HOW A BANKER
LOST \$100,000

Arrests in Paris Bare Story of Fraud in Troy, N. Y.

"Friends" He Met at Savoy Bar, London, Show Norwegian Banker the Signs in New York—After Winning \$50,000 He Lays Ten \$10,000 Notes on a Race, and the Horse Loses.

The story of how Eric Skogstad, a Norwegian bank president, was parted from ten \$100,000 bills in the peaceful town of Troy, New York, was revealed upon cabled advice of the arrest in Paris of a pair of international swindlers.

Skogstad has gone back to Norway minus \$100,000 and the incidental expenses of a sightseeing trip out of New York City which he was piloted by two jovial and apparently innocent strangers, said to be the pair arrested in an indictment charging the pair and two others, not yet apprehended, with conspiracy to defraud.

And once they were sure the alleged principals in the affair were under lock and key, the authorities disclosed the unfortunate outcome of the banker's venture abroad under the tutelage of men whose propensities portended a return to the Rogues' Gallery at New York Police Headquarters reserved for international confidence men.

They Meet at the Savoy Bar. When Skogstad decided to visit America last October, he booked passage on the Aquitania and went to London to await the vessel's departure from Southampton. At that famed meeting place for strangers the Savoy bar, two friendly men contrived Skogstad's acquaintance. Soon the banker knew that one of them was John Prescott of Melbourne, and the other Arthur Ernest Cox, Londener and globe trotter.

The banker found his new-found friends most distressing when he told them he was to sail for America. But their chagrin that he was not to ferry him to London vanished when he named the Aquitania and its sailing date. By a happy chance Prescott and Cox were on the very same ship. It was particularly fortunate for Mr. Skogstad because Prescott knew New York like a book and could guard him from the pitfalls ever-lurking in the path of unwary visitors.

Prescott, Cox and Skogstad had a pleasant crossing. The acquaintance had been cemented into friendship by the time the liner nosed her way up the Hudson, so it was perfectly natural that the three should choose the same hotel. They went to the Vanderbilt and looked the town over for a day or two.

Prescott dilated on the beauties of the countryside in the fall and suggested a drive along the Hudson—say as far as Albany. Skogstad and Cox were pleased, and presently the trio found themselves dining luxuriously at the Hotel Ten Eyck in the state capital.

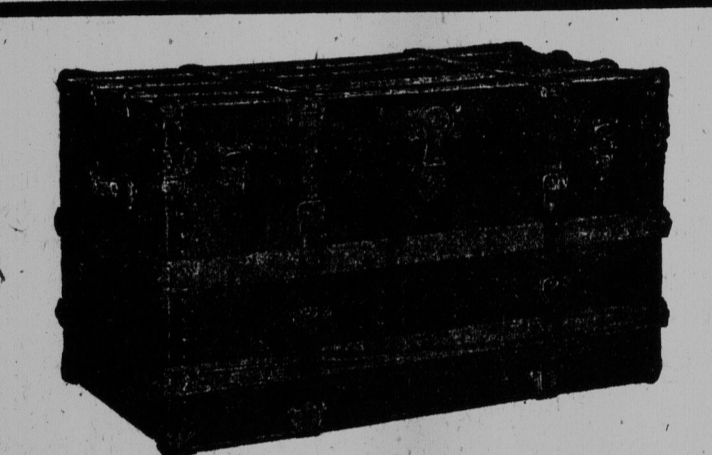

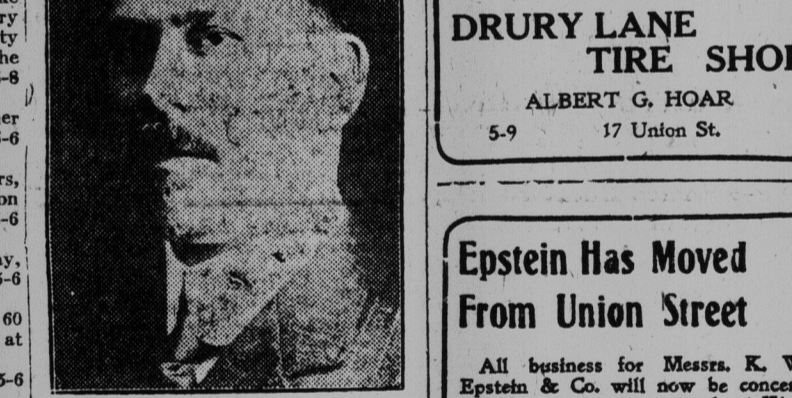

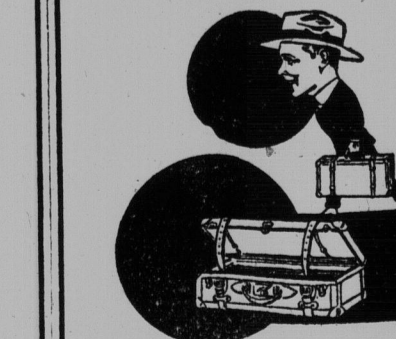

WOMAN, ONCE RICH SENTENCED FOR THEFT

Stole for Sick Mother, She Says, But Receives Six-Month Term in Penitentiary.

When Miss Clara Lovett, thirty-eight years old, received in special sessions in New York an indefinite sentence of from six months to three years in the penitentiary for the theft of more than \$1,000 worth of merchandise from Kool & Co.'s West 125th street department store, she told the court that she stole the articles to aid her sick mother.

Miss May Magan, a probation officer, told Justices Edwards, Herbert and O'Keefe that she had learned that Miss Lovett's father was for many years a prosperous merchant in Hackensack, N. J., and maintained a fine home, carriages and servants for his family.

TRUE PLEADS INSANITY.

British Major on Trial for Killing a Woman "Abnormal From Youth."

London, May 5.—The prosecution has rested in the case of Major Ronald True, formerly of the Royal Flying Corps and for some time resident in the United States, who is being tried for the murder of Gertrude Yatis, also known as Olive Young. The woman's body was found March 1 in the bathroom of her flat in Kensington.

Sir Henry Curtis Bennett, counsel for the defense, said he would prove that True had been insane for some time past and had been abnormal from early youth. He mentioned two serious airplane accidents that True had, and said medical evidence would show that he was a morphia maniac and a homicidal maniac.

References were made by witnesses to True's visit to America, mentioning San Francisco and Buffalo. The defense brought out testimony that the defendant once proposed the forming of a "murderers' club."

True's wife testified that she met her husband in New York in 1917 and that he told her truthfully that he had been in France. True was engaged by the American government as a flying instructor at Mineola, while she, an actress, was on tour. The witness declared the defendant began taking drugs in 1919 and that while they were in West Africa he made a will containing a strange bequest to their child.

FRENCH GIFT FOR LEGION

War Ministry to Present Painting to American Body Saturday.

Paris, May 5.—Presentation of the picture "America," by the French Ministry of War to the American Legion will take place Saturday afternoon. The painting, which was ordered especially by the war-ministry from its official painter, Rene-Mel, depicts an American soldier with his right arm around a wounded French poilu, supporting him, while with his left he is warding off the enemy.

The presentation will be made officially by Minister of War Maginot to Colonel Cabot Ward, head of the American Legion in Europe, representing National Commander MacNider. Marshal Foch will deliver a short speech, to which Ambassador Herriot will reply. The painting will be shipped to the U. S. later.

WHOS WHO IN CHINESE WAR.

General Chang Tso-Lin, Governor of Manchuria, and a former bandit, was the chief opponent of the recent Administration of President Hui-Shih Chang.

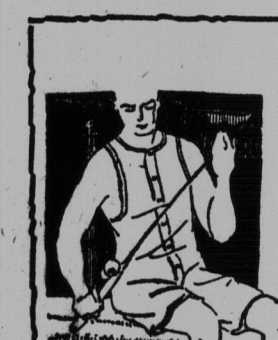
He is very wealthy and has been manoeuvring for what he termed a more representative government in China. General Sun Yat Sen is the founder of the South China Republic, which he set up.

General Wu Pei-Fu has been in control of the provinces of Hunan and Hupoh in Central China, and has been the guardian of the present Administration, although only lukewarm toward the president. Generals Chang and Sun Yat Sen recently held a conference at Mukden to thrash out China's difficulties. It was agreed that Sun was to be made President of China and Chang Vice-President. Sun eventually seized Peking and one of the main railroads leading into the city.

Wu Pei-Fu then demanded that President Hsu immediately force the evacuation of Peking by Chang or he would attack. He charged that Chang was setting back a dictatorship. This demand was refused, and Chang launched an attack upon the forces of Wu Pei-Fu.

Gen. Sun recently announced that, in view of the agreement at the Mukden conference, he would start troops north to join forces with General Chang.

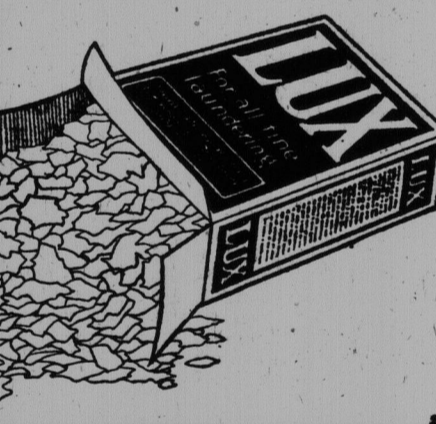

BROTHER OF A DIGBY MAN SLAIN

During the war platinum was held by the government at a fixed price of \$108 an ounce—a trifle more than five times the value of gold. Today one can buy it for \$75 an ounce. Some platinum comes from Colombia, but the main source of the world's supply is in the district of Perm, in the Ural Mountains. Nuggets of large size are rare; the biggest ever found, weighing twenty-one and two-third pounds, is in the Deuloff Museum at St. Petersburg.

Platinum is used in many industries. It is indispensable in the "contact process" for making sulphuric acid and in plants for the fixation of nitrogen. Chemical laboratories could not get along without it; it is used in dentistry, and for various electrical purposes it is a necessity.

The Bureau of Mines has been trying to find substitutes for platinum, and with some success, though none has been yet discovered that will meet certain chemical requirements or serve for "high-duty" electrical contacts. While gold is one of the most promising, being not attacked by nitric acid. Another available for various electrical purposes, is composed of 70 per cent silver, 25 per cent palladium and 5 per cent cobalt.

POLITICS IN THE OLD COUNTRY

Effect of Genoa on Prospect of the Elections.

Some Social Functions of the Coming Season in London—Traffic in Cocaine—Premier as Follower of Movies—The Derby.

(From our own Correspondent.)

London, April 28.—The general expectation seems to be that we are now in for a somewhat tranquil political interval. This is based on the Easter recess and the prime minister's absence at Genoa. It hardly takes account of the threatening character of two very serious domestic problems, those presented by conditions in Ireland and in the industrial world, neither of which can be regarded as decidedly hopeful. Nor does this optimism quite pay adequate attention to the attitude of the die-hard, who usually seize on the prime minister's absence to stir up some unexpected trouble, and just now are smarting under the sting of their recent trouncing on the floor of the House of Commons by Austen Chamberlain. Folks are talking now of the general election having been definitely postponed until, at earliest, the autumn. As to this matter, I will wait for Genoa developments. That crucial test of the prime minister's capacity in the role of political Hercules may have the most sudden and sensational denouement.

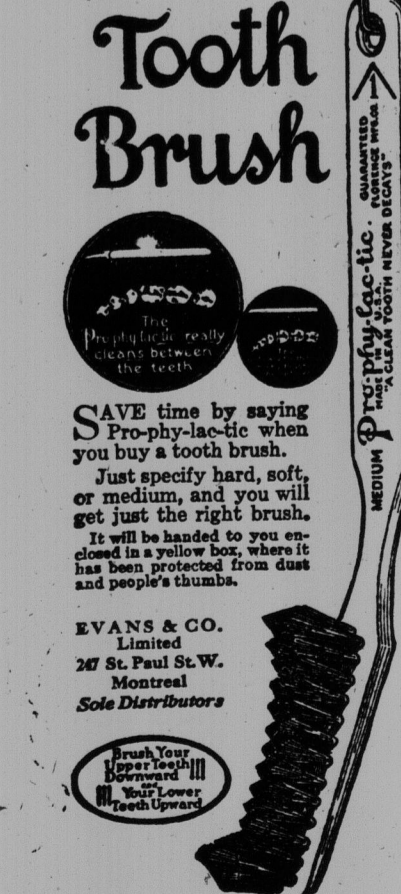
London's Busy Season.

It is now possible to enumerate some of the most important functions which will go to make the forthcoming season in London one of the busiest for many years. In fact, it promises to be very great extent to approach pre-war standards. One of the first functions which the king and queen will perform after the return of the court to town during the first few days of May will be a visit to the Royal Academy. I should not be surprised to find that the royal visit will be on the first Sunday, in the afternoon.

The king and the queen are much interested in art, and delight to wander through the galleries at their leisure, and Sunday afternoon affords this facility without any interference with the public days. Then comes the state visit to Belgium, and during May there are one or two race meetings which the king will attend, and Derby week will see the king and queen at Epsom for the race on the 1st and the Oaks on June 2. A fortnight later follows Ascot week, when the court will be at Windsor Castle again.

Among the town engagements which will be honored by Their Majesties is the military tournament at Olympia, which will open on May 18, and almost immediately followed by the International Horse Show, which this year, I am told, promises to surpass all past ones.

The Paris-London Air Disaster.

The chances against such an accident as that which has befallen the Paris-London Air Service were about a million to one, and it was the million-to-one chance that happened. Probably in the fog which prevailed the pilots did not catch a glimpse of each other until they were a few yards apart, and no human skill could then have avoided collision. Both machines were flying low on account of the dense mist, and they were traveling in opposite directions on the same route. Unfortunately there are no means of signalling in the air such as enable ships to give warning to each other. Anything in the nature of sound-signalling would be useless, since any conceivable signal of this kind would be drowned by the roar of the engines. Nevertheless the accident is sure to give an impetus to those inventive minds seeking some means whereby air pilots may signal their whereabouts to each other in foggy weather.

The Cocaine Traffic.
It is satisfactory to learn that the police are continuing their campaign against the traffic in cocaine and other deadly

drugs which was so long allowed to go on almost with impunity. Even when public indignation was stirred by successive tragedies, the tendency at first was to seek out the root of the evil in the east rather than in the west end of London. Limeshouse and Chiswick no doubt, continue to have an unsavory reputation, but everyone outside Scotland Yard was perfectly well aware that Shaftesbury avenue and other thoroughfares branching off from Piccadilly Circus were the streets in which the most active traffic was going on.

Attention is now being directed to the public houses as well as to the night clubs, which abound in this part of the west end, and though it is hopeless to expect traffic in "the snow" ever to be entirely stamped out, the business of procuring it should be rendered as difficult as possible. There is, however, good reason to believe that the traffic is not by any means confined to London. It is spreading rather ominously to many of the provincial cities, and the difficulty which relatives of these cocaine victims experience, even in country districts, of tracking down the source whence the drug is derived, suggests that the postal service is being used in some degree.

Von Falkenhayn.

erative, reserved, with a strain of rather coarse animal spirits, unbecoming on occasion among his military conquests in the congenial atmosphere of a smart regimental mess. He saw service in the Far East under Count Waldersee, and after various staff appointments at home was made the German war minister, with subtle prevision of coming events, just a year before August, 1914. After Von Moltke's personal collapse, following the first reverse on the Marne, Falkenhayn became his successor as chief on the western front, and retained his hold on the emperor's confidence despite all intrigues, until he, too, succumbed after the ghastly failure at Verdun in 1916. He was the main author of the great drive for Calais which resulted in the fierce fighting at Ypres and thereafter. His military quarrels with Hindenburg and his lieutenant, Ludendorff, raged around a controversy familiar enough in this country. Falkenhayn was associated perhaps most brilliantly of all, from the military point of view, with the great drive by Mackensen which scattered the Rumanian armies so signal.

Premier's Favorite Films.
Many prominent people nowadays flit to a cinema show an excellent tonic, and the present prime minister is no exception. Often the premier makes arrangements for a private cinema show at Chequers, and whilst he was at Criccieth recently some thousands of feet of film were sent down to him and shown in the large dining-rooms in the evenings. His favorite variety of film comedy, is Charlie Chaplin has an ardent admirer in Lloyd George, never failing to win a good laugh from the premier in his portrayal of the "Little Class." But the prime minister has also a strong taste for drama, particularly when the actors of our great English artists is featured on the film. Mrs. Lloyd George and Mrs. Morgan share the premier's liking for a good film, and in London they may be seen regularly at one or other of the better cinema halls.

Vanishing England.
Civil engineers, and especially those engaged on the supervision of our coastline under the Office of Works, are becoming distinctly alarmed at the rapidity with which several portions of the foreshore are being washed away. This is in many cases directly due to the erection of haphazard harbors, the case of the jetty at Shoreham, near Brighton, being a glaring example. This pier was built in 1874, and since then something like nine million tons of shingle have been laid up on the west side that should have traveled along the coast with the general coastal drift. The result has been serious erosion at Rottingdean to the east and the loss of acres of valuable land. Engineers are now pleading that a national policy should be adopted to prevent the natural protection of the drifting and shingle being interfered with. An amusing instance of lack of co-operation comes from the Isle of Wight, where a short time ago, on one side of the island, the admiralty were making a fuss because someone had been removing shingle, while on the other side the war office was busy doing that very thing in order to build a fort.

Mount Everest Medico.
Among the party setting out for this year's attack on Mount Everest is included a new medical officer, Dr. G. T. Longstaff. He is an Oxford man with a reputation which is world-wide among mountaineers, although he is practically unknown to the ordinary world, probably because he is one of the most modest and unassuming of men, who conceals rather than advertises his feats. He has climbed in every part of the world, the Alps, the Caucasus, Solikra, the Rockies and India, his most famous feat perhaps being the climb of Tirinal in the first European crossing of the Saltor (18,200 feet), the (18,200 feet) leaps. Rather small in stature and build, he is of that wiry, steel-muscle type which apparently knows no sur-renders to no fatigue or prolonged effort, and he has a reputation for tenacity which makes it probable that he will be among those who struggle through to the final triumph of reaching the summit.

THE ROYAL FISH.
A sturgeon is called a royal fish, because of an edict made by Edward II, that any sturgeon caught in the Thames belonged to the crown. It is many a year since that fish was caught in London's main stream or in any of its tributaries.
A sturgeon, weighing 832 pounds, was caught about a year ago in British waters and taken to Grimsby, and in 1808 one of 562 pounds weight was caught on the Norfolk coast and taken to Billingsgate. This was nearly eight feet long. But the record is believed to be a fish caught in the deep sea off

Haligoland, which Frank Buckland, the naturalist, certified to weigh 632 pounds, and of 11 1/2 feet long.

SYNOD SUPPORTS NEW BRUNSWICK ORPHANAGE ONLY

Fredericton, May 4.—The fifty third annual session of the diocesan synod of the Anglicans of New Brunswick closed here this afternoon with the exception of committee meetings which will detain some of the delegates. Many returned to their homes today.

During the afternoon there was a lively discussion with reference to the collection of funds for orphanages. It was decided to take a special collection for orphanages in November but the motion to divide the money between the three St. John institutions was defeated, and the New Brunswick Protestant orphanage will get the proceeds of the collection.

In regard to communion wine it was announced that a satisfactory arrangement for supplies had been made with the New Brunswick liquor commission. It was incorrectly reported previously that wine supplied by this commission was not satisfactory. The fact is that it was wine supplied by outside firms which was not satisfactory.

The Morning Session.—The chief item of business at the morning session was the report of the standing committee to the charge which His Lordship had delivered to the synod.

The report was as follows: To the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of the diocese synod of Fredericton. The standing committee have considered your Lordship's charge by report as follows: We feel that we are expressing the joy of the whole church in the province when we acknowledge our deep gratitude to Almighty God for his mercies vouchsafed to your Lordship in your recent recovery from the very serious operation which you underwent last year.

"We are much impressed with your Lordship's remarks in reference to the very serious outlook for the supply of candidates for the ministry of the church in the diocese and we strongly recommend the clergy to bring the call to the sacred ministry constantly before their people, and especially at the Easter season, and we reiterate the strong recommendations contained in our report at the last synod. In this connection we remind the synod that those clergy who have received special training in missionary work have to give at least five years service to the diocese.

The Poorer Parishes.—

"While deeply sympathizing with those parishes which owing to circumstances beyond their control have lost their self-supporting status, we nevertheless feel that the requirements of the diocese should be strictly adhered to in all distinction between aided missions and self-supporting missions be entirely obliterated. We therefore recommend that this synod appoint a representative commission to survey the whole situation with reference to the executive to take such remedial action as they deem necessary.

"In view of the action of the general synod in the matter of provision for clergy, widows and orphans we recommend that all married clergy on coming to the diocese, provided they be not already contributing to a similar fund in any other diocese and that all clergy in the diocese who may hereafter enter the holy estate of matrimony, be required to become members of the fund of this diocese.

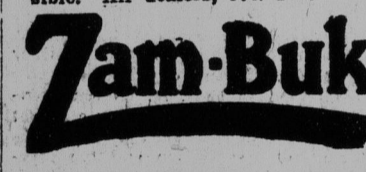

In order that they may thereby become eligible for the benefits of such beneficent funds, a general synod may establish. And with this end in view we recommend that our own governing body should be brought into line with the terms under which the general synod's fund is administered.

"Pending action on the part of the state with regard to our suggestion of last year that notice of intention to marry be published in the diocesan journal, that as far as possible the requirements of the prayer book be adhered to, namely that marriages be solemnized in a church where possible.

"Whereas we are committed to contribute to the maintenance of the Home for Girls at Truro, we recommend that steps be taken at this synod to discharge those financial obligations for which we have already become responsible and in the matter of the Social Service Council conference with the diocese of Nova Scotia, a more equitable adjustment of the burden.

"Respecting the thirty-three years' service which have been rendered to the church and diocese by Archdeacon Lambeth, we commend to the synod his splendid and unremitting labor, devoting himself to the welfare of the diocese, and we therefore recommend that the executive take up the matter with the secretary with a view to retaining his valuable services and at the same time rendering him such assistance as his ever increasing demands.

"With reference to King's College we bear with pleasure of the effort to unite all denominational colleges in one great university.

"Deeply conscious of the desirability of the reunion of Christians of the synod to support our Lordship's interpretation of the Lambeth appeal.

"This report on the bishop's charge was adopted after considerable discussion, particularly regarding the sections relating to the widows and orphans fund and to the publication of the banns of marriage.

Respecting the widows and orphans fund, the feeling was expressed that the inclusion of the unmarried clergy in such a pension scheme would be a hardship on them. This section was amended as adopted.

"Concerning the publication of the marriage banns, it was felt that in some special cases this might not be advisable.

The afternoon session opened with the introduction of two notices of motion given previously regarding the taking up of collection for the Protestant Orphanage homes in St. John. Considerable discussion ensued during which the information was divulged that there were three orphanages in St. John—the Provincial Memorial, the Wiggins Home and the New Brunswick Protestant orphanage—accommodating 175 orphans. The feeling was expressed strongly by Canon Armstrong and endorsed by the members of the synod that these three institutions should be amalgamated.

Canon Vernon, general secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada, was given permission to speak. He said that he was opposed to the synod authorizing the collection of money for any institution no matter how worthy it is, in which the synod has no representative. A motion was proposed that mothers allowance act should provide for fatherless children while mother present them should be adopted by private families. After a lengthy discussion a motion by his honor, Judge Armstrong, that the first Saturday of November of this year be set aside for the taking up of collections in all Anglican churches of the Protestant orphans was passed. The motion that this money be granted to the three homes in St. John to be divided in proportion to the number of orphans accommodated was lost. The original motion by Canon Armstrong, of which notice had been given previously, that the money so collected be devoted to the New Brunswick Protestant orphanage alone, was carried by a large majority. This latter motion was expressed by the feeling in the synod is an attempt to force amalgamation on this home to which all the proceeds of this collection are to go.

Following the conclusion of this discussion the results of the balloting were announced. FINISH EVIDENCE IN PARIS CASE

The hearing of witnesses was concluded last evening in the case of John Paris who is on trial at the circuit court charged with the murder of nine-year-old Sarah McAuley at or near Riverview Park on August 2, 1921. G. H. Vernon, of Truro, counsel for Paris, will begin his address to the jury this morning. He will be followed by Hon. J. P. Byrne, attorney general of New Brunswick, who, with Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., appearing for the Crown. Mr. Justice J. H. Barry, who is presiding at the trial, will deliver his charge to the jury after Mr. Byrne has concluded. The case may go to the jury this evening.

The written copy of the evidence given at the last trial by Warren Ogilvy, manager of the Eastern Hat and Cap Factory, Truro, who had died since the last trial, was submitted in evidence by Mr. Vernon. The document was read by the clerk of the court. In his direct testimony Mr. Ogilvy testified that he knew Paris who had done some work for him. During his cross-examination at the last trial Mr. Ogilvy had said that he had been tendered him personally by Paris. One, two or three days before August 2 Paris had met Mr. Ogilvy and asked him for the payment for work done at his home some time previously. Mr. Ogilvy testified that he had no recollection that there was no possibility of his being mistaken about Paris for the man who had done the work for him.

To Mr. Vernon, Mr. Ogilvy had said that the man who had asked him about the work was the man he had hired. Mr. Vernon said he would like to ask Walter Humphrey a question. Mr. Ogilvy had said that he could ask Paris something, Mr. Vernon said he would not ask Humphrey.

Called in Rebuttal.—

Mr. Byrne called in rebuttal Robert Wynn of Halifax, in rebuttal of the evidence that gasoline was bought by Stanley Nichols on August 2. Witness said he had been working at the Halifax office of the Imperial Oil Company. In reply to a question from the attorney-general, witness said he did not think there had been any sale of gasoline to Stanley Nichols on August 2. The slip 886,608 was included in the sales report dated August 6 and received in Halifax on August 10.

To Mr. Vernon, he said he would not swear from his own knowledge that Nichols had not bought gasoline on August 2. If the dates on the slips were changed then his evidence that he had not bought any gasoline on August 2 amounted to nothing, he said.

He was shown the August 2 duplicate of 886,608 and was told that the driver had sworn that the "9" in August 5 in the corresponding original was not in the driver's writing. Witness said that McCurdy changed the date to match the date of the sales reports he was sending in.

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Witness looked up the original of the slip, serial number 886,608, the duplicate of which was dated August 2. The duplicate was the paper Stanley Nichols said he received from the tank wagon driver.

Better Than the British Museum's Natural History Society is Proud of New Specimen, an Anaconda Skin Twenty-one Feet Long.

To secure a specimen better than the ones shown in the British Museum is an enviable achievement, but it is exactly what the Natural History Society of New Brunswick has done. Among the most recent gifts to the society's museum is the skin of an anaconda, the largest known variety of snake. The skin is twenty-one feet and two inches long and at its widest part is three inches wide. The largest specimen in the British museum is eighteen feet and nine inches long, therefore the feeling of pride in the length of the one in the St. John museum. The skin was the gift of H. Fielding Rankine who received it from a ship's chief engineer. The anaconda lives in tropical lands and it is said it may reach a length of thirty feet. Trees, water and land are equally home to the anaconda and it lives on mammals and birds. It is not poisonous but kills its prey by constriction, crushing it to the condition of a sausage in order to swallow it. The particular skin in the museum was taken from a snake that had just killed and swallowed a lamb. Some other welcome gifts have recently been received by the society. Miss Villah has presented several interesting books and three photographs. The photographs include one of Sir Leonard Tilley in early manhood, one of the Paris crew racing on the Kennebecasis and one of King Edward and Queen Alexandra, when the Prince and Princess of Wales, with King George as a baby. Mrs. John Salmon has presented three pieces of old pottery, that will be very valuable additions to the collections in the museum. Two of them, a sugar basin and cream jug of English lustre ware are at least 150 years old and the third, while perhaps dating back a few years less, is still sufficiently old. It is a large sugar bowl with a lustre border and on each side has a picture of Father Mathew, "the celebrated advocate of temperance administering the pledge." These pieces of pottery will be placed in a new case in the room on the first floor of the museum and preparations are already being made to show an exhibit of Loyalist relics in the other cases there. While the society already has a fairly representative collection of Loyalist relics additions to the collection would be welcome.

FRENCH ARRIVES New York, May 4.—Field Marshal Earl French, commander-in-chief of the British armies during the war, arrived today on the Homeric for his second visit to America—a purely personal visit, he explained, without a mission of any form. He was greeted at the pier by a group of British war veterans. With mighty cheers they escorted him to his hotel.

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NORTHCLIFFE QUILTS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, May 4.—Lord Northcliffe, in resigning from the London Newspaper Proprietors' Association, declares that the association was of great value during the war in fighting the press bureau and newspaper control, "but the situation now is quite different." Lord Northcliffe says: "Capitalists have come into Fleet street who have made fortunes in other industries, with no experience of newspapers at all, and it is unreasonable that they should take part in dictating conditions and wages of printers to those who have been associated with newspapers and printers all their lives." Lord Northcliffe strongly objects to certain proposed wage reductions.

NURSE GUILTY

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Montreal, Ya., May 4.—A verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree was returned by a jury in Westmorland county court here tonight against Miss Sarah E. Knox, Baltimore nurse, charged with the killing of Mrs. Margaret L. Eastlake, at Colonial Beach, last September. The jury stipulated that the verdict should carry a sentence of twenty years' imprisonment. Testimony was given of intimate relations existing between Miss Knox and Mrs. Eastlake's husband.

TEXT OF PAPAL NOTE

Hope Expressed for Successful Outcome at Genoa. The text of the letter reads: "The keen desire by which we are animated to see established in the world a new peace which does not merely consist in a cessation of hostilities, but principally in spiritual reconciliation, causes us to follow with solicitous attention, in fact with anxious trepidation the work of the Genoa conference. "We have already invited our faithful people to invoke with fervent prayer the benediction of God on this conference. We cannot hide the intense satisfaction we feel at seeing removed, thanks to the good will of all, the serious obstacles which form the

very beginning seemed to make the possibility of agreement remote. "Nobody, in fact, can doubt that the happy issue of such a great assemblage, which includes representatives of all the civilized nations, will mark a historical date for Christian civilization, especially in Europe, the peoples of which have suffered so much in past conflicts, and through the recent and most deplorable consequences, and rightly desire that through the agency of the conference the danger of new conflagrations shall be removed as far as possible. "May full attainment at least prepare the basis for the future and not far distant advent of a new era of peace of which one may say, with the Bible, that justice and peace have joined, remembering that the exigencies of justice must be tempered with charity. "Such a return to normal state of human relations in its essential elements in conformity with the dictates of reason which is also the divine command, will work greatly to the advantage of both conquerors and conquered, but especially to the advantage of those unhappy populations of eastern Europe, which, already laid waste, by war, by intercaste struggles and by religious persecutions are now, in addition, decimated by famine and epidemics, while they embrace in their territory so many sources of wealth that they might be strong elements in social restoration. "May our word of compassion and comfort, together with that of our lamented predecessor, reach these populations, though they are divided from our communion by an ancient difference, and may these unhappy populations also receive the ardent desire of our paternal heart to see them enjoy, together with us, the same gifts of humanity and peace

which are expressed by common participation in the holy mysteries. "And if by the height of misadventure, even in this conference the attempt at sincere pacification and lasting agreement should fail, who can think without trepidation how much the condition of Europe, already so deplorable and threatening, would be aggravated, with the prospect of continually increasing suffering and the danger of a conflagration which would involve in its ruins all Christian civilization."

That there was no cause for alarm regarding the present conditions in China, particularly near Peking, is the information contained in a letter from the New York office of the Peking Union Medical College to Mrs. John G. Leonard, 255 German street of this city, who has a sister, Miss Ethel Robinson, attached at the college in Peking. The news was despatched via cable and is being broadcasted by the New York office.

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
