# IN THE ZEEFONTEIN FIGI

Twelve Hundred Boers Under Dewet Surprise British at Two in PEAGE TERMS FOR BUERS the Morning-Casualties Number Seventy-Enemy Had Two Wagon Loads of Killed and Wounded.

London, Dec. 29.-In a despatch to the War Office, Lord Kitchener gives further details of the action at Zeefontein, on Dec. 24, when General Dewet rushed the camp of Colonel Firman, who commanded four companies of Im- Burned Homesteads to Be Rebuilt at perial Yeomanry. He says:

"The column was encamped on a solitary kopje, whose southern side was almost precipitous. The outposts on the northern side were well pushed out. The position, which was naturally a strong one, had also been entrenched. The night was moonlit, but cloudy. Details have not been received, but it is stated that the Boers climbed the precipitous southern side and collected near the top.

"At 2 o'clock in the morning, the Boers suddenly attacked the pickets on the summit, in superior numbers. Before the men in camp were able to get clear of the tents, the Boers rushed thru, shooting them as they were coming out. The officers were shot while trying to stem the tide. Lieut Harwich, who worked the pompom, was shot thru the heart. There was no panic There has not been even the slightest among our men. All did their best.

"Including the casualties, half the column is now at Elands River Bridge. The remainder are prisoners. Two wagon loads of dead and wounded Boers were removed from the scene of the action. The Boers numbered 1200, and were under command of Dewet, who behaved well, leaving men to attend to

"The Imperial Light Horse, which was 14 miles distant, arrived at 6.40 a.m., and pursued the Boers, but without effect." The War Office prints a list of the casualties in the fight at Zeefontein, These include: Killed, 6 officers, 11 non-commissioned officers and 40 pri-

vates; severely wounded, 8 officers, and, missing, 5 officers. Simultaneously with the above, the War Office gave out a despatch from Lord Kitchener, chronicling a big success of the South African Constabulary, who made a raid on Bothaville and captured 36 Boers.



## NEARLY TEN MILLIONS ADDED TO PUBLIC DEBT

With the Largest Revenue in the Country's History There Was An Addition to the Indebtedness Last Year of Nearly

Three Millions-Loss on the I.C.R.

Ottawa, Dec. 29.—With the largest revenue in the country's history, there was an addition to the public debt during the last fiscal year of nearly \$3,000,000. The exact amount added to the debt was \$2.986,196, leaving the net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year \$268,480,000. In five years the Liberal administration has added \$9,982,569 to the public debt, and that during a period of constantly expanding revenue.

Tangier, Dec. 29.-A water spout has burst over the town of Saffee, Morocco. It inundated the lower part of the town for the space of 12 hours, sweeping everything into the sea. Two hundred persons are reported to have been drowned. There are no Europeans among the dead. The damage to Saffee was enormous. Saffee is a fortified seaport town of Morocco. It has a population of 12,000; including about 9000 Jews. It is enclosed by massive walls, and has a palace and a small fort.





Lord Rosebery Takes Coach and Four to Drive Away Sleeplessness.

THIS IS NOW MUCH TALKED ABOUT

Former Premier Generally Thought of as the Coming Leader of the Liberals.

London, Dec. 29.-Since his speech at 'hesterfield. Lord Rosebery has been the most-talked-of man in all England. Even discussion of the Buller case seems to have lapsed. Anecdotes about the Liberal lead er, which there seems no doubt he will again become, have been revived. One was told by a clergyman in his

Christmas sermon. The preacher even went so far as to hail him as a sort of political Messiah, comparing the state of England to-day to that of Rome before the birth of Christ. He declared that Britain's hopes were centred on Lord Rosebery's making another advent into politics to save her from her trouble and perplexity. . Lord Rosebery, who has been spendin

Christmas quietly at Dalmeny, his seat near Edinburgh, has been exciting some curiosity among his neighbors in Midlothian by a form of exercise or recreation to which he has recently taken. He has been in the habit lately, two or three times a week, of ordering a carriage

three times a week, of ordering a carriage and four horses to be got ready for him after dinner, sometimes as late as 10 o'clock at night. In this equipage, preceded by an outrider, the former Premier is rapidly whirled for an hour or two thru his park or along the road between Dalmeny and Edinburgh.

Lord Rosebery suffers, it is understood, from an occasional insomnia of an obstinate kind. He has an idea that he may induce sleep by rapid motion before retiring to rest. Hence these rather singular nocturnal excursions.

Speaking about Lord Rosebery, by the way, reminds one that two of his children, Lord Daimeny and Lady Crewe, celebrate their birthdays next month. Lord Daimeny will be 20. He is destined for the army.

Many are not aware that Lady Crewe and Lady Sybil Primrose, Lord Rosebery's other daughter, were trained, by the wish of their late mother, in the School of Cookery and Domesic Economy at Edinburgh. As a result Lady Sybil is a practical, first-class cook, while Lady Crewe is thoroly skilled in that art and all the duties of an upper housemaid.

Rev. George A. Dewey Says They Are Indispensable Public Benefits. Rev. George A. Dewey, in his sermon at the Agnes-street Methodist Church Sunday

He asserted that it needed brains to run a histel, but none to run a barroom, and a hotel could exist without the barroom. He did not believe in the government licensing which for the nursess of selling liquor to clubs for the purpose of selling liquor to its members. He said if he were "on to the ropes," and not one of the clergy, he could get a ticket for the purchase of liquor at any of the city clubs. duor at any of the city cluos.

Liquor will exist to the end of the world. But, he said, its manufacture and sale should be under government supervision and by government agents, and every other place selling liquor should be abolished. Thus it would be possible to conduct a hotel without the stigma that now rests over the name. By contrasting the situation of our schools and professions in earlier days and now, he showed how, by government interference, these had been advanced days and now, he showed how, by government interference, these had been advanced without discomfort to those concerned. Thus these institutions were now under public protection, and practically governed by the public. The same scheme could be carried out in reference to hotels. He believed in the abolition of parts of hotels; they should be regulated according to meal or bedroom capacity. If the government does not protect the hotels they will never come up to the standard of accommodation that should be in Canada. In closing, he wished the hotels success, and hoped they would eventually become such that no one would fear to allow his children or other loved ones to go into them for fear of temptation or contamination.

## GEN, SHAFTER BUNCOED.

Was Led to Endorse Bogus Drafts

By a Forged Letter. San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 29 .- Major-General Shafter will soon be sued for two drafts amounting to \$496, which he indorsed last June on the strength of a seemingly genuine letter from Major-General Mac-Arthur. It turned out that the letter was a lorgery and the drafts were bogus. The drafts were presented to Gen. Shafter by E. B. Lawrence, who bore letters from MacArthur asking Shafter to indorse them for his friend Lawrence. The letters seemed genuine and Gen. Shafter promptly compiled.

With Gen. Shafter's endorser With Gen. Shafter's endorsement they were promptly paid by Hong Kong and Shanghai banks. After two months they came back with a note that the drafts were both spurious. Then the bank wanted Gen. Shafter to pay the amount, but he refused and they threatened suit. Papers are now being drawn to compel the general to pay.

## OPEN WEATHER IN CANADA.

Port Arthur, Dec. 29.—Navigation is still open at Port Arthur. Thunder Bay is clear of lice up to the elevator and breakwater and there is nothing to have prevented steamers from carrying out Manitoba wheat all this month. The question of prolonging the season will soon be a live issue if the Northwest continues to produce as much wheat as it did this year.

The couple reach-ed the hotel about 9 o'clock and asked that the pony, which had every appearance of having been driven hard a long distance, be put up for the day. They declared that it was their intention to go down town on a shopping expedition and would return for the outfit late in the afternoon. return for the outfit late in the afternoon. Since then the couple have not been seen, and the pony and cart are still at the hotel awaiting claimants.
