

days. Committed by Judge Hill for trial in May, the grand jury of the Superior Court has had his case under consideration during the past week and will probably report on Tuesday, at the latest. There is little doubt of its verdict, and the probability is strong that Cole will face a traverse jury on the charge against him.

What the outcome of the trial will be is a matter of much doubt. From the outset, Cole's lawyer, Scott Wilson, city solicitor of Portland, has been outpoken in the light that the light is invested as his belief that his client is innocent, and that he can produce evidence that will absolutely clear him from suspicion. Mr. absolutely clear him from suspicion. Mr. Wilson is an able lawyer and his opinion carries weight with all who know him. But he expressed a similar opinion as strongly before the preliminary hearing and at that time the strength of the state's case upset all calculations. It is the general belief now that Sheriff Pennell, who has given close personal attention to filling in the gaps of the evidence already presented, will offer at the final hearing a chain of proof that it will be difficult for the accused to break, unless he shall be able to establish a complete and convincing alibi.
