New York, July 25—An Associated Press cable from London says:—
"Apparently the status of Ireland has gone steadily from bad to worse ever since the Sinn Fein rising on Easter Sunday, for at present the country is in the hands of a temporary and make-shift government composed of a commission of judges assisted by Major General Sir John Maxwell, commander of the British forces in Ireland, who still is maintaining military control over most of the ordinary police functions.

"There is no viceroy in the place of Baron Wenborne, former Lord Leutenant of Ireland, and, since Premier Asquith's announcement that the Dublin rebellion had been an utter failure, none is likely to be appointed. The office of Augustine Birrell, ex-chief secretary for Ireland, remains unfilled.

The firing kept up all day, Belore we came away the horses had got quite used to it.

"I and four others in the afternoon were having a little session. I held for lixes and had just made it two fprines to draw, early when an anti-aircraft shell whizzed down a few yards off. I hunched my shoulders and bet five francs, which made them all quit but one. He raised me five and I saw him. He had four nines. We live in the open absolutely, sleeping on the ground, having the sky as a roof. Everyone seems more contented and bright."

CANADIANS IN LONDON.



At Pozieres, the Australians are still fighting furiously with the Germans for possession of the village and the head of the road leading from it to Bapaume, and the greater part of the village is now reported to be in their hands. There has been a diminution in the viclous fighting which began Saturday night along the British front from Thiepval to Guillemont. A condition of comparaalong the British front from Thiepval to Guillemont. A condition of comparative quiet prevails south of the Somme along the French line, where the only fighting reported—and that of a minor engagement—resulted in the French capturing a German battery south of Estrees. Eastward, in the Verdun region, the French have occupied a German redoubt west of Thiaumont, taking with it five machine guns and two score of prisoners.

Berlin still asserts that the only result of the British attack Sunday along the Thiepval-Guillemont line was the penetration of a few houses in the village of Posieres, and that the Australians obtained these only after having suffered sanguinary losses.

That German troops have been removed from the Verdun front for the Somme operation is apparent from the German statement that the Brandenburg Grenadiers, of "Douaumont fame," defeated the British in the fight Sunday at Longueval.



His proposal, he said, therefore was modified as follows:

"Until dissolution Irish members of parliament remain undiminished, afterwards the provisions of the home rule act should become operative, but the Irish members should be summoned in undiminished numbers whenever parliament considers the final settlement."

Sir Edward Carson said that when he went into negotiations he thought only off what was best to help win the war, compared with which home rule or anything else mattered little. He would never have touched the negotiations, except as a war measure, and had made it perfectly clear from the beginning that the six Ulster counties must be struck definitely out of the home rule act. He was not asking, however, for permanent exclusion, Sir Edward added. No settlement made by this parliament could be permanent. He stood by the agreement announced by the prime minister, that the Ulster counties could be included without a bill. Concluding, Sir Edward appealed to the Nationalist members not to lose all the good that had come out of the negotiations.

William O'Brien, leader of the Independent Nationalists, said, "fortunately for England and for Ireland the partition plot is dead and damned. Millions of the Irish race will rejoice, with all their hearts, tomorrow over its death."
