AS TO ONTARIO'S HEALTH. Provincial Board Says it is Satisfactory. MILK BOTTLES DISCUSSED And the Way in Which They May Spread Infection.

Elaborate Report of the Committee on Contagious Diseases—The Outbreak of Scarlatina and Diphtheria—Contributory Causes Considered—Toronto Local Board of Health Criticized—Recommendations for its Consideration—Daily Inspection and Milk Supply—Care of Immigrants.

The quarterly meeting of the Provincial Board of Health began session at the secretary's office at the Parliament Buildings yesterday morning. There were present Dr. McDonald, Hamilton; Dr. Vaux, Brockville; Dr. Kitchin, St. George; Dr. Cassidy, Toronto, and the secretary, Dr. Bryce.

Dr. Bryce was instructed to investigate a complaint he had sewerage in the town of Smith's Falls. He will also go down to Picton to look into the cause of the diphtheria outbreak there, in response to a petition influential signed.

Mr. John Ross Robertson, M.P., addressing the board regarding difficulties connected with the admission of indoor and outdoor patients to hospitals, in the Toronto Sick Children's Hospital there were 3,000 outdoor cases, or considering the fact that they returned two or three times a year, actually 15,000 cases per year, or 100 cases in every

of these 3,000 cases in every hundred about 10 per cent. could pay something for the care received. Of 200 other cases 25 per cent. could pay. The fact that 20 cases of direct infection had been discovered by investigation showed that sanitary action on the part of the board towards preventing such practices was desirable.

The board will consider the matter. Health Generally Satisfactory. The report on contagious diseases dealt chiefly with the alarming prevalence of scarlatina and diphtheria, and general sanitary conditions of the Province since the committee's last report had continued no action on the part of three exceptions no extended local outbreaks of disease had called for action.

Inspection of Immigrants. The fact that smallpox had been carried to Winnipeg and Montreal by immigrating Chinamen, plainly indicated the necessity of a closer inspection of immigrants even in the inland Province of Ontario. The only outbreak of smallpox was that at Rat Portage, where the separation of drinking and sewerage water was urged by the board secretary.

In Toronto. Scarlatina had shown a more than average prevalence during the quarter, but the outbreaks had been mild, regarding the outbreak in Toronto the following proportion of deaths: In February, cases 104, deaths 3; February, cases 172, deaths 13; March, cases 265, deaths 15; April, cases 245, deaths 11; May, cases 212, deaths 11; June, cases 180, deaths 10.

milk vendor to discontinue the delivery of milk within the city. Milk in Bottles. As the preparation and delivery of milk in bottles was urged by your secretary some 10 years ago as a step in sanitary progress of the first importance, he has naturally desired to enquire as to how far the action of the City Health Officer was founded on a basis of fact.

The City Health Officer in his last monthly report to his board has laid great stress upon the dangers due to the bottles coming from houses where infectious disease have been pursued in dealing with scarlatina in Toronto during the past six months, where in the case of this district some 22,000 bottles were delivered in a single month, it will be that some bottle coming from an infirm, unclean, unventilated, and where there was no means, either to the dairyman or the health officer, of knowing whether or not such a bottle had been disinfected, may have infected the hands of the delivery man, but to be oblivious to the danger of disseminating disease upon the milk vendor, and to be oblivious to the fact that neither of the two agencies, public, viz., a removal of the patient to the Isolation Hospital or the disinfection of the house, would indicate a misapprehension of the actual facts of the situation, or a neglect to take public safety into account.

The Secretary's Analysis. In order, however, that the actual dangers arising from the distribution of milk of the extent of 22,000 bottles may be accurately estimated, even under these conditions, your secretary analyzed the bottles during May and five days in June on the returns supplied by this health officer, with the following results: Of the 230 cases reported to the City Health Officer during the period, 63 were reported customers of this district. Of these 63 cases, 41 were reported as whole milk, or 65 per cent. of the whole milk cases, were reported by this district. Of the 63 cases, 22 went to four schools, viz.: Huron, Lansdowne, Model and Queen's schools, while 41 out of the 63 infected school children, or 27 per cent. of all the school cases occurred in the population of these schools. Of the 230 downed 969, Huron 706, Queen Victoria 751, Model 584, total 2,390.

In fact, the registered number of pupils in the city for the year, excluding the Model School, was 26,571, or schools with slightly more than one-tenth of the pupils had 27 per cent. of all the school cases. Of these schools, moreover, the Model School had 23 cases or 11.6 per cent. of all the cases in a school population of 28,371. This is a most interesting fact, these cases of still more interest. From May 1 to May 31, 15 of these 23 cases had died, and only three on them on the route of the condemned dairy. From the ages of the children so far as given their divide respectively into two school classes or rooms, or three other words, were exposed to two common sources of infection. It is pointed out by the City Health Officer that he has had constantly to struggle against the constant attempts to have children exempt from the disease by physicians return to school. This, with perhaps some non-reported cases, may help to explain the presence of infection in the schools.

Let the public health statistics and the city health by-law be enforced so rapidly either immediate removal to the Isolation Hospital or ascending of premises where cases of disease are and the people will at once be freed from at least one source of possible danger. Notes of Warning. It is with much pleasure that your committee has learned of the notable decrease of the school cases for scarlatina closed at the end of June. But this closed and the city health authorities have to realize the experience and regard diphtheria in Toronto, as well as that of London with regard to scarlatina, teaches that every possible means known to health authorities be not fully taken advantage of, the city will see the epidemic return again in September, and another winter of danger for thousands of homes follow.

Recommendations. Your committee would therefore, urge upon the Board that it notify the Local Board of Health of the city of Toronto: 1. That should, on being notified of any case of scarlatina, require the immediate removal of the case to the Isolation Hospital. 2. That should this not be at once complied with, the whole household be quarantined until the six weeks from the occurrence therein of the last case shall have elapsed and the house be placarded. 3. That, inasmuch as your committee is informed that the Isolation Hospital wards of the city are for scarlatina have been full during the past six months, and that they have proved wholly inadequate to the demands upon them, the Local Board of Health be directed to supply itself with such additional hospital accommodation as is required under the Act.

4. That the Board be urged to extend systematic inspection to every dairy of farm sending milk into Toronto, as is the practice in other cities of the province, the freedom to inspect and enforce the condition on which a permit to send milk into the city be granted. 5. In conclusion, your committee, in notifying the city health authorities of its recommendations, desires that the Board express its willingness and anxiety to lend every assistance within its power to mitigate, and, it is hoped, finally stamp out the serious epidemic which exists at present. The report was adopted. The Board will meet again to-day.

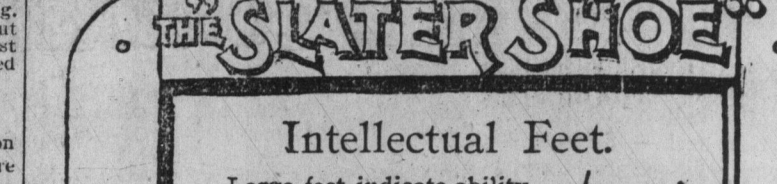

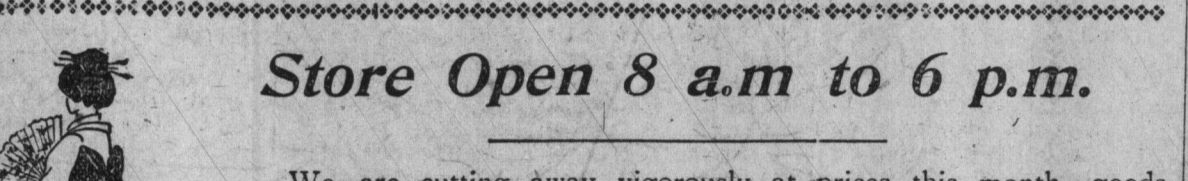

WANTS TO BOUNCE FELLOWS

Mayor Fleming Says He is Not Required Now.

KEATING MAKES A BIG KICK

And the Board of Control Recommends That \$4000 Be Restored.

Facts and Figures in Favor of the Proposed Victoria Square—The Regulation of Machinery Hospitals—The Mayor's Scheme for New Parks Sent on to Council—Money Voted to Repair the Track Allowances—City Hall News.

At the meeting of the Board of Control yesterday, the question of reducing the staff in the Engineer's Department was taken up, and the discussion, while it lasted, was decidedly interesting. It will be remembered that the Council reduced the appropriation for salaries in this department from \$24,000 to \$20,000, and instructed the Board of Control to investigate the department and make changes that were deemed necessary. The Mayor having stated that, in his opinion, some reduction in the staff could be made.

When the question came up yesterday the Mayor was asked to name the men whose services might be dispensed with. His Worship accepted the challenge, and named Engineer Fellows, who has charge of waterworks matters. He said that when the Waterworks Department was transferred to the Engineer's Department Mr. Fellows displaced Mr. Williams. He claimed that this was done simply to keep Mr. Fellows in a position. There was no doubt, in his opinion, that the services of Mr. Fellows and others in the department could be dispensed with, and that if it was Mr. Keating's department, it would be conducted much cheaper.

Mr. Keating maintained that Mr. Fellows did not displace Mr. Williams. Mr. Williams was placed in charge of the mechanical work, and Mr. Fellows in charge of the outside waterworks matters. Mr. Keating reminded His Worship that the rate at the Island had never been reduced, and that no further reduction could be made. He stated that there was as much to be done as important work going on now as there had been under his supervision since he assumed charge of the department. He would not think of entrusting the laying of the pipe at the Island to anyone else. Mr. Fellows or Mr. Rust, and Mr. Rust's time was fully taken up in other matters.

The Mayor referred to the placing of valve chambers under the tracks by Mr. Fellows as an expensive matter, but Mr. Keating replied that Mr. Fellows was acting under instructions. Mr. Keating thought that it was unsafe to make any further reductions at the present time, but he was of opinion that there were too many inspectors. Mr. Keating claimed to have the most confidence in Mr. Keating. His Worship refused to accept Mr. Keating's judgment that no reduction could be made. As for himself, he was satisfied that Mr. Keating was right.

Ald. Lamb said that Mr. Fellows was a good reliable man, who did valuable work at a small salary. The Mayor seemed to be echoing someone else, and said that someone else had loaded him up with the wrong valve chamber matter. The Mayor: "I have never had anything but praise for Mr. Keating, but that does not mean that I have never had anything but praise for Mr. Keating."

Ald. Lamb moved that the board recommend that \$4000 that was struck off the appropriation be restored. The motion carried. The Mayor alone opposing it. Thus the matter ends.

Maternity Hospitals.
The question of introducing a maternity hospital was discussed some time since by the Board of Health. Some time since the board had a report from the Maternity Hospital, which was not in possession of the board. Mr. Sheard said he was not in possession of the report, but he would refer to it. Ald. Lamb pointed out that a more serious evil might result if the proposed hospital were put into operation. If unfortunate children were forced to submit to police interference and inspection there might be a tendency to resort to more dangerous practices than child desertion. If the names of every unfortunate girl were placed in the hands of the police they would carry the stigma through life and so would the young men whose names were given as fathers of the children. The other members of the board were of the same opinion. Ald. Lamb's arguments and decided to ask Mr. Sheard to investigate the condition of the hospital, and to report to the board. Mr. Sheard will also consider and report upon the matter.

THE CONSTABLE SHOT HIM.

A Peddler From St. Thomas Who Was Doing Business Near Strathroy Tried to Evade Arrest.
London, Ont., July 23.—The town of Strathroy was yesterday morning thrown into great excitement over a shooting affray between Constable Wilson and J. W. Burns, a peddler from St. Thomas. Burns has been selling spectacles and charging very high prices, and an information was laid charging him with fraud and a warrant was issued. The officer went to Burns' boarding house, a small one-story affair, and placed him under arrest. Burns asked permission to go up stairs to change his clothing. Permission was granted, and the next the constable saw of Mr. Burns was his exit from the rear door of his boarding house. Wilson, it is said, called on him to stop, but the prisoner refused to go down. Wilson fired five or three shots in the air, and when this had no effect the constable and the man, and the shot took effect in the muscles of the left arm. Burns was brought before Mayor Evans of Strathroy in the absence of a magistrate, and remanded until July 26. He was brought to this city and placed in the county jail. The prisoner said he had been shot in the back of the head, and did not want to be encumbered with the expense of a trial. Jail physicians, however, were of opinion that if the prisoner can be bailed he will be removed to the hospital, and an effort will be made to extract the ball.
