



# Aniversity College,

### TORONTO:

In the year 1827, a Charter was granted by His Majesty George IV., for the establishment of a University at York (now Toronto), under the designation of "King's College;" and in the following year the Institution was endowed, by patent, with a portion of the lands which had previously been set apart by His Majesty George III. for educational

purposes.

Under this Royal Charter, as modified by subsequent Statutes of the Legislatures of Upper Canada and of the Province of Ontario, the University of Toronto and University College, are now constituted. The University prescribes the requirements for Degrees, Seholarships, and Prizes; appoints Examiners; and confers Degrees in the Faculties of Law, Medicine, and Arts. University College gives instruction in the Departments of Arts and Science prescribed by the University for the Degrees of B.A., M.A., and LL.B.

### SECTION I.

### DAILY PRAYERS.

(The work of the College is opened each day at 10 a.m. with Prayer, at which all who have no conscientious objections are expected to be present.

### SECTION II.

### STUDENTS.

- 1. The regular Students of the College are those who have passed the \*Matriculation Examinations in Arts in any University in Her Majesty's dominions; and Matriculants, who are students taking the full undergraduate course.
- 2. Matriculated Students are required to attend the Lectures and Examinations, on all the subjects necessary for Students of their respective standings. Certificates of attendance, during one or more Academic Years, will be given to those Matriculated Students and Matriculants who have been regular in their attendance on the required Lectures, and who have passed the prescribed Examinations.
- 3. Matriculated Students are required to reside, during the period of their attendance on Lectures, in the College, or in houses selected by their parents or guardians, or approved by the President.
- 4. Non-matriculated Students may be admitted to Lectures on application to the Professors in the respective Departments.
- 5. Certificates of Attendance on Lectures in any Department during an Academic Year, may be given to Non-matriculated Students who have been regular in their attendance, and who have also passed the Examinations in such Department.

### SECTION III.

### RESIDENT STUDENTS.

### ALFRED BAKER, M.A., Dean.

1. The Resident Students are under the immediate charge of the Dean of Residence, who is authorized to impose fines for infraction of regulations, insubordination, or disorderly conduct.

2. The authority to suspend is vested in the President, and that to expel in the Council; but at the close of each term the Dean may, with the approval of the President, decline to admit any student into Residence.

3. Each Student on entrance shall sign his name in the Dean's Book to a declaration that he shall conform to the Statutes and Regulations relative to Resident Students.

4 Graduates formerly students of the College may be admitted as Residents to any rooms not required by Undergraduates; and shall sign a declaration engaging to conform to all Statutes and Regulations relative to Resident Graduates.

5. Rooms cannot be vacated without the permission of the President.

6. A Register shall be kept of the attendance of the Residents at Prayers, and also of the hours of passing the Gate. The Register shall be submitted weekly to the President.

7. Resident Students shall wear their Caps and Gowns during Term, both in and outside the College, at the discretion of the Dean.

8. They shall regularly attend Morning and Evening Prayers, unless exempted from so doing in consequence of the objection of their Parents or Guardians.\*

9. They shall regularly attend their respective places of worship on Sunday.

10. No Student shall be absent from the College after the closing of the Gate, except by permission of the Dean.

11. No stranger shall be admitted after the closing of the Gate, nor remain in the building after 12 o'clock at

night.

- 12. The first Morning Bell shall be rung at 7 A.M.; Second Morning Bell at 8 A.M.; Prayers at 8.05 A.M.; Breakfast from 8.15 to 8.55 A.M.; Dinner at 2.15 P.M.; First Evening Bell at 6.30 P.M.; Prayers at 6.35 P.M.; Tea from 6.45 to 7.30 P.M.; Second Evening Bell at 9 P.M.; and Gate closed at 9.30 P.M.
- 13. Students may occasionally invite their friends to any meal, having previously entered their names in the book kept by the Steward, to whom they shall pay the charge fixed for such meal.

14. The Officers of the College and the non-resident Students can purchase from the Steward tickets for meals.

- 15. The Fee payable for Resident Students for Board and Rent of Room, varies from Three and a Half to Four Dollars per week.
- 16. All fees of Undergraduates are to be paid in advance, per Month or per Quarter; of Graduates, per Quarter.

### SECTION IV.

# COURSE OF STUDY IN ARTS.

The Courses of Lectures, and the Practical Instruction given in the Physical, Biological, Geological, and Chemical Laboratortes, are carried out in accordance with the

requirements of the University of Toronto, both in the Pass and Honor Courses, for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts. The Degree may be taken by the Pass Course; or by special Honor work in five Departments.

#### PASS COURSE.

In Latin	All the four Examinations must be passed.
In Greek,	All the four Examinations must be passed. French and German, however, may be substituted for Greek in each year of the Course. Undergraduates exercising this option must take the Honor French or the Honor German of the second year, though not required to obtain in these subjects an Honor standing.
In Mathematics and Physics	The Examinations in the First, Second, and Fourth Years must be taken. In the Third Year either this subject or that of Mental and Moral Science and Civil Polity is required.
In English	The Examinations in the First, Third, and Fourth Years must be taken.
In History	The Examinations in the Second and Third Years must be taken.
In French or German	Each Undergraduate must take the Pass French or the Pass German of the First and Second Years in the First and Second Years respectively. (Oriental Languages are accepted as an alternative.)
ences	Each Undergraduate must take the Chemistry or the Biology of the First Year in his First Year; and the Pass Mineralogy and Geology of the Second Year in his Second Year.
In Mental and Moral Science and Civil Polity	The Examinations of the Second and Fourth Years must be taken. In the Third Year either this Department or that of Physics must be taken.

#### HONOR COURSE.

In this Course there are five Honor Departments, viz.: I. Classics; II. Physics and Mathematics; III. Modern Languages, with History; IV. Natural Sciences; V. Mental and Moral Science and Civil Polity.

Candidates pursuing Department II. are allowed to take either Physics or Mathematics in their Fourth Year.

An Undergraduate in the Honor Course must take the Pass and Honor subjects of one of these Departments, and also additional pass subjects as mentioned in the following Schedule:—

### NATURAL HISTORY.

### Including Zoology and Botany.

Professor: R. RAMSAY WRIGHT, M.A., B.Sc. (EDIN.)

The Lectures in this Department are given in the classroom adjoining the Museum of Natural History, but the Practical Courses are held in the Biological Laboratory of the School of Practical Science.

The following are the Courses of Lectures:

- I. An Elementary Course, dealing with the Structure and Physiology of Plants during the Michaelmas Term, and with Zoology during the Easter Term.
- 2. A short course on Animal Physiology in the Michaelmas Term.

The above courses are intended for Candidates for the First Pass Examination in Biology of the University.

- 3. A series of Lectures for Honor Students of the Second Year, on the Forms described in Huxley and Martin's Elementary Biology.
- 4. Practical Instruction for two hours twice a week during the Session to illustrate above.

# SECTION VII.

### TERMS.

1. The Academic Year consists of Two Terms; the first (Michaelmas) extending from October 1st to December 22nd; and the second (Easter) from January 4th to

May 31st.

2. The term will not be allowed to Students who have been reported to the President by any of the Professors as neglecting to attend the required Lectures; or who have not passed the prescribed Examination, or have not conformed to the other Statutes or Regulations of the College, or have been reported to the Council for bad conduct.

### UNIVERSITY REGULATION.

"Every Undergraduate who has not received dispensation from the Senate for any particular Year, must, before being admitted to Examination, produce to the Registrar from the Head of the Affiliated College which he has attended during the year, a Certificate of attendance and of compliance with the requirements of that College."

# SECTION VIII.

# EXAMINATIONS.

I. All Matriculated Students are required to attend the College Examinations in every department or branch prescribed by the University of Toronto, as necessary for their respective standings.

2. Prizes and Honors in the College are awarded in each department on the result of the Examinations at

Easter, with additional Examinations at Christmas, at the discretion of each Professor or Lecturer.

3. Candidates for Prizes and Honors are arranged, according to their Proficiency, in two classes, and those who are not Candidates for Prizes and Honors, or who fail to obtain Honors, are similarly arranged in the Third Class; but no name of a Candidate for Honors shall be entered on the Class Lists until he has passed in all the prescribed subjects.

4. Certificates of Honor in each department are awarded to those Students who have been placed in the First Class at the Examinations

5. The Examinations for both Pass and Honors in the University for all Students of the Second and Third Years, attending Lectures in University College, will be conducted by the Professors, Tutors, and Lecturers of the College, and conjointly with Associate Examiners appointed by the Senate, at the same time as the University Examinations for the First and Fourth Years.

6. Non-matriculated Students are not required to attend the Examinations, unless they are Candidates for Prizes or Honors, or desire to obtain Certificates of attendance.

# SECTION IX.

# FELLOWSHIPS.

Seven Fellowships, of the value of \$500 each, are open for appointment each year, on the recommendation of the College Council. The selection will be made immediately after the publication of the result of the University Examinations in May, from among the Graduates of the University of Toronto.

The Statute requires that each Fellow shall be appointed annually; but he may be reappointed for a period not exceeding in all three years.

Each Fellow is required to assist in the teaching and practical work of the Department; to pursue some special line of study therein; and to devote his entire time during the College Terms to the work of the Department, under

the direction of the Professor or Lecturer.

The Statute provides that "The Fellows shall be appointed from among the Graduates of the University of Toronto, on the recommendation of the College Council, and shall be selected with a special view to their aptitude for teaching, along with their acquirements in the work of the Department to which each Fellowship is attached." And also that "Every Fellow on accepting his appointment shall come under an obligation to fulfil the duties of his Fellowship during the College Terms of the Academic Year in which he is appointed, unless specially exempted by resolution of the College Council."

Candidates must send in their applications annually to the College Registrar, not later than the first day of June.

### SECTION X.

# 1. THE MACDONALD SCHOLARSHIP.

(Presented by John MacDonald, Esq.)

The Macdonald Scholarship, of the value of \$50, will be awarded to the Student ranking highest in general Proficiency in the Examinations of the Second Year provided he shall be in attendance at the College in the following year, who have obtained First-class Honors in one Department, and First or Second-class Honors in another Department.

The relative proficiency of Candidates is estimated on Honor work alone. The Scholarships will be paid in two sums of \$25 each, the first at the beginning of Michaelmas Term, the second in Easter Term.

# 2. MARQUIS OF LANSDOWNE MEDAL.

His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne, having presented a Silver Medal for annual competition, it will be awarded to the Student of the Third Year, who, having taken first Class Honors in the College Examinations in one Department, and First or Second-Class Honors in another Department, shall rank highest. The relative proficiency of different candidates is estimated on the Honor work of the two Departments alone.

# School of Bractical Science,

### PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

The Eighth Session will begin on the 1st of October, 1885. Intending students may enter as (1) Regular (2) Special Students.

Regular Students are those who propose taking the Three Years' Course for the Diploma of the School in (1) Engineering; (2) Chemistry; (3) Assaying and Mining Geology. Applicants must pass an Entrance Examination at the Educational Department, similar to the "Intermediate," unless an equivalent examination has previously been passed. The Fees for regular Students are as follows:—Thirty Dollars for the First Session; Forty Dollars for the Second; and Pitty for the Third. These are payable in two Instalments, one at the beginning of each Term.

Special Students are admitted to any of the Courses of Instruction given in the School, and may obtain certificates of standing, if they have previously passed an examination similar to that for Public School teachers of the third-class, or have presented equivalent certificates. The fees for the different courses of instruction will be found in the Synopsis given below:

# COURSES FOR THE DIPLOMA.

### (1) IN THE DEPARTMENT OF ENGINEERING.

The course in this Department is designed, not to supersede the practical work of the engineering office and works in the training of the pupil, but to satisfy a want which they do not provide for. The student's time will be chiefly occupied in obtaining a knowledge of the principles of the applied sciences, and in the application of these principles to various engineering problems, such as the calculation of the strains in bridges, roofs, and other constructions, the flow of water in pipes and channels; water power; the efficiency of water wheels, steam engines, and other prime movers; the transmission of power, the shapes, connections, and motions of parts of machinery; pumping machinery, &c., &c. He will also have practice in designing various constructions, machines, &c., and in making specifications therefor.

In addition, a course of reading will be indicated, involving a good deal of information, which a student of ordinary intelligence should have no difficulty in acquiring for himself, and which, although necessary for an engineer, will for the above reason not be touched upon in the lectures, except incidentally. The examinations will cover such course of reading as well as the subjects of the lectures.

With the exception of the instruction in Drawing, Surveying, and Levelling, little time will be spent on what it is considered can be learned

better by actual experience on work than in the lecture room.

The instruction in Chemistry, Mineralogy, and Geology is intended to afford the student a good foundation, theoretical and practical, in those sciences, upon which he may subsequently build, without difficulty, such a superstructure as his professional requirements may demand.

Owing to the great value and extent of French and German Engineering

Literature, these languages have been included in the course.

The object of this course is to put within reach of the student, the means whereby, with his subsequent experience, he may make himself an expert in whatever branch of the profession he may devote himself to, and at the same time, to send him forth sufficiently equipped to earn a fair salary when he begins his professional life.

### (2) IN THE DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY.

The course is intended to render the student proficient in all the methods of Analytical Chemistry, and to fit him for such a position as that of Public Analysis, Consulting Chemistry, &c. In addition to a sound training in all branches of Chemistry, the Three Years' Course includes instruction in necessary collateral sciences, such as Mathematics, Physics, Mineralogy and Geology, with Blowpipe Analysis and Assaying, and Elementary Biology.

# (3) IN THE DEPARTMENT OF ASSAYING AND MINING GEOLOGY.

The student is fully prepared in all the methods of Analysis, necessary to render him a competent assayer. He is also qualifid to survey and report upon the value of mineral lands. In addition to the training necessary for the immediate professional requirements of the student, the course includes the requisite preliminary instruction in Geology, Paleontology, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, &c.

# DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL LAND SURVEYORS.

Courses of instruction are given in accordance with the requirements of the Statutes relating to Dominion and Provincial Land Surveyors, which will enable the students, who after examination obtain certificates therein, and who have hitherto fulfilled the provisions of the said Statutes, to present themselves for final examination before the proper Boards, at an earlier period in their apprenticeship than would otherwise be permitted.

The attention of Candidates for the Certificates in Higher Surveying, given by the Dominion Board of Examiners, is directed to the facilities afforded for preparation by this department.

Note—The above applies to those taking the regular course for the Diploma of the School as well as to those who obtain the Special Certificate in Surveying.

The fee for Special Students in Surveying is \$30 per Session.

THE ADVANCED COURSE embraces Spherical Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry (Plane and Solid), Differental and Integral Calculus, Theory of Equations, Statics of Solids and Fluids, Particle and Rigid Dynamics, Hydrodynamics, Optics, Acoustics, Thermodynamics, Electricity, Astronomy.

### THE PHYSICAL LABORATORY.

The Physical Laboratory, which has been lately established, is furnished with a large collection of apparatus for lecture experiments in the departments of Mechanics, Sound, Light, Heat, and Electricity. It is also well supplied with instruments of precision for individual work in the same departments. In addition to an Elementary Laboratory there are several special Laboratories which offer unusual facilities for the conduct of experiments in the various branches of Physics.

A workshop in connection with the Laboratory will be ready next term.

# UNIVERSITY PRIZES AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

### PRIZES.

A Prize of the value of Ten Dollars in Books will be given to the Candidate who, at any of the four Examinations of Undergraduates, has been placed first in the First Class in Oriental Languages.

Prizes, each of the value of Ten Dollars in Books, may be awarded annually among Undergraduates in Law, Medicine, or Arts, for the best Composition in Greek Verse, Greek Prose, Latin Verse. Latin Prose, English Verse, English Prose, French Prose, and German Prose.

Certificates of Honor will be given at each Examination, to those Students who have been placed in the First or Second Class in any Department. The fee for such certificate is one dollar.

All Scholars must sign a declaration of intention to proceed to a Degree in the Faculty of Arts in this University.

Every Candidate who obtains a Scholarship must attend Lectures in some Affiliated College for the Academic Year immediately following such Examination, except in case of Scholarships awarded to women; but the

\*This Scholarship may be awarded to a Candidate who has obtained First Class Honors in three out of the four Sub-Departments.

Senate may, upon satisfactory reasons being shewn, permit such Scholar to postpone attendance upon Lectures for a year, in which case the payment of the amount of the Scholarship shall likewise be postponed. The Scholarships are paid in three Instalments—on the fifteenth November, the fifteenth January, and the fifteenth March; and each Scholar is required to send to the Registrar a Certificate of Attendance upon Lectures at least three days before the date of each payment.

No Student can hold two Scholarships at the same time; but if two or more Scholarships have been awarded to him he will be entitled to forty per cent. of each additional Scholarship, his Scholarship being called a Double, Triple, &c., Scholarship, as the case may be; and the Senate may award the remainder of the value of such additional Scholarship to the Candidate who was next entitled to it.

The Examinations, together with the Prizes, Certificates of Honor, Scholarships, and Degrees, are open to women on the same conditions as to men, excepting that it is not imperative on them to attend lectures in an affiliated College; and any woman gaining a Scholarship shall sign an engagement that the money will be expended by her in the further prosecution of the studies prescribed as necessary for the Degree in Arts.

No Scholarship (except for General Proficiency, and that for English, &c., at the Junior Matriculation Examination) will be awarded to any Candidate who has been placed lower than the First Class in the Department, or in any of the Departments or Sub-Departments to which the Scholarship is attached.

In awarding the Scholarships for General Proficiency, every subject in which a Candidate has passed is taken into account, and the Scholarships are awarded to such students as have obtained the highest aggregate number of Marks upon the whole Examination of the year. A Candidate who has gained a Special Scholarship shall not be entitled to hold a Scholarship for General Proficiency, but his name shall be ranked in the Class List with the Scholars for General Proficiency, according to his marks in all the subjects. In awarding these Scholarships the comparative value of the several Departments and Sub-Departments is estimated according to the following Schedule:

# PRINCE OF WALES SCHOLARSHIP.

At the Junior Matriculation Examination the sum of \$50, being the annual proceeds of the Fund presented by His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, on the occasion of his admission ad eundem statum, will be awarded as a Scholarship to the Candidate, who, having obtained First Class Honors in both Classics and Mathematics, shall in the aggregate rank highest in these two Departments; and in default of any Candidate answering this condition, it will be awarded to the Candidate, who, having obtained First Class Honors in (1) Classics and Modern Languages, with History, or (2) Mathematics and Modern Languages, with History, shall bave obtained the highest aggregate number of marks in (1) or in (2): and in the event of such Scholarship not being taken at any Junior Matriculation Examination it will be awarded to the Candidate (if any) at the ensuing First Year's Examination who shall answer the same conditions. In estimating the aggregate number of Marks of the Candidates, the same values are given to Classics, Mathematics, and Modern Languages with History, as in competition for the General Proficiency Scholarships. This Scholarship is tenable in conjunction with any other Scholarship or Scholarships.

# THE MARY MULOCK CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIP.

The late Mrs. Mulock having donated the sum of \$2,000 (which with accrued interest amounts to \$2,250) for the encouragement of the study of the Greek and Latin Classics, a Scholarship of the value of \$120, known as the "Mary Mulock Classical Scholarship," will be anually offerred for competition at the Junior Matriculation Examination.

## CIRCULAR OF DEAN OF RESIDENCE.

As your—purposes coming into residence in this College, I beg to inform you that it is the desire of the Council, that, where there are no conscientious objections, all the Students under their charge should be present in the Hall at Daily Morning and Evening Prayers, with reading of the Scriptures. It is also their wish that they should regularly attend on Sundays their respective places of worship, and receive such other religious instruction as their parents or guardians may desire. I have to request that you will be so good as to let me know whether you desire your—to attend such Daily Prayers in the College, and that you will also mention the Minister under whose charge you wish to place him.

The Council will afford every facility for the carrying out of your intentions, and with this view, will exercise such control over your—during his residence, as may be best calculated to effect your wishes. In the event of your not informing me of your desire on the subject, the Council will assume that you have no objection to his being required to attend the Daily Prayers of the College, and will exercise an oversight as to his attendance on the ministrations of a Clergyman of the Denomination to which he belongs.

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
