


A Church House.

If the plan is not to ambitious—and I do not see why it should be so—then it has much to commend it to us all. Certainly, something of the sort is greatly needed. It goes without saying, I think, that, it this plan should be adopted, the Catheldral must surrender its rightful claim to recognition in the matter. If there is to be a Church House in the Diocese, St. John is obviously the proper place for it. The only large city in the Diocese—and destined evidently to become a much larger city—it must more and more become what it is already—the centre of our Church's active life. We shall do well to consider very carefully the resolution state is in our hands. But, whatever you may think of the proposal, I trust that this Synod will not adjourn without taking some steps in the direction of a memorial to Bishop Kingdon.
