NEW BATTALIONS PARADE STREETS

Citizens Throng Thorofores and Enthusiastically Receive Units.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS

Two Boys Lie in City Hospital in Critical Condition.

HAMILTON, Monday, Sept. 20.—Thousands of Hamilton citizens thronged the principal streets of the city to witness the parade of the various units of Hamilton battalions, which was held under the auspices of the Hamilton Recruiting League for the purpose of stimulating the formation of an informal league of the citizens to the Hamilton Machine Gun Battalion and the Sportsmen's Battalion, which leave for Niagara camp shortly.

The Machine Gun Battalion will probably leave for camp on Thursday, while the Sportsmen's Battalion will probably go next week.

Owing to the fact that other units which have left this city have gone during the day the citizens have been able to turn out in as large numbers as the civic and military authorities desired, but on Saturday night the public turned out in such large numbers that the main streets were entirely blocked for more than an hour, and enthusiasm was at fever heat.

Nearly 1100 soldiers, including every unit connected with the Hamilton Depot Battalion, took part in the parade, and many of the soldiers carried large banners, urging the citizens to do their bit.

Headed by the 12th Royal and 1st Highlanders' Brass Bands and the Machine Gun Battalion Bugle Band, the parade, which was commanded by Capt. A. J. Taylor, left the armories shortly after 8 o'clock and marched along James to King, to Bay, to Main, to Wellington, to King, to James and back to the armories. After the parade the 12th and 1st bands marched to Gore Park, where they took part in the musical recruiting meeting which was held there.

Appealed to Young Men. After several addresses had been given, a lengthy program of interesting addresses was given. Collinson acted as chairman and delivered a strong appeal to all young and able-bodied men to join the colors at once. The other speakers were S. F. Washington, K.C., Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Rev. T. W. Tehsb, Rev. George Puseley, H. J. Waddie and W. S. Connolly.

Another stirring recruiting meeting was held last evening, when a strong appeal for recruits was made by J. H. Collinson, P. Bell, A. M. Tunstunham, W. Rollo, Cal. Davis and D. B. Wood.

May Quarter in Hamilton. The information that it was practically settled that the 30th, 31st and 40th Battalions would spend the winter at the Woodbine track, Toronto, is by no means official. In fact, instead of going there, prospects are expected to be sent to the artillery units training at the Jockey Club grounds here.

Hotelsmen and Soldiers. It is hardly likely that the hotelsmen will today make any attempt to force their order, not to serve soldiers in uniform at any hour of the day or evening. So strong is the sentiment against the action of the license holders that several of the central business have refused to sign the agreement. Already the soldiers, and while the resolution passed at Thursday's meeting has not been rescinded, there is little chance that it will be observed. The majority of the hotel proprietors are satisfied with the wishes of the military authorities and refuse to serve soldiers when they are supposed to be on duty.

Should any attempt be made to enforce the order it will be fought to the limit by the military authorities. Already the Ontario license board have been appealed for placing a branch Cleveland, Ohio.

SUNDAY GOLFERS ROUNDLY SCORED

Bishop of New Westminster Says They Should Be in Training.

RECRUITING MEETING

Grand Opera House Filled to Overflowing on Sunday Night.

One of the most stirring patriotic meetings held in Toronto since the start of the present war was held last night in the Grand Opera House, under the auspices of the City Recruiting League.

The audience completely filled the building. The speakers were Archbishop Matheson, Anglican Primate of Canada; N. W. Rowell, K.C.; Hon. Findlay Macdunnachie, Hon. Thos. Crawford, and the Bishop of Westminster, who is going to front as a chaplain. Dr. Norman Allen presided.

A letter from Premier Hearst was read in which he expressed his sympathy to be decorated with the flags of the Empire and the playing of patriotic airs.

Hon. Findlay Macdunnachie, minister of public works for Ontario, said he appreciated with diffidence because the story of the present crisis had already been eloquently dealt with by public speakers, but wherever the flag of empire was unfurled men and women loved to gather together to hear the story told of the valorous deeds being performed by British sons.

Heard that Premier Hearst had today two sons wearing the King's uniform, ready to take their places in the trenches to meet poisonous gases and to fight for King and country, showed the interest the premier of Ontario had in the war.

His Lordship the Bishop of New Westminster, Dr. DuPondier, who is going to the front as a chaplain, gave a stirring address. He pointed out that the prime minister of England, Mr. Lloyd George, Rupert's Land, had given his son as a soldier, and he was now in the trenches. The Bishop of New Westminster said that Canada had not yet begun to appreciate the strength of the Germanic combination.

Against Drinking. It was the wish of the citizens of Canada to help the soldiers training in Canada to say "No" when tempted by strong drinks.

While passing by the Lambton Golf Club on Sunday afternoon he had seen many men out there playing golf. He thought the men could be better employed if they were in training for active service at military camps.

A short but sparkling speech was delivered by the Archbishop of Rupert's Land, Primate of Canada. He said he had attended the meeting in order to show the church of England in Canada was behind the great movement of recruiting. Every man that was not too old and not yet in the military service should go on active service at once.

Too few of the native sons of Canada, the primate said, had joined the colors.

Mr. Rowell's Address. N. W. Rowell gave an eloquent address and aroused much interest. He said he couldn't gather an audience like this in France tonight, and that the young men are with the colors. You couldn't have an audience like this in Great Britain for three-quarters of the young men there are serving with the colors.

He called on the men of Canada to give up their lives in necessary for their country, for mothers to give up their sons, wives to give up husbands, and sisters to give up brothers.

If the war was not fought out to a victorious conclusion on the banks of the Flinders, it might have to be fought out on the banks of the St. Lawrence, he concluded.

Conscription Not Needed. Hon. Thos. Crawford said that the enthusiasm of those attending the meeting showed that conscription was not needed in Canada. He rather objected to Mr. Rowell's statement regarding such a meeting not being possible in France. Mr. Crawford declared that the men of Toronto had responded in a manner equal to any other city in the world.

There were some exceptions taken to this by several men in the audience, who contradicted the speaker by shouting "No."

Those present on the platform also included: Lieut.-Col. W. G. A. Forrester, Major G. A. Forrester, chaplain of Niagara camp; T. O. Anderson, Sgt.-Major Clouston of the O.R., E. J. Hearn, K.C., and Col. Galloway.

Ivanoff is still keeping Field Marshal von Mackenzen at arm's length from the fortress of Rymno, the key to the route to Kiev, and in counter-attacks has retaken a number of villages both in Volhynia and Galicia.

It seems adjacent from the inability of the Austro-Germans to hold their positions in the southern area that they sent reinforcements from that front to Field Marshal von Hindenburg's northern army, which, as heretofore, is expected to score the biggest successes.

Both the Germans and the French claim minor victories on the western front, but neither there, in the Italian theatre, nor in the Dardanelles, have any events of great moment been reported.

PROMINENT ORGANIST DEAD AT LONDON, ONT.

Dr. George Sippl Was Long Connected With St. Paul's Cathedral.

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 19.—Dr. Geo. Buckley Sippl, from 1876 until 1913 organist and choirmaster of St. Paul's Cathedral, this city, and one of the best known musicians in Canada, was stricken with apoplexy in the public library building yesterday afternoon, and died seven minutes later.

ITALIANS MAKE GAIN IN NEW OFFENSIVE

Considerable Successes Scored in Attacks on Austrian Positions.

ENEMY ASSAULTS FAIL

Forward Movement Resumed in Plezzo Zone to Bar Access to Basin.

ROME, via Paris, Sept. 18.—The following official statement was given out by the Italian war office: "Last night, after an intense artillery preparation, the enemy attacked our positions on Monte Costone, northwest of Arterio, but he was repulsed and sustained losses. Several times our troops attacked and dispersed enemy forces at Monte Valpiano, in the valley of Torrent Maso-Brent, and other detachments destroyed the enemy's refuges in Campo Fisserica, in the valley of Torrent Devanti-Cismon.

In the Plezzo zone, having finished a defensive organization on the positions recently conquered by us, our offensive action, with a view to barring access to the basin, was resumed vigorously.

On the entire front near the precipitous slopes of the Pilsch region on the dangerous wooded slopes of Javorek and the cliffs of Lipnik, our infantry, with the consistent and effective support of artillery, attacked and succeeded in approaching strong lines of the enemy, well protected by barbed wire entanglements, in which large breaches were made.

On Mount Javorek several entrenchments have been captured by us. We blew up an observatory and two blockhouses and made prisoners 50 men, of whom two were officers.

ARTILLERY CONTESTS ALONG BELGIAN FRONT

Germans Bombard Several Advanced Posts, Pervyse and Other Towns.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—An official Belgian communication says: "The night of Sept. 17-18 was calm. This morning there was a bombardment of slight intensity of several of our advanced posts, as well as at Pervyse. A bombardment more sustained occurred in the region to the south of Dixmude.

In the course of the afternoon, Oostkerke, Saint Jacques Capelle, Oudecapelle, and Nieuwcapelle were bombarded.

AUSTRALIA RAISES CREDITABLE ARMY

Seventy-Six Thousand Troops Sent Abroad by Middle of August.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.—Details of Australia's splendid record in raising men for overseas service given by the Canadian trade commissioner in Melbourne.

He states that on Aug. 12 the commonwealth had organized, equipped and despatched 75,000 troops for active service abroad. At that time 40,400 troops were in training camps in Australia for despatch to the front.

The various divisions comprise infantry, light horse, ammunition columns, artillery, engineers, army medical corps, flying corps, veterinary sections, bridging, train and pay corps.

At the request of the Government of India, a section of the Australian Flying Corps was despatched to the Persian Gulf, and is working in conjunction with the Royal Air Force.

POST'S PREDICTION HAS BEEN VERIFIED

Two weeks ago The Post predicted that a renewal of activity in mining stocks was about due, and on Thursday last the prediction was partially fulfilled when a bull market developed that carried prices of several favorite gold and silver stocks to substantially higher levels.
