WILL HEAR BOTH SIDES
BUT FAVOR THE VIADUCT

Public Bodies, Considering
Solution of Esplanade
Problem, Incline to Mr.
Moyes' Idea.

The conference of public bodies held at the Labor Temple last night to consider the proposed viaduct for the esplanade, showed itself fully in sympathy with the solution offered, but also disposed to hear the arguments for bridges before taking a definite stand. The city engineer and C. B. Smith, his associate, in preparing the report for the city council, had been asked to present, but neither was able to attend. J. W. Moyes, the board of trade's engineer, explained at some length the plan drawn up by himself and Mr. Berrian of Boston, and evoked enthusiasm. Another meeting will be held on Monday night next, when the city's representatives will be asked to be present.

Robert Hungerford of the Trades and Labor Council, was elected chairman. Others present were: E. M. Trower, A. Harrington, J. Harper, Harry Ellis, A. B. Griffin, T. Grinnill and A. E. Austin and J. Harper of the Retail Merchants' Association; J. Gardiner, L. H. Gibbons, and J. Stewart of the Trades and Labor Council; and A. W. Wright, J. H. Duthie and J. M. Wilkin of the Public Ownership League.

The general trend of the speeches was decidedly in favor of the viaduct. Duthie pointed out how seriously the city's navigation interests would be endangered by allowing the harbor approaches to be cut off, and that the consideration of cost should be subordinate to that of the public safety. Mr. Moyes entered fully into explanation of the plan for protecting the viaduct front, and referred to the statement of Government Engineer Sling that Toronto had great possibilities in its harbor. He refuted the assertion that the waterfront lent itself naturally to bridges, pointing to the varying levels. He held that the extra cost of hauling merchandise over the bridges would be at least 2 cents a ton, and that it would cost \$1,000,000 to provide bridges for the fifteen crossings, whereas the viaduct, which would eliminate danger at all points, would cost only \$2,000,000.

HOW MCBRIDE LOST OUT.

Canadian Ministers in England Insisted on Making Bill Final.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, Aug. 6.—The bill to amend the British North America Act in relation to provincial subsidies as finally amended has passed the house of commons.

There appears to have been some difficulty over the bill. The imperial authorities insisted that their own reference to the "final and unalterable" feature of the scheme. This created the impression that it was the intention of the British government to leave the matter open to further agitation by the provinces, particularly by British Columbia. The Canadian ministers in England strongly objected to the bill in this form, and in consequence the imperial representations respecting the necessity for the recognition of the "final and unalterable" purpose of the arrangement were withdrawn from the Canadian parliament, including the words in question, was made part of the bill in the form of a schedule.

FIRST WIFE DIDN'T COME.

So Trial of Pickering Man For Bigamy is Adjourned.

WHITBY, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—I failed to appear at the trial to-day of George Hicks of Pickering Township, charged with bigamy. Crown Attorney Farewell stated that he had sent the woman in Detroit an order from the attorney, whereby extending protection from prosecution on account of the abduction of Roy Hicks from the defendant's wife. Alfred Hamilton, her nephew, swore he saw her in Detroit about Christmas, four years ago, and told Hicks of seeing his wife and son Roy. Hicks now claims he hadn't heard of her for seven years.

INGERSOLL ASKS \$10,000.

Andrew Carnegie Gets Another Chance to Give Away Money.

INGERSOLL, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—The council has instructed Mayor Cadridge to make application to Andrew Carnegie for a \$10,000 library grant.

COAL SHOVELERS STRIKE.

MONTREAL, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—One hundred and fifty coal shovelers went on strike to-day. They were employed by the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co., and the Inverness Railway & Coal Co., and were paid \$7.12 cents an hour. They demand 40 cents.

NEW YORK DETECTIVE IS HERE FOR SWINDLER

It Will Cost U.S. Government Just Eight Cents to Get Mrs. Etta Strangways.

It will cost the United States government just 8 cents when the Toronto police deliver over possession of Etta Strangways, alleged swindler, to Detective Ditch of the New York force at the Union Station. This sum is the collateral of two car tickets, and it is doubtful if the payment will be enforced.

The specific charge upon which she is being returned to New York is that of passing worthless checks upon Madame Clarke, a Thirty-second-street modiste to the elite. There are, in addition, charges of a similar nature in the hands of the police there, based upon complaints of bonifaces and tradesmen, amounting to over \$800. In addition to this, Detective Ditch says that the woman borrowed many thousands from people standing high in New York society, which cannot be ascertained owing to the reluctance of her victims to undergo the necessary ordeal of publicity.

The important feature of the affair, as seen in New York, is the unaccountable friendship of Miss Louise McCallister for the Strangways woman, that a prominent society leader and daughter of one of the city's most prominent men should so vigorously defend a woman whose adventures have set even Gotham agog.

MOTHER LED MOB.

Almost a Lynching in Busy New York Thoroughfare.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—More of what have come to be seriously known at police headquarters as "near" crimes against girls were followed by nearer lynchings to-day.

Edward Pratt, a millwright, 46 years of age, was charged with the abduction of a girl from her home at 1575-seventh-street. Nellie and Helen Farrell, each about ten years old, accused Pratt of improper conduct. Adelaide Wilder, a nurse, fought off an assailant on the west side to-day.

AUSTRALIA INCREASES TARIFF

Canada Will Suffer—Bounties For Iron and Steel.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—J. S. Larkie, the Canadian trade agent in Australia, reports that the commonwealth will establish iron and steel bounties with a view to encouraging home industries.

MANITOBA PHONE BONDS.

Wilson Smith of Montreal Will Take \$500,000 Worth.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 6.—At a meeting of the Manitoba cabinet an offer of Wilson Smith of Montreal for \$500,000 worth of telephone bonds at a rate to produce 4.48 per cent. interest to the investor, was accepted.

ALBERTA CROPS.

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 6.—The minister of agriculture has issued a statement with respect to the crop situation in Alberta, in which he says the winter wheat growth is remarkable and that the province will harvest one of the finest crops ever seen.

A BIG CONSTITUENCY.

EDMONTON, Aug. 6.—W. F. Bredin, M.P., for Athabasca, has arrived from Athabasca Landing after trip of 1200 miles with his constituency without doubling back a single mile.

HAIL DESTROYS LARGE DISTRICT

Crops in Area of Eight Miles by Thirty Miles Are Ruined by Storm.

RESTON, Man., Aug. 6.—(Special.)—The worst hailstorm in the history of this locality, stripping a district about thirty miles long and eight miles wide, occurred last night.

Not a spear of grain was left in its track, the destruction being most complete. Hail, in shape varying from the size of a small marble to a pigeon egg, fell until the ground was white. The windows in the houses of the town, unless protected by wire screens, suffered severely.

DERAILED FREIGHT TRAIN "SIDE SWIPES" EXPRESS

Four Passengers Killed and Many Injured in a Wreck on the Pennsylvania.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Aug. 6.—Four persons were killed and twenty-five injured in a railway wreck on the Buffalo & Allegheny division of the Pennsylvania railway at Kelly, about 35 miles from this city to-day.

At 11.30 while passing thru Kelly the train was side swiped by a gondola coal car and the engine, tender, baggage and express car with the three day coaches were derailed.

The dead: Mrs. Alonzo Huff and male infant of Johnstown, Pa.; M. B. Irwin of Oakmont, Pa., engineer of passenger train; Geo. Coraman, Rimesburgh, Pa.

The gondola car was loaded with coal and had broken away from a train and rolled down over a switch extending over the main track. The passenger train running about 80 miles an hour came around a curve and before speed could be reduced, struck the gondola. The engine was thrown about 30 feet from the track.

CHANCELLOR'S RUSH VISIT.

Will Come to Canada and Return by the Same Steamer.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) LONDON, Aug. 6.—Lord Loreburn, the lord chancellor, accompanied by John O'Connor, Nationalist M.P. for North Kildare, and a barrister, sails next week per C.P.R. steamer for Canada, where they will remain one week, returning by the same steamer.

COUPLE SUICIDE.

New Yorkers Who Had Lost Heavily at Monte Carlo.

NAPLES, Aug. 6.—A Mr. and Mrs. Ruckingham, who came here from New York, committed suicide by taking poison at Castellamare to-day.

BARE-HEADED WOMAN SHOCKS

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—Some little commotion was caused Sunday at St. Barnabas Anglican Church Sunday when a woman walked into the edifice without any covering on her head.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Andrew Carnegie has given \$500,000 as a contribution to the King Edward Hospital fund.

TWO BAD FIRES IN AN ODD WAY

Welland Road Roller, Breaks Gas Main, is Burned—Ignites Meth. Church.

WELLAND, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—An unusual accident occurred this afternoon at 5.30 when the town's heavy road roller burst a gas main, an eight-inch pipe leading from the Crownland gas fields.

The gas ignited from the fire box of the roller, and the roar of the flames, which reached eighty feet in the air, could be heard for miles. William Phillips, the engineer, was blown from the cab of the roller and horribly burned. He was taken to a nearby house, and it was found that the fire was coming from his hands.

Nothing could be done to put out the fire until the gas was turned off at four o'clock. The town is tonight out of a gas supply.

At 7 o'clock the Methodist Church burst into flames, presumably from a spark from the burning cab of the road roller. The town firemen and the brigade from the Plymouth Cordage Co. could do nothing to check the fire, and the whole building was consumed in less than an hour.

Nothing stands now but the bare walls. Ryan, a fireman, was struck by a falling cornice and badly hurt. He was taken unconscious to Cowper's Hospital.

COLLECTOR \$3000 SHORT IN RETURNS FOR TAXES

Bondsman of P. C. Creeggan of Thorold Asked to Make Good Deficit.

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—For three years past, P. C. Creeggan, who has held the position of tax collector of the Town of Thorold, has failed to return his rolls. Action was threatened by the council and Creeggan lately returned the rolls. Frank Patterson, the Quebec Bank examined the books, and at the council meeting last night the mayor reported that the audit showed that in 1914 there was collected \$18,790.39; in 1915, \$15,010.88; and in 1916, \$15,255.88, or a total of \$48,067.15. The treasurer's books show receipts of \$44,210.69, leaving a deficit of \$3,856.46.

WOMAN CUT TO PIECES CONGEALED IN A TRUNK

Man and Woman Arrested Tell Fanciful Story to Explain Possession of Corpse.

MARSEILLES, France, Aug. 6.—A trunk belonging to a man and woman who arrived here to-day from Monte Carlo attracted the attention of the baggage-master, who caused it to be opened. It was found to contain the body of a woman, cut to pieces. The man and woman owning the trunk were arrested. They had assumed that it had been forwarded to London.

NO LICENSE FOR CLUB.

Many Halesbury Citizens Do Not Want Liquor in Camp.

COBALT, Aug. 6.—(Special.)—The license board for that portion of Nipissing district north of the Temagami met in Halesbury, and unanimously decided not to approve the granting of a license to the Halesbury Club.

TANGIER, Aug. 6.—Casablanca, on the Moroccan coast, has been bombarded by French cruisers. The Moors are reported to have been shot down in large numbers, and the town since last Sunday night has been practically in the possession of landing parties from French and Spanish cruisers.

The Frenchmen were fired by the Moors. The Frenchmen responded with a bayonet charge, and the bombardment of the native quarter with melinite shells.

Ald. Andrews visited The World office and said he considered that The World never carried a more noble, useful institution, and he was glad to see that from such small beginnings an organization had sprung up that reflected the greatest credit upon all associated with its management.

He had thought the government should take up the work and endeavor to distribute labor all over the province where it was most needed, but now he was convinced that the Welcome League, if it had branches established throughout the province, could and would do the work more efficiently than any government bureau.

The present system of dealing with new arrivals was an injustice to every one.

Great efforts were made in the old country to induce people to come to Canada; promises were made that work would be provided for all—yet when the immigrants arrived here, unless they were prepared to accept farm work, utterly regardless of his fitness for it, he was left to his own resources, with the result that Toronto and other large centres were congested with unemployed and discontented men.

NORTH TORONTO. Efforts of Finance Committee to Cut Estimates Failed.

NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 6.—The finance committee of the town council took up the estimates at to-night's meeting. An effort was made to reduce the estimates, but it was found that the committee had pretty well kept the expenses down to actual necessities. The total amount is \$1,413,219, and the amount to be levied \$27,780, which will make a rate of 19.2 mills, the same as last year. But for extraordinary expenditures of \$4000 on schools, a reduced rate would have been possible. The committee decided to allow Assessor Whaley \$25 for expenses. In addition to his salary.

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BREAK THRU POLICE LINE TO RESCUE WATCHMAN

Heroic Action of Three Men Saves Another From Deck of Burning Shamrock.

Breaking thru the police lines and taking their lives in their hands, three young men at yesterday morning's fire at the ferry wharf saved a man from death, by rescuing him from the burning of the Shamrock. The rescuers were: Robert Johnson, Dave Barry and Isadore Cohen. The man rescued was the watchman on the Shamrock.

The young men were standing at the corner of York and King, when their attention was attracted by the reflection in the sky. They ran to the waterfront and, boarding the ferry John Hanlan, cut her from her moorings. They saw a man on the stern of the Shamrock, took down a lifeboat and rowed to the burning boat.

The lifeboat was drawn up alongside the Shamrock and the watchman jumped to safety. In doing so, however, he almost upset the boat, and in the excitement the party had some difficulty in saving themselves.

For the remainder of the season the Bay-street wharf will be deserted, except for the workmen who will be engaged in the tearing down and rebuilding of the sheds.

Boats for the island now leave the foot of York-street. She has been rebuilt twice and refitted several times.

The burning of the Shamrock will necessitate the building of another boat to take her place.

Two new ferries will be placed on the harbor next season. They will be of the Bluebell type.

The safe in the Ferry Company's office was pulled out after the fire and many valuable papers were found intact.

Firm's Great Headway. How a firm in service is puzzling the office of the department, Deputy Chief Noble was driving down Dundas-street, returning from the fire at Hanks' Planning Mill, on Lansdowne-avenue, when he saw the glare in the sky. He had passed Bathurst-street on Queen before an alarm began to ring. Bay-street firemen were on their way in response to a still alarm, and Lombard-street sections had also started on an alarm from the man on the floor watch, who saw the reflection, before the gong began to ring.

York County and Suburbs

MORE POLLING PLACES IN YORK TOWNSHIP

Rapid Increase in Population Demands it—Runaway Accident—County Notes.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, Aug. 6.—The regular meeting of the York Township Council, held to-day, was fruitful of business, many important matters coming up for consideration.

Reeve George Henry presided, and Deputy Reeves Watson, Barker, Nelson, and Councillor Jackson were present, the latter introducing the most important measure of the day, that relating to the readjustment of the polling places in York Township.

Through the courtesy of Township Clerk W. A. Clarke The World is in a position to give a brief summary of the changes which will go into effect at the forthcoming elections.

In the former 2nd Division Norway division. The line between lots 7 and 8 forming the division, 2a, consisting of lots 8 and 9, con. 1, F. B. This will give the residents of Reid-avenue district a polling place, probably on Reid-avenue.

In the former 3rd Division Wychwood division, leaving only lots 25 and 26, con. 2, F. B. (south of St. Clair-avenue), in No. 11, 11a, the new division, consists of lots 25 and 26, and the south halves of lots 27, 28 and 29, con. 3, F. B.

No. 12, Bracondale division, is also affected by the above change, all north of St. Clair, which formerly belonged to 12, being added to 11a and 17; the south halves of the lots 27 to 29, con. 3, F. B., being added to 11a and the north halves to 17.

No. 13a takes from No. 13, Davenport, the south halves of lots 30 to 33, con. 4, F. B., the north halves of these lots being also added to Fairbank division, No. 17.

No. 16, Mount Dennis division, has added to it those portions of No. 3, con. 4, W. Y., lying west of the G.T.R. and C.P.R., and lots 1 to 5, con. 5, W. Y. The ratepayers of this section formerly voted at Fairbank; they will now vote at Mount Dennis.

No. 17, Fairbank, while it loses territory on the west and gains more on the south, having added to it the north halves of lots 27 to 33, F. B., which formerly belonged to divisions 12 and 13.

In addition to these there will be a new polling place north of St. Clair-avenue, and probably a little west of the Faughnan-road.

The change also calls for a booth in the vicinity of the school house on Dufferin-street.

The rapid increase in the suburban population, which, in the case of the east and west, is phenomenal, renders imperative all concerned. Mr. Barker, the clerk is insistent in urging upon the residents to examine the lists posted up at the various post-offices and schools in order to thoroughly familiarize themselves with the changed conditions.

A resolution composed of William Rennie, W. Smith, Mr. Maundier, and Mr. Major, representing some 80 property owners of the Swansea district, passed to all concerned. Mr. Barker, a franchisee to the Toronto and Suburban Railway Co. on terms mutually agreed to, has been asked to grant a franchise at some length advocating the measure, which, in effect, means a direct route from the corner of Keele and Dundas-street to the Lake Shore coming in the Swansea district thru Ellis and other avenues. It was urged by some of the speakers that the franchise should not exceed 12 years. Manager Royce of the Suburban Railway expressed himself as favorable to the extension.

Reeve Henry and council were disposed to view the matter favorably. County Clerk Ramsden forwarded the annual levy for county purposes. They are: For general purposes, \$8847.58; Industrial Home, \$1509.88, and court house debentures, \$396.61, a total of \$10,754.07.

Public School Inspector Fotheringham forwarded the names of the three pupils obtaining the highest marks at the last high school entrance examinations, thereby qualifying for the prizes offered by the York Township Council. The first of which is a gold medal, second tuition at the high school, and third silver medal. The winners are Edna Ash, No. 27, York Township, Tomdromen School, Gladys Pickering, No. 10, Deer Park, and Albert Bromley, No. 25, Bracondale.

Council authorized the issue of debentures for the sum of \$10,000, in addition to the \$25,000 previously granted in connection with school section No. 13, York Township.

Mulock, Milliken & Clarke, thru counsel, urged the claims of Mrs. Edith Thompson, the owner of lots 76, 78, 79, 80, 81 and 82, at the corner of College and Craig-streets, thru damage of flooding, owing to the action of council in grading. Council deny any liability in the matter.

A. W. Austin and others petitioned for the erection of a gas lamp at the corner of Davenport and Spadina-road.

E. W. Wilcox, representing the Ontario Motor League, was anxious concerning the progress of the "good roads" movement, but met with little encouragement, as council have practically abandoned the idea, from a local standpoint.

H. J. Bannion is erecting five houses on Wheeler-avenue, and wants drain connection with the city, necessitating the putting down of some 120 ft. of pipe which will bear cost.

A number of other matters of minor importance were put thru.

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RAISULI EXPLAINS WHY HE CAPTURED THE CAID

Fearing Treachery of the Sultan in Invitation to Go to Fez.

TANGIER, Aug. 6.—In a long statement to the correspondents of an English newspaper, Raisuli, the Moroccan bandit, who is holding Caid Sir Harry MacLean a prisoner, blames the treachery of the sultan's government for his capture of Sir Harry.

Raisuli says that during his negotiations with MacLean, previous to his capture, he explained his grievances, and Sir Harry promised him a safe conduct if he would go to Fez and lay his troubles before the sultan, who would remedy them. He accepted this offer, but while he was arranging for the journey government troops, instigated by the sultan's bad advisers, Sid Mohammed Cabbas, the Moroccan minister of war, and Gen. Baghani, chief of the sultan's army, plundered and devastated his property at Zinat and captured some of his relatives.

In the meantime Sir Harry had shown him a letter from the sultan, promising him safe conduct, but he had also secured a copy of another letter written by the sultan to his minister of war, instructing him to attack Raisuli vigorously unless he went to Fez. This, continues Raisuli, convinced him of the treachery of the sultan, and he, therefore, made a prisoner of Sir Harry.

Sir Harry Raisuli declares, is perfectly safe in his hands. He did not capture him for money, but for justice, and the hope to secure by calling the attention of the British government to his grievances.
