, for the year 1932, (unrevised copy).

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Rhodes: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Ways and Means, and the proposed motion of Mr. Ralston in amendment thereto, and the proposed motion of Mr. Lucas in amendment to the said proposed amendment.

And the Debate continuing;

(Private Bills)

The following Bills were again considered in Committee of the Whole, and further progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider them again at the next sitting of the House, viz:—

Bill No. 41, An Act to incorporate The Sarnia-Port Huron Vehicular Tunnel

Company.

Bill No. 48, An Act to confirm an Agreement between the Vancouver, Victoria and Eastern Railway and Navigation Company and the Northern Pacific Railway Company.

The amendment made by the Senate to the Bill No. 29, An Act to amend and consolidate the several Acts relating to the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto, was taken into consideration and agreed to.

(Public Bills)

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Power: That the Bill No. 29 (Letter I of the Senate), intituled: "An Act with respect to Hospital Sweepstakes," be now read the second time.

And the Debate continuing; and he work at continuing;

Mr. Carmichael, seconded by Mr. Speakman, moved in amendment thereto: That the word "now" be left out, and the words "this day six months" added at the end of the question.

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

The hour devoted to Private and Public Bills having expired;

The House resumed the Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Rhodes: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to resolve itself again into Committee of Ways and Means, and the proposed motion of Mr. Ralston in amendment thereto: That all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor:—

"the proposals of the government as set forth in the budget presented to this House by the Minister of Finance make no provision for the fundamental changes in existing policies regarding trade, credit and employment which are required to cope with the present economic situation. They imply a continuance of fiscal and other policies which have not only signally failed to afford any solution of our national problems, but have been proven to have the effect of diminishing trade, of decreasing revenue, of increasing unemployment, and, without any corresponding reduction in expenditures, of increasing taxation, and debt, thereby aggravating the existing depression and distress.

"The increases in taxation proposed in the budget resolutions will fall most heavily upon those least able to bear the burden thereof, and, combined with other unjust exactions, will serve to intensify the distress already experienced in many homes throughout the Dominion.

"The absence, at this time, of any provision in the budget indicative of Canada's desire to negotiate trade agreements with countries willing to trade with Canada on a reciprocal basis is further evidence of the lack of a definite constructive policy in meeting the needs of the present situation.

"For these and other reasons, this House is of the opinion that the present government no longer possesses the confidence of the country."

And the proposed motion of Mr. Lucas in amendment to the said proposed amendment: That all the words after "therefor" in the said proposed amendment be struck out, and the following substituted therefor:—

"Whereas, the present depressed condition of Agriculture, Industry and of business generally, with its consequent unemployment, is the direct result of fundamental defects in our economic system, accentuated during recent years by the policies of deflation and of credit restriction which have been followed by different Governments and financial institutions, and

"Whereas, while it is recognized that the present budget contains certain commendable features, including the proposed appointment of a Royal Commission to investigate banking and finance, and a measure of assistance to agriculture, it must also be recognized that it is based in principle upon a continuance of the aforesaid ruinous policies of deflation and an increased restriction of purchasing power, and

"Whereas, the continuance of these policies, accompanied as they must be by a constantly increasing burden of debt, recurring budget deficits, and a decrease of purchasing power, and therefore of consumption, must inevitably result in a condition of still greater depression, and increasing unemployment, and "Whereas, it is imperative, in view of the foregoing facts, that such policies be inaugurated as will have the effect of restoring the price level of agriculture, and other primary products, increasing purchasing power, reducing the burden of interest bearing liabilities, encouraging consumption and raising the standard of living amongst our people;

"Therefore be it resolved,—That in the opinion of this House the Government should give immediate consideration to the introduction of such measures

as may-

"(a) Make available the real credit of the Nation through the instrumentality of a National Central Bank, and render possible the utilization and control of this credit for the legitimate needs of the people of this country;

"(b) Bring about such a degree of controlled inflation as would stabilize the price level of our chief commodities at a point where it would bear a reason-

able relation to costs of production and to incurred obligations;

"(c) Provide employment and purchasing power to our people, through the above-mentioned means, and where necessary, by the direct use of our national credit in the construction of public works of various kinds, and in other ways which might be suggested including the construction of houses, etc.;

"(d) Ensure a more equitable distribution of the National Income through well considered methods of taxation, and the legislative control of interest,

profits and investment;

"(e) Nationalize our Insurance Systems, including the establishment of such systems of social insurance as may be necessary for the protection and well being of our people."

After further Debate thereon, the question being put on the said proposed amendment to the proposed amendment; it was negatived, on the following division:—

A Message was received from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bill to which the concurrence of this House was desired:—

Bill No. 75 (Letter T of the Senate) intituled: "An Act for the relief of Olga Shidlowskaya Lowrey."—Mr. Bell (St. Antoine).

And also,—A Message communicating to this House the evidence taken before the Standing Committee of the Senate on Divorce to whom was referred the petition of Olga Shidlowskaya Lowrey, praying for a Bill of Divorce, and the papers produced in evidence before them with a request that the same be returned to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Simpson (Algoma West) pursuant to Special Order made 27th March last the said Bill was read a first and a second time, on division, and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills (together with the evidence, etc., taken before the Standing Committee of the Senate on Divorce on the petition on which the said Bill was founded).

Mr. Hanson (York-Sunbury), from the Select Standing Committee on Railways and Shipping owned, operated and controlled by the Government, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has considered Bill No. 73, An Act respecting the Canadian National Railways and to authorize the provision of moneys to meet expenditures made and indebtedness incurred during the calendar year 1933 and to authorize His Majesty to make loans and advances to the Canadian National Railway Company, and has agreed to report the said Bill without amendment.

Mr. Gordon, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 2nd March, 1933, for a Return showing whether the Quebec Government has made any representations in favour of the abandonment of the system of direct relief and the re-establishment of the system of public works.

Mr. Stewart (Leeds), a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 6th March, 1933, for a copy of all pay lists and a statement of materials used in connection with the work on the Sand Point Wharf, St. John River, during the year 1932.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd April, 1933, for a copy of all letters, correspondence and all other documents in the possession of the Government since August, 1930, respecting the construction of a breakwater at Roberval, province of Quebec.

Mr. Sauvé, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 20th March, 1933, for a copy of all documents, requests, petitions, and correspondence, respecting the change in the postmastership at Haysport, British Columbia, from 1929 until the present.

An Act to make provision with respect to Forces of His Majesty from other parts of the British Commonwealth or from a colony when visiting the Dominion of Canada; and with respect to the exercise of command and discipline when Forces of His Majesty from different parts of the Commonwealth are serving together; and with respect to the attachment of members of one such force to another such force, and with respect to deserters from such forces.

An Act for the relief of Auguste Burdayron. An Act for the relief of Nora Tulloch Carr. An Act for the relief of Alberta Grace Wood. An Act for the relief of Hilda Nice Allen.

An Act for the relief of Mary Louise Robinson Reid. An Act for the relief of Elizabeth Bernstein Schmerling.

An Act to amend and consolidate the several Acts relating to the Board of Trade of the City of Toronto.

An Act respecting a certain Patent application of Fred Charles Fantz.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate in the following words:—

"In His Majesty's name, the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General doth assent to these Bills."

The Honourable the Speaker of the Commons then addressed the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General, as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

"The Commons of Canada have voted supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Honour the following

Bill:—

"An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1934."

"To which Bill I humbly request Your Honour's assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of the Deputy of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

"In His Majesty's name, the Right Honourable the Deputy Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

The Bill No. 37 (Letter A of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting the Canadian National Railways and to provide for co-operation with the Canadian Pacific Railway System, and for other purposes," was again considered in Committee of the Whole, and further progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again at the next sitting of the House.

Tainter and others, of the second part, one McLeod Stewart of the third part, The Quebec Bank and others of the fourth part, and the Company of the fifth part, a copy of which is set out in the schedule to this Act, and that by virtue of the said transfers and assignments the said two thousand nine hundred and forty-four (2,944) shares of its capital stock thereupon became revested in the Company as unissued shares without effecting a reduction of the capital of the Company."

Also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 53, An Act to amend the Criminal Code (Offensive Weapons), with amendments, which are as follows:—

1. Page 1, line 8. For clause 118 substitute the following:—

"118. Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years, who, not having a permit in Form 76,—

(a) has upon his person elsewhere than in his own dwelling house, shop, warehouse, counting house, or premises, a pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed upon the person;

or who not having such permit,

- (b) is carrying in any vehicle under his control, or of which he is an occupant, a pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed upon the person."
- 2. Page 1, line 29. After the words "Form 76B" insert the following proviso:—
- "Provided however that any bona fide sportsman and hunter shall be permitted to enter or pass through Canada having in his possession any shotgun, rifle or other such firearm, or any ammunition therefor, on condition that he pass continuously through and out of Canada or if not that he apply for a permit in Form 76B without undue delay after entering Canada."
- 3. Page 2, line 20. After "property" insert "or for target practice in a regularly organized shooting club approved by the Attorney General of the province in which such club is organized."
 - 4. Page 2, line 28. For the word "in" substitute the word "for".
 - 5. Page 2, line 43. After the word "persons" insert "or classes of persons".
- 6. Page 4, line 38. After the word "property" insert "or for target practice".

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 59, An Act to amend the Penitentiary Act, with an amendment, which is as follows:—

Page 2, clause 5, line 17. Subsection one of section thirty-two of the said Act is further amended by adding thereto the following proviso:—

- 1. Resolved,—That the Customs Tariff, being chapter forty-four of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, as amended by chapter thirty-nine of the Acts of 1929, chapter thirteen of the Acts of 1930 (first Session), chapter three of the Acts of 1930 (second Session), and chapter thirty of the Acts of 1931, be further amended by adding to Section six thereof the following subsection:—
- (9) Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, the Governor in Council may from time to time and as occasion requires order and direct, subject to such exceptions as may be made, what shall be the rate of exchange fixed for any currency in computing the value for duty of goods imported into Canada from any place or country the currency of which is depreciated, and in case a sum in Canadian currency less than the invoice value of the goods in the currency of the place or country of export, computed at the rate of exchange so ordered, be paid for the goods, the actual selling price of the goods to the importer shall be regarded as less than the fair market value of the goods when sold for home consumption, and the provisions of this Section shall apply and special or dumping duty shall apply equal to the difference between the value of the invoice computed at the current rate of exchange or at the average cur-

rent rate from time to time fixed by order of the Governor in Council, and the value of such invoice, computed at the rate of exchange for duty so ordered as aforesaid, or may be less than such difference as the Governor in Council may from time to time order and direct; and the Governor in Council may order and direct that in all cases of sales or consignments of goods imported into Canada, where the importer owns, controls or is interested in the business of the exporter, or the exporter owns, controls or is interested in the business of the importer, or the importer and exporter operate under a controlling or holding company, notwithstanding the expressed terms of the sale or consignment, the transaction shall be regarded as a sale and the actual selling price to the purchaser in Canada shall be taken to be the value of the goods in the currency of the place or country of export converted into Canadian currency at the current rate of exchange, or at the average current rate from time to time fixed by order of the Governor in Council, and shall be regarded as less than the fair market value of the goods when sold for home consumption and the provisions of this Section shall apply and special or dumping duty shall be deemed to apply equal to the difference between the value of the invoice computed at the current rate of exchange or at the average current rate from time to time fixed by order of the Governor in Council, and the value of such invoice computed at the rate of exchange for duty so ordered as aforesaid, or may be less than such difference as the Governor in Council may from time to time order and direct.

Any Order in Council made hereunder may be varied, extended or revoked at any time by the Governor in Council.

This subsection shall be deemed to have had effect from and after the First day of September, 1931.

EXCISE ACT

Resolved,—That it is expedient to introduce a measure to amend the Excise Act, chapter sixty of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, and to provide:—

1. (i) That section one hundred and forty-nine of the said Act, as amended by chapter eight of the Statutes of 1932, be amended by providing that the rate of excise duties set out by the second paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of the said section be fixed at two dollars and fifty cents per gallon of the strength of proof on spirits used in the manufacture of patent and proprietary medicines, extracts, essences, and pharmaceutical preparations manufactured in bond, instead of \$2.40, \$2.42 or \$2.43 as set out in the said paragraph;

(ii) That said section one hundred and forty-nine be further amended by

adding thereto the following subsection as subsection two thereof:-

(iii) There shall be imposed, levied and collected on all spirits used in

bond for the manufacture of perfume, an excise duty as follows:-

On every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, one dollar and fifty cents and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon, and the said duty shall be payable by the bonded manufacturer in accordance with regulations prescribed.

(2) There shall be imposed, levied and collected on all spirits distilled from the juices of native fruits for use exclusively by registered wine manufacturers under prescribed regulations, a special excise duty

as follows:-

On every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, one dollar and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than a gallon, and the said duty shall be payable by the registered wine manufacturer at the time such spirits are taken out of warehouse.

2. That subsection two of section one hundred and fifty of the said Act be amended by repealing paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) thereof and substituting therefor the following:—

On every gallon of the strength of proof by Sykes' hydrometer, two dollars and fifty cents, and so in proportion for any greater or less strength than the strength of proof and for any less quantity than one gallon.

thereby increasing to a flat rate of two dollars and fifty cents the duties already imposed at \$2.40, \$2.42 and \$2.43 as the case may be on spirits used by licensed druggists in the manufacture or preparation of medicines, etc.

3. That any enactment founded on the foregoing paragraphs of this Resolution shall be deemed to have come into effect on the twenty-second day of March, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three, and to have applied to all goods taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that date.

SPECIAL WAR REVENUE ACT

Resolved,—That it is expedient to amend The Special War Revenue Act, chapter one hundred and seventy-nine of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, as amended by chapter fifty of the Statutes of 1928, chapter fifty-seven of the Statutes of 1929, chapter forty-three of the Statutes of 1930, chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1931 and chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1932, and to

provide:-

- 1. That section four of the said Act be amended to provide that notes of a bank in circulation in any British Colony or possession other than Canada, under the authority of section sixty-two of the Bank Act and in respect of which taxation is levied and payable by or under the laws of such colony or possession, shall be exempt from the taxation required to be made under sections three and four of the said Act, provided that if the tax imposed by or under such laws is less than the tax imposed under section three of the said Act the amount of such exemption shall not exceed the amount required to be paid by or under the laws of such colony or possession in respect of such notes.
- 2. That the provisions exempting from the stamp tax cheques, receipts to banks, money orders, traveller's cheques and post office money orders, where such instruments are for an amount not exceeding \$5 be repealed, except in the case of cheques issued by butter or cheese factories to producers of milk or cream.
- 3. That section seventy of the said Act, as enacted by chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1931, be amended by providing that the stamp tax on postal notes shall be at the rate of three cents.
- 4. That section fifty-eight of the said Act, as enacted by chapter forty-three of the Statutes of 1930, be amended by adding thereto and making liable to the excise tax on sale, transfer or assignment of stocks, bonds, etc., the

following:-

Any participating interest in the operations or profits of any association, company, or corporation, represented by certificates, documents, or other instruments of title capable of being sold, transferred or assigned, including mineral deeds, oil royalties, and fixed investment trust shares issued by a trustee and representing equitable ownership in deposited securities.

- 5. That section seventy-six of the said Act be amended by providing that when matches are put up in packages containing less than twenty-one matches each the tax shall be payable at the rate of three-twentieths of one cent per package instead of at the rate of three-sixteenths of one cent.
- 6. That Part X of the said Act be amended by adding thereto the following as section 77(a):—
 - 77 (a). Except as hereinafter provided, every manufacturer and every importer of cigarette papers in packets shall affix to every packet of cigarette papers manufactured by him or imported into Canada, an adhesive or other stamp of the value of 2 cents for each 100 leaves or fraction of 100 leaves contained in such packet.
 - 2. Except as hereinafter provided, every manufacturer and every importer of cigarette paper tubes shall affix to every package of cigarette paper tubes manufactured by him or imported by him into Canada, an adhesive or other stamp of the value of 4 cents for each 100 cigarette paper tubes or fraction of 100 cigarette paper tubes contained in such package.

3. No manufacturer or importer shall sell or import cigarette papers

or cigarette paper tubes unless they are in packets or packages.

4. It shall not be necessary to affix an adhesive or other stamp to packets of cigarette papers or packages of cigarette paper tubes manufactured in Canada for export out of Canada when they are manufactured and exported under regulations made under the provisions of this Act.

5. When cigarette papers in packets or cigarette paper tubes in packages are imported into Canada, the adhesive or other stamp shall be affixed to the packets or packages while they are in the custody of the

proper customs officers.

- 6. The provisions of this section shall not apply to cigarette papers or cigarette paper tubes sold to, or manufactured by, or imported by, a manufacturer licensed to manufacture cigarettes, who employs such cigarette papers or cigarette paper tubes in the manufacture of cigarettes subject to the provisions of the Excise Act.
- 7. That subsection two of section eighty-six of the said Act be amended by adding thereto the following proviso:-

Provided that if a licenced wholesaler sells goods to another licenced wholesaler at a price less than the value upon which the tax is to be computed under paragraph (c) of the last preceding subsection, the vendor shall forthwith become liable to pay the tax upon the difference between such value and his sale price.

- 8. That Schedule I to the said Act be amended by adding thereto the following articles and imposing thereon an excise tax at the rate set opposite the respective article:-
 - (i) Articles, materials or preparations of whatever composition or in whatever form, commonly or commercially known as toilet articles, preparations or cosmetics which are intended for use or application for toilet purposes, or for use in connection with the care of the human body, including the hair, nails, eyes, teeth or any other part or parts thereof, whether for cleansing, deodorizing, beautifying, preserving or restoring, and to include shaving soaps and shaving creams, antiseptics, bleaches, depilatories, perfumes, scents and similar preparations, 10 per cent.
 - (ii) Toilet soaps not to include shaving soaps or shaving creams, 5 per cent.
- 9. That Schedule II to the said Act be amended by adding thereto the following articles and imposing thereon an excise tax at the rate set opposite the respective article:-
 - (i) Materials enumerated in Customs Tariff Items 134, 135, 135a, 135b, 139 (except glucose and grape sugar), 140 (except molasses); invert sugar and syrup, two cents per pound;

(ii) Glucose and grape sugar, one cent per pound;

(iii) Unfermented wort (sweet wort) suitable for the brewing of beer, ten

cents per gallon:

(iv) Malt syrup, or malt syrup powder, extracts of malt, fluid or not, or any other malt products suitable for the brewing of beer, twenty cents per pound.

(v) Tires in whole or in part of rubber for automotive vehicles of all kinds, including trailers or other wheeled attachments used in connection with any of the said vehicles, per pound, 2 cents. Inner Tubes for use in any such tires, per pound, 3 cents.

Provided that the tax hereby imposed under paragraph (i) shall not apply to materials enumerated in Customs Tariff Items 139 and 140 when sold in packages containing not more than ten pounds each.

- (2) That any enactment founded on the provisions of sub-paragraph (i) (except with reference to materials enumerated in Customs Tariff item 134) and of sub-paragraph (ii) shall be deemed to have come into force on the 26th day of April, 1933, and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that date, and to have applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that date.
- 10. That Schedule III to the said Act, as enacted by chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1932, be repealed and the following substituted as Schedule III:—

SCHEDULE III

Bread, not to include rolls, buns or similar goods, whether sweetened or not; flour, not including self-raising flour; animals living; live poultry; meats and poultry, fresh; meats salted or smoked; milk, including buttermilk; condensed milk, evaporated milk and powdered milk; cream; butter; cheese; lard, when produced in Canada; eggs; vegetables, fruits, grains and seeds in their natural state; shorts; bran and middlings when for use as cattle, hog, poultry or other stock feed; alfalfa meal; oil cake, oil cake meal; grains mixed or crushed for cattle or poultry feed; hay; straw; hops, when produced in Canada; nursery stock; vegetable plants; other farm produce sold by the individual farmer of his own production; bees; honey; sugar; maple syrup; salt, when manufactured or produced in Canada; ice; fish and products thereof; ores of metals of all kinds; fuel other than in liquid form; gold and silver in ingots, blocks, bars, drops, sheets or plates unmanufactured; British and Canadian coin and foreign gold coin: logs and round unmanufactured timber; split fence posts; fence posts, railroad ties, pulpwood, tan bark, and other articles the product of the forest, when produced and sold by the individual settler or farmer; newspapers and quarterly, monthly, bi-monthly and semi-monthly magazines and weekly literary papers unbound; materials for use only in the construction, equipment and repair of ships; ships licensed to engage in the Canadian coasting trade; radium; electricity; gas manufactured from coal, calcium carbide or oil for illuminating or heating purposes; artificial limbs, and parts thereof; artificial eyes; donations of clothing and books for charitable purposes; settlers' effects; War Veterans' badges; memorials or monuments erected in memory of soldiers who fell in the Great War; articles for the use of the Governor General; articles imported for the personal or official use of the British High Commissioner, Ministers of Foreign Countries, Consuls General who are natives or citizens of the country they represent and who are not engaged in any other business or profession; bibles, missals, prayer books, psalm and hymn books, religious tracts, and Sunday school lesson pictures; manila fibre for use only in the manufacture of rope not exceeding one and one-half inches in circumference for the fisheries; boats bona fide purchased by individual fishermen for their own personal use in the fisheries; articles and materials used in the manufacture of boats bona fide built for individual fishermen for their own personal use in the fisheries; sinkers and floats including trawl kegs, when for use exclusively in the fisheries, not including these articles for sportsmen's purposes; fibre for use only in the manufacture of binder twine; fertilizers; dried beet pulp; manuscript; raw furs; wool not further prepared than washed; drain tiles for agricultural purposes; printed text-books authorized by the Department of Education of any province in Canada and phonograph records so authorized for instruction in the English

and French language, and materials used exclusively in the manufacture or production thereof; insulin; calf, cattle, hog, fox or poultry feed; preparations or chemicals sold for disinfecting, dipping or spraying and so used in agriculture or horticulture, and materials for use exclusively in manufacture or production of such preparations; cream separators and parts thereof; cars and other similar appliances for use exclusively at a mine or a quarry for mining or quarrying; articles and materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of cars and other similar appliances for use exclusively at a mine or a quarry for mining or quarrying; articles and materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of cream separators and parts thereof; usual coverings to be used exclusively for covering goods not subject to the consumption or sales tax: materials to be used exclusively in the manufacture of usual coverings to be

used for covering goods not subject to the consumption or sales tax.

Woollen rolls or wool yarn milled for a producer of wool from such wool supplied by him for his own use; cotton duck and cotton sail twine to be used only in the manufacture of equipment for ships or vessels; official stationery imported by His Majesty's Trade Commissioners in Canada from His Majesty's Stationery Office in England; crushed stone, produced or manufactured by any municipality exclusively for use in building or maintaining its roads or sidewalks, and not for sale, and sand, gravel, rubble and field stone; lasts for boots and shoes including rubber footwear and patterns and dies for boots and shoes including rubber footwear; apples, dried, desiccated or evaporated; articles and materials for the sole use of any bona fide public hospital certified to be such by the Department of National Health, when purchased in good faith for use exclusively by the said hospital and not for resale; preparations for use exclusively as gopher poison; bakers' cake and pies when produced by any one manufacturer or producer to the value of not more than three thousand dollars in any one calendar year.

406. Coil chain, coil chain links, including repair links, and chain shackles, of iron or steel;

409a. Milking machines and attachments therefor; centrifugal machines for testing butter-fat, milk or cream; complete parts of all the foregoing;

409b. Cultivators, harrows, seed-drills, horse-rakes, horse-hoes, scufflers, manure spreaders, garden seeders, weeders, and complete parts of all the foregoing;

409c. Ploughs; farm, field, lawn or garden rollers; soil packers; complete

parts of all the foregoing;

409d. Mowing machines, harvesters, either self-binding or without binders, binding attachments, reapers, harvesters in combination with threshing machine separators including the motive power incorporated therein, and complete parts of all the foregoing;

Notwithstanding the provisions of tariff item 442, materials or commodities as hereunder defined or described, when imported by manufacturers for use exclusively in the manufacture, in their own factories, of the goods enumerated in tariff items 409a, 409b, 409c, 409d, 409e, 409f, 409g, 409j, 409o, and 439c, under regulations prescribed by the Minister:—

(1) Pig iron;

(2) Bars or rods, of iron or steel, hot rolled;

460. Materials to be used in Canada for the construction of bridges and tunnels crossing the boundary between the United States and Canada, when similar materials are admitted free under similar circumstances into the United States, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;

464. Steel dies, of a class or kind not made in Canada, valued at not less than one thousand dollars each, for use exclusively in stamping metal sheets or metal plates: Provided that such dies shall be exported from Canada under Customs supervision within three months from the date of import entry;

476. Surgical and dental instruments of any material; surgical needles; X-ray apparatus; surgical operating tables for use in hospitals; microscopes valued at not less than \$50 each by retail; and complete parts of all the foregoing.

476a. Glassware and other scientific apparatus for laboratory work in public hospitals; apparatus for sterilizing purposes, including bedpan washers and sterilizers but not including washing or laundry machines; all for the use of any public hospital, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;

480. Crutches or specially constructed staffs for cripples;

538. Binder twine or twine for harvest binders;

663b. Articles which enter into the cost of the manufacture of fertilizers, when imported for use exclusively in the manufacture of fertilizers;

666. Nitro-glycerine, giant powder, nitro and other explosives;

667. Blasting and mining powder;

682. Fish hooks, for deep-sea or lake fishing, not smaller in size than number 2.0; bank, cod, pollock and mackerel fish lines; and mackerel, herring, salmon, seal, seine, mullet, net and trawl twine in hanks or coil, barked or not—in variety of sizes and threads—including gilling thread in balls, and head ropes for fishing nets; marline, and net morsels of cotton, hemp or flax; and fishing nets or seines, and manilla rope, not exceeding one and one-half inches in circumference, when used exclusively for the fisheries, not to include hooks, lines, nets or ropes commonly used for sportsmen's purposes;

- 692. Coins, cabinets of; collections of medals and collections of postage stamps; medals of gold, silver or copper, and other metallic articles actually bestowed as trophies or prizes and received and accepted as honorary distinctions, and cups or other metallic prizes (not usual merchantable commodities), won in bona fide competitions;
- 695a. Paintings in oil or water colours, and pastels, valued at not less than twenty dollars each; paintings and sculptures by artists domiciled in Canada but residing temporarily abroad for purposes of study, under regulations by the Minister;
- 696. Philosophical and scientific apparatus, utensils, instruments, and preparations, including boxes and bottles containing the same; maps, photographic reproductions, casts as models, etchings, lithographic prints or charts; mechanical equipment of a class or kind not made in Canada. All articles in this item, when specially imported in good faith for the use and by the order of any society or institution incorporated or established solely for religious, philosophical, educational, scientific or literary purposes, or for the encouragement of the fine arts, or for the use and by order of any public hospital, college, academy, school, or seminary of learning in Canada, and not for sale, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;
- 700. Animals and articles brought into Canada temporarily and for a period not exceeding three months, for the purpose of exhibition or of competition for prizes offered by any agricultural or other association: Provided a bond shall be first given in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Minister, with the condition that the full duty to which such animals or articles would otherwise be liable shall be paid in case of their sale in Canada, or if not re-exported within the time specified in such bond;
- 701. Menageries, horses, cattle, carriages and harness of, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;
- 702. Carriages for travellers, and carriages laden with merchandise, not to include circus troupes or hawkers, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;
 - 703. Travellers' baggage, under regulations prescribed by the Minister;
- 704. Apparel, wearing and other personal and household effects, not merchandise, of British subjects dying abroad, but domiciled in Canada; books, pictures, family plate or furniture, personal effects and heirlooms left by bequest;
- ARTICLES AND MATERIALS TO BE USED EXCLUSIVELY IN THE MANUFACTURE OF GOODS ENUMERATED IN CUSTOMS TARIFF ITEMS;
- 281, 281a, 391a, 406a, 406b, 409a, 409b, 409c, 409d, 409e, 409f, 409g, 409i, 409j, 409k, 409n, 410b, 411, 411a, 411b, 439c, 440k, 442, 442a, 476, 476a, 480, 538, 663, 663a, 663b, 666, 667, 696.
- MATERIALS, NOT TO INCLUDE PLANT EQUIPMENT, CONSUMED IN PROCESS OF MANUFACTURE OR PRODUCTION, WHICH ENTER DIRECTLY INTO THE COST OF GOODS ENUMERATED IN CUSTOMS TARIFF ITEMS:
- 281, 281a, 391a, 406a, 406b, 409a, 409b, 409c, 409d, 409e, 409f, 409g, 409i, 409j, 409k, 409n, 410b, 411, 411a, 411b, 439c, 440k, 442a, 476, 476a, 480, 538, 663, 663a, 666, 667, 696.

11. That Schedule IV to the said Act, as enacted by chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1932 enumerating articles exempt for fifty per cent of the sales tax, be repealed and the following substituted as Schedule IV:—

SCHEDULE IV

All articles manufactured or produced by the labour of the blind in institutions in Canada established for their care or under the control or direction of such institutions.

12. That Schedule V to the said Act, as enacted by section sixteen and referred to in section twelve of chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1932, be repealed and the following substituted as Schedule V:—

SCHEDULE V

Articles on which other excise taxes are imposed on importation by Part XI of this Act; raw leaf tobacco when imported by licensed tobacco or cigar manufacturers; material for the manufacture of binder twine for export, when imported by the manufacturers thereof; British and Canadian coin and foreign gold coin, bullion and unmanufactured gold; fish and other products of the fisheries of Newfoundland; fish caught by fishermen in vessels registered in Canada or owned by any person domiciled in Canada, and the products thereof carried from the fisheries in such vessels; donations of clothing for charitable purposes; bibles; fertilizers; animals for the improvement of stock; boards, planks and deals of fir, spruce, pine, hemlock or larch, in the rough, or not further manufactured than planed or dressed on one side, when imported from a country which admits free of duty similar lumber imported from Canada; goods enumerated in Customs Tariff Items 173, 364, 460, 700, 702, 703, 704, 705, 705a, 706, 707, 708 and 709.

- 13. That any enactment founded on paragraphs five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven and twelve of this Resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the Twenty-second day of March, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-three, and to have applied to all goods imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on and after that date, and to have applied to goods previously imported for which no entry for consumption was made before that date.
- 14. That any enactment founded on paragraphs two, three and four of this Resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the First day of May, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-three.

INCOME WAR TAX ACT

Resolved,—That it is expedient to amend the Income War Tax Act and to provide:—

- 1. That the exemption granted to a married person or a widow or widower with a dependent child be reduced to \$2,000 and the exemption for all other persons be reduced to \$1,000;
- 2. That the exemption heretofore afforded to householders as defined shall be abolished;
 - 3. That the exemption for a dependent child or grandchild be \$400;
- 4. That the exemption for a dependent parent, grandparent, brother or sister be the actual amount expended by a taxpayer up to a maximum exemption of \$400 for each such dependent person;

- 5. That the exemption of \$2,000 heretofore afforded to corporations and joint stock companies be abolished;
- 6. That the graduated rates of tax applicable to persons other than corporations and joint stock companies shall be the rates set forth in the following schedule:
- 7. That the rate of tax applicable to corporations shall be twelve and one-half per centum;
- 8. That where a corporation elects to file a consolidated return, the corporate rate of tax shall be thirteen and one-half per centum;
- 9. That the additional rate of tax heretofore provided in respect of incomes in excess of \$5,000 shall not apply to corporations;
- 10. That all bearer coupons, coupon certificates or dividend warrants issued by Canadian debtors in respect of which any interest or dividends are payable and all similar bearer coupons and dividend cheques issued by British or foreign debtors which are cashed by residents of Canada must have attached thereto a duly completed ownership certificate on the form prescribed;
- 11. That a tax of five per centum shall be imposed at the source on all dividends or interest paid or credited by Canadian debtors to non-residents of Canada;
- 12. That a tax of five per centum shall be imposed at the source on all dividends or interest payable by Canadian debtors and cashed by Canadian residents at a premium over par of Canadian funds;
- 13. That rents and royalties which are payable by Canadian debtors to non-residents of Canada shall have deducted at the source a tax of twelve and one-half per centum subject to adjustment on assessment of the Income Tax Return filed by the non-resident.
- 14. That provision be made to clarify and to render more certain and effective Section 13 of the said Act;
- 15. That provision be made for the limitation of certain allowances and expenses charged by companies in respect to amounts paid to relatives of shareholders, bonuses to officers and fees to directors;
- 16. That interest on indebtedness and taxes on productive property shall be rateably apportioned between income from sources exempt and those not exempt from Income Tax, provided that in no case shall such interest or taxes be apportioned against a taxpayer's income from his chief occupation or business;
- 17. That any enactment founded on paragraphs one to nine, both inclusive, and paragraphs fifteen and sixteen, shall be deemed to have come into force at the commencement of the 1932 taxation period and to be applicable thereto and to fiscal periods ending therein, and to all subsequent periods;
- 18. That any enactment founded on the provisions of paragraphs ten, eleven and twelve of this Resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the first day of April, 1933, and shall be applicable to all payments made or received on or after such date and to any coupons, coupon certificates or dividend warrants which are redeemable on or after the said 1st April, 1933;
- 19. That any enactment founded on the provisions of paragraph thirteen of this Resolution shall be deemed to have come into force on the 22nd day of March, 1933, and shall be applicable to all payments made on and after the said date.
- 20. That the exemption heretofore afforded with respect to war pensions be repealed.

Whereupon, Mr. Bennett, a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the proposed Resolution, recommended it to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at the next sitting of the House, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

The Bill No. 21, An Act to amend the Indian Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for third reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 26, An Act to amend the Exchequer Court Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, and after some time spent therein, the Committee rose without reporting.

The Bill No. 30, An Act to amend the Customs Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 45, An Act to amend the Soldier Settlement Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The amendment made by the Senate to the Bill No. 27, An Act to amend the Bank Act, was taken into consideration and agreed to.

The Order being read for the second reading of Bill No. 66, An Act respecting Courts of Admiralty;
On motion of Mr. Bennett, the said Order was discharged and the Bill

withdrawn.

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until to-morrow, at 11 o'clock, a.m.

Your Committee has considered Bill No. 76, An Act respecting The Quebec, Montreal and Southern Railway Company, and has agreed to report the said

Bill without amendment.

Mr. Sauvé, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 27th March, 1933, for a copy of all correspondence, letters, telegrams, petitions, reports and other documents in the possession of the Government, respecting the post office of Garson, Ontario, since 1930.

On motion of Mr. Bury, the Second and Third Reports of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders were respectively concurred in.

The Bill No. 77, An Act to facilitate Compromises and Arrangements between Companies and their Creditors, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 94, An Act to amend the Excise Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 73, An Act respecting the Canadian National Railways and to authorize the provision of moneys to meet expenditures made and indebtedness incurred during the calendar year 1933, and to authorize His Majesty to make loans and advances to the Canadian National Railway Company, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 80, An Act to amend the Railway Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Order being read for the third reading of Bill No. 37 (Letter A of the Senate), intituled: "An Act respecting the Canadian National Railways and to provide for co-operation with the Canadian Pacific Railway System;

Mr. Manion moved,—That the said Bill be now read the third time.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Heaps, seconded by Mr. MacInnis, moved in amendment thereto:-

That the said Bill be not now read a third time but that all the words after "That" be struck out and the following substituted therefor:—

"the Bill be referred back to the Committee of the Whole with the request that the Government consider ways and means of providing compensation for such persons whose services will be dispensed with as a result of the operation of any of the provisions of this Act."

Mr. Rhodes moved,—That the said Bill be now read the third time.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the third time and passed.

Mr. Senn, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, then presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has had under consideration an Order of Reference dated February 23, 1933, namely:—

"Ordered,—That the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization be instructed to ascertain the facts connected with the production, collection, manufacture, distribution and marketing of milk and milk products, throughout the Dominion of Canada, with power to examine and inquire into all aspects of the said questions and report their findings to the House."

The witnesses called and examined were representative of the primary milk producers and the distributors. Officers of the Department . Agriculture addressed several meetings and gave valuable information.

Your Committee also studied, with interest and advantage, the Grigg Commission Report of Great Britain, the report of the Quebec Provincial Dairy Commission of 1932 and the report of Dr. Bond of Cornell University to the said Commission. The health and sanitary milk by-laws and regulations of the several cities investigated were examined and reviewed.

The evidence and this report have been widely distributed to interested parties throughout Canada, including librarians, provincial governments and universities as well as the producer and distributor organizations. It is felt that this distribution of facts, findings and recommendations will tend to a truer understanding of the situation and assist to a considerable extent, those concerned, in formulating policies and remedies.

The Committee has held thirty meetings and taken the evidence of forty witnesses comprising one thousand pages in printed form. A copy of the evidence is tabled herewith for the information of the House. A study of the evidence adduced discloses that,—

During recent years total milk production in Canada has increased and during the same years there has been a tremendous increase in milk consumed as such, the latter increase being due to increasing per capita consumption coupled with an increasing population. The result has been that the demand for milk for domestic consumption has increased much more rapidly than the increase in production. Between 1925 and 1930, total milk production increased by about 18 per cent but during the same period the quantity of milk required for domestic consumption increased by about 85 per cent. The relatively greater increase in the milk for domestic consumption as compared with milk production has necessitated a withdrawal of milk from other outlets in order to supply the increased demand for domestic consumption. This is illustrated by the following statement which shows the percentages of the total milk production used for different purposes in 1925 and 1930:—

Cheese	15.82	% 9·10
Creamery and Dairy Butter	50.31	44.76
Condensed, Evaporated, Dried Milk, etc.	1.50	1.35
Ice Cream	74	1.03
Consumed as Milk and Cream	27.11	42.65
Other purposes	4.52	1.11

It will be observed from the foregoing tabulation that the percentage of total milk production used for domestic consumption is 151 per cent greater in the latter than in the former year while with the exception of ice cream, lesser percentages of the total milk production are devoted to the purposes of the manufacture of dairy products. It will also be observed that the greatest reduction in the percentage of total milk production entering into the manufacture of any one dairy product has been with respect to cheese, which viewed from a standpoint of total milk production utilized for this purpose might appear at first thought to be of minor importance. Since, however, cheese is, from a standpoint of the export trade, the most important of the different dairy products, it is an important factor in determining prices of milk for other purposes, and is therefore of much greater importance than indicated by the percentage of the total milk production which enters into its manufacture.

Owing to the magniture, diversity and dominion wide scope of the dairy industry, your committee decided to commence its inquiry by a study of the production and distribution of fluid milk and cream.

The rapid increase in urban population, combined with the public demand for a pure and healthy supply has resulted: -

(a) In an increased cost of production; (b) a complicated and expensive system of collection, processing and distribution.

Cost of Production

The main factors in estimating the cost of production of milk are:-

(a) Cost of feeds and labour. (b) Replacement of herds.

(c) Necessity for a regular and constant daily and seasonal supply.
 (d) Transportation costs.

(e) Requirements of provincial and municipal laws and regulations in regard to cleanliness, sanitation and health.

(f) Depreciation of buildings and equipment. (g) Interest on capital investment.

(h) Insurance.

Returns to Producers

These costs are not reflected, as they should be, in the returns to the primary producer but the price paid the producer of fluid milk is arbitrarily fixed and controlled by the distributors, having regard, to some extent to the prevailing prices of butter and cheese and the surplus supply; it being generally agreed by all witnesses that the farmer-producer is not receiving an adequate return for his labour and investment.

Store Sales

The comparatively recent advent of stores, and particularly chain stores, into the retail milk business was brought to the attention of the Committee. Price cutting by featuring milk as a leader has resulted in upsets in the industry, coupled with extremely low returns to the producer. The featuring of milk as a leader should be discontinued.

Producers' Associations

Producers' Associations have been formed in many districts, for such purposes as collective bargaining, and controlling surplus.

The unenforceable agreements between distributors and producers presently used, respecting prices and supply, should be replaced by contracts enforceable at law.

Your committee recommends that tribunals should be set up vested with authority to settle differences between producers and distributors organizations, and, if necessary, to fix the returns to the producers and the prices charged the consumer.

Producers Co-operative

The result of co-operative organization by the producers was evidenced by witnesses representing the Fraser Valley Milk Producers' Association, the northern section of the Alberta Pool and the Saskatoon Dairy Pool.

These co-operative efforts have met with considerable success, with resultant substantial benefits to the producer members of their associations.

Your Committee finds that the measure of success of co-operative efforts is dependent upon local conditions.

It is worthy of note that the Saskatoon Dairy Pool succeeded in reducing the spread and at the same time gave to the producer 46 per cent of the consumer's dollar.

Distribution Costs

The main factors determining the cost of distribution are:-

- (a) Pasteurization and provincial and municipal sanitary and health regulations.
- (b) Duplication of services.
- (c) Special services.
- (d) Labour costs.
- (e) Bottle losses.
- (f) Bad debts.
- (g) Depreciation of distributors' plant and equipment.
- (h) Fluctuating demand.
- (i) Dividend requirements.

$Pasteurization\ and\ Other\ Regulations$

Pasteurization of the milk supply is compulsory in some cities, and has been adopted because of the consumers' demand in nearly all. Pasteurization costs, and the cost items above enumerated, though not definitely determined by the inquiry undoubtedly add considerable to the cost spread.

Provincial and municipal laws and regulations have been enacted, designed to ensure the purity of the milk supply and to fix standards of quality. Such regulation and control cannot be too highly commended but the committee is of the opinion that greater uniformity of such laws and regulations is desirable.

Duplication of Services

The overlapping of delivery and collecting routes by numbers of distributors in the same area is a serious factor affecting the price to the consumer and the returns to the producer. The committee is of opinion that such overlapping, should as far as possible, be eliminated.

Bottle Losses

Substantial sums of money are spent annually in bottle replacements. The evidence discloses a wide variation in the percentage of losses charged by the different distributing companies for this purpose.

Bad Debts and Special Services

The consumer who receives special service and is accorded credit should pay the cost and loss resulting therefrom; whereas the evidence shows such costs and losses are charged to the consumer at large.

Surplus Milk Problem

Producers are paid a price called an association price for a percentage of milk delivered, and a much lower price for the balance which is designated as surplus milk, and generally paid for at the prevailing butter fat price.

The basis upon which the percentage of surplus milk is calculated is not clearly defined and in many cases is arbitrarily fixed. As a result much dissatisfaction prevails among producers over the percentage paid for as surplus milk.

Producers' associations have endeavoured to control the surplus but with indifferent success.

Producers and distributors are agreed that control of the fluid milk supply would have a beneficial stabilizing effect.

The present system of paying on a surplus basis for a certain percentage of milk consigned by the individual producer, a percentage determined exclusively by the distributor is inequitable. Milk bought for other purposes than fluid distribution should be purchased under separate contract.

Sweet Cream

This is an important item in the industry and one of the most profitable for the distributor. The volume of milk required for the production of such cream is exceeded only by that used in fluid milk sales. The greater number of the distributors purchase their supply direct from the producers at a price slightly above the prevailing price for churning cream.

The evidence disclosed that in some cases surplus milk is separated and the cream sold in the sweet cream trade while the by-products—such as skimmilk—instead of remaining on the farm where it might be profitably fed to stock is dumped in the sewer, while in some cases, surplus milk is added for the purpose of reducing the fat content of cream to the desired grade.

The Distributor

Your Committee, owing to the magnitude of its task and the brief time at its disposal, did not have as full an opportunity as might be desired to investigate the financial growth, capital structure, profit and loss accounts, and other like details of the distributing companies.

The evidence presented clearly indicates that while the returns from most industries have during the past two or three years, materially decreased, such cannot be said of those interested in the distribution and sale of whole milk. The salaries and returns to executive and operating officials and shareholders of the distributing companies have, in a large measure been maintained at the 1927, 1928 and 1929 level although business and industry general have, since 1929, declined very markedly, and milk prices to the producer have been reduced to an extremely low level.

We desire to draw attention to a few of the more outstanding facts as disclosed by the evidence in respect to capitalization, depreciation charges, etc., of those engaged in the sale and distribution of whole milk products.

1. Capitalization.—Over a period of years there is a marked growth in the capitalization of those companies which have been engaged in the business for any considerable length of time. While much of this increased capital was added in the ordinary way, because of increased business, it is very apparent that over-capitalization exists. Some of the ways in which this has been brought about are:—

(a) By purchasing or absorbing, by merger or consolidation of other companies in the same line of business. These changes of ownership very frequently took place at an enhanced valuation which generally involved an increased

stock issue by the purchasing or parent company.

(b) Goodwill—Very substantial values were in many cases placed upon goodwill. For such goodwill the purchasing or parent company as a general rule issued common stock. No par value stock was used for this purpose in the majority of cases. This stock while nominally of no value, gradually appreciated in value as time went one, became dividend bearing and a charge upon the industry.

(c) By "splitting" shares,—The too-common practice of splitting or dividing shares seems to have been indulged in by many of the companies at one

time or another during their history.

2. Depreciation.—There is a very marked difference in the method of calculating depreciation on buildings, machinery and equipment. The Committee is of the opinion that depreciation reserves set up by many of the distributing companies, were calculated on an unwarrantedly high basis, and that frequently depreciation reserves cover hidden profits.

3. Bad Debts.—To a lesser extent the remarks in the preceding paragraph

might well apply to reserves for bad debts.

4. Salaries.—The Committee are of the opinion that salaries paid to some of the higher officials of the various distributing companies are at this time, entirely too high and wholly unjustifiable.

- 5. Profits and Dividends.—Those engaged in the sale and distribution of whole milk products have during these very difficult times, in a substantial way at least, been able, unlike most other industries, to maintain their profits at the same level as in more prosperous times. It is true that in certain cases dividends have been reduced and in some cases discontinued. In the most of such companies however, substantial reserves continue to be set aside annually as in previous years. The Committee is of the opinion that dividends might very well have been declared by some companies in which producer-shareholders are interested. The failure to pay dividends in such cases has undoubtedly had the effect of reducing the value of the stock in the public mind and possibly cause dissatisfied producer-shareholders to sell or dispose of their stock at less than actual value.
- 6. Merger, Purchase or Absorption of other Companies or Interests.—The evidence presented to the Committee clearly indicates that the sale and distribution of whole milk products is gradually getting into the hands of fewer and larger companies. Economies to the companies interested may have resulted, but there is no evidence of any benefits accruing from such mergers to either the producer of the consumer. In many cases there is evidence that mergers have removed competition and the general effect is undoubtedly to give the distributors a more definite control of the situation.

Producer's Share of the Consumer's Dollar

The matter of a just share of the consumer's dollar as it relates to the distributor and the producer, is important to the conduct of the milk business. That each should receive a just share as a remuneration for his efforts is recognized, having due regard to the consumer's interest.

Our investigation has thrown considerable light upon this problem, in as much as it shows conclusively that the producer's share has decreased very substantially during recent years.

Such evidence as was directed to the point leads your Committee to the conclusion that the producer is not receiving an equitable share of the money

paid for milk by the consumer.

The milk distribution business is made possible by the industry and investment of the primary producer and it is the opinion of the Committee that the primary producer is entitled, at least to a much greater share in the ultimate proceeds of the sale of this product.

Other Milk Products

Milk not required for fluid consumption is manufactured into many different products of great commercial value. These represent in the aggregate nearly 60 per cent of the total. It is apparent, therefore, that your Committee has investigated only a very limited part of the subject referred to it.

The prosperity of the milk industry is co-related with and dependent upon the successful production and sale of butter, cheese, evaporated and powdered milk, casein, skim-milk-powder, etc.

Your Committee is convinced that a thorough investigation into the production, manufacture and sale of these commodities should be undertaken.

Your Committee, in view of the foregoing findings, conclusions and recommendations further recommends:—

That steps be taken to inquire into the manner in which our production of milk should be manufactured and marketed; to explore the different markets available at home and abroad; to investigate the possibility of new markets, and to study the methods of collection, handling and storage.

The Committee being confined by its Order of Reference to ascertaining the facts connected with the mik industry and to report the same to the House, now respectfully submits the evidence taken and its findings and conclusions therefrom.

Also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 78, An Act to amend the Pension Act, with amendments, which are as follows:—

- 1. Page 4, line 44.—Insert the following as subsection (4) of new section 7:—
- "(4) Except as herein otherwise expressly provided for the purpose of exercising and performing the powers, authorities and functions vested in the Commission, as distinct from a quorum thereof, under this Act, the Commission shall consist of two or more Commissioners; and whenever under this Act a quorum of the Commission is referred to, it shall mean a quorum as constituted under the provisions of section fifty-five of this Act."
- 2. Page 6, line 22.—After "bodies" insert "or as a member of the Board of Pension Commissioners for Canada or of the Pension Tribunal,".
 - 3. Page 13, line 10.—After "before" insert "the Commission or".
 - 4. Page 18, line 5.—After "reference" insert "or submission".
 - 5. Page 21, lines 18 and 19.—Leave out the words "or section thirty-three".

Also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate doth not insist on its first amendment to the Bill No. 71, An Act to amend the Criminal Code, and requests the concurrence of this House to the following amendment in substitution therefor:—

Page 2, line 14.—Add the following as a proviso to subsection (2) of clause 3:—

"Provided that this subsection shall not apply in the case of two persons who though in fact living in adultery are living apparently respectably as man and wife and where the children affected are the children of such union."

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bill to which the concurrence of this House was desired:—

Bill No. 110 (Letter F1 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to incorporate The Discount and Loan Corporation of Canada."

Mr. Speaker informed the House,—That the Clerk had laid on the Table the Nineteenth Report of the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills, which was read as follows:—

Pursuant to Standing Order 99, Section 3, the Examiner of Petitions for Private Bills has the honour to present the following as his Nineteenth Report:—

Your Examiner has duly examined the following Private Bill from the Senate and finds that the requirements of the 95th Standing Order have been partly complied with, viz:—

Bill No. 110 (Letter F1 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to incorporate The Discount and Loan Corporation of Canada."

Mr. Stanley, for Mr. Matthews, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Sixth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

On Monday, 6th February, 1933, the following Order of Reference issued from the House, viz:—

Ordered,—That the following Proposed Resolution be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce:—

Whereas the question of public and private indebtedness has become one of our greatest and most perplexing problems, enhanced during the past years by the extremely low price level of all primary commodities, through which this indebtedness must be in large part met and the effect of which has been to double and treble the actual burden of these liabilities; and,

Whereas this fact has been recognized in respect of certain international obligations, and has become a practical issue in respect of the public obligations of many countries; and,

Whereas no such recognition has as yet been given to the heavy private indebtedness within this country, although these, together with the high interest rates which prevail, constitute just as heavy and impossible a burden to the individual, as do national and international obligations to the countries concerned; and,

Whereas this situation is one of the greatest factors in the present economic depression, and is one of the greatest barriers to the financial recovery of agriculture and industry, and as such, deserves and commands the immediate attention of this parliament;

Therefore be it Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, the Government should give serious and immediate attention to the question of debts and interest rates within this country, and the possibility of their reduction, either by way of direct action, or by the submission of the entire problem to the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, in order that the subject may be fully enquired into, and if possible, some solution found.

In view of the general terms in which the resolution is expressed, the sponsor was asked to prepare a memorandum indicating more specifically the ground he would suggest the Committee endeavour to cover. This was done, and the memorandum may be found on Page 3A of the printed evidence.

The Committee accepted the task set before it, but to obtain the information outlined to the Committee by the proposer of the resolution, was an undertaking that in part was incapable of fulfilment. For example, a comprehensive answer to the question asking for a general classification of the wealth level of all lenders of money would require a complete census of the wealth of private individuals as well as of corporations. Such a census, in the view of the Committee, could not accurately be taken.

While the Dominion Statistician was able to supply from existing records a large amount of relevant statistics, additional data are needed which can only be obtained by special enquiries for which a period of time covering some weeks or even months will be necessary. In view of these facts, this report must necessarily be limited in scope and is not intended to be a complete review of the subjects contained in the reference.

Nevertheless, studies of the material gathered to date reveal tendencies upon which certain conclusions may be based. These are developed in the paragraphs which follow:—

I. PUBLIC DEBT—DOMINION OF CANADA

(a) Debt Outstanding.

The total of unmatured funded debt of the Dominion on March 31, 1933, was \$2,715,910,607. From this amount should be deducted sinking funds of \$66,001,724, leaving the net funded debt at \$2,649,908,883.

(b) Interest Rate.

Interest payable on this total was \$127,239,499, or an average rate of 4.68 per cent. On specific bond issues the rate varies from $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent on the loan of \$4,888,186 made in London in 1897, due in 1947, to $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent payable on Victory Loans maturing in 1933, 1934 and 1937.

Evidence presented to the Committee indicates a downward tendency in interest rates in recent years. The yield on typical Dominion Government bonds used by the Bureau of Statistics in their index of long term interest rates, which was as high as $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent in 1922, was done to a rate of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent in 1933. This cheapening of the cost of money is reflected in the current interest rates, which have been paid on various classes of debts. The average rate of interest paid on Dominion Government funded debt was 5·20 per cent in 1922, and in 1932 was 4·97 per cent. The current rate, due to the effect of conversion loans, is 4·68 per cent.

Since the Committee began its sittings, the rate of interest on savings deposits in banks has been reduced from 3 per cent to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, in loan and trust companies from 4 per cent to $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, in the Post Office from 3 per cent to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent, and in the Province of Ontario Savings Office from 3 per cent to $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

(c) Sinking Funds.

Sinking funds are applicable only to sterling bonds issued in London, of a par value of \$254,000,000. The amount presently held in the sinking fund represents about one-quarter of the outstanding principal of the issues to which the sinking fund applies. With respect to other issues, retirements have been made from yearly surpluses from time to time, but no definite program of debt retirement has been laid down in the past.

Recommendations re Public Debt.

1. The Committee highly recommends the conversion of outstanding obligations from a higher to a lower rate of interest when the state of the money market warrants it. The conversion loan of 1931 is an example of the benefits of this practice, as shown by the following table:—

The annual saving of interest is shown to be \$6,192,964.

In pointing out that bonds maturing within a short time should be converted to lower rates of interest as soon as it can be done, the Committee calls attention to the possibilities as shown in the following figures:—

There are outstanding Victory Loans maturing in 1933 and bearing

 $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent interest, \$169,971,850.

Victory Loans maturing in 1934 and bearing $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent interest, \$226,138,350.

The conversion of these $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent securities presently falling due affords an opportunity of further reducing the burden of fixed charges. If they were converted to a $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent coupon the saving per annum in interest would be \$3,961,102. If the rate of interest were 4 per cent, the saving would be \$5,941,653.

The Committee expresses the hope that a coupon rate not exceeding 4 per cent may be used. Any discount on the sale of the bonds could be absorbed by amortization.

2. A general amortization or debt retirement plan should be put into effect as soon as finances permit, and the annual payment to effect this end should be budgeted for each year. The adoption of this plan would ensure an orderly retirement of the existing debt within a definite period.

The Committee particularly draw attention to the fact that after the heavy refundings that will be necessary up to and including 1937, there follows a period of twenty years in which the maturities in any one year are not so large as to involve major borrowing operations.

- 3. Future long term bond issues should either
- (a) have sinking fund provisions; or
- (b) have their maturity dates arranged, in so far as practicable, to conform with the suggested plan of annual debt retirement.

In good times, when revenues are buoyant and no bonds maturing, the pressure for increased capital expenditure throughout the country is almost irresistible. When maturities are coming due, the Minister of Finance must provide for them. Hence the desirability of regularity of maturities.

4. Long term issues should, when possible, have callable provisions so that in times of low interest rates advantage may be taken to re-finance.

If and when these recommendations are adopted, the whole debt structure of the Dominion of Canada will be on a retirement basis that will tend to safeguard and indeed improve the credit of the country.

We are of opinion that an emphasis on the integrity of our national obligations will reaffirm to our own people and to the world that in trustworthiness and quality we stand for the honour of our bargains, whether convenient or not.

The following table summarizes the situation as regards public debt in the Dominion, its provinces and municipalities, and the funded debt of corporations:-

The net debt figure is used in preference to that for gross debt (\$2,990,315,000) because certain items in the gross debt are offset by active assets (\$391,226,000), which are in large part cash assets and interest bearing assets. Among the active assets are loans to Provinces which should appear among Provincial debts. If they were included in Dominion Government debt also there would be duplication. Net debt figures are used in preference to funded debt because the latter would include money raised and put into active assets, such as loans to Provinces.

(2) Bonds guaranteed by the Dominion. Of these, interest only is guaranteed on principal amounting to \$216,000,000. Principal and interest are guaranteed for the remaining \$780,148,354.

(3) The largest item in Provincial public debt is the bonded debt which totals \$1,148,451,597. In addition there were treasury bills amounting to \$103,707,602, bank loans, savings deposits, etc. (4) Indirect liabilities of the Provinces include guarantees of railway, hydro-electric,

municipal obligations, etc.

(5) This figure includes the total liabilities of all municipalities in six provinces and the bonded debt of the others (the total liabilities not being available). The amount given is, therefore, the lowest at which the aggregate direct liabilities of Canadian municipalities can be placed.

(6) Only the unguaranteed portion of Canadian National bonded indebtedness is included

here, the guaranteed debt being included in the second item of the table.

(7) Other corporations include industrial, financial, merchandising, etc.; in fact, all except public and railways.

Other liabilities, consisting of temporary loans and overdrafts on banks, accounts payable and miscellaneous floating liabilities, amount, to \$295,223,318.

Interest payments on municipal bonded debt average 4.9 per cent or on the total shown in the table above, \$63,151,599.

III. PRIVATE DEBT

While the figures for public debt can be obtained with approximate completeness, those for private indebtedness can only partially cover the field. Figures for bank loans are a matter of monthly record and were submitted to the Committee.

Concerning mortgages, definite information is obtainable for only a portion of the field. In the census of 1931, a question regarding mortgages was included in the farm schedule. As a result of this investigation it was ascertained that out of a total of 654,297 owned and partly owned farms in the Dominion, 244,201 were mortgaged to the extent of \$677,564,100. It should be pointed out that these figures refer only to the debt secured by a mortgage or by an equivalent legal instrument on lands and buildings. Details may be found in the evidence. These figures apply also only to "owned" farms. It is estimated that urban mortgages held by corporate lenders amount to about \$765,000,000.

No attempt has been made to compile information on debts of private individuals which may have been contracted in various ways, because of lack of available data.

IV. BANK INTEREST

Rates of bank interest and discount are not available by provinces but average rates for the Dominion as a whole are known. Average interest rates on loans, including call loans, show declines from 1930 to 1932.

*Each bank reports quarterly its maximum and minimum rates. The averages shown above are the averages of four quarterly periods and of all banks.

V. MORTGAGE RATES OF INTEREST

Considerable data were secured by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics from the Dominion Mortgage and Investments Association, and from some individual mortgage companies relating to interest charged on mortgages. Average rates were obtained from 57 companies, which show current rates ranging from 6 per cent to 8 per cent in all provinces except Quebec, where slightly lower rates were reported. One large company furnished records showing that the average rate on new rural and urban mortgages for the Dominion declined from 8.35 per cent in 1921 to 6.84 per cent in 1931. On renewals the rate fell from 8.17 per cent in 1921 to 6.90 per cent in 1931.

In general, it may be concluded in the cases of the figures supplied that mortgage rates have declined throughout the Dominion in recent years on both

new mortgages and renewals.

Nevertheless, these conclusions should only be taken as tentative, because they are based on returns from corporate lenders only. No data are available yet from private lenders or from mortgagors themselves. Statistical enquiries should be instituted to secure information from these sources to round out the case presented by the mortgage companies.

VI. SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION REQUIRED

On several other subjects which came to the attention of the Committee, partial information was furnished by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, but it is felt that the data thus far brought together are insufficient upon which to base definite conclusions, and that an all-round enlargement in the Bureau's organization of financial statistics should be instituted. In particular, in addition to the supplementary information required on mortgage rates (which has already been mentioned) the Committee recommend that the Dominion Bureau of Statistics be authorized to obtain the following:—

Data on fees and charges to which mortgagors are subjected when taking out new mortgages or renewing old ones. Very meagre information is available on this subject, but enquiries are already under way in the Bureau of Statistics.

Data on the cost of money to loaning bodies are required so as to get some idea of the spread between actual costs and loaning rates. Only partial information is now available.

Data on arrears of interest payments and on the amount of principal and interest written off by mortgage companies.

VII. JURISDICTION OF PARLIAMENT

The following questions respecting the jurisdiction of Parliament to legislate on the subject of interest and loans were submitted to the Deputy Minister of Justice, the Deputy Minister of Finance and the Attorneys General of the various provinces (pp. ix and x):—

- 1. Has the Dominion Parliament the power to fix a maximum rate of interest which may be charged on loans, et cetera, granted by corporations created by Dominion statute or letters patent where such corporations were
 - (a) previously incorporated;
 - (b) to be incorporated?
- 2. Has the Dominion Parliament any power to prescribe the maximum rate of interest chargeable on loans generally made by
 - (a) persons,
 - (b) corporations created by statute or letters patent other than Dominion?

- 3. Has the Dominion Parliament the power
 - (a) to fix;

(b) to alter

rates of interest in respect of bills of exchange and promissory notes?

- 4. (a) Has the Dominion Parliament power to enforce reduction of principal of debt in respect of loans made
 - i. by corporations incorporated under jurisdiction of the Dominion Parliament:
 - ii. by corporations incorporated under other jurisdictions;

iii. by individuals?

- (b) If necessary for the determination of the above questions, is any differentiation to be made between loans
 - i. secured upon real property;
 - ii. secured upon personal property;

iii. without security?

Answers to these questions were made by the Department of Justice and the Attorneys General of Nova Scotia, British Columbia, New Brunswick, Manitoba and Quebec. These answers appear in the Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence as follows:—

Department of Justice, pp. 43 to 48;

A.-G. of Nova Scotia, p. 49;

A.-G. of British Columbia, pp. 65-66;

A.-G. of New Brunswick, p. 187;

A.-G. of Manitoba, pp. 188 to 190;

A.-G. of Quebec, pp. 198-200.

The answers may be summarized as follows:-

Questions 1 (a) and (b)—all answers were in the affirmative.

Questions 2 (a) and (b)—all answers were in the affirmative. The A.-G. of British Columbia, however, said that:—

so far as corporations other than federal are concerned, the Dominion perhaps could not interfere with a contract made with a foreign company outside Canada though the party liable for the interest might reside within Canada.

Questions 3 (a) and (b)—all answers were in the affirmative.

Questions 4 (a), i, ii, iii—all answers, with the exception of that of Manitoba, were in the negative, the Department of Justice excepting, however, bank loans. The A.-G. of Manitoba said that it was difficult to give a satisfactory answer but stated that in the case of legislation arising out of what might be termed a national emergency, or legislation which could be classed as relating to banking, incorporation of banks, the issue of paper money, bills of exchange and promissory notes, bankruptcy and insolvency, the answer would be in the affirmative. He further stated that in the case of a debtor who resides in one province and the creditor outside the said province, the legislature of the province of the debtor could not validly legislate in derogation of a civil right existing and enforceable outside the province.

Questions 4 (b) i, ii, iii—all answers, except in the case of Manitoba, were in the negative. The A.-G. of Manitoba did not answer this question expressly, but it would appear by implication that his answer would have been in the negative.

GENERAL

It is hardly necessary to point out that obligations, both public and private, undertaken when the general price level was much higher, present a serious problem under economic conditions presently prevailing. This is particularly true of Canada, in which within a comparatively short period, heavy obligations have been assumed for capital investments in plant, equipment and transportation facilities connected with the development of our natural resources and the expansion of the productive capacity of the country.

In so far as public debts are concerned, we believe that the most desirable course to be pursued lies in the direction of means that may be taken to cheapen money, and other measures, including international co-operation, designed to lay the foundation for a rise in the general price level and a restoration of

world confidence and trade.

Within the country, the balancing of governmental budgets and the conversion of maturing debts at lower interest rates will be a constructive influence. Measures which will tend to relieve the burden of fixed public debts will of

course also operate with similar effect in the field of private debts.

The Committee believes that the reduction in interest rates on bank deposits recently achieved with the co-operation of the government is a constructive step, and it is to be hoped, a forerunner of more important action which Canada may be enabled to take in the international sphere as a participant in the World Economic and Monetary Conference.

The Bill No. 2, An Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended;

Mr. Dupré made the following Report to the House:—

Your Managers beg to report that they duly held the Free Conference with the Managers appointed by the Senate with respect to the amendments made by the Senate to Bill (71), intituled: "An Act to amend the Criminal Code," and the Managers on behalf of the Senate have agreed to recommend that the Senate do not insist upon their first amendment to which the Commons have disagreed but that it accepts the following proposed amendment in lieu thereof:—

"(3) In any prosecution under subsection two of this section, where the circumstances are such as, in the opinion of the Court, to render it likely that the child might be in danger of being or becoming immoral, its morals injuriously affected or its home rendered an unfit place for it to be in, it shall, upon proof that the person accused did, in the home of such child, participate in adultery, in sexual immorality, in habitual drunkenness, or in any other form of vice, be an irrebuttable presumption, that the child was in fact in danger of being or becoming immoral and its morals injuriously affected and that its home had in fact been rendered an unfit place for it to be in."

Mr. Dupré then moved,—That subsection 3 of section 3 of the said Bill be deleted, and the following substituted therefor:—

"(3) In any prosecution under subsection two of this section, where the circumstances are such as, in the opinion of the Court, to render it likely that the child might be in danger of being or becoming immoral, its morals injuriously affected or its home rendered an unfit place for it to be in, it shall, upon proof that the person accused did, in the home of such child, participate in adultery, in sexual immorality, in habitual drunkenness, or in any other form of vice, be an irrebuttable presumption, that the child was in fact in danger of being or becoming immoral and its morals injuriously affected and that its home had in fact been rendered an unfit place for it to be in."

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The second and third amendments made by the Senate to the said Bill were taken into consideration and agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Cahan, it was ordered,—That two hundred copies of the Interim Report to His Excellency the Governor General in Council, dated January 13th, 1932, made by Errol M. McDougall, Esquire, a Commissioner appointed to investigate and report upon illegal warfare claims and reparations payable in respect thereof, laid on the Table of the House on February 5th, 1932, be printed forthwith in the French language, and that Standing Order 64 in relation thereto be suspended.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, it was ordered,—That 500 copies, in the French language, of the proceedings held and evidence taken, before the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization which were distributed from day to day during the sittings of the said Committee, be printed forthwith, and Standing Order 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate hath concurred in the amendments made by the Commons to its first original amendment to Bill No. 71, An Act to amend the Criminal Code, without any amendment.

A Message was received from His Excellency the Governor General, desiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker with the House went to the Senate Chamber; when His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to give, in His Majesty's name, the Royal Assent to the following Bills:—

An Act to amend the Canada Shipping Act.

An Act to amend the Criminal Code.

An Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate in the following words:—

"In His Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to these Bills."

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

"The Commons of Canada have voted Supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following Bill:—

"An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1934."

"To which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's Assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

"In His Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their bonevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Fourth Session of the Seventeenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

In bringing to a close the Fourth Session of the Seventeenth Parliament, I congratulate you upon the extent to which you have realized the hopes set forth in my address on the re-assembling of Parliament in October last.

It is deeply gratifying that the benefits of the Imperial Economic Conference Agreements now known throughout the world as the "Ottawa Agreements," to which legislative sanction was given in the early part of the session, are already reflected in a profitable and steadily increasing volume of Empire Trade.

The measures which my Government has taken to maintain the integrity of national finance are already showing gratifying results. The credit of Canada throughout the world has been strengthened.

The last decennial census, upon which redistribution of the representation of the people in the House of Commons under the British North America Act is based, disclosed that Canada has now, like many other countries, a majority of its population residing in urban communities. Notwithstanding this added difficulty, a fair and equitable redistribution of the electoral divisions of the country has been accomplished.

The Charters of Canadian Banks have been extended for one year, in order that Parliament before undertaking the decennial revision of the Bank Act, may be informed of the conclusions of the World Monetary and Economic Conference and may have before it the findings of a Royal Commission which my Government will shortly appoint, to consider Canadian Banking and Monetary Problems.

The intricate and difficult problems of railway transportation in Canada have been dealt with by Legislation embodying the essential recommendations of the Royal Commission on Canadian Railways and Transportation. This Legislation based upon the principle of maintaining the integrity of our two transcontinental railway systems, aims to secure efficient and economic service and to provide means for ensuring co-operation between the two railways.

The Agreement with the Republic of France, regulating customs tariffs, together with the Convention governing the rights of nationals, commerce and shipping, which you have ratified will, it is confidently believed, promote trade between and confer mutual benefits upon the two countries.

The Amendments to the Pensions Act which you have passed will enable the country more fairly and equitably and with less cumbersome and expensive machinery to discharge its obligations to those who served in the Great War.

Among other important measures passed were An Act to Amend the Canada Grain Act, An Act to Authorize the Governor in Council to agree to Extend by Proclamation the Duration of the Canada New Zealand Trade Agreement, An Act to Amend the Canada Shipping Act, and Acts respecting Penitentiaries, His Majesty's Visiting Forces, the Criminal Code, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and Unemployment and Farm Relief.

Members of the House of Commons:

I thank you for the provisions you have made for the Public Service.

The courage with which the Canadian people have endured the burdens imposed upon them in these troubled times is witness to their great faith in the future of their country. It is, however, realized that co-operation amongst the peoples of the world is essential to recovery from the unprecedented conditions which have for so long prevailed in all countries.

In relieving you from attendance upon your parliamentary duties, I pray
