

BATTER PUDDING

Remove fat from as many chops as needed. Lay in deep pan. Cut up one large onion. Season with pepper and salt and a generous sprinkling of celery salt. Cover with water and cook slowly until done. Add more water as needed; thicken gravy and add small piece of butter.

PINEAPPLE TART. Make a pastry of a quart of flour, half a cupful of lard, butter and sugar and the beaten yolks of 3 eggs. Stew a can of grated pineapple until clear with half a cupful of sugar and a tablespoon of cornstarch rubbed smooth in a litle cold water. Line a baking dish with the pastry, pour in the pineapple, bake until crust is done, cover with meringue and bake until puffed and brown.





THE LANCASTER LANDS MATTER

The proposals to open up the city land on the Gypsy Settlement Road for building purposes was discussed at a meeting of about thirty citizens with the mayor and city commissioners last evening. Various suggestions were made, but the commissioners took the stand that they could undertake no such work until the town planning scheme had been completed.

Mr. Hatheway outlined his plan which was that the land should be laid out in lots 50 by 150 feet with 66 foot streets and the lots sold from \$100 to \$200 on easy terms to workingmen who would be required to erect houses costing not less than \$600 in order to retain the title. Mr. Hatheway had been assured that if fifty families settled there the St. John Railway Company would extend its line to the district. The proposals to open up the city land

district.

Commissioner Schofield said that, as the district was not within the city limits, the city could not undertake the laying out of streets or supplying water and sewer-

age.

Mayor Frink suggested that development work might be undertaken more easily if the parishes of Simonds and Lancaster were included in the city limits.

Commissioner Wigmore urged the need of developing the land back of Fort Howe and in Stanley ward. He understood that some of those who were advocating selling the city lands, at low prices were holding tracts of land elsewhere for fancy figures. Commissioner McLellan referred to the necessity of coping with the housing problem, saying that in one place he found seven persons living in three rooms.



Indeed, so generally is this supremacy accorded automatically to the wife of the prime minister that Mrs. Winston Churchill, brilliantly clever as she is and ambitious, would never have thought of challenging it but for the fact that Mrs. Asquith did things which, as the wife of a less important person than the prime minister would have done her no harm,—indeed, they probably would have served to enhance her reputation for cleverness,—but which actually succeeded in shocking the sense of propriety of the more staid and influential of the powerful Liberal women who affect the old manner.

These women, like Lady Granard, Lady Cowdray and Lady Crewe, thought it ill became the dignity of the prime minister's wife to have her name freely mentioned in the press as having given a party at the official residence of her husband in Downing street with the direct object of helping to advertise the gowns of a French modiste. One slip of this sort to be sure, might have been forgiven, but then came others in quick succession. There were several hostesses who declined to go to Mrs. Asquith's house to meet a barefoot dancer upon whom the prime minister's wife chose to bestow her particular friendship some few years ago. Soon after came the case when Mrs. Asquith, in the witness box, glibly and smilingly assured the jury that getting into debt tended to enhance a lady's social reputation. Mrs. Asquith no doubt spoke the simple truth, but it was regarded as a terribly indiscreet admission for her to make and several of the most influential Liberal hostesses told the prime minister so.

These and other indiscretions on the part of the premier's wife gave the opportunity for Mrs. Winston Churchill to come forward as a social leader round whom the great Liberal hostesses preferred to rally than round a lady of so eccentic a disposition as Mrs. Asquith.

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

Ottawa, March 27-The appointment of a convict, serving a term for forgery, to a government office and his release in crder to allow him to take up his duties was discussed in the House of Commons to-day and, on a straight party division, the action of, the Conservative government was upheld. Mr. Kyte, Richmond, N. S., drew attention to the appointment of Andrew Landry, a convicted forger, under sentence of twelve months' imprisonment, to a position as buoy inspector and wharfinger by Hon. Mr. Hazen on the recommendation of J. A. Gillies, defeated candidate in Richmond, N. S., and the subsequent pardon of Landry by Hon. Mr. White, acting minister of justice, in the absence of Hon. Mr. Doherty. The government had been warned that Landry was a convict, but the appointment was made and Landry was released on the testimony of his nephew. Mr. Kyte's motion of censure of the appointment was defeated.

Hon. Mr. Whyte, minister of finance, for the second time in twenty-four hours, was forced to withdraw a statement made before the house of commons. Hon. Mr. Puysley drew attention to Mr. Whyte's statement that Liberalism was attempting to obstruct the passing of the bill ratifying to obstruct the passing of the bill ratifying the West India treaty, as he said they had tried to obstruct the naval bill. "Has it come to a point where no member may discuss any bill without being charged with obstruction?" he asked.

The minister said that he did not mean to use the term in an offensive sense, but repeated his statement that obstruction had been practiced. In obedience to a ruling Hon. Mr. Whyte withdrew his statement, and when he started, to continue his remarks defying his opponents, he was called to order by the speaker.
