FORM OF BEQUEST.
OF THE
LAKE SUPERIOR MISSION,
AND ITS
HOMES FOR INDIAN CHILDREN.

I GIVE and bequeath unto the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the Lake Superior Mission, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, the sum of.....; to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, exclusively out of such part of my personal estate not hereby specially disposed of, as I may by law bequeath to charitable purposes; and I hereby lawfully charge such part of my estate, with the said sum upon trust, to be applied toward the general purposes of the said mission and its various Homes, for the Christian training and civilization of Indian children; and the receipt of the Rev. Edward Francis Wilson, or the Treasurer for the time being of the said mission, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Legacy. (And I direct that the duty upon the said Legacy be paid by my executor out of the said fund).

The will or codicil giving the bequest must be signed by the testator in the presence of two witnesses, who must subscribe their names in his presence and in the presence of each other.

NOTE--This testament must have been executed one year previous to death of Testator, to give it effect over Mortmain Acts.

BEQUESTS TO THE INDIAN HOMES.

The late Mr. James Kyffin, who died at York, county of Haldimand, July 25th, 1883, has bequeathed to the Indian School, Shingwauk Home, in the Diocese of Algoma, the sum of \$500.

The late Mrs. Hannah A. Kern, who died at Ancastor, on Advent Sunday, 1885, has bequeathed the sum of \$150 to the Wawanosh Home.

The late Miss Davidson, of Quebec, bequeathed the sum of \$400 to the Indian Homes. (1886).

DATES TO REMEMBER.

JULY, 1871—Chief Little Pine, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to Toronto and other places, and addressed the white people, urging that a "Big Teaching Wigwam" might be built for the young Indians belonging to his tribe. This was the beginning of the Shingwauk Home.

SUMMER OF 1872—Chief Buhkwujjenene, of Garden River, accompanied Mr. Wilson to England to plead the cause of his people. About £800 was collected, and with this sum the first Shingwauk Home was erected.

SEPTEMBER 22ND, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was opened; 15 pupils, boys and girls, were present.

SEPTEMBER 28TH, 1873.—The first Shingwauk Home was burned to the ground, six days after the opening.

JULY 30TH, 1874.—The foundation stone of the new Shingwauk Home was laid by His Excellency, Lord Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada.

OCTOBER, 1874.—Our work was recommenced with 18 Indian children, boys and girls, who, with their matron and teacher, occupied a frame building temporarily for the winter.

AUGUST 2ND, 1875.—The present Shingwauk Home was publicly opened by their Lordships Bishop Hellmuth and Bishop Fauquier.

AUGUST 19TH, 1879.—The Wawanosh Home was opened for use, with 15 Indian girls.

JULY 23RD, 1881.—The Marquis of Lorne and suite visited the Shingwauk Home.

AUGUST 29TH, 1883.—The Bishop Fauquier Memorial Chapel, in connection with the Indian Homes, was opened.

APRIL 15TH, 1885.—A talk with Chief Buhkwujjenene about the troubles going on in the North-west suggested the idea of establishing several Branch Homes.

AUGUST, 1885.—Mr. Wilson, accompanied by three Shingwauk boys, paid a visit to the North-west, going as far west as Regina.

AUGUST 6TH, 1889.—The Kasota and Washakada Homes, Elkhorn, publicly opened by the Lord Bishop of Rupert's Land.

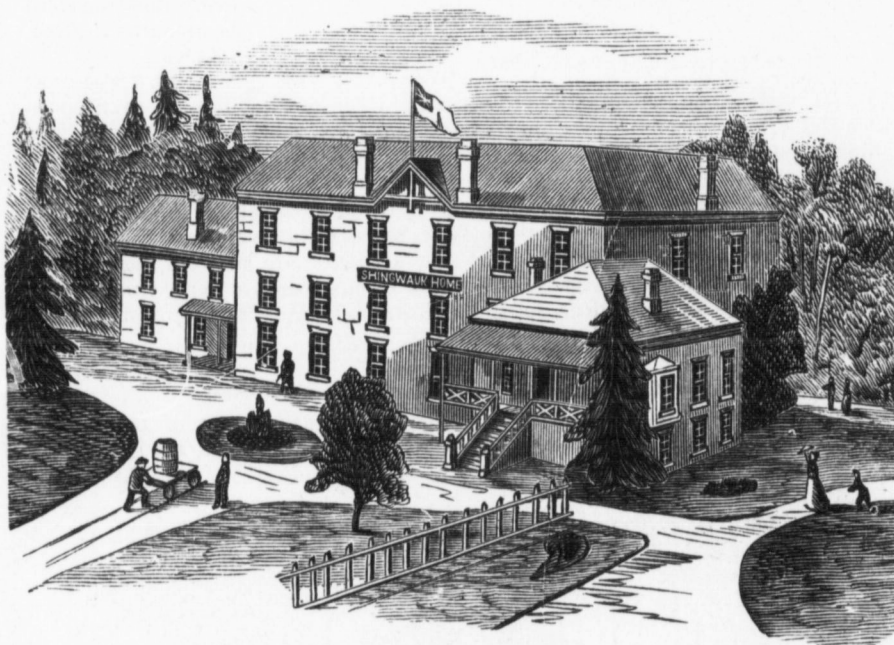
OCTOBER, 1890.—The Sauketappi Home in course of erection at Medicine Hat, N. W.T.

OUR INDIAN HOMES.

AT the last Meeting of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions, held in Montreal in October, 1891, a letter was read from the Rev. E. F. Wilson, Chief Manager of the Indian Homes at Sault Ste. Marie, Elkhorn and Medicine Hat, proposing to give over the entire management, control and responsibility of his Indian Homes to the Board.

The proposal was fully discussed, and the following resolutions passed:—

(a) That, as constituted by the Provincial Synod, the Board cannot, in justice to themselves or to the interests committed to their care, or to the interests of the Indian Homes, accept the direct responsibility of the Indian Homes, which have been formed by the Rev. E. F. Wilson.



THE SHINGWAUK, HOME.

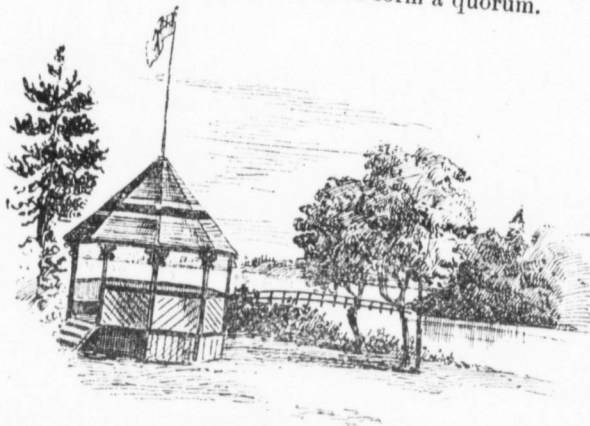
(b) That this work and responsibility of the Board should be directed to the extension of a more active interest in Indian work and the securing of more liberal contribution for it.

(c) That all the details of management in the case of each of these Homes cannot be controlled by a Board constituted like the Board of Management, and can be effectually managed only by those having local knowledge and able to bring personal influence to bear closely upon each Home and its affairs.

Since this decision was arrived at by the Board, the Algoma Indian Committee has been reconstructed. It consists now of the Bishop of Algoma as President; Judge Johnston, Mr. W. F. Thompson, Rev. E. F. Wilson, and one other not yet appointed, Members of Committee; Judge Johnston, being Secretary. The following rules have been adopted:

1. The Committee shall be called the Algoma Indian Committee, and shall

consist of the Bishop of Algoma, as President, the Rev. E. F. Wilson, Principal of the Homes, and three other persons; the attendance of three members at any meeting being sufficient to form a quorum.

duties of the Committee shall be to assist the Rev. E. F. Wilson by their counsel and advice in the management of the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Homes, and to take such steps as they think best to augment the funds of the Institution.

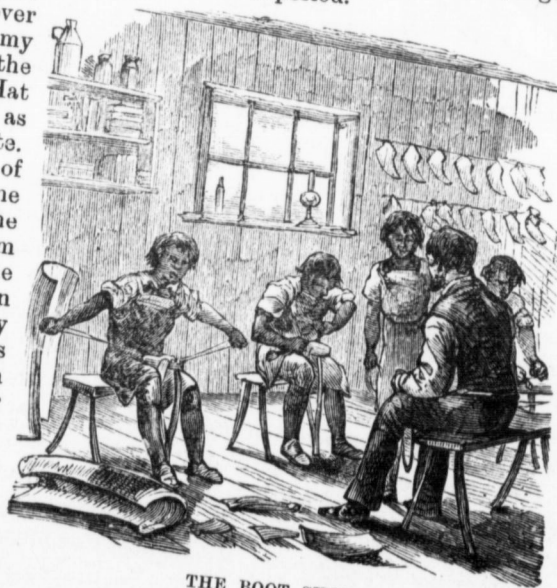
5. The erecting of new buildings, or addition to or alteration of existing ones; the dismissal and appointment of teachers; the examination from time to time and the annual auditing of the accounts, are matters that should properly come within the province of the Committee: it being understood, however, that the Committee have no desire whatever to unduly fetter the hands of the Principal.

To the President and Committee of the Algoma Indian Homes:

GENTLEMEN,—I beg herewith to submit you my Report of the Indian Homes under my charge, for the year ending December 31st, 1891, together with my financial statement covering the same period.

My Report for the past year must necessarily cover the entire extent of my work, embracing the Homes at Medicine Hat and at Elkhorn as well as those situated at Sault Ste. Marie, as the accounts of all have been kept in one set of books—but, with the close of the year, I am taking steps to have the Medicine Hat and Elkhorn accounts kept separately with a view to those Homes being carried on as soon as practicable, under their own local committees and superintendents.

With the concurrence of the Superintendent-General of Indian Affairs, the Indian Commission at Regina and Archdeacon Phair: my son, Archibald E. Wilson, will this next spring undertake the



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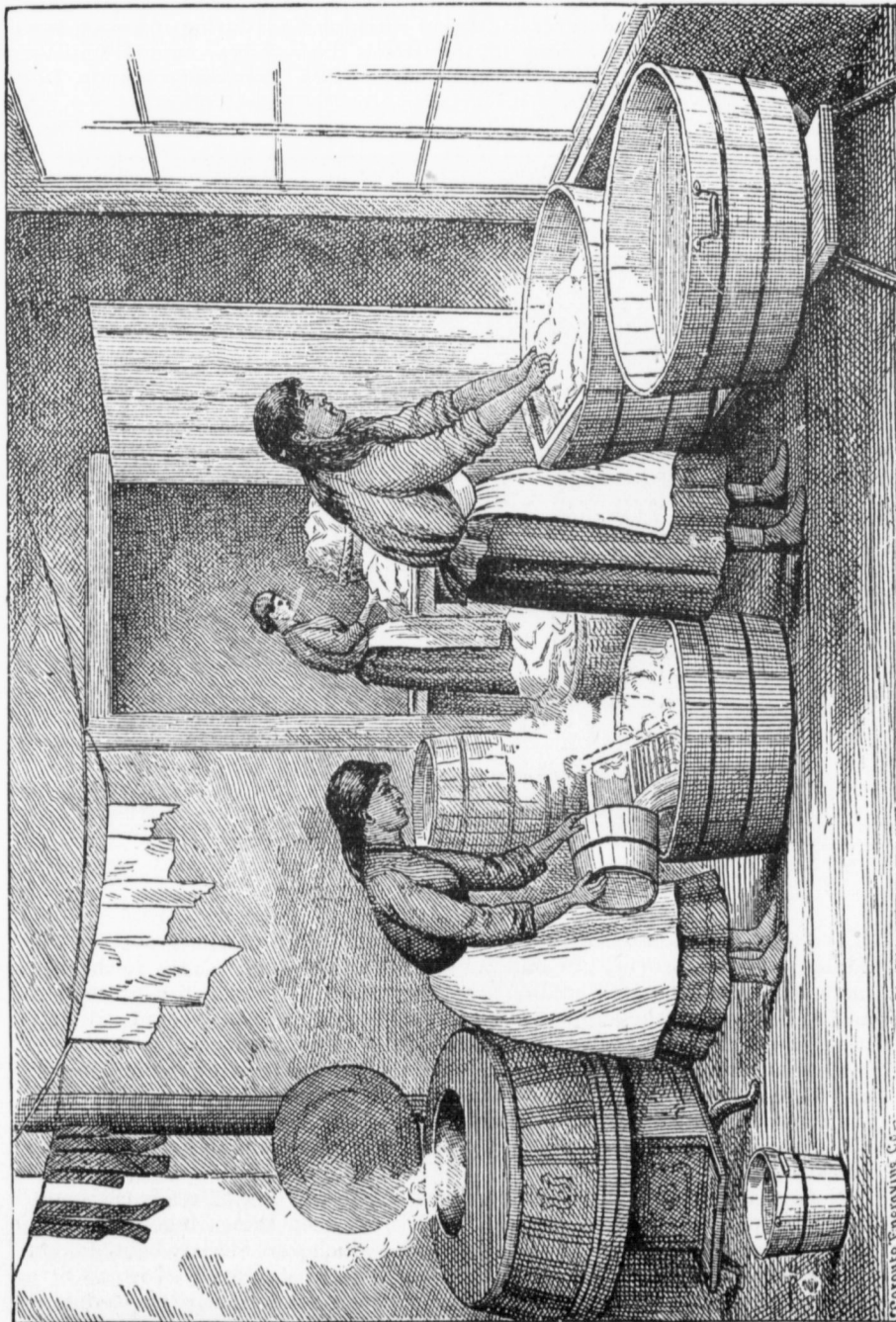
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superintendency of the Elkhorn Institution ; and payments towards the sup-
port of pupils may, after the 1st of April, be made direct to him.

Of the Medicine Hat Institution, the erection of which is not yet completed,
I cannot at present speak definitely ; but I am in correspondence with the
Bishop of Qu'Appelle (in whose Diocese it is situated) and the local committee



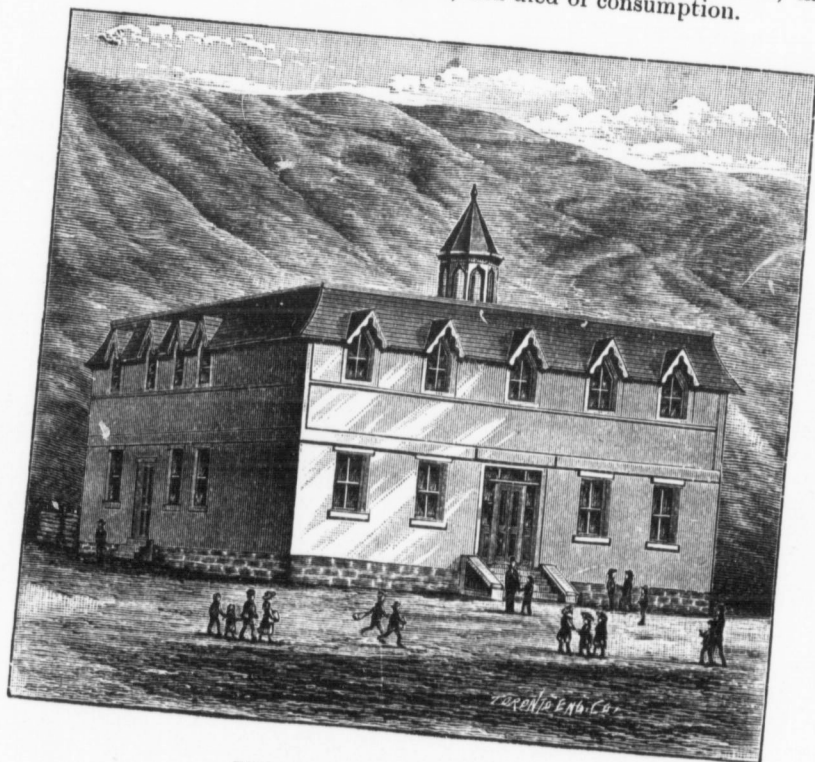
THE WAWANOSH LAUNDRY.

at Medicine Hat in regard to it. I would like to see the building completed
and the Institution fairly launched before I withdraw from it.

To confine myself now to our Algoma Homes : We commenced the year
with an attendance of 30 boys at the Shingwauk, and 16 girls at the Wawa-
nosh, the number of pupils having been greatly reduced about Christmas time

(1890), on account of the lack of funds. As spring came on, in anticipation of an increased government grant, we gradually augmented our numbers—the boys to 51; the girls to 28. At the close of the year we had 49 boys at the Shingwauk; 23 girls at the Wawanosh. The entire number of pupils under my charge during the year, at Sault Ste. Marie and at Elkhorn, as shown by the accompanying list, has been 140.

I regret to say we had several cases of sickness here during the year, and that two pupils while resident in the Home died—a boy named William Esquimau, in April, and a little girl named Mary Petuhwegezshik, in December; both were scrofulous subjects, and died of consumption.

We were disappointed in our expectation of a government grant towards adding to and improving our buildings. There had been placed in the estimates for us, \$2,500 for building purposes, \$900 to provide fire protection, and \$1,380 toward the support of additional pupils; but on account, we suppose, of the Premier's death, and everything in consequence being thrown somewhat out of gear at Ottawa, these grants failed to pass the Privy Council; and we have been obliged to do without them. And not only so, but even the allowed grants towards the maintenance of our Algoma Homes have, since the 1st of July last, been only partly paid, and are now very considerably in arrear.

Notwithstanding all this inconvenience, which the lack of ready cash generally entails, we have managed, I think, to keep things together pretty fairly. Not only have we kept up the trades which were already being taught at the Shingwauk, but have launched out somewhat afresh. Instead of a female being in charge of our tailoring department, as formerly, we have now a man in charge; and are taking and executing orders from town, having more work on hand generally than the tailor and his five boys can get through with. We have also engaged a weaver for the six winter months; and the click of the shuttle is heard constantly in the weaving room—turning out cloth and carpets. Our carpenter shop and factory have also been in full operation,

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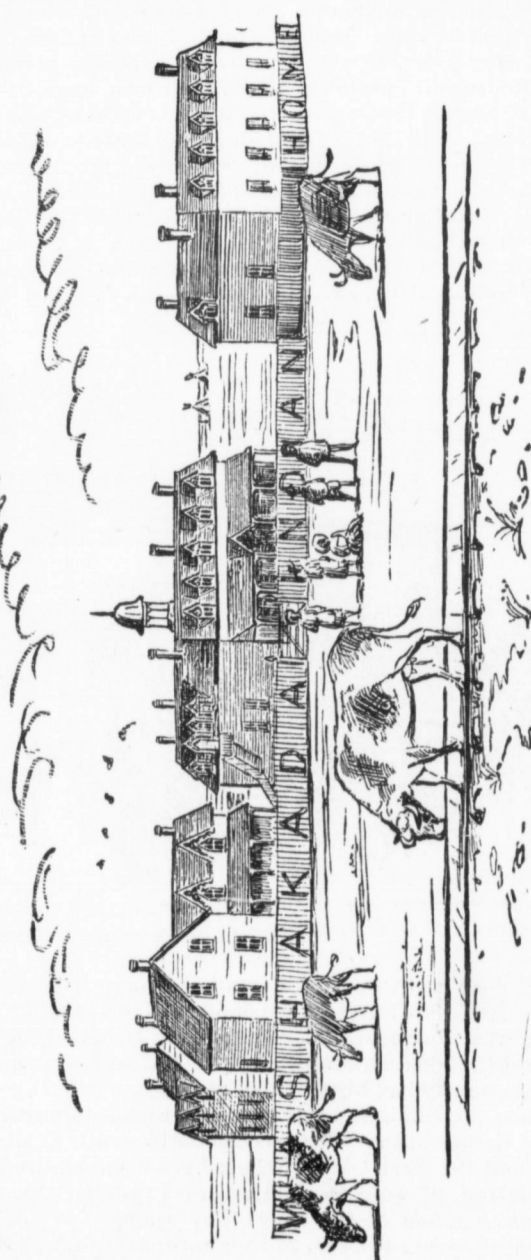
completing some government work that was left over from last year, and taking in any outside job-work that might offer. Our buildings at the Shingwauk consist now of the following: The main Shingwauk building with two wings, stone; the Chapel, stone; the Hospital, stone; the Industrial build-

ing, stone; the Factory, frame; Carpenter's cottage, stone; Barn and Stables, frame; Farm man's cottage, frame; the Shingwauk Hall (with school-room upstairs and drill hall below), frame. These buildings stand on ninety acres of land, about two-thirds of which has been cleared. At the Wawanosh we have the Main building, stone; Laundry and Laundresses' Cottage, frame; Playhouse and Stables, frame; these buildings stand on fifteen acres of land. We also rent about eighty acres of hardwood land, whence we draw our fuel, about four miles back from the Shingwauk. The total value of our present buildings at Sault Ste. Marie is estimated to be about \$22,000.

In May last, after consultation with the Committee, I introduced the plan of having six school examinations in the year, and doing away with summer holidays. The difficulty had been that the pupils went away for seven or eight weeks' holiday, just at the very busiest time of the year, when farm, garden, carpenter work, &c., were all in full operation; and when visitors to the Homes were coming in largest numbers. So

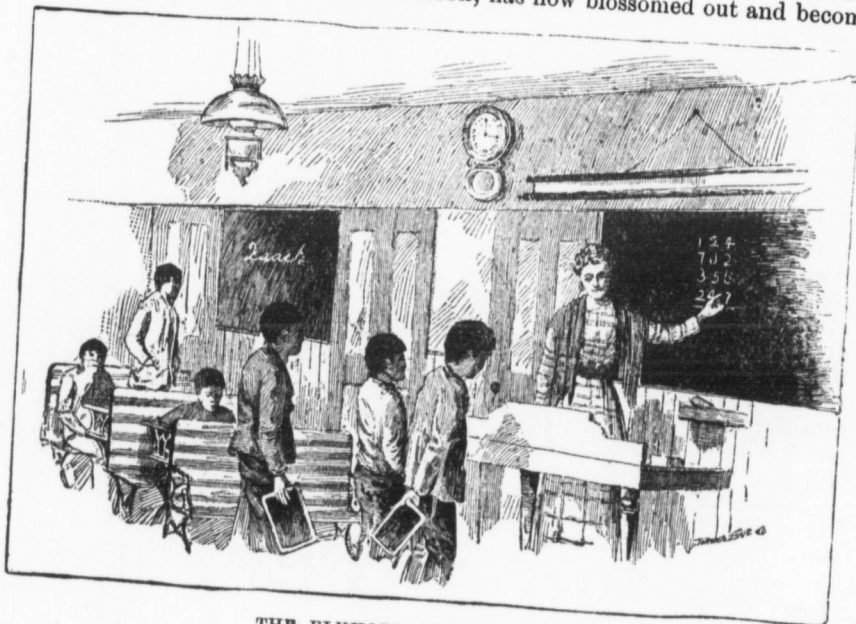
the plan at present is to have about seven or eight days' holidays at the close of each of the six examinations, and to have no general break-up for the summer—pupils, whose parents live at a distance, and particularly wish to have them home for a visit, being allowed occasionally to miss one term and go to their homes for seven weeks. The plan seems to answer very well, as regards the pupils; but is not so acceptable to the school teachers.

I have felt a little disappointed, I think, of late, in regard to the results of our work. The Indians do not, unfortunately, seem to show any great appre-

ciation of what we are trying to do for their children; and when our pupils leave us, after completing their course of four or five years, the tendency in too many cases has been to go back into the old way of living, talking Indian to one another, and doing but little to improve their circumstances. I have noticed also, a tendency among those we have educated to try to show off their education by using grandiloquent phrases rather than by making any good, solid use of it. Even such advanced Indians as the Mohawks, on the Bay of Quinte, seem to prefer to retain their own language in preference to English, and so long as this is persisted in, it must always be a great hindrance to their progress. Still, notwithstanding drawbacks and discouragements, there is the satisfaction of feeling that we have been trying honestly and perseveringly to do the best we could for these poor people; and, in looking back upon the past twenty-three years of my life, passed among the Indians, I cannot but thank God that although the progress may seem at times to have been slow, there has certainly been some advance made, and our Shingwauk Home, which once stood almost alone, as a desolate beacon, has now blossomed out and become



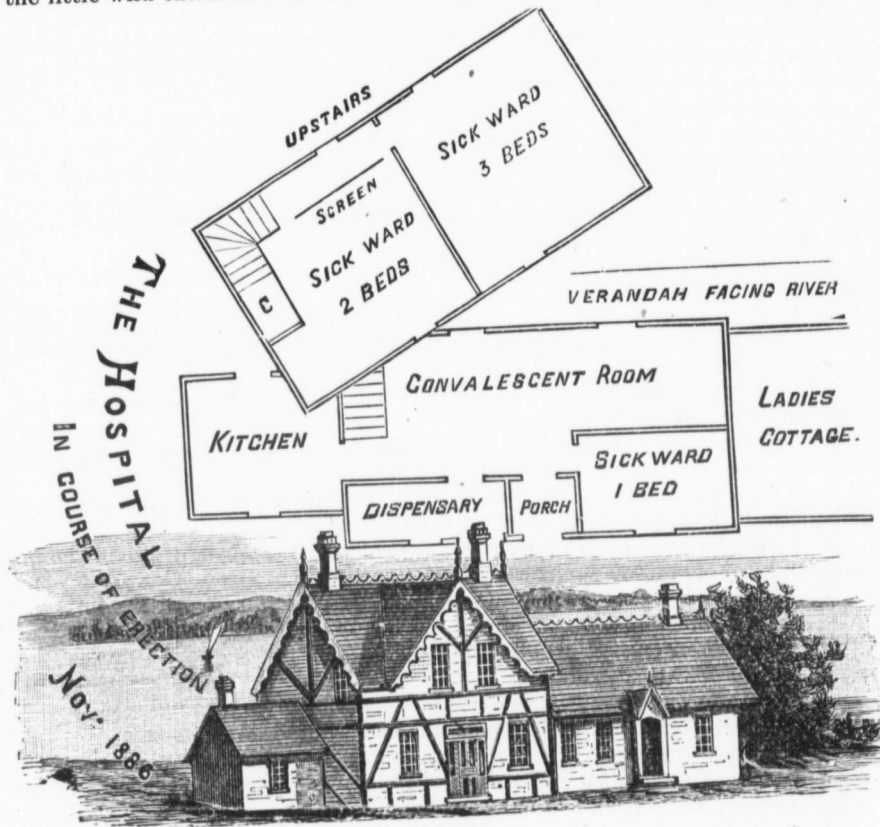
THE ELKHORN SCHOOL-ROOM.

the pioneer and forerunner of a large number of Institutions for Indian children, not only Church of England, but under other religious bodies, in Manitoba, the North-west Territory and British Columbia. If the system of gathering Indian children into an Institution were a failure, I think there would scarcely have been these results.

Since our Shingwauk Home was first established, I have, at this and my other Homes in the West, received 516 pupils in all; of these, 325 have been boys and 191 girls. 254 of them have been baptized members of the Church of England, 97 were Methodists, 14 Presbyterians, 99 Roman Catholics, and the rest heathen of the tribes they belonged to; 334 were Ojibways, 14 Mohawks, 40 Sioux, 46 Cree, 23 Delaware, 33 Ottawa, 4 Blackfeet, 15 Pottawatimi.

In drawing this Report to a close, I would wish to thank most heartily those Sunday Schools, Ladies of W.A., and others in Canada who have aided us so much by undertaking the support of pupils or providing clothing for our Homes; and also those kind English friends who, from the first outset of the work, have done so much to help us. I shall not easily forget that this work, in which I have been for so many years engaged, originated among my friends in England, who came to my aid in the hour of need and have since done so much to support me in my efforts. Whether or not it may be the will of God for me to continue in the work much longer I do not at present know. The

separation from me of the Western Homes, I must confess, diminishes my own personal interest in the work, as it does away with the idea of making the Shingwauk our Central Institution, and bringing to it from time to time the little wild children from our Branch Homes in the West. My own sym-

pathies are, I think, more with the Western Indians than with these half-civilized natives of Ontario. Sometimes too, I think, that for the sake of my growing family, and especially on account of my wife, who is in enfeebled health, that I ought to be withdrawing altogether from the Indian field, and seeking work in some other sphere. But these things, happily for us, are not for ourselves to decide. There is a hand that rules above, and orders for us our destinies. By that hand only do I wish to be guided, and to engage only in such work as it may be the will of the Almighty for me to engage in.

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List of Pupils at the Sault St. Marie and Elkhorn Homes during the year 1891.

LEFT DURING THE YEAR.

1. *Arthur Miskokoman*—age 20; had completed his course at the Shingwauk; returned to us after summer holidays, and began attending the Public School up town; made very satisfactory progress, but the plan did not answer very well; so he went back to his home by the last boat down.
2. *Joseph Soney*—age 18; was attending Trinity College School, Port Hope, but his elder brother having failed to pay the stipulated quota towards his support, there was a difficulty about his returning to the School last fall, and his place has been taken by another.
3. *Pascoe Hill*—age 14; went home sick (the result of pleurisy) last fall, and has since died.
4. *Ziba Peters*—age 15; had only come to us for two years, completed his time, and went home.
5. *Elijah Rickman*—age 12; was very ill in the early spring with pneumonia and pleurisy; was taken home by his father soon after opening of navigation, and has since died.
6. *William Esquimau*—age 11; died of consumption in our hospital, April 2nd, and was buried in our cemetery.
7. *Edward Rickman*—age 10; brother of No. 5; went home with his sick brother, and will remain at home for the winter.
8. *Wilson Knaggs*—age 16; came back to us in the spring (although time completed); left again at close of navigation.
9. *Nancy Henry*—age 18; went out to service in the spring; late in the fall went to her home; was doing very well.
10. *Mary J. Waukay*—age 13; was ill at the Wawanosh with scrofula, and symptoms of consumption, so sent to her home.
11. *Elizabeth Augustus*—age 16; completed her time at the Wawanosh, and sent home in charge of No. 10.
12. *Annie Jacobs*—age 16; had made excellent progress, and should have remained longer, but her mother was sick and wanted her home.
13. *Thomas Cromarty*—age 17; was three years at Shingwauk, and three years at Elkhorn; had become a most reliable, useful boy; but began to show symptoms of consumption, so was sent home last fall.
14. *Aleck Beesaw*—age 15; completed his time with us (partly at Shingwauk, partly at Elkhorn,) and went home in the fall.
15. *Joseph Charles*—age 13; very much troubled with Scrofula, so we thought it best for him to leave the Elkhorn Institution.
16. *Edward Eastman*—age 7; was very ill last spring with pneumonia and symptoms of consumption; taken home by his friends near Elkhorn, and soon after died.
17. *Jeremiah Slater*—age 10; was taken home by his mother when she left the Elkhorn Institution (having been cook there.)
18. *Ruth*—a heathen child, age 10; has left our Elkhorn Institution for the present, but we hope to get her back.
19. *Winona*—a heathen child, age 8; has left also, but will, we hope, return.
20. *Alice Slater*—left with her mother at the same time as No. 17.
21. *Elijah Crow*—age 14; we were disappointed with. He had been three years at the Shingwauk, could talk English well, but his removal to Elkhorn where he was near his friends seemed to have a bad effect with him. He ran away twice, and the second time we thought best not to take him back.
22. *Frank*—a heathen boy, age 15; was sent home sick from our Elkhorn School, and has since died.
23. *Rose*—a heathen child, age 10; went home sick and has not returned; but we hope ere long to have her back.
24. *Mary Wechahwejin*—age 13; was three years at our Elkhorn School. Her father, who lives at Moose Mountain, thought this long enough, and took her away.
25. *Albert Kennedy*—age 13; went home for holidays in the summer and has not returned.

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26. *Jessie Smith*—age 16; went home for holidays in the summer and will probably not return, as she is old enough to go out and work.

27. *Angus Prince*—age 7; was taken away by his mother when she left the Elkhorn Home (having been employed as laundress.)

28. *Mut-o-kin-ni*—a Blackfoot heathen boy, age 18; came to us in January, and remained until we began reducing our Elkhorn pupils in September, when he went home.

Ex-pupils still dependent on us for Support.

29. *John A. Maggrah*—an Ottawa, from Manitoulin Island, age 23; was five years at the Shingwauk; at present studies as a Divinity student, at St. John's College, Winnipeg; expenses met by the C. M. S., assisted (through us) by *Evangelical Churchman*. John was employed as a Catechist among the Fort Alexander Indians on Lake Winnipeg during the summer vacation.

30. *James Fox*—Delaware, age 19; is pupil-elect for Trinity College School, Port Hope, in place of Joseph Soney. He will be supported in part by St. Paul's Church Sunday School, London, Ont.

Now in Residence (or absent Temporarily.)

31. *Joseph Sampson*—age 20; Pottawatami, from Walpole Island; captain of the School; a communicant; is in the brass band and base ball club; has become an excellent shoemaker. During last few months he has been doing fourth class work, remaining all the day at School, as he is anxious to improve his education and then take up shoemaking as his trade. Supported by Holy Trinity Sunday School, Yarmouth, N.S.; has \$41 in our Savings Bank.

32. *William Soney*—age 15; Pottawatami, from Walpole Island, learning tailoring; belongs to brass band and base ball club. Supported by St. John's Sunday School, York.

33. *Isaiah Jacobs*—age 13; Delaware, from Moravian Town; at present learning tailoring, but hopes to be a Missionary; also learns telegraphing. Supported by Miss McWilliams, Berthier en haut.

34. *Absalom Fox*—age 20; brother of No. 30; a communicant; does chore work; member of the brass band and base ball club. Will be supported this year by Church of Ascension S. School, Toronto.

35. *John Solomon*—age 19, Ojebway, from Walpole Island; a communicant; good carpenter; belongs to the brass band and base ball club; has \$42 in our Savings Bank; supported by St. Paul's S. School, Toronto.

36. *Frederick Pratt*—age 17, Cree, from Manitoba; a communicant; learning carpentering; member of the brass band; supported by Trinity Sunday School, St John, N. B.

WAWANOSH HOME.

37. *Caroline Anthony*—age 16, Delaware, from Moravian Town; an orphan; a communicant; has been out to service for a little while and given excellent satisfaction. Supported by St. George's Mission Union, Lennoxville.

38. *Lily Anthony*—age 14, sister of 37. Supported by Trinity Ch. Sunday School, St. John, N. B. (in addition to 36.)
