The third trial of Edward S. Stokes
commenced in the court of Oyer & Ter-
miner this a. m., before Judge Davis.
The court was comfortably filled but the
crowd was not so large as on former oc-
casions. Stokes was brought into the
court at 10:30 o'clock, looking well, the
only perceptible change being that his
hair is a little more grey. He looked
calm and confident, and was seated be-
hind his counsel with his mother and
sister. His counsel were Lyman Tre-
maine, Messrs. Don Passos & Brainerd;
District Attorney Phelps and Assistant
Attorney General for the prosecution.

Mr. Tremaine read a challenge to the
jury, setting forth that the jurors panel
was drawn from the statute on the 10th
of Sept. 1878, and that it was not
drawn from the full panel as required by
law, also that the panel from which it
was drawn was selected from bankers, brokers
and merchants, excluding mechanics,
laborers, and other respectable classes of
the community. District Attorney Phelps
said he would be obliged to traverse the
challenge. In order to allow time for
preparation of the traverse, a recess was
taken till 1 o'clock.

Twenty buildings in the town of Mount
Vernon, N. Y., were burned to-day; loss
\$50,000.
The defalcation of Pierce, cashier of
the Merchants' Bank of Lowell, Mass.,
amounts to \$70,000.
Charles Bradshaw, the English Re-
publican, has written an article for publi-
cation, in which he says there is a wide
spread fear that the coronation of Henry V
will involve war with Italy in relation
to Rome, and therefore war with France.
He claims that the majority in the As-
sembly do not represent the French na-
tion.

The Gathering at the Capital—The
Crowd in the Exhibition Palace—
Disturbances Arrived—A Change Proposed—Visitors Still
Arriving.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 8.
There was a great rush to the Exhi-
bition Palace last night, and it was full.
Some say that there never was a greater
crowd in it. The large amount of vacant
space enables a very great number of
people to get around comfortably. Bry-
son's band discoursed music most indu-
striosly until ten o'clock. The visitors
did not trouble themselves much with
the show. They promenade, flirted,
and looked at each other. The magnifi-
cent building presented a charming
scene, and the evening was voted a most
enjoyable one.

Many hundred people are here from up
river, and many more are expected by
tomorrow. Calais and St. Stephen are
largely represented, several arriving
from the border last evening. Among
them are D. Main, Hugh McAdam, Joseph
Donald, and other public men. The offi-
cers of the Main State Fair are here in a
body, and take much interest in the dis-
play. The Capital, in fact, is full, and
visitors have to look for quarters at private
houses.

Horse talk continues lively since the
arrival of Hopewell, and it is not known
yet whether Andy will be allowed to go
against him or not.

The day is sunny and cool and the track
is nearly dry. It was rolled this morn-
ing.

The report that there was collision
between the owner of Climax and the
Factory Girl, is stoutly denied, and Clim-
ax stock is low.

Mr. Reid suggests a change in the pro-
gramme, and will if not strongly opposed
carry it out. He wants to abolish the
two-hundred two race, and make a two-
hundred forty race instead. He will divide
the \$500 purse among three horses, \$300 to
first, \$150 to second, \$20 to third.

This will give Andy and McLeod's
mare a chance to struggle for the second
money. Hopewell is expected under this
arrangement to show his greatest speed
just for the benefit of the spectators.
The crowd will be disappointed if he
doesn't go under two thirty.

All the other fast trotters will be put
in the two-hundred race. Two are expected
from Calais to-day, making five or six in
this race.

Everybody wants to see the races
finished to-morrow, but there is a pro-
spect that one or two of them will be
staved off until Saturday.

And still the people come from all quar-
ters, especially from St. John, and more
are looked for. The hotels can scarcely
feed the people. There was a good dis-
play of horse flesh in the Park this fore-
noon. Hopewell went over the course
at a moderate pace. Climax and Ginger
ran around a few times. Several fine
matched carriage teams attracted much
attention.

The track is good and will be in perfect
condition to-morrow.

Some of the drivers in the two-hundred
race have consented to abandon it and go
into the proposed two-hundred, but it is
doubtful if all will agree.

Ontario Immigration—The Class Gathering.

immigration to Ontario.
