He mentioned two serious air-plane accidents that True had, and said medical evidence would show that he was a morphia maniac and a homicidal

maniac.

References were made by witnesses to True's visit to America, mentioning San Francisco and Buffalo. The defense San Francisco and Buffalo. The defense brought out testimony that the defendant once proposed the forming of a "murderers' club."

True's wife testified that she met her husband in New York in 1917 and that he told her untruthfully that he had flown in France. True was engaged by the American government as a flying instructor at Mineola, while she, an actress, was on tour. The witness declared the defendant began taking drugs in 1919 and that while they were in West Africa he made a will containing a strange bequest to their child.



The air we breathe consists roughly speaking of a mixture of the gases, nitrogen and oxygen, in the proportion of four to one; but it contains considerable quantities of argon and meon among other things, which have already assumed a serious commercial importance.

It has been recently stated that the annual "output" of oxygen in the United States alone amounts to a thousand million cubic feet of the present value of nearly three millions sterling.

Oxygen is used on an enormous and rapidly increasing scale in the engineering world, with acetylene, to make the intensely hot flame which cuts through steel rails like a knife, for welding, and a dosen industrial processes.

Nitrogen is being trapped from the air on an immense scale for the manufacture of fertilizers.

CIVIL SERVANTS AND THE BONUS

Explanation of the Appeal for Continuance — Matter Discussed in Toronto.

To The Editor of The Times:


