When Major-General Cotton reviewed the Imperial Cadets before the grand stand yesterday afternoon, he, and several thousand others, saw a well-drilled small-sized army. There were 16 corps in the final ceremonial parade of their encampment at the grounds, and all showed themselves to know considerable about the soldlering game. About 3 o clock, led by the queen's Own Band, the cadets marched thru the west gate and over to the stage fronting the centre of the stand. The English boys were in front, followed by representatives from Ireland, Scotland, Australia, New Zealand, Newfoundland and then the cadets from the provinces of the Dominion.

As the band played "O Canada," Major-Gen. Cotton, accompanied by his aide, Lieut. George, and Col. Hem-ming, Col. Thompson, Major Barker and others, walked from the grand stand to the stage. And then the inspection began. The major-general walked between the lines and inspected minutely the various corps. Following this, as the band played the Queen's Own regimental air, the juvenile soldiers marched by in company order, and it must be said that no better "march past" has been seen in Toronto. PANAMA CANAL TO CUT RATES? BURDEN TO ADDP

Commissioner Johnson Says Charges Must Be Lower Than Suez Rate of \$1.25 Per Ton.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 Prof. Em-ry R. Johnson, special commissioner on Panama traffic and tolls, discloses in a report a factor that doubtless will be urged by the American negotiators. After pointing out the many advantages of the Suez in the way of coaling facilities, low insurance rates for the superior opportunities for picking up cargoes between terminals, and the like, Prof. Johnson declares that the only possibility of the Panama Canal catting a fair share of the world's busgetting a fair share of the world's business is to place the tolls at a figure actually lower than by the Suez route.



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



"As the result of representations made to the Western Union Telegraph Company by the postmaster-general of Great Britain and the postmaster-gen-eral of Canada, the following additional reductions will be made at an early date in cable rates:

"No. 1—For telegrams in plain lan-guage the present deferred rate of six pence (twelve cents) per word will be reduced to four and one-half pence (nine cents) and besides these tele-grams, instead of being subject to a delay of twenty-four hours will be transmissible without any more delay than what is necessary to give priority to the ordinary traffic of one shift Mng per word.

"No. 2—Another rate of night letter-grams will be inaugurated at a charge of three shillings (72 cents) for twelve words and two and one-half pence (five cents) for each additional word. Those lettergrams will be subject to the prior delivery of ordinary traffic to be delivered on the morning of the day following that on which they are handled. "No. 3—There is at present in exist-ence a rate of six shillings for thirty words and one shilling for each addi-tional group of five words for the week-end cable letters handed in up to Saturday for delivery on the following Saturday for delivery on the following Tuesday.
