and is considering with the President the choice of his successor, which may possibly be M. Bourgeois, the present Minister of Education.

"When Greek Meets Greek."

The Paris correspondent of The Standard says: "If England keeps on saying that Marchand must go, France will reply that Marchand will stay; and if he is removed forcibly there can be little doubt as to what the consequence will be."

On the other hand, the Paris correspondent of The Daily Graphic says: "I have good reason for stating that Count Muraviev (the Russian Foreign Minister) has discouraged French resistance in the matter of Fashoda."

Most of the papers, however, refuse to accept the explanation that French activity is merely in pursuance of M. Lockroy's scheme. Several exhort the Government to

answer the preparations of France by mobilizing the British fleet.
Some of the more conservative organs, notably The Times, practically ignore the French movements, and decline to perceive any war cloud.
The Daily Chronicle remarks: "Sir Michael Hicks-Beach has been at it again. He is a dangerous man. He has been without tact."
Other papers hint that the plain speaking of the Chancellor at a time when a crisis is approaching is an indiscretion.

WAS IT DUE TO MAGNETISM?

Peccoliar Conditions Exist Near the Manacles, Where the Ill-Fated Steamer Sank.

London, Oct. 19.—Newspapers, in their reference to the loss of the Mohagan, recall a story to the effect that peculiar and variable magnetic conditions exist near the Manacles, which are liable to disturb ships' compasses.

The wreck of the steamer Palmyra in that vicinity on March 14, 1885, in similar circumstances, is mentioned.
Messrs. A. G. L. Smith, W. J. Bloomingdale, Richard Kelly, Surgeon Trewar, and Miss Katharine Noble and Mand Bond-Bussch, arrived in London today, accompanied by Mr. A. S. Williams, the London manager of the Atlantic Transport Company, as his guests. The company gave each passenger 25 before leaving Falmouth. The surviving passengers will hold a meeting to-morrow. It has not been settled yet on board what steamer they will sail for New York.

An uncle and a group of friends met Miss Bondbusch at the railway station. She was weak and unnerved, and collapsed in her uncle's arms, where she sobbed for several minutes. She is suffering from rheumatism and is crippled by the loss of her mother, Mrs. Grandin, who perished in the disaster.

Miss Bondbusch is, however, resolved to keep her engagement to sing at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York. She will sail on the Cunard Line steamer Ettrah, and will take her mother's body with her.

Paris, Oct. 19.—The Temps, commenting upon the sensational stories of naval mobilization says:

"While the political situation necessarily induced a vigilance and activity it must not be forgotten that the present naval movements are principally an inauguration of the reforms planned by M. Lockroy, whom we appointed Minister of Marine, and which he desires to have completed prior to Jan. 1 next—reforms whereby the squadrons and ports will all be ready and clear for action and fully equipped within a few days."

After enumerating the proposed future strategy, which the various squadrons intended for coast defence, The Temps concludes as follows:

"Ashore our military works are quite ready and certainly the best disposition is being made of the means at the disposal of the navy, even if before the date mentioned the hoped-for solution, agreeable to both countries, should be found for the Fashoda question."

EMPEROR 'BILL'S' TOUR.

Great Reception to the Emperor and Empress at Constantinople.

Constantinople, Oct. 19.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany were heartily cheered while driving to the German school in the hope of the soldiers engaged in a long conversation with the teachers and children, and made minute enquiries as to the progress made in the various schools of Germanism."

A number of songs, including the Turkish national hymn, were sung. The Emperor drove through the streets, preceded and followed by two squadrons of cavalry, and accompanied by a numerous suite. The Emperor and Empress were accompanied by a large number of foreign children in attendance at the school, and he said in a speech that the "victorious force of Germanism."

A MOST AWFUL CRIME.

Father and Four Children Murdered in the Galician Settlement of Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Oct. 19.—There are no fresh developments in the Starbuck quadruple murder case to-day. It looks as though it was the result of a conspiracy, in which four or five persons, including the mother of the children, are implicated. Arrests are expected to-day.

The details of the tragedy are reported to be that Wasyl Bochek, a Galician, lived with his family in four children at Starbuck, Manit., about 25 miles east of Dominion City. The man and his children—two boys and two girls—were found dead in their home, having evidently been killed with an ax. The bodies showed by bruises and the floor and walls by blood that the father and mother had been shown in the killing. It is supposed they were murdered while asleep, and the crime was committed by strangers did the deed, while the others hold the opinion that the wife and mother, who is missing, is the guilty party. It is said the couple did not live happily together. No arrests have been made.

Two Slick Young Men.

A clever swindle has been worked successfully by two young men on boarding house keepers. The men watched the advertisements of people who had rooms to rent, and then paid them a visit. They then agreeing to pay the rent in advance, and producing a bill, usually for \$10, and getting the change and going away, promising to return with their things. The landlady never sees them again, and discovers that the bill is counterfeit.

The trick was played on a lady on Shuter street, but she discovered the fraud in time and got her change back. The police are on the trail of the men.

Markham Resident Held Up.

Matthew Outbert of Markham has reported to the police that he was held up and robbed of a watch and a sum of money on Victoria street on Saturday night last. Mr. Outbert's refusal to hand up his cash without a right secured for him a brutal beating. Mr. Outbert's face still shows ample evidence of the treatment he received.

BERDEEN TO VISIT TORONTO

And Will Probably Hold First Function in New City Hall.

Where the Mayor Proposes to Present Him With a Civic Address - Assessment Commissioner Fleming's Departure Have Raised Some Points of Law, Which Judges Must Decide Upon - Lease of Exhibition Grounds.

His Excellency the Governor-General, in the course of his farewell tour of the country, will grace Toronto with a visit. In reply to a wire from Mayor Shaw, the following telegram was received at the City Hall yesterday afternoon:

Cobourg, Oct. 19. Telegram of yesterday containing the courteous invitation of Your Worship and the corporation that we should be the guests of the city on occasion of visit next month is fully appreciated and invitation accepted with pleasure.

Lord Aberdeen. It is probable that this visit will be made on the occasion of the first public function in the new City Hall. The Mayor has thrown out a feeler, which is meeting with a favorable reception, in the shape of a suggestion that the civic address to His Excellency should be now in course of preparation by City Clerk Bevin, should be presented in the new Council Chamber.

A public meeting of citizens has been called for this afternoon at 4.30 o'clock in the present Council Chamber to discuss the best means of doing honor to the outgoing Governor-General. A proposition will be submitted to have the Mayor propose that the new Council Chamber should be patriotically decorated and that chains might be gotten at the old hall for requirements. Meantime he is hustling Messrs. Rust, Jones and Chambers, who have had in hand the improvement of the hall, to get the matter in front, but they claim that the man they are all waiting for is the architect, who is constructing the walks and who is now in New York.

Terms for the New Lease. The sub-committee of the Parks and Exhibition Committee, which has had in charge the terms on which the city will renew the lease of the Exhibition grounds, will make the following recommendation to the committee to-day:

(1) That a new lease be granted to the Exhibition Association for a period of ten years from the expiration of the current lease, the lease to be substantially upon the same terms as the existing one, except as hereinafter provided.

(2) That the city take over all the buildings and property upon the grounds leased to the association, and assume the mortgage for \$28,000 now owing by the association to the Canada Life Assurance Company, the association to pay the interest to the expiration of the current lease, and thereafter the principal and interest to be assumed and paid by the city.

(3) That the association hand over to the city all the money in its possession (except the sum of \$10,000 hereinafter referred to) on the 28th of February next, to be applied towards the encumbrances now upon the property, and that the association be allowed to retain the sum of \$10,000 as required by its charter, to be kept on hand for exhibition purposes.

(4) That the association hand over to the city each year its surplus revenue after providing prize money and other necessary expenses, and the said sum of \$10,000 to be retained as afloat, and this surplus money may be expended in providing such additional accommodation for the said association upon the said grounds as the City Council may seem proper, or in such other manner as the said Council may decide.

(5) That the clause in the lease providing that the grounds and buildings at other times than when used by the Exhibition Association shall be subject to such use and purposes as the Council of the city apply to be amended so that the city may have power to permit exhibitions or entertainments of a similar nature to that given by the said association to be held upon the said grounds and in the said buildings.

Property Committee To-Day. The Property Committee will have in its possession today statements as to the respective floor areas of the Technical School, the St. Lawrence Market rooms suggested as a site for a similar nature to that given by the said association to be held upon the said grounds and in the said buildings.

The area of the market building spoken of is placed at about 55,000 square feet, which being included of two rooms, by which it is proposed to enlarge this suggested school house. Chairman Dunn is also getting the attention of the Board of Education in order to arrive at a settlement of this Technical School difficulty.

Fleming's Departure Raise Questions. The Court of Revision continued its sitting to hear appeals in respect to Ward 3 assessments yesterday. Over 60 were heard. There were some novel points raised, all arising out of the new departure of Assessment Commissioner Fleming in reaching out for new things to assess. One of the more important was the appeal against the valuation on the personality of the Luxfer Prism Co., Yonge-street, south of Wellington. Assessor White vouchsafed that this was a new business, and the Assessment Commissioner has also given notice that he will appeal against the exemption of the Central Press Agency, which the court allowed on the ground that it was a manufacturing establishment, making "boiler plate." Mr. Fleming takes the ground that it is a newspaper business pure and simple.

Is Massey Hall Educational? The trustees of Massey Hall made the startling plea that the hall was an educational institution, and was therefore exempt from all of the \$37,000 levied thereon. The assessment of \$421,220 on the buildings, wires, poles, etc., of the Toronto Electric Light Company was confirmed as well. It will go before the judge, with that confirmed upon the Street Railway Company at \$150,702.

The general tendency was to lower assessment figures on land fronting on Yonge-street, below King, that of R. G. Barrett, at 60 Yonge, being cut down \$25 per foot. In the morning the court declined to reduce the assessment of \$1400 on the U. C. Bible Society streets, at 102 Yonge-street; of \$1200 on that of Farmer Bros., or of \$1200 on the Evening News Building. Mr. Fleming says they should be raised in that quarter rather than reduced.

Market Improvement Would Stop This. Among the reductions was that of the property at the north side of Front-street, between West Market and Church-street, on the ground that business had moved west. It was cut from \$200 per foot to \$150 per foot. This is where the effect of the St. Lawrence Market improvements would be felt in increasing valuation.

Will Delay Elevator Tenders. In response to requests from the Otis and Portland companies, the Mayor has consented, subject to the approval of the Board of Control, to postpone for one week the acceptance of tenders for elevator cars. They will not therefore be opened before a week from to-morrow.

Building permits were issued yesterday as follows: To M. A. Blackwell, to erect a 2-story and attic brick residence at 164 Jameson-avenue, to cost \$2000; also to Patrick Maher, for a 2-story brick dwelling shed at 10 Bloor-street east, to cost \$4000.

In the West Victoria Election Case - Other Matters of Political Import.

The motion is to set aside the conveyance of copper mines and company, which was made on the supposition that the company was properly incorporated in Ontario and could operate the mines. It seems, however, that the company was incorporated only in Ohio. Mr. Ritchie wants the lands put into the hands of the syndicate again.

Salting the Municipality. Mr. Albert Ballagh, suing the Township of Etobicoke through his solicitors, Messrs. Gallagher and Bull, for \$1000 damages, for alleged defective condition of a road while driving while driving was overturned into a ditch and was seriously injured.

No More Smallpox. Word was received yesterday by Dr. Bryce that no more cases of smallpox have developed in Camden Township, County of Kent. It is thought the disease has been brought in from Massachusetts some time ago.

Mrs. Elizabeth Cox, beneficiary under the will of the late George Cox of Guelph, is a claimant on a policy for \$1000 against the Massachusetts Benefit Life Association, at Osgoode Hall.
