OF THE

# Manitoba and North-West Conference

HELD AT WINNIPEG, MANITOBA, 20TH JUNE, 1889.

The Sixth Session of the Manitoba and North-West Conference of the Methodist Church was opened in the Grace Church, Winnipeg, Man., on Thursday, June 20th, 1889, at 9 o'clock.

REV. THOS. ARGUE, President of the Conference, announced the 753rd hymn. After the singing, REV. GEO. DANIEL, Secretary of the Conference, read the Scriptures. REV. JAMES WOODSWORTH, Superintendent of Missions, and REV. J. W. Bell led the Conference in prayer.

# OBITUARY.

### REV. I. N. ROBINSON.

Isaac Newton Robinson was born of English descent, near Peterboro', Ont., January 28th, 1850, and died in the faith, at Souris City, Manitoba, on September 14th, 1888.

Of Christian parentage, his mind and heart were early instilled with the precious love of the Saviour, and although his mother died while he was but four years of age, his boyhood days were rich with the promise of a useful manhood, unchecked by any youthful dissipation. He was bright as a child, apt as a student, and winsome and loving as a Christian. He was converted at thirteen years of age in a revival meeting held by Rev. D. A. Johnson, in the church on his father's farm, and there was a steady development of the Christian graces in his character from that time. The witness of the Spirit was so clear and constant, that he was never harassed by doubts and fears. He was devoted from the first to all the means of grace, both public and private, that are esteemed by Methodists; and, encouraged by his father's word and example, early took a part in the family devotions, also in the public services.

He commenced as exhorter, then was put on plan as local preacher; he was recommended and received as a probationer for the ministry at the age of twenty-one years.

He received a good education at the Peterboro' Collegiate Institute, and, having passed his Conference examinations, was ordained to the full work of the ministry in 1875. Previous to his ordination he travelled on the Cartwright, Stouffville, Darlington, and Markham Circuits, and Wooler and Shannonville Circuits afterwards, all in the Toronto Conference. Ten years of happy ministry were thus spent in Ontario, and in 1882 he was sent to Manitoba. Morris, Neepawa, and Souris City successively enjoyed his diligent pastoral care, on which fields he had precious fruit to his ministry. As a preacher, he was scriptural and earnest in his presentation of the truth, was successful in his pastoral and evangelistic work, and delighted in leading the children to Christ.

After a short, painful illness, he died of typhoid fever, leaving a widow and five children to mourn the loss of his loving, parental care. A memorial service was conducted at Souris City by the Revs. J. Woodsworth and T. B. Wilson, which was largely attended by the sorrowing flock over which he watched. The Chief Shepherd had called him to his reward.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The Board of Examiners report as follows:-

Forty-seven candidates presented themselves, of whom only twenty-two wrote upon the entire work prescribed for their respective years. To these, certificates were awarded, as follows:—In the fourth year, one first-class and two second-class. In the third year, two first-class. In the second year, one first-class, with honors: four first-class, and one second. In the first year, tive first-class. In the preliminary year, two first-class and four second-class.

The following regulations respecting candidates were adopted:-

Candidates who intend writing in preliminary course shall hereafter send intimation of the same to the Chairman of District in which they reside, not later than the first day of March.

Examiners shall forward to the Secretary of the Examining Board, not later than the first day of March, manuscript questions on each subject allotted to them, which shall be printed under the Secretary's supervision, and forwarded by him to Chairmen of Districts, not later than the fifteenth of March.

The Examinations shall be conducted in each District where there are candidates, on the third Wednesday in April, by the Chairman and members of the Board resident within the District. But in cases where the distances are very great, the President shall grant permission to Chairmen to arrange for examination of candidates under supervision of the nearest ordained minister.

Time shall be considered an element in the Examinations, and in all cases where time is set by an examiner, it shall be strictly adhered to.

We find that the assessment of last year has been paid by all the Districts excepting Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie, and Saskatchewan. A small overplus was paid by the Districts that met their assessment, leaving an actual deficiency of \$58.

# SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Annual Report of the Board for the year endiny July 31st, 1888.

I have pleasure in again presenting to the Board the Annual Exhibit of the state of the Fund.

Although the past year has been one of great stringency in money matters, the income of the Fund has been sufficient to meet the claims of the year, and to pay off the balance against the Fund, with which the year was commenced.

The amounts apportioned to the several Districts have been paid, with comparatively trifling exceptions, and the claimants have received their full

I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid allowances. ministers have been compelled to make up deficiencies which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in very few instances have I heard any complaint.

The estimates for the coming year have been very carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the percentage be no higher than six per cent. the same as last year, although that may leave a small deficiency against the Fund.

The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes. The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. account, as we w amount of our collected.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886 the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of our Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400 an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item.

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting this increased claim, by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

Í consider the estimates made by the Financial Committee of the General Conference to be moderate and approximately correct, and I think the whole of these apportionments will be required to meet the claims

against the Fund during the quadrennium.

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up till the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively. According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, I would just say here in addition, that one-half of the quadrennium is now past, and one-half of the estimated amount should be in the Treasurer's hands.

These figures speak more eloquently than any-What is to be done? This is a question properly thing I could say. belonging to the several Annual Conferences. That something should be done, and done generally and promptly, I think all will admit. The next meeting of the Annual Conferences should not be allowed to pass without very decided action. All the Conferences might not be disposed to take the same action; some might be disposed to adopt an additional collection to make up the balance, while others might prefer to do it by a private subscription among the friends of the Church. The amount should be raised in some way by each of the Conferences.

### REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Having now completed the work assigned them, and, from the papers as well as from the other sources of information placed at their disposal, prepared the usual Conference schedules, the Committee on Statistics beg leave to present the following synopsis of their work:—

A. Membership:-On Trial, 735; Full Members, 8,028; Increase, 1,815.

B. Ministerial Support:—Raised for Salary, Board and Fuel, \$34,544.25; In crease, \$5,962.25.

C. Grand Total: -Raised for all purposes, \$90,176.19; Increase, \$2,644.29.

Some of the work imposed on the Committee might have been avoided, and their efforts to present a correct report greatly facilitated, had all the schedules consulted by them been uniform. It is to be regretted the excellent regulation sanctioned by the Conference last year, viz.: that the Chairman and Secretary of e ch District be a Committee to prepare proper returns, and hand them to the Secretary of Conference in time for the first meeting of the Committee, was not, in every case, strictly carried out.

In the judgment of this Committee, all the District books should be carefully audited before the close of each District Meeting, and all the forms designed for the use of the various Committees properly filled up. Even if all these things were faithfully adhered to from year to year, it is extremely doubtful whether entire satisfaction could be thus guaranteed. It is very evident the Conference schedules would be vastly improved by the introduction of several additional columns, especially where it becomes necessary to tabulate the total amounts raised on the different Circuits. The Committee would consequently suggest the advisability of a general revision of all the schedules by the General Conference, thus enabling them to present not only more complete, but more correct, tables of "Statistical returns."

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg to express their gratification at the respect with which the Sabbath is observed in Manitoba and the North-West Territories generally.

We know of no country, so young as ours, where the Sabbath is regard-

ed with so great sanctity as this.

This we consider is due to the fact that the Missionary has, in ou country, gone side by side with the very first settler, and the leavening process of religion has thus retained its hold upon the heart of the people.

But viewing the large immigration into this country, and the tendency in the pressure of other matters to forget the claims of the Sabbath day, your Committee impress the necessity for untiring vigilance on the part of every minister and member of our Church to retain our present advanced position; and that we co-operate in every way possible with the other denominations to work for the continued and increased observance of the Sabbath.

And since the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada are desirous of strongly petitioning the Dominion Government for legislation in reference to Sabbath observance by railroads and other public corporations, we recommend that a copy of the petition be procured by each minister, and that they procure as many signatures thereto as possible, to aid the Alliance in this much-needed reform.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee, having had placed in their hands certain memorials, having carefully considered the same, beg leave to report as follows:—

1. We re-affirm the position always held by the Methodist Church, that as a Church we stand in direct opposition to the traffic in intoxicating drinks in all its forms, and are prepared to give our best assistance to any and every effort to lessen, restrict, or put a stop to the traffic. We believe the only true position for the Church or State is uncompromising

opposition and prohibition.

2. We believe the time has come when this Church should assert and affirm the logical outcome of its own principles, and declare that any one who will either sign a petition for the granting of a license, or use his influence to induce another to sign, is unfit for membership in our Church; and we recommend that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to the effect that the Discipline be so amended that any of our members so transgressing shall be liable to suspension or expulsion from membership in the Church, as may be determined by a court properly constituted on that behalf.

3. We rejoice in the good work done by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and other temperance organizations, and especially recommend that all our ministers and people be urged to give to any of these organizations, specially mentioning the Women's Christian Temperance Union, all the help in their power, in organizing or in their work

otherwise, in the advancement of our common cause.

4. Without specifically commending the "Third party," as a party, or any other party, we declare that we have no confidence in any party that refuses to place *Prohibition* as a distinct plank in its platform; and we think the time has come when all Christian people should lay aside mere party politics, and resolve, for conscience' sake, to use all their influence to secure Parliamentary reform, especially in this matter, ever remembering that the function of government is not at any time to regulate a wrong, but to suppress it. The power of the ballot ought always to be used as a sacred thing, only to put in Parliament men who are true to their principles of truth and righteousness.

Your Committee having heard that there is a movement on foot, looking toward the changing of our provincial license law, so as to permit of a license being granted on the petition of a less number of householders than sixteen out of the nearest twenty to the house for which license is sought; we respectfully recommend that, as a Conference, we affirm our approval of the license law as it now stands in that respect, and emphatically protest against, and urge all our people to use all lawful means to prevent, any change in the law looking toward the weakening of the restrictions now placed around the traffic. And we further urge that all our ministers and people use their best endeavors to enforce the law as it now stands.

6. Further, as section 57 of the present law provides for local prohibition, we urge our ministers and people to take steps, in conjunction with all who will assist, to secure the adoption of the said clause by the muni-

cipalities.

7. We also desire to enter our solemn protest against the violation of the principles and spirit of the prohibitory law of the Territories, by the granting of certain licenses to sell intoxicating liquors, by the Federal Government, and the granting of licenses, to sell four per cent. beer, by Gov. Royal. We believe that as long as any law is the law of the land, it ought to be respected and maintained inviolate, and enforced both by public and private citizens; being assured that any such setting aside of the law, by those in authority, must be disastrous in its effects on the moral tone of the citizens of our land—a thing to be greatly deprecated in any community.

8. We desire to record our emphatic disapproval of, and indignation at, the manifestations of rowdyism in the interest of the liquor traffic in various parts of our land. We exceedingly regret that the fair name of our Province has thus been dragged in the dust, and hope the officers of the law may use all their power to stamp out promptly all such unlawful and disgraceful demonstrations. Let the liquor traffic be destroyed.

That the trustees of the old parsonage property in Carberry be permitted to sell the building and lot; also, that the trustees of the church property in Carberry be allowed to sell 33 x 87 feet off the south-eastern end of their church lots, proceeds of the whole to be applied on the cost of a new parsonage in Carberry.

4. That the request of the Regina Board of Trustees to sell the old church and parsonage property, to apply proceeds to cost of new property

on a more eligible site, be granted.

5. We recommend that the Calgary trustees be permitted to sell the old church property, to apply the proceeds in the erection of a new church.

6. We recommend that a committee, consisting of Revs. J. Woodsworth, W. Bridgman, J. McDougall, J. McLean, Ph.D., and A. M. Peterson, be appointed to make inquiries relative to land grants and sites for educational purposes in Manitoba and the North-West, as the Committee shall deem it expedient in the interests of Methodism, with power to take action, and report to the next Annual Conference.

### SABBATH-SCHOOL REPORT.

We hail with sincere pleasure the results, to which our attention has been directed, in the communication of Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D., viz.:—

1. The number of scholars in our schools has increased since last tabulation by 13,284.

2. The number of conversions during the year, 34,000.

3. The number of officers increased by 2,389.

4. Number studying the Bible weekly, 236,949.

5. Number meeting in class belonging to our Sabbath-schools, 34,036.

6, We are pleased to notice an increase in our own publications for the past two years of nearly 40,000 copies.

7. We would draw special attention to Sabbath school Aid and Extension Fund, with its income of \$3,664.41, for the past year, an increase of \$1,052, and urge special attention thereto, both to its support and help in aiding poor schools.

We deeply regret that, owing to imperfect returns from Districts, arising from want of Schedules and lack of uniformity between Schedules and District Books, your Committee is not able to make a satisfactory report, especially of the funds of our Sabbath-schools

We would call the attention of Circuit and Mission Superintendents to the fact that, with two exceptions, they have neglected to report the number of Methodist children attending union Sabbath-schools, as required by Conference recommendation last year.

We have in active operation within the bounds of this Conference, 120 schools, increase 4; officers and teachers, 866, increase 98; scholars, 6,733, increase, 961.

During the year 468 have professed faith in Christ; increase, 161.

During the year 1,813 have taken the total abstinence pledge; increase, 740.

Contributions for Sabbath-school purposes, \$5,626.17; increase, \$1,981.63.

Your Committee recommend: -

- 1. That still greater efforts be made to place our own papers in our schools.
- 2. That we urge more strongly the duty of teaching the Methodist Catechism in our schools.
- 3. That, as far as possible, all officers and teachers be members of our Church.
  - 4. That District Conventions be organized in each District.
- 5. That Rev. W. G. Wilson be the Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year.

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### REPORT OF WESLEY COLLEGE.

The Board of Directors of Wesley College beg leave to submit the following Report:—

In pursuance of the resolutions of the last Conference, and to carry into effect the universal desire of the Methodists of Manitoba and the North-West, the Board took steps, as soon as practicable, to establish here a college that should meet the requirements of our Church. After a careful view of the whole situation, after much deliberation, and with a deep sense of the responsibility being assumed, it was decided to inaugurate the work of the College, engage a Principal and staff of Professors, and secure the necessary accommodation that a legal status might be obtained, and affiliation with the Provincial University, and the right to participate in the public moneys and stated endowments, appropriated and set apart for the promotion of higher education. To that end application was made to the Provincial Government, and last October Wesley College was duly affiliated, and thereby became entitled to, and now enjoys, all the rights and privileges in common with the other Colleges in Manitoba.

The selection and procuring of a qualified Principal and Professorial staff with the financial resources at the disposal of the Board involved numerous grave difficulties. The most gratifying success has, it is felt, crowned the persistent efforts of the Board in this matter. The Rev. Dr. Sparling came to the position of Principal with qualifications that gave ample assurance of undoubted ability and peculiar fitness. It is gratifying to know that all that was promised in regard to him has been realized. Professor Cochrane and Dr. Laird came with testimonials establishing their position as scholars and teachers of very high merit. The efficiency of the work performed during the past session amply attests the wisdom exercised in their selection. In his department M. Chevalier De La Mothe, as tutor, performed excellent work.

The Board has no hesitation in expressing the belief that Wesley College, with the present Professorial staff, composed of educationists of a high class and of modern thought and method, and with such assistance as is presently available, offers superior inducements to all desiring higher education, and deserves, and should command, the unanimous and cordial endorsation and support of the Methodist Church, and especially of that part of it in which her operations are specially carried on.

It is scarcely necessary to advise you that the financial resources of the Board are not at all commensurate with the work that is to be done. It may be stated shortly that the sum already contributed amounts to about \$3,500, which, except about \$100 in the Bursar's hands, has been disbursed in expenses incident to the inaugurating and maintaining of the College to the present time.

It is now desired to place the College on a more satisfactory and efficient footing, that the demands of our people may be gratified by having a College second to none in the Province. The Board, therefore, finds it

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irman. etary. necessary to ask for \$8,000 to meet the current year's expenses. Of this amount it is estimated that \$1,500 will be derived from old subscriptions, marriage license fees, fees from students and other sources; the sum of \$6,500 will, therefore, require to be raised by voluntary contributions. It must be admitted that this is a considerable sum, but certainly not sufficient to suggest discouragement; rather enough to elicit a united effort by all who desire to evince loyalty to Methodism, and a spirit worthy the descendants of those grand old fathers and founders of Methodism in Canada, who, amid much more adverse surroundings and with less promising prospects, established institutions for higher education from which Canada has in a general way drawn immense benefit, while as Methodists we have and enjoy results beyond all computation Church in this College has an object of interest that should excite alike its most considerate regard and fostering care. The history of our Church teaches the paramount importance of constantly associating education, refinement and culture with religious instruction as the only certain method of best securing the ends Methodism seeks to attain. The time has fully arrived here when our best efforts should be enlisted in developing our work on well-defined and approved lines. The establishment and maintenance of a college is among the first steps in this direction. With the illustrious examples Methodism affords of heroic enterprise and daring resolve to anticipate the needs of the times, we cannot, we dare not, hesitate before any undertaking that is so essential to our denominational growth and prestige, and the great purpose and aim of our existence as a College must be considered. The raising by the Church of so considerable a sum as \$6,500 for this particular work will call into requisition the cordial unanimity and enthusiastic efforts of our whole Conferential Connexion.

It will not be permitted for any one to excuse himself by the effort of another. The conscience of each will acquit or accuse as each may or may not be able to say, I did what I could. By the concerted and sustained effort of all, there need be no dread about the raising of the required sum. Lack of sympathetic effort and co-operation may bring partial failure and disappointment; but no one, we feel persuaded, will venture to contribute by his negligence or lack of proper regard for duty to an end that must bring humiliation upon this Conference and upon the name of Methodism. We are at a crisis in our educational work in this Province, and as on a memorable occasion the most distinguished loyalty and valor were elicited and a magnificent victory achieved under the inspiration of the patriotic exclamation, "England expects every man to do his duty," so we look for similar results in our educational affairs under a similar exhortation, "Every man is expected to do his whole duty," and, if need be, even more than he may consider his duty, to carry this, to us, great enterprise to a successful issue.

The raising of the money named, it will be understood, is only a part of the duty imposed and referred to. The interests of the College may be forwarded in many other ways, and no opportunity to accomplish this should be allowed to pass unimproved. There are throughout the Province many who will shortly be students in some of the Colleges. We should feel ourselves charged with the duty of seeing that these attend the

best institution Methodists in t assured that W Board will feel be made by eac possible.

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sum, but to elicit best institution, and with the generous support that has so characterized Methodists in the past, and which we now confidently anticipate, we feel assured that Wesley College may be safely recommended as the best. The Board will feel greatly encouraged with an assurance that every effort will be made by each one to secure as large an attendance of students as possible.

It is desired that all moneys shall be remitted to the Bursar, Mr. J. H. Ashdown, as promptly as possible. With the remittance there should be a detailed statement showing the source of the contribution, that proper credits may be made. A lack of attention to this request will create difficulty and confusion. It is thought that in each case convenience will be consulted if each Superintendent shall be regarded as responsible for the collection and transmission of the assessments on his own Circuit.

The Board has been disappointed in not receiving from certain Circuits and Missions the amounts assessed. It is unnecessary to point out what embarrassments might and likely will result from default occurring in this way. There should be no delay in having the amounts made up at once. The manifest injustice of some contributing their share, and others failing to do so, need not be dwelt upon. We can scarcely hope for success if any fail to regard obligations that the Church fairly imposes.

Having regard to the action lately taken by the Conference, the Board has adopted the following resolutions regulating the fees to be paid by students:—The annual charge for incidentals shall be \$10, payable by all. The tuition fees shall be \$5 per term, payable by all except such as may be appointed by Conference, and are not proceeding to a degree in Arts, which it is hoped will quite meet your wishes.

It is scarcely necessary to remind you of the wholly exceptional position in which our people are placed, in their effort to establish and maintain a College in a country that must be considered missionary. In most instances, our people are making a start for themselves, while, in the majority of cases, they lately went, or are still going, to parts of the country in which Methodism must receive its first impulse. A burden of expense is thus placed upon a few whose claims to assistance have not thus far, it is thought, received that consideration, by those having control of the Connexional Funds, that was deserved. The results of the operations of the College must form a very important factor in the promotion of the interests of the Missionary Society, and should, it is thought, rank on that Fund in sums proportionate to the importance of the work and the services rendered. The Board will be glad to have the endorsation of Conference to assist them in receiving from the Missionary Funds of the Church such grants as may be deemed proper under the circumstances.

The Church in Manitoba and the North-West has, from year to year, contributed most generously to the Educational and other Connexional Funds. At the time the apportionment of the Educational Fund was made, Wesley College was not in existence, and consequently no provision was made for her. It was thought by the Board that all liberality would be exercised in considering the claims Wesley College undoubtedly has on the Church at large, and that particular attention should be drawn to our anomalous and apparently unfair position, in consequence of which it was

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resolved by the Board that we should press upon the Educational Society the importance and justice of Wesley College participating in the Educational Fund of the Church. We would express the opinion that liberal treatment by the Church toward us now will, in the future, be to the great advantage of all the Connexional Funds and institutions. If the proportion of this Fund, to which Wesley College is manifestly entitled, were in the hands of the Board now, it would form a very great help.

Provision was made for paying the travelling expenses of probationers permitted to attend Victoria University. As all these will in the future attend Wesley College, it is thought this amount should be diverted to assist in the maintenance of the latter.

The Board unanimously resolved to request that a collection be taken up at each appointment, once during the year, expressly for Wesley College, such collection to form part of the assessment. It is desired that this collection shall in no way interfere with the collection ordered for the Educational Society of our Church.

The Board are happy to be able to record their satisfaction with the results of the first year's work. Relying upon the loyalty of our people, the brilliant achievements and prospects of Methodism in this country, and the cordial sympathy and co-operation of all who should, and doubtless will, unhesitatingly, lend a helping hand to the establishment of a connexional College that shall be the pride and glory of our Church in the years to come, we anticipate the future with calm confidence. Fully appreciating what is involved in the undertaking, and with unwavering faith, we rely upon the characteristic generosity of our people, and the promised blessing of the Great Master upon everything that is undertaken in His name, and for the promotion of His glory.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee having learned that the Rev. Jas. Woodsworth, our Superintendent of Missions, has prepared an exhaustive report on the State of the Work, resolved that it be adopted as the report of this Committee.

REPORT.

A review of the year's operations reveals a gratifying measure of pros-

perity in all departments of Church work.

Our operations have been considerably extended, especially in the Province of Manitoba. Revivals of religion have been general, and financial returns remarkably good, as will be evident from the following comparative exhibit:—

Number of Circuits and Missions last year, classified as follows:—Self-sustaining charges, supporting two men (one married and one single), 4; supporting one married man, 18; supporting one single man, 3; making a total of twenty-five self-sustaining charges, supporting twenty-nine men—Domestic Missions, 52; Indian Missions, 13; total, 90.

Number of Circuits and Missions 1889 90, classified as follows:—Self-sustaining charges, supporting two men (one married one single), 5; supporting one married man, 27; supporting one single man, 3; making a total of thirty-five self-supporting charges, employing in all 40 men:—Domestic Missions, 62; Indian Missions, 13; total, 110.

Number of preaching appointments or stations, 1887-88, 368; 1889-

90, 424; increase, 57.

Membership of last year:—Indians, 1,087; Whites, 5,923; total, 7,010.

Membership of this year:—Indians, 1,048; Whites, 7,777; total, 8,825. Increase, 1,815.

Number of churches last year, 78; number of churches this year, 81;

Number of parsonages last year, 53; number of parsonages this year, 57; increase, 4.

Moneys raised last year:—For Missions, \$6,503.16; for Superannuation Fund, \$1,894.17; all other purposes, \$79,134.57; total, \$87,531.90.

Moneys raised this year: —For Missions, \$8,158.48; for Superannuation Fund, \$2,329.98; for all other purposes, \$79,687.54; total, \$90,687.54.

A comparison with the State of the Work in 1883-4, the first year of our existence as a Conference, shows rapid development:

By request of the General Secretary, Bro. John McDougall and Superintendent of Missions, paid a visit to the Indian Missions on Lake Win-

The removal of Bros. Ross, Langford and Semmens was greatly regretted by the people on their respective charges. The work accomplished by them was genuine in its character, and no doubt will prove lasting in its results. At each of these Missions we have a very interesting cause, good churches, comfortable parsonages, and a devoted membership.

Special mention should be made of the fidelity and success of Bro. Edward Paupanakis, who discharged the duties of school teacher and missionary during the Conference year of 1887-88, a task which involved heavy labor, and considerable self-denial to himself and family. His character, deportment and work were referred to by the Chief Factor of the Hudson Bay Co., and by the Indians under his charge, in the most complimentary terms.

It is a matter of regret that the people of Oxford, (Oxford, R. Brooking, 1854) and Nelson River, so long regarding themselves as members and adherents of the Methodist Church, and so regarded by others, should have been so irregularly supplied by our own Church with religious services. Their distant location from Norway House, together with their geographical relation to each other, render it impossible for the Norway House Missionary to serve them only to a limited extent. The appointment of Edward Paupanakis to Oxford will provide for the holding of religious services at that point and others within reach.

An ordained Missionary should be sent to Nelson River, where a large number of Indians live, who are looking to the Methodist Church to supply them with educational advantages and religious teaching. Now that Bro. Eves has become settled at Norway House, and Bro. McHaffie at Fisher River, these two important Missions may look for a continuance of the prosperity which has in general marked their past. A suitable teacher having been appointed to Beren's River school, Bro. Butler will be at

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liberty to do more extensive, as well as more efficient, work as a Missionary. These Northern Missions constitute a field that will pay for cultivation. The people appreciate the efforts of the Church made on their behalf. Their improved spiritual, mental and social condition is evidence of the beneficial effects of Gospel teaching and Christian example. The changes in our fields and new ground occupied will involve the employment of twenty-one additional men, though, perhaps, not more than ten will be added to the list of those stationed on Missions whose support will come in part from the Missionary Society.

Great difficulty has been experienced in procuring suitable men for our work. Its character and importance are not fully or adequately appreciated in the Eastern Provinces, whence we look largely for our supplies. There is great need for the Church to urgently pray that the Lord would raise up more laborers and send them forth into these fields which are already white with the harvest.

### COMMITTEE ON JESUITS' ESTATES ACT.

We, the members of the Manitoba and North-West Conference of the Methodist Church, desire at this critical juncture in the history of liberty in Canada, to place ourselves on record in the most emphatic manner, as a united Conference, in our unqualified condemnation of the Act incorporating the Society of Jesus and the Jesuits' Estates Act.

Knowing as we know, that the aim and purpose, and the very constitution of the order of Jesuits are subversive of both religious and civil liberty, and contrary to the most sacred principles of our constitutional government, we cannot but view with consternation, as well as with unyielding hostility, the encroachments which, through such Acts as these, the Roman Catholic Church is making upon our most cherished Protestant faith and the rights given to us by our fathers.

We condemn the order, as an alien society, the enemy of social peace, and the happiness of our homes, and as the emissary of the dark counsels of the Church of Rome, for the overthrow of civil freedom.

We condemn its teachings, as baneful to moral purity and virtue, and to the progress of the pure and undefiled religion of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We condemn its iniquitous endeavor through the passing of the Acts above recited, to appropriate to its nefarious ends, funds which belong to

the people.

We condemn the Acts as unconstitutional, and the latter Act especially, as a flagrant violation of the Supremacy Act and the sovereign rights of our beloved Queen; and we pledge ourselves to use most strenuous efforts to procure the disallowance, voidance, or repeal of those Acts, and to stamp out every incipient or growing organization or scheme whose tendency like that of the Society of Jesuits, is against good government and morality, and the Protestant faith of our land.

The action of the majority of Parliament upon the question of the disallowance of the Jesuits' Estates Act, has destroyed our confidence in the present political parties, and has convinced us that both parties are pandering to Rome and Jesuitical influences, and we deem it right and imperative that an organization which has so blinded and led our lawgivers apart from the righteousness which exalteth a nation and a nation's repre-

sentatives should be forever crushed out of existence.

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### PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

### MANITOBA CONFERENCE, 1889.

Beloved Brethren,—We are heartily glad of another opportunity of addressing you from our Annual Conference. The promise of our Divine Master, "For I am with you always," has been manifestly fulfilled by the evidence of His presence during all the sessions. The review of the past year's work has been most satisfactory, and our public anniversaries have been seasons of great pleasure and marked spiritual profit.

### MEMBERSHIP.

It is a cause for profound thankfulness that, after deducting all removals from the membership roll, we have received during the year additions which now give us a net increase of 1,815. Some of this addition has been made up of persons from the Eastern Conferences, who have been gathered in by our missionaries engaged on frontier stations, and who might otherwise have been lost to our united Church. But by far the larger portion is composed of persons received on trial, mainly the fruits of revival work, in which our pastors and working laymen have been greatly assisted on many Circuits by Bros. D. W. Savage and G. McLachlan, and Bros. Crossley and Hunter. Beyond the mere numerical result, we are glad to inform you, that a better spiritual tone seems to prevail throughout the various Circuits than has been observed in the past. This work of soul-saving and spiritual upraising is undoubtedly our great object, and we trust that both ministers and people will keep this ever before them.

### CALLED HOME.

One of our most highly esteemed and beloved brethren, Rev. I. N. Robinson, the Chairman of the Brandon District, has been called, after a very brief illness, to his reward. All the rest of our ministers have been preserved, notwithstanding the arduous toils and frequent exposure incident to the opening up of a new and often very sparsely settled country.

### MINISTERIAL SUPPLY.

We are thankful to be able to report that our numerous stations have been much more generally supplied than during any previous year. Yet so great has been the developments of the country, especially in southern Manitoba, that fully forty new men are required to meet the demand, and fill the places vacated by some who have been transferred from the Conference to other parts of our work. While in the East, our Superintendent of Missions succeeded in inducing about twenty-six men to offer themselves for our work. We appreciate this success very highly. But we are deeply conscious that the time has come when we ought to look more thoughtfully to the young men of our own Circuits to supply the work.

Let us then, dear brethren, have your hearty co-operation in prayer, that God would raise up laborers for His harvest. Let our young men be set at work in holding prayer meetings in outlying places, in conducting classes, or other Church work, for while so employed, they will be much more likely to learn and obey the voice of God calling them into His vineyard, than they would if neglecting these home duties.

### WESLEY COLLEGE.

For the first time in the history of our Conference, we are enabled to report something actually accomplished in educational lines. Our Wesley College, which was organized and duly officered last autumn, has had a prosperous year. Without in any way discounting other educational institutions, we may be allowed to say that with such an efficient staff of professors, we do not fear being able to hold our own alongside of our sister colleges of the North-West. Some fears were entertained respecting the financial support of this Institution, but the money has come in fairly well. With the united effort of the ministers and the Methodist people, in standing by the College, we are confident that the best results will follow. Principal Sparling hopes to be able to visit many of the Circuits during the year in the interests of the Institution. It is hoped that all our friends having students requiring college training, will send to Rev. J. Sparling for circular explaining the advantages which Wesley College is able to offer

### SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The excellent report of the Sabbath-school Conventions, to be published in the Minutes of Conference, shows that this great movement for the benefit of the young is doing a grand work for our people everywhere. There is an increase during the year of four schools and 961 scholars; 468 conversions are reported among our scholars.

### HARMONY.

We are glad to find throughout our work the best of harmony and peace prevailing, and our brethren seem content to abide by our historic usages. Both ministers and people are resolved that whatever changes the spirit of the times may indicate, as important and desirable, shall be brought about within peaceful and constitutional lines.

### DOCTRINES, ETC.

Entering now upon the duties of another Conference year, we trust that you will with us resolve to adhere closely to the doctrines, discipline and usages of our Church. A free and full salvation from all sin is our happy privilege, let all seek earnestly its complete realization. Our means of grace, especially the class-meeting, might be more faithfully and wisely observed than they are in some sections of the country. Scattered populations and irregular services in many new places, account in part for the neglect of class-meeting. And even when these hindrances are removed, a careless habit still lingers, and many could attend more regularly than they do.

### FAMILY WORSHIP.

We feel it our duty to remind you of the unspeakable advantages of family prayer. How can we hope for the Divine blessing upon our homes unless the Lord himself be regularly and avowedly acknowledged there?

### LITERATURE.

In the rush of business engagements which marks our Western civilization we trust that you will not lose sight of the importance of supplying yourselves and your families with sound reading matter in plentiful supply. Our energetic and painstaking Book Steward, Rev. W. Briggs, D.D., Toronto, keeps well ahead in preparing everything on these lines, and will be glad to furnish the best at lowest prices and with commendable despatch. Our Christian Guardian is still worthy your hearty support. We wish it was in every Methodist family in Canada. Our Magazine and Sunday school papers need only to be seen to be appreciated, and their circulation is now astonishingly great.

### TEMPERANCE.

On the subject of Temperance and Prohibition we never required to be more in earnest than at present. The year now past will long be regarded as a period of numerous and continuous defeats for the friends of Prohibition. All the counties and cities of Canada, where the local Prohibition law was in force have repealed the Act, except the County of Elgin, and this will probably follow suit at the approaching election. In the Territories the shadow on the dial of politics has apparently gone backward many degrees in regard to Temperance and Prohibition. In addition to the licenses granted to the Canada Pacific Rail ay dining cars, and the hotels at Bauff, and permits for sale of beer of a strength of four per cent. in all centres of population, and frequent permits for domestic uses, the enforcement of the present law is now so difficult that it seems little more than a dead letter on the statute book. Still we cannot believe that Canadians as a whole are less desirous of Prohibition than they have been. The recent movements indicate that existing forms of Prohibition have been weighed in the balance and found wanting, and already, forces are being gathered and marshalled for the grand struggle of Dominion Prohibition of the liquor traffic. Our people have stood firmly to principle in the past, and we are confident they will do so in the future, for it will be a conflict that will test our courage and fidelity.

### HORSE-RACING, ETC.

We regret to find that horse-racing is becoming very common in many localities, so also is promiscuous dancing, and other diversions which we do not believe can be taken in the name of the Lord. We have no other object in calling your attention to these things than the good of the individual and the glory of God. And we are sure that the rule of the Discipline is a good and necessary one, and will not be considered a hardship, if only it be rightly understood and observed.

### SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We are glad to record our high estimate of the movement on behalf of a better observance of the Sabbath-day among the various Churches of

This improvement has not at all been confined to Canadian lines, but in the United States also, especially on all roads connected with the Vanderbilt system, there seems to be a determination that there shall be no more Sabbath labor than such as may be actually required in the interest of mercy and real necessity.

STATIONING.

Again our brethren have been stationed on the various Circuits and Missions according to the best ability of the important Committee having this grave responsibility upon them. When it is remembered that every member of this Committee is there as a chosen representative by the united suffrages of ministers and laymen—men chosen for their known ability, experience, and piety, as well adapted for this work and most likely to do their best to send the right man to the right place—without claiming infallibility of judgment, we are free to say that in every case the Committee has done the best it could under the circumstances and with their knowledge of the entire Conference; and we confidently believe that our esteemed brethren, official and non-official, will heartily co-operate with all their ministers in seeking the salvation of souls and advancing the well-being of the Methodist churches under their charge.

Finally, brethren, let us all with renewed consecration present our bodies to God as a living sacrifice, and see that we be renewed in the spirit of our minds, keeping Christ in our midst, for without Him we can do nothing.
