THE BOARD OF TRADE, THE HARBOR AND THE COMMON COUNCIL.

The meeting of the Board of Trade yesterday to discuss harbor matters was well attended as is ought to have been considering the vital importance of the questions to be considered. The members of the Board certainly are interested in the prosperity of St. John, and they ought to know that if they display indifference to matters which concern the harbor and the promotion of the trade of this port, their want of interest will be reflected in the actions of the Common Council who, naturally enough, look to the Board of Trade to voice the opinions of the mercantile community in regard to matters concerning the improvement of our harbor and our trade.

And so the Kingston Freeman denounces the 'godless schools' of Ontario. How much more like the St. John Freeman of from fifteen to eighteen years ago. Mr. Anglin harped on the 'godless schools,' but the time came when the help of St. John consulted with the trustees, and without any change in the school law, which had been so amended, and its supporters obtained, they came together and talked over the situation. The bishop's brother-in-law, Dr. Travers, is now sitting along with other Catholics side by side with their Protestant brethren, directing the schools, which are being taught by the members of every branch of the Christian Church, including the Catholic Sisters, out of the same books, in the Victoria and St. Joseph's, St. Albert and St. Patrick's buildings. Let Ontario follow the lead of New Brunswick with one system, one set of books and school methods, under one Board of Education, and we are as much as one nation, which, if continued to grow, will be fruitful of evil.

NOTE AND COMMENT.
This will be a great day in London for it is the day of the Mayor's report when that functionary goes to present to the Royal Courts of Justice the report presented to the Lord Chief Justice and sworn into office. It is said that the celebration of the Mayor's report is one of the greatest magnificence that ever before, probably because the Lord Mayor's show is soon likely to be abolished altogether.

WHERE THE HARBOR SHOULD BE IMPROVED.
Mr. Samuel Schofield yesterday expressed the opinion at the Board of Trade meeting, that the place where harbor improvements were most required, and where they were most likely to be profitable, was at the head of the harbor. This view of our circumstances seems to be a sound one, and to be justified by the facts. Mr. Schofield pointed out that while the head Point wharf would be very useful for traffic going over the Canadian Pacific and while railway connection improvements there would be mainly valuable for the Intercolonial, wharves erected at the head of the harbor would have easy connection with the Intercolonial and the Canadian Pacific. He also pointed out that if improvements were made there and it was finally discovered that our expectations of a large in transit trade were not well founded, these wharves at the head of the harbor, from their central position and proximity to the seat of business, would still be valuable for the use of our city trade and preferable to those which built there. This is a consideration which ought to have

great weight in determining the location of our steamship wharves. If we can build wharves which will be equally available for general business as for the special trade they are intended to promote, we will be in no danger of finding ourselves encumbered with unprofitable wharves which yield no return for their cost.
