The Sessions and the Assessment Bill. The Sessions met at 10 o'clock. About 30 magistrates were present.

Justice Marshall opened the debate, going into the history of the appointment of a committee and their year's work.

Justice Jervis explained that the committee as a whole were not committed to the scheme, but held themselves open to vote as they wished.

Justice Gilbert spoke of the amount paid by men on income, said he had looked over the tax-books of the Town of Portland, and from them he found that income paid about 2 per cent, and he on his income about 5.

Justice Donaldson wished the entire assessment confined to rates on estate, and a license system of business, as at present in Montreal. Make this law for the city only.

Justice Gilbert moved, from the imperfect information before them, that the subject be postponed until the Common Council, who were considering the scheme, should report.

Justice Fisher agreed with Mr. Gilbert, and thought the whole matter should be dropped.

Justice Gordon argued the division of personal property into three or four kinds, but stated he intended to vote for the motion of Justice Marshall.

A motion was made to admit a motion from Justice Gregory, which was excluded by Justice Gilbert's motion to postpone.

Justice Gregory offered a resolution that Chapter 3 of the Revised Statutes be handed to the Committee, and alterations recommended so as to arrive at a more thorough distribution of taxes.

He said the Town of Portland were satisfied and it was not intended, in the House of Assembly, specially mentioning Justice Marshall as the champion of assessment, change their city laws and adopt that perfect one of the Town of Portland.

Justice Keane made a very round and sensible speech on the matter, complaining that a proper spirit was not shown in the discussion. He favored the original bill and came to the meeting to aid the committee members of the Sessions when the committee proposed anything, no matter what, throw themselves into an attitude of offence and make themselves a laughing stock to the community.

Mr. Marshall, he said, had now moved a resolution tantamount to abandoning the original principle of the bill. The only good would possibly accrue from this discussion was to show how diversified in opinion they were, as the final adoption of the bill had to depend on the action of the Council of St. John.

Justice Elder moved that the matter be referred back to the Committee and that which a majority shall bring at the next meeting of the court.

Justice Quinon claimed that the whole trouble with the bill was that the Committee had proposed a Board of Assessors. Had that part been left out they might have arrived at a fair basis of assessment, for the City of St. John would never consent to being ruled by the out-parishes, who would have a majority in such a Board.

Murray presented his letter and this note at the electric telegraph office, but, seeing a copy of THE TRIBUNE on the desk, grabbed the manuscript and left like a streak of lightning on a ground wire.
