## Inspectors' Annual Report.

To the Toronto Public School Board: <
We have the honor to present the following Report regarding the Schools under your charge for the year 1898.

Appended to the Report will be found Statistical Tables which give in detail all important particulars relating to Teachers, Pupils, Attendance, Absenteeism, Tardiness, Studies Pursued, Cost of Maintenance, etc.

## ATTENDANCE.

The total number of pupils registered during the year was in the Kindergarten 4,838 , in the other classes 29,771, of whom 1540 were promoted from the Kindergarten:

- The average daily attendance was in the Kindergarten 2,177, in the other classes 21,860 .

884 pupils attended school less than twenty days.

The average monthly registered number was 27,270 . This shows an increase compared with last year of 523. (See Table A).

The average of Monthly Average Numbers was 24,037. (See Table B).

The average of Monthly Averages was 88.2 per cent of the Average Monthly. Registered Numbers.

The best average for any month in the year was 94 per cent., the average for September.

The largest number 27,931 was registered in October, and the smallest number, 26,113 , in June.

Silver Medals are awarded to such pupils as have conformed to the above conditions for eight years.

A Silver Clasp is given to each pupil who conforms to the above for each year over eight years.

There were 533 Teachers and 125 Kindergartners employed in the Schools of Toronto, during the past year in addition to the special teachers.

There are two music teachers and one drill instructor engaged in special teaching.

The certificates of the teachers are as follows:- First Class 79 : Second class, 454.

The certificates of the Kindergartners are as follows: -Directress, 89 : Assistant, 36.

There were three new Kindergartens opened in 1898 viz : one in Manning Ave., one in Perth Ave., and one in Leslie Street. This makes 46 kindergartens in all, The total number registered in the Kindergartens during the year was 4838 , the average of monthly register-

ed numbers was 2798 and the average of monthly average numbers was 2.177 . The following table shows the registered and average attendance for each month:


The total amount paid to Kindergartners for salaries. in 1898 was $\$ 34,343$.

The total amount paid for Kindergarten supplies was $\$ 1,219$.

The total cost of Kindergartens for salaries and supplies was $\$ 35,562$.

The cost per pupil on the basis of total enrolment was for salaries and supplies, $\$ 7.35$.

The cost per pupil on the basis of average monthly number was $\$ 12.70$ for salaries and supplies.

Percentage of caretakers' salaries and fuel say $\$ 2,400$.

The cost per pupil in the Kindergarten on the basis of total enrolment was $\$ 7.84$ for salaries, supplies, fuel and caretaking.

The cost per pupil in the Kindergarten on the basis of average monthly number was $\$ 13.56$ for salaries, supplies, fuel and caretaking.

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## FREE TEXT BOOKS.

The total cost of the Free Text Books issued in 1898. was $\$ 1,159.04$. Of this amount $\$ 249.12$ was returned for the text books sold, leaving a balance of $\$ 909.92$. as the cost of free text books during the year. A large amount was saved by repairing books in the schools with bookbinders' paste and strips supplied by the Board. In nearly every school the books have been preserved with great care.

The total cost of supplies including work books, exercise books, book-keeping blanks, dictation books, business forms, drawing books, writing books, slates, paper, etc., was $\$ 2,913.02$. $\$ 326.57$ were received for supplies during the year leaving the net cost of supplies $\$ 2,586.45$

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was 3 cents.

The cost per pupil for text books on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was $31 / 3$ cents.

The cost per pupil for supplies on the basis of total enrolment, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was $82 / 3 \mathrm{cts}$.

The cost per pupil tor supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was $10 \frac{1}{2}$ cents.

The cost per pupil for both text books and supplies on the basis of average monthly attendance, omitting Kindergarten pupils, was $14 \frac{1}{3}$ cents.

The cost per pupil for text books, supplies and Kindergarten material on the basis of total enrolment, was $13 \frac{2}{3}$ cents.

In the above statements the text books and supplies for Night schools are charged against the day school pupils.

CITY MODEL SCHOOL.
The attendance at the Model School for giving professional training for third class teachers was 38.

The following obtained third class certificates in December, 1898. Nearly the whole of the successful candiates held higher than third-class non-professional certificates, so that after teaching for six months they will be eligible for admission to the Normal School for professional training or second-class certificates.

## DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATIONS.

Pupils from the Public Schools took part in the following Departmental Examinations :-The Entrance Examination, the Public School Leaving Examination, Art School, and the examinations for Form I., and Form II., of High Schools.

## ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

502 candidates in all wrote at the Entrance Examination in June 1898. Of these 425 were from the Public Schools, 212 succeeded in passing the examination, of whom 161 were Public School pupils.

## PUBLIC SCHOOL LEAVING EXAMINATION.

There were 396 candidates at the Public Schoot Leaving Examination in June, 1898, of whom 362 were from the Public Schools. 45 passed, all of whom were Public School Pupils. 112 of the Public School pupils who did not succeed in obtaining their Public School Leaving Examination certificates obtained Entrance Standing on their Public School Leaving papers.

## THE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The attendance at the Victoria Industrial School for boys during 1898 was 180 . Of these 69 attended during the whole year, 57 were sent from the Institution, and 54 were admitted. The principal states that the boys are improving in conduct, and there is less trouble in their management than formerly.

The teachers in the school are doing efficient work, considering the fact that the pupils in all but the lowest class attend school only one-half of each day. It would be desirable to have the hours of teaching lengthened in order that the pupils might be able to give more time to their studies. There seems to be no reason for hav-. ing the school hours in an Industrial School correspond with those in an ordinary Public School.

The atterdance at the Alexandra Industrial School for girls during 1898 was 32 . Of these, 7 attended during the whole year, 9 were sent out during the year, and 15 were admitted. One death occurred during the year.

The girls are attentive to their work, and considering the circumstances, they do good work.

## SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

There are thirty teachers' libraries in the schools. In some instances two schools are united for library purposes.

## REPORT OF THE CLERK OF SUPPLIES.

I beg leave to submit the following report re Text Books, General Supplies and Kindergarten Supplies for the year ending December 1898.

On taking over the Supply Department in April last, my first duty was to make some changes in the Store-room to put it into a business-like shape so that goods received into the store-room and also those delivered to the schools could be properly checked. That, together with taking the stock, took some time, and I am pleased to say that everything is now working very satisfactorily. I have visited every school in the city since then and taken stock of the Text Books and Supplies on hand and noted the condition of same. I have furnished each Principal with a new account book showing the stock charged to his school ; each assistant teacher has also been supplied with a new account book ; an account has been opened with every Kindergarten and Night School so that in future all supplies received and charged to them will be shown in the same way as is done in the other schools. These accounts have not been kept in the past.

The Text Books were found to be in a fairly good condition with a few exceptions; of course every year there will be books that will require to be rebound, also a number unfit for use. This year there were 2701 books rebound, and 2187 condemned as being unfit for use


1032 Text Books and a considerable amount of General Supplies were sold. 273 Texts Books were destroyed by the Medical Health Officer owing to contagion being in the homes of children using them.

I recommend that Second Readers should not be rebound. They cost the School Board 16 cents each and after being in use say five years they are too much soiled by constant handling to be given out again and it does not pay to spend 10 cents each for rebinding them. The marginal spaces in the Note, Exercise and Dictation books I think might be made smaller, thereby giving more working space on each leaf.

See tabulated tables (A), (B), (C), (D) in the Appendix to the Minutes of the Board,showing the quantity of Text Books, General Supplies and Kindergarten Supplies on hand at the time of taking over the Supply Department, the quantity purchased since, the quantity delivered during the year and the quantity on hand at the end of December, 1898.

## MUSIC REPORTS.

MR. PERRIN'S REPORT.

The progress of the pupils in the subject of singing has been quite as satisfactory as in the previous years, and the growing liking the pupils show for this branch of study, as must be witnessed by the teachers, gives much encouragement.

Part singing has been undertaken very generally in the IV. book classes, both in exercise and song work, and likewise in most of the Senior III, book classes wheré the pupils have been found prepared. From its exercise, the scholars have learned to appreciate the beauty, ever newly formed by the intermingling of the sounds, and from it as a valuable adjunct, have also gained a more tuneful impression of the sounds than they could otherwise have done.

In some classes, pupils have been successful in singing out from the key in the proper order, the notes of some familiarly known song, while the class though unable at the time to recognize the soug, sings the selected notes.

In consequence of the training the pupils are constantly receiving, their voices have grown to be much sweeter, and their reading of the notes more accurate. The degree of enjoyment the pupils are likely at any time to draw from a lesson, depends in a measure upon the ease with which the notes are read.

Pupils when promoted to the Senior III. book classes, are frequently ill prepared for taking up the practice of the scale. The teachers feel this deficiency a drawback, when with the notes its practice is resumed. It is desirable that all pupils especially when entering the Senior IV. book classes, should have a practical knowledge of the notes.

The newer teachers, many of them though unable at first to lead their classes in singing, are afterwards as a rule more successful in this respect.

There is still considerable indifference on the part of many pupils to unite in the singing. The proportion of those not joining in the singing, is far larger than it should be. On my rounds to the schools, this defect is remedied as much as possible.

There are yet quite a number of class-rooms without the much prized blackboard on which the notes can be permanently placed, more easily copied and conveniently seen.

MR. CRINGAN'S REPORT.

In presenting my report on Music for the past year it affords me much pleasure to state that the results accomplished by the regular teachers have been exceedingly satisfactory in many respects. The high standard obtained in reading music at sight has been fully maintained. In this respect the majority of the classes have complied with the requirements of the Course of Study prescribed, and, in many instances, these have been exceeded.

In the Fourth Book classes regular instruction has been given in the transition from Tonic-Solfa to the Staff notation. The results have clearly demonstrated the value of the training in Tonic-Solfa imparted in the junior classes as the pupils readily master the notational difficulties of the staff which are merely a new representation of musical facts and effects already mastered through the medium of the more simple, and easily comprehended Tonic-Solfa.

The results in Voice-production and Tone-quality have steadily improved. Much attention has been given to exercises calculated to form correct habits of breath-control and tone-formation without which anything worthy to be called singing is impossible of attain-
ment. I have endeavored to demonstrate that all harsh and stridenttone quality is the direct result of excessive breath pressure consequent on the imperfect control of the chest muscles which regulate the flow of breath to the vocal chords. Where this condition exists an undue strain is placed upon the vocal chords, the extrinsic muscles of the throat and pharynx are constricted and the production of natural, resonant vocal tone is seriously impeded. The results are visibly apparent in the contraction of the facial muscles and the constricted appearance of the lower jaw which renders the proper formation of consonants and vowels an impossibility.

During the year some attention has been given to the teaching of part-singing, but the results have not been attended with the success that could be desired. This is to be regretted as part-singing is the most educative branch of music teaching possible in classes where no instrumental accompaniment is available. Where everything is sung in unison, and without any accompaniment whatever to supply the essentiai harmonic coloring the effect is apt to become somewhat monotonous. Where the harmonies are supplied by one or two additional vocal parts the musical effect becomes much more pleasing and agreeable. In addition to this the practice of part singing provides an excellent mental discipline, which tends to cultivate independence in maintaining individuality of the parts, and co-operation in blending them into an harmonious unity. In the classes provided with music books the results have been much more satisfactory than in those not yet supplied with suitable selections of part songs.

During the last five weeks of the spring session I was engaged in preparing the pupils for the annual concert ire Massey Hall. About eight hundred pupils attended the rehearsals which were held on Saturday afternoons in order that the regular studies might proceed without interruption. The programme evidently gave satisfaction to the large audience present, but personally I am of the opinion that it was not quite up to the standard of previous years. To prepare a programme worthy of our public schools, and fitted to represent them before a discriminating audience, would require double the number of rehearsals that were possible last year.

Much credit is deserved by the regular teachers in my department for the cordial manner in which they have endeavored to put into practice any helpful suggestions which I may have been able to offer.

## REPORT OF THE INSTRUCTOR IN MILITARY

## DRILL AND PHYSICAL EXERCISES.

I have the honor to submit for the information of the Chairman and members of the Toronto Public School Board the following report in connection with the Military Drill and Physical Exercises in the Toronto Public Schools during the year 1898.

## CADET COMPANIES.

I am again pleased to report that the work of the cadet companies has been very satisfactory. It will be seen by the efficiency return that the companies composing No. 1 Battalion are the same as last year. This is the fourth year that this Battalion has held first place.

ANNUAL REVIEW AND INSPECTION.

The annual review and inspection of the Toronto Public School Cadets was held on 2nd of June. Lieut.

Col. Otter, District Officer Commanding Military District No. 2, reviewed the Cadets as they marched up Simcoe street, and afterwards inspected the Battalions after they had been formed into line on Queen street avenue. He was pleased to compliment the Cadets on the creditable way in which they had performed the several movements. There were present on parade 39 companies, including 1 company from Victoria Industrial School, with a total strength of 1567.

After the review and inspection the Cadets assisted the Veterans of ' 66 and the Battleford and Batoche Colums in decorating the monuments erected to the memory of the volunteers that were killed in 1866 and 1885. Lieut. Col. Mason Commanding Royal Grenadiers was in command. I herein send you a copy of a letter received from him, which expresses his admiration for the work done by the Cadets. I am very much indebted to Major Leslie and Captains Curran, Elliott and Gillies of the York Rangers for the able assistance rendered me at the parade.

## CARE OF ARMS.

The care of the rifles supplied to the several companies, I am pleased to report, has been satisfactory.
senior classes (Gibls).
The work of the senior girls for the past year has shown a marked improvement, but as very few of the
teachers give the necessary time to the practice of the physical exercises as given to the girls by me, the work is not as satisfactory as I should desire. The girls themselves are taking a greater interest in the work, and if the teachers were to practice the exercises with their classes the results would be very much better, while the teachers would also receive a benefit. Once more I strongly recommend that in these classes physical exercises with apparatus be taught.

## JUNIOR CLASSES.

The work in the junior classes is steadily improving, a greater interest being taken by the pupils.

## SPECIAL CLASSES.

The class of model students consisting of 40 students was instructed during the term in military drill and physical exercises. Most of the students succeeaed in passing the examination at the end of the term.

I gave special instruction to two classes of girls taken from the senior classes of the several schools. These classes took part in the annual school concert held in Massey Hall. One class gave an exhibition of Wand drill, the other class consisting of 46 girls performed the Scarf drill. These classes did their work in a most reditable maṇner.

The class of 24 cadets that took part in the annual school concert received special instruction in physical drill with arms. The work was very satisfactory.

During the year, through the efforts of Stephen W. Burns Esq., Chairman of the Board, and Inspector James L. Hughes, permission was obtained from the Honourable, the Minister of Education and the Militia Department, for the formation of six companies of Public School Cadets. In response to the request for pupils to join the companies, I had six hundred applications, enough for twelve companies. The service rolls were duly signed and, together with the recommendations for the appointment of officers, and requisitions for arms and equipment, were sent to the Militia Department. The School Board has been endeavoring to obtain this permission from the Militia Department for several years past, and I am pleased to report that we are now in a fair way to accomplish the formation of the Cadet corps.

An invitation was received from Governor Bloxham of Florida, for the presence of a company of Toronto Public School Cadets in Tampa during the Military convention to be held in Tampa, Florida, during February, 1899. The invitation was accepted and the Board granted permission for the company to go.

I herewith forward a return of comparative efficiency of the several battalions, also parade states for June 2nd.

I think it only my duty to say to you that the behaviour of the boys composing the Public School Brigade was most commendable.

My position as the senior officer in charge of the parade from the time they arrived at the Armouries gave me every opportunity of judging, and I could not help noticing how readily they obeyed the commands of their officers up to the end, and how well the movements were performed, more especially the formations into and from lines of Quarter Columns, rendered more difficult because done on ground more or less (unavoidably) impeded by crowds of spectators, the whole reflecting much credit on the boys themselves as well as on those responsible for their drill and discipline.

I sincerely trust that such organizations will soon become general throughout the whole country and that in the near future every educational institution for boys in the Dominion will have its drilled company or companies.
