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

(Contributions by the 16 Nations Actually Mobilized.)

According to the most authoritative or official statistics, the death directly due to the war or indirectly inflicted by it number betwee 16,000,000 and 20,000,000, over 7,000,000 of which were military

Of the civilian deaths, over 100,000 were directly caused and nearly 10,000,000 indirectly caused by it. In the first category of civilian deaths there were the 292 Americans and the 20,620 British subjects killed at sea, 1,270 British victims of air raids, 30,000 Be gian and 40,000 French victims of the German invasion, and 7,50 neutral victims of the U-boat. The second category includes 1,085. 441 Serbs dead through starvation or disease, 4,000,000 deaths from influenza and pneumonia, beyond the normal figure, and the 4,000,000 Armenian, Syrian, Greek and Jewish victims of the Turk.
