Men Getting Married Entitled to Tax Concession for the Whole Year. On the authority of the city solicitor, Supervisor Nixon of the assesstor, Supervisor Nixon of the assessment department announced at the court of revision yesterday that any man getting married is entitled to a married mar's income tax exemption for the whole year rather than only the portion following his marriage. Anyone moving from the city, how-ever, was entitled to exemption only for the portion of the year he was absent from the city. The ruling was also announced that the father of a child born any time in the year 1920 would be entitled to \$200 ex-emption next year. It was announced by Chairman Drayton that he will try to have the statutes amended to permit the court of revision to take a stated case to the high court on any question of law, instead of by the round-about course of going first to the county court or railway board. The court of revision ruled that J. G. G. Kerry must pay his income tax on \$14.739 here, altho he is not a continuous resident of Toronto. The assessment against the Oak Hall Clothing Company on the busi-ness at the northeast corner of Yong and Adelaide streets, which stands at \$81.385, was appealed on the ground that it was a retail business and en-titled to a 25 per cent. assessment in-stead of a wholesale business.
