

Prof. Charles R. Eastman, Charged With Killing Grogan, Still

on Trial. ROTHER-IN-LAW A LOVELY FELLOW

Vere the Words the Prisoner Used in Dr. Durrell's Hearing-Hit Man's Expression.

Cambridge, Mass., April 27.-The 32calibre leaden bullet, which caused the death of Richard H. Grogan, jr., was handed around for microscopic examination by the jury, and proved an interesting feature early to-day in the trial of Charles R. Eastman, charged with murdering Grogan. The bullet was brought out in connection with the testimony of Dr. Durrell, one of the medical examiners of Middlesex County, who was summoned when Grogan was killed, and who was present at two autopsies subsequently

was present at two autopsies subsequently heid.

The first autopsy was held the day after the tragedy and the second on Jan. 2 last, when the body was disentombed at Mount Auburn Cemetery.

Dr. Durrell testified that after the shooting on the night of July 4 he went to Eastman's house, where Eastman reconsted and illustrated how he had stood relative to Grogan when the shot was fired. Eastman had said he was trying to revolve the cylinder in the old revolver when it went off accidentally. He had said that when the shot was fired Grogan fell to his knees, and that the latter had a "flendish or devilish" expression on his face. Eastman also told Dr. Durrell that Grogan had a good temperament and was a "lovely fellow."

Dr. Durrell told where the bullet was found in Grogan's body, and said that it fitted into the old rim-fire revolver.

Police Inspector Henry J. Jones of Cambridge testified that after the shooting Eastman said to witness that if it was his other brother-in-law, he would have to able in the family had been settled three months before, and everyone had shaken hands over it. 
