

SHIPS SUFFER

NERVE BREAKDOWN

Two Collisions.

The four-masted lumber schooner Perry S. Setzer was almost cut in two, and its skipper, Captain A. J. Wilson, of Fairhaven, Mass., killed outright at the time of its collision with some unidentified craft, off Diamond shoals, North Carolina, Saturday morning. About that time only a few miles away, the starboard bow of the City of Montgomery ripped into another unidentified craft.

Joseph D. Wood reported that he had the Setzer in tow until the schooner broke away in the storm.

Capt. Wilson, master of the schooner, had refused to abandon his ship despite its water-logged condition, and his crew stuck with him. The schooner was in an almost helpless condition when it broke away and was struck by the unidentified craft. The eight members of its crew after clinging to the rigging of the almost submerged ship were finally rescued by the oil tanker Solana, 15 miles north of Cape Hatteras, 12 hours after the collision.


