



FIND BOGUS STONES IN PLACE OF ROYAL AUSTRIAN JEWELS

Vienna, May 29—(By the Associated Press)—The great portion of the im-perial jewels, whether belonging to the Austrian crown or privately owned by the former emperor, have been substituted with spurious stones. This was done during the war or since hostilities ended. This fact was discovered during progress of an inventory of the crown prop-erty which was being made with the purpose of finding money with which to purchase food for the people, and reported to President Seitz. The list of missing stones includes gems of great value which were world famed. Many belonged in various insignia of the coronation robes and historic sceptres, diadems and crowns. The gems included rubies and pearls and dia-monds weighing from 20 to 100 carats






WILL NOT PROHIBIT THE EXPORT OF RAW SALMON FROM CANADA.

Ottawa, May 29—There will be no prohibition of the exportation of raw salmon from Canada. In the senate to-day Sir James Lougheed said that a re-quest for the prohibition had been re-ceived from the Vancouver board of trade, but there had been a protest from the fishermen of the Pacific coast and the government had decided not to in-terfere with the exportation of raw salmon
