PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

Beloved Brether,—"Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ," through the gracious care of the Great Head of the Church, we have again enjoyed the privilege of meeting in our Annual Conference. We have abundant reason to be thankful to the "Master of Assemblies" for the harmony which has prevailed during our sessions. Though many, and in some cases, widely divergent views have been entertained, and conflicting interests involved, in the subjects discussed, "the unity of the Spirit has been kept in the bond of peace." The near approach of another General Conference led to many suggestions relating to the more perfect adjustment of the different departments of our work, and to the more effective operation of our ecclesiastical machinery. It was felt that the constantly changing conditions of thought, feeling and organization, incidental to the progress, of social and religious life, necessitated new methods of action, and forms of effort more precisely adapted to things as they are. In the consideration of these topics there was an evident sense of need of the wisdom that cometh from above, and a manifest desire to secure divine direction and

The old and justly prized spirit of Methodism has been felt in the soul-stirring power of our religious services. Though intellectual strength and beauty characterized the addresses, and these features of the exercises duly appreciated, they were largely controlled by the devo-

tional and spiritual.

The gratifying increase reported in our membership, and in connextional funds is worthy of grateful notice. We are still able to exclaim, with our venerable founder, "The best of all is, God is with us." Revivals have taken place at many points within our boundaries. This is as it should be. No greater calamity could befall us than a decline of spiritual power, unless it might be its utter loss. Other churches may find their strength in the cultivation of the social element, others may rely upon their historic claims to the favorable consideration of the public, others may expend their resources in scenic display and ritualistic imagery, and others in intellectual strength and culture, but the Methodist Church must be an evangelistic organization or die. The very reason for its existence is found in the need of the common people for the gospel as we preach it. To lose our aggressiveness is to lose our life. Our economy furnishes us with every element essential to success. There

There is not a truth we hold that does not sustain and strengthen every other related truth. We have no contradictions to reconcile, no theological tenets which require to be explained away, or made to mean

something they do not say.

The plain unbiased common sense of the people is with us and the gospel as we preach it. We have no mysteries to be communicated only to the initiated few. The terrible doctrine of human depravity, as we proclaim it, is confirmed by the experience and observation of all mankind. Where is the intelligent conscience that does not readily respond to the offer of a full and free salvation, resting upon the evangelical doctrine of universal redemption? Where is the manhood that does not feel itself honored by such an appeal to its self-respect as that which is made to it when God says, "Come, let us reason together." To the lowliest and most degraded that gospel is welcome that does not ignore his power to choose for himself and that does not make him a mere senseless cog in the heartless machinery of a blind fatalism. Where is the penitent who does not welcome the kindly aid of the Holy Spirit and the prospect of a free forgiveness for the sin of the past? Where is the prospect of a free forgiveness for the sin of the past? young convert who does not exult in the witness of the Spirit and the joy of a conscious salvation? What loftier ideal of devotion can be presented to the uplifted vision of the child of God than that which is found in the Methodist doctrine of Perfect Love? Our class-meetings and love-feasts enable our people to realize, as they can in no other way, the blessedness of the communion of saints. Our sacred institutions greet the infant of days, surround the mature manhood of later life, and add to the comfort of the dying saint. No community upon the face of the earth has greater reason to prize the means of grace within its reach, and no Christian worker can find more perfect facilities for usefulness than those which are furnished him by the resources of our common Methodism.

We are grateful to be permitted to note the growing strength and efficiency of our missionary operations. Through the operation of a series of remarkable providences, the field has become more vast and varied, and in foreign lands as well as in our own, inviting openings, encourage the exercise of a stronger faith, and demand increased effort. Through the blessing of God our community has become more united and strong, its resources are rapidly multiplying and its position becoming more advantageous and influential. The immense size of the territory occupied by our missionaries, the number of noble and self-sacrificing men and women engaged in this work; the multitudes of people of varied languages, habits, and superstitions, among whom they labor; the generous sums contributed for the accomplishment of the results desired both in the home and foreign field; the gratifying ingatherings of souls already reported, and the sure promise of still more magnificent successes in the future indicate the importance of this department of our work. But, what has been done is insignificant when compared with what may yet be accomplished. There never was a time in which the claims of this ever-increasing work were more pressing and urgent nations, that are

We shall be recreant to our trust if we fail through indolence, indifference or worldliness, to meet the demands of this momentous hour. With every accession of privilege there is a corresponding increase of responsibility. The Lord of the vineyard who has honored us by committing so large & territory to our care, places us under the most solemn obligations, and demands our largest resources. It is with pleasure that we note the flourishing condition of the Woman's Missionary Society, and recognize the importance of its operations, and the gratifying results secured, both in the home and foreign field. We also hall with gratitude and gladness the energy and zeal with which the Epworth League and Students' Forward Movement is worked, thus securing through variety of agency and unity of purpose, the magnificent results which we are warranted in anticipation.

The progress of our Superannuation Fund is, we presume, a matter of the progress of our Superannuation Fund is, we presume, a matter of deep interest to our people. The foundation of a civil and religious liberty we enjoy, and the religious institutes with which we are connected, were largely laid by the early ministers of the gospel, who, when difficulties were great and handships abounded, labored in this country. They had no opportunity of laying up anything for old age. They shared with cheerfulness the poverty of the people, not expecting an earthly reward. Many of these men are now dependent upon the scanty provision made for their support by this fund. They were the instruments in the hands af God of saving many members of a former generation from the dissipations connected with a life of sin, and leading them to the formation of those habits of industry and frugality, which are ever associated with godliness, and that they secured to their children the material and moral treasures which they enjoy to-day. It becomes us all to remember with gratitude the benefits conferred upon the community

by the labors of these self-denying and devoted men, and recognize them

in the most generous and practical manner.

The maintenance of our educational institutions is a work of great importance. The public school system of this country is in many respects an admirable one, and while your children remain under the parental roof they may with safety and profit avail themselves of its advantages. But when higher education is sought, and your children, in order to obtain it, must spend months, or even years away from your homes, it becomes you to consider whether it is wise to place them under influences that are wholly secular, or surround them with associations that are moral and religious, as well as intellectual. In the educational institutions of our own Church the highest intellectual culture is provided in connection with an unsectarian, but thoroughly Christian training. Many of our young people are led, during the progress of their education, in the midst of their surroundings, to consecrate themselves to the service of the Lord Jeaus Christ, and not a few persons now occupying influential positions in society, are indebted to them for a purity and beauty of character which renders intellectual culture all the more attractive and effective. wholly wanting, is likely to become one of the future perils of society, and it becomes you to see, that as far as possible, your children are preserved from its blighting influence. On the other hand, we would warn you against securing upon terms so low as to render it a charity, an education for your daughters in institutions in which superstition takes the place of religion, and the crucifix supplants the cross. Some of the fairest descendants of Protestant parents have been thus deluded by the deception of a system in which the sanctified smoothness of a heartless Jesuitism is made to take the place of the "beauty of holiness." No parent who has the spiritual interests of his children at heart will expose them to the miserable results of such a course, a course in which the intellectual gains are as few and scanty as the moral fruits are tasteless and disappointing. Nor can you ever estimate the importance of that department of our educational work which provides for the training of probationers for our ministry, a work which has been the means of preparing for the pulpit some of its brightest ornaments and most effective preachers.

As believers in the close connection that exists between precepts and the promises of God you will appreciate the importance of the Sunday School work of our Church. He who has said, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it," has vouchsafed His richest blessing to all well directed efforts for the salvation of the young. The statistical and financial returns will show you that this department of our Church's work is making gratifying progress. The officers and teachers of our numerous schools are evidently selected with a view to their piety, zeal and efficiency, and are in thorough sympathy with their work. A system of organization of the most comprehensive character is now made universally applicable, and its results are apparent in the increased efficiency of the work. Our Book-Rooms provide an admirable series of publications specially prepared for the use of both teachers and scholars, at a reasonable cost, and we heartily commend them to your favorable notice. As the periodicals and literary aids prepared by our Sunday School authorities are in harmony with our doctrines, and evince a thorough acquaintance with our methods of operation, they must be of greater assistance to our own people than other publications can be, and for that reason we urge their general use to the exclusion of foreign productions which have nothing in common with our work. We are thankful to note, as a most important fact, the results of Sabbath School training in the large numbers of children who through this agency are brought to Christ and become promising members of the Church, thus uniting fealty to their Lord, with intelligent attachment to the peculiar institutions of Methodism. There are few, if any, more inviting fields than this, and none which bring in larger spiritual returns. No talent is too valuable to be employed on it, and no resources too large to be drawn upon for its benefit. The future of the home, the Church, and the nation, is in the hands of the children of to-day, and the religious life of the world in the early days of next century is what we make it now. No class of effort demands more intense zeal, more spiritual power, or more practical efficiency. Nor can we close our reference to this subject without joyful and grateful recognition of the importance of the

Home Department of Sabbath School work, in promoting the more general study of the Scriptures, and bringing parents, teachers and

children into closer relationship with each other.

The growth of our Young People's Societies affords great satisfaction to every lover of the Kingdom of God. Though there is much to be admired in the variety, as well as the number of such organizations, still greater efficiency would be secured, while the Spirit of Christian unity would, by no means, be impaired by more general uniformity both in the designation and character of these institutions. Such uniformity would secure a more general understanding of the common ground and purpose of such societies. The admirable constitution of our Epworth Leagues would, if universally adopted, promote the common aim of youthful Christian Endeavor, make its moral machinery more perfect and effective, and bring our young people into closer relationship with each other and promote their loyalty to the principles of our beloved Methodism.

No community has a more undoubted right to express its purpose in relation to questions of moral reform than that to which we belong. For more than a century and a half the Methodist Church has had on her statute books an ordinance forbidding "drunkenness, the buying or selling spirituous liquors, or drinking them," the oldest prohibitory law in the world outside of the Bible. In her view, at least, the time has passed in which the right of the people to demand, by vote, legislation to secure the total prohibition of the liquor traffic, can be doubted. That that right will be exercised, more effectually than ever, in the near future, by the Christian voters of this land is certain, and there is every reason to hope that the desired result will be secured. We have no need to remind you of your duty in relation to this question. The position taken by our venerable founder, when he stood alone, or nearly so, the traditions of our common Methodism, the unquestionable teachings of Holy Writ, the interests of the rising generation, and a due regard to the security of our homes, the demands of good citizenship, the safety of our sacred and civil institutions, and the integrity of the manhood of the future demand at once and forever the abolition of this iniquitous traffic.

There are many to-day who plead that the ever-widening demands of a progressive civilization, the complex relations and far-reaching interests of the commercial world, the massiveness of our manufacturing enterprises, the increased activity produced by the rapidly multiplying facilities for travel must necessarily interfere with the integrity and sanctity of the Lord's Day. There are many who are inclined to substitute a loose application of the observance of the Day of Rest. But Christian love finds at once its refuge from the cares, and its repose from the toil of life in that quiet day which, like a sacred spell, charms into peace the anxieties of secular life. The Lord of Life is the Master of time, and amid the countless changes of advancing civilization remains the same. We need only remind you that the Sabbath law of rest began with creation, and when time shall end, shall widen into the repose of endless life. We urge you to guard against all interference with this sacred day, and both by precept and example promote its peaceful purpose, and perpetuate its unimpaired obligations.

OBITUARIES.

GEORGE R. SANDERSON, D.D.

Rev. George Sanderson was born in Kingston, Ont., in 1816, and died at his residence in London, Ont., March 20th, 1898, in the 82nd year of his age. In the death of Dr. Sanderson there has passed from our ministerial ranks not only one of the oldest and most highly esteemed members of the London Conference, but a man of such marked personality and conspicuous talents that his lifework must always remain prominently identified with the history of the Methodist Church in this country. For nearly half a century this venerable divine has been one of the most familiar figures in the pulpits and councils of the Church, and his name has become a household word in the homes of our Canadian Methodism.

He was one of the few surviving ones of that heroic band of pioneer preachers who threaded the pathless forests of this Province, in order to minister to the spiritual wants of the people in those early days. He was also one of the little band of students who first attended the Upper Canada Academy, since developed into our well-known Victoria

In 1841 he was ordained, and after travelling the Stamford and St. Catharines Circuits was in 1846 appointed editor of the Christian Guardian, occupying that important position with signal ability for five years. After leaving the editorial chair, Dr. Sanderson was stationed in Cobourg, where he witnessed, perhaps, one of the most remarkable revivals of religion ever known in that town. He was then appointed Book Steward, and for four years discharged with tidelity and success the onerous duties pertaining to that important office.

pertaining to that important office.

In 1860 he was elected Chairman of the London District, and ever after continued to occupy that important position in the several districts in which he was stationed. The esteem in which he was held by his brethren and by the flocks to whom he so faithfully ministered, is sufficiently indicated by the official positions assigned him and which he so ably filled.

In 1861 he was appointed representative to the English Wesleyan Conference; in 1871, co-delegate of Conference; in 1872, representative to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States. He was twice President of Conference, in 1877 and again in 1885. He was delegate to our first General Conference, 1874, and also to the General Conference of 1878. Victoria University conferred on her distinguished son in 1877 the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. After travelling fifty-one years and occupying such important stations as

Although retired, he was very far from being inactive, and gave numerous evidences, notwithstanding his advancing age, of being still an energetic, untiring Christian worker. Dr. Sanderson frequently preached and also took some part, almost every Sabbath, in the services of the First Methodist Church (with which he was connected) up to his death. He was also senior Vice-President of the Western Ontario Bible Society, and ever evinced, both by speech and by pen, a deep interest in that important work. Indeed, to the very last, he was a marvel of sustained energy. He retained his wonderful mental activity to the end, his magnificent brain being the last to yield before approaching dissolution, and when it ceased to act, his soul quickly ascended to its God.

It is almost beyond our power to present even a brief analysis of Dr. Sanderson's pulpit style or to indicate even a few of the many regal qualities in a life so richly endowed. In personal appearance, manners, and pulpit delivery he belonged to the old school of English preachers, for many of whom he is said to have cherished a warm admiration. He was at the farthest remove from what is now known as a sensational preacher; yet in the days of his power, we are told, there were times when his solid scriptural, earnest and methodical sermons were clothed with an eloquence and given with a pathos that could never be attained by any mere tricks of oratory.

Personally he was a dignified, large-hearted, grandly developed man, one to be revered as well as loved, in whom the elements of strength and kindness blended in the formation of an imperial manhood. Dr. Sanderson's wonderful and accurate knowledge of connexional law and usage made him an almost indispensable member of every important Conference committee. His long and useful life becoming more and more mellowed as it drew to its close, endeared him to very many, and those loved him most who knew him best.

His monument is his noble life, since it has secured for him an imperishable place in the history of his Church and in the memory of the people. Impressive funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church,

London, of which for nearly eleven years prior to his decease he had been a valuable and faithful member.

The large congregation that assembled in the spacious edifice was addressed by Revs. Chancellor Burwash, Dr. Burns and Dr. Griffin (all life-long friends of the departed), and after the solemnly interesting service, in which the President of Conference, chairman of the London District and others took part, "devout men carried him to his burial."

JOHN G. LAIRD.

Like many grand men in the Methodist Church, Bro. John G. Laird was a native of Ireland. He was born in Fermanagh in the year 1823. In the fourteenth year of his age he was converted to God and united with the Methodist Church. Having received a good English education, and completing a course at the Normal Training Institution in Dublin,

John G. Laird the year 1823. od and united lish education, ion in Dublin. he became a teacher and continued in that work for a brief period after his arrival in Canada and his settlement in London township. In 1848 he entered the ministry as a probationer, and having successfully passed through his probationary period was duly ordained a minister in the Weslevan Church.

After thirty-six years of faithful service in the active work he retired owing to ill-health and subsequently settled in London. For the past eleven years he has been identified with Dundas Centre Church, always manifesting a deep and lively interest in all matters pertaining to the Church of Christ in general and Dundas Street Church in particular. During his active ministerial career he enjoyed the confidence and love of his brethren in a very high degree. These delighted to do him honor, conferring upon him the highest honors they had it in their power to bestow. He was superintendent of many of our most important circuits, such as London, Hamilton, Sarnia, and others of like status, closing his active ministry in Orangeville. He for years was chairman of the district on which he was stationed. Was elected Secretary and afterwards President of the Toronto Conference. In all these offices he gave satisfaction to his brethren, bearing his honors meekly and discharging duty with promptitude, kindness and fidelity.

Brother Laird was eminently a soldier of the cross. Not only a soldier but a hero, not only a hero but a conqueror. He finished well his course, ceasing at once to work and live. Sound in doctrine, he lived as he preached the faith once delivered unto the saints. He was a laborious and faithful Methodist preacher. Many precious souls were led to Christ through his instrumentality. He ever esteemed it the greatest privilege and highest honor to earnestly preach the glorious Gospel, and strove not so much to make his preaching eloquent as effective in the salvation of souls, rightly judging that this is the only result that can be viewed with satisfaction in the last hour.

The sessions of the last Conference being held in Dundas Street Church, London, Brother Laird greatly appreciated the privilege of having fellowship with the brethren of the ministry once more. He seemed to be endowed with special strength at that time, for he was enabled to attend almost every session. On the Sunday following the meeting of the Conference he undertook an appointment in the Hamilton Road Church, but was unable to complete the service. Ere he had finished his sermon he became unconscious and was conveyed immediately to his residence, where after the lapse of a few days "he was not, for God took him." Appropriately might this servant of God in his final hour employ the language of the great apostle to the Gentiles and say, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteous mess which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day, and not to me only, but also to all them also that love His appearing."

A memorial service was held in the church, when appropriate addresses were delivered by Revs. Dr. Sanderson and Willoughby and a representative of the Western Ontario Bible Society, of which Brother Laird was vice-president, after which all that was mortal was given to the grave in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, London, awaiting the resurrection of the just.

JAMES GUNDY.

The Rev. James Gundy, the subject of this obituary, who was born in Port Arlington, Ireland, belonged to a family of whom the greater number were ministers of the Gospel of Christ. His father was a minister of considerable prominence in the church once known as the Methodist New Connexion, and three of his brothers, one of whom, the Rev. J. R. Gundy. is still an honored member of this London Conference, served the Church

with marked success in the ranks of the ministry.

Soon after his conversion, he was persuaded that he was called of God to preach the Gospel. This, in the order of Divine Providence, was followed by the call of the Church, to which he willingly responded. The earlier years of his ministry, while in the strength of his manhood, were marked by great success in his work. During a term of four years spent on the Adelaide Circuit, the hand of the Lord was with him in great power in evangelistic services, and many were converted to God through his instrumentality, some of whom remain to this day as the seals of his ministry. During the later years of his active service, it was his lot to be appointed to some of the most arduous and uninviting fields of our work; yet he went to them without a murmur, and patiently and faithfully labored for the Master' by seeking the salvation of souls. His sermons were always orthodox, and often powerful expositions of truth according to the Methodist standards of doctrine. By the kindliness of his nature, and his experience of the love of his Saviour, he was especially qualified to be the minister of consolation to the sorrowing heart. His words of sympathy and encouragement will linger long in the memory of many a spirit once burdened with grief. His heart was in his work, and it was with the utmost reluctance that he was compelled to superannuate at the Ridgetown Conference in the year 1894. He still clung to the hope that he might yet recover strength and be restored to the active work; but such was not to be the case, for the Lord took him to his rest and his reward. At his home in Brantford, on the 31st of October, 1897, he quitted the earthly tabernacle for the house not made with hands eternal in the heavens.

Those who knew Bro. Gundy best can never forget the almost feminine tenderness of his regard for the members of his family, and his sincere affection for his brethren in the ministry. In that place where God appoints the stations, and where love of truth, and love of Christ and duty, constitute the base of gradation, we shall not be surprised to find him in the ranks of those counted worthy of the higher degrees of distinction

in the honor and glory of God.

JOHN WALKER.

The Rev. John Walker was born in Sligo County, Ireland, June 22nd, 1825, the eldest of twelve children, of Robert and Jane Walker. His parents and family emigrated to Canada and settled near the present town of Smith's Falls, in 1830. They were pious members of the Methodist Church, and taught their children the way of godliness. Of their six sons three entered the ministry and three others graduated in medicine.

John Walker was converted when very young, and at the age of seventeen became a promising local preacher and zealous temperance lecturer. He felt called of God to enter the ministry, but for some time he shrank from so momentous a work, and took the calling of school teacher. In 1854 he entered the ministry, being sent to the Lansdowne Circuit, and from that time until failing health compelled him to desist, he devoted all his intellectual and physical powers successfully to the work of soul-saving,

and at the last day many will call him blessed.

He was a man of true and noble character, and of heroic, self-sacrificing life. A pioneer Methodist minister, he shared the many hardships and bore the trials and took his full part in the arduous work of the men who laid the foundations of Methodism in western Ontario, and especially in what was known as "the Huron tract." In his self-denying and laborious work he would sometimes be absent from his home for three or four weeks at a time, following the new settlers by a trail indicated by marks on the forest trees "blazed" by an axe, sometimes wading bridgeless streams or crossing rivers on rafts rudely constructed for the occasion, and when hungry, weary and footsore, his heart would be gladdened at the sight of the curling smoke from the shanty of the settlers in the small clearings. After joining them in their humble fare, he would sally forth and visit the neighborhood, gather together the people and preach to them the good news of salvation, hold "protracted" meetings and form Methodist classes. In the midst of church and parsonage building and much travelling and preaching, he found time also for much reading and study, and not only was he a reader, but an independent thinker, original in his conception and expression of the truth. As a preacher he was earnest, fervent, and spoke with the unction of the Spirit. He was a man of strongest convictions of right and truth and duty, and dared everywhere and always to express them. He had a kind and benevolent heart; most kind was he in his own home and to his friends, and benevolent to all.

He providentially found a noble, heroic and loving wife and helpmate, in the person of Miss Elizabeth Taylor, who with seven children survives him. His only living son, Robert, is engaged as a teacher in one of our Indian Institutes in British Columbia, and a daughter is teaching in Red Deer Institute, Manitoba. In Lucknow, where he spent nine years of his active ministry and twenty-four during superannuation, his memory, with that of his estimable family, is held in the very highest esteem. During his long illness he had the joy of the Lord as his strength, and whilst suffering much, and for weeks and months unable to leave his chair even for sleep, he never murmured, but patiently endured and left all with God. When visited by the minister in charge, he was always able to witness confidently and triumphantly to the abiding love and grace of God toward him. In his last moments he frequently said, "I am going home; we shall all meet by-and bye." He died at Mount Brydges, January 14th, 1898, to which place he had removed the previous July. "He being dead yet

speaketh."

JOHN LESLIE KERR

Was one of Ireland's choicest gifts to the Methodist Church. He was born in the town of Sligo, September 1st, 1826. Up to the twelfth year of his age he lived with his grandmother Leslie, in honor of whom he received his second baptismal name. At the age of sixteen he united with the Church; and he became a local preacher one year later. At that early day in his life he was accustomed to travel all around a large circuit, and even then gave promise of the splendid manhood revealed in after years. At twenty-five he was married to Margaret J. Rutledge, of his native town, and sister to the Rev. W. L. Rutledge, B.A., now of the Hamilton Conference. That union proved one of great happiness, and made their home one of delight to all for forty-seven years. In the year 1852 he disposed of a prosperous and lucrative business, in which he had been engaged for some years, and, at the earnest solicitation of the Rev. Enoch Wood, D.D., then President of the Canadian Conference, he, with wife and daughter, came across the sea, to enter the ranks of the itinerant ministry. The strength and clearness of the divine call, together with his ardent interest in the work of saving men, alone made it possible for him to brush aside the brightest prospects of worldly wealth and honor. Soon after his arrival in Canada he was appointed by the President to act as supply on the Sandwich Circuit, on the Detroit River; and to that charge he made his way on horseback from Erin, near Guelph. At the end of his second year's probation he was ordained. He subsequently labored with great acceptance at Mono, Owen Sound, Meaford, Orillia, Cayuga, Napier, Romney, Dawn Mills, Dresden, Ridgetown, Leadington, Wardsville, Kirkton, Dorchester, and Mount Brydges.

Thirteen years ago he was granted superannuation, and went to reside at Brussels, where his elder son was located, and who was and still is an honored official of the Church. There he spent the closing years of his life on earth, still useful in the service of the Church, respected and beloved by all who knew him. He was in every way eminently qualified for the work of the Gospel ministry. He possessed a sound and vigorous body; he had been well disciplined and trained; he had a rich voice for both sermon and song; he was endowed with much of the eloquence, wit and fire for which so many of his fellow-countrymen are specially noted; he was well balanced; he was a man of bright and "sunny ways," and, above all and crowning all, there dwelt in him in very large measure the spirit of his Master. He was one of God's true noblemen. His fine, keen sense of honor and right made it impossible for him to be anything less than a Christian gentleman. In him the young man especially found a striking example of true manliness. Not often, indeed, is the Church called to mourn the loss of one who lived a more unselfish life, or one who revealed a more beautiful and attractive spirit. One of the most notable characteristics of his life was the warm, tender affection which he manifested toward every member of his family. And it was one joy of his heart that God in his providence had called his younger son, now a member of this Conference, to wear the father's mantle in the ranks of the ministry.

His only desire was to be divinely directed as to where he might labor. The way to the most inviting fields of labor does not always seem to open to the man of the finest ability, or he would have found it oftener than he did. But his work has been well done, and he has "entered into rest." For several months previous to the day of his death he seemed to have premonitions of death's approach. His last act of ministry was the administration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper to a couple of the members of his class, who were unable to attend the church service. In the last week of his pilgrimage, and when within sight of the other shore, he sang as in his youthful days:

"Come, let us anew our journey pursue;
The arrow is flown; the moment is gone;
The millennial year
Rushes on to our view, and eternity's here."

And as the brightness and beauty of the morning of Palm Sunday, April 3rd, 1898, dawned upon the earth, our Brother Kerr passed into the light of the eternal day.

WALTON PRESTON.

Walton Preston was born in Darlington, England, in 1823. His father was an officer in the British Army. Walton was converted to God at the age of thirteen, and from that moment had an ever deepening impression of his call by God to preach the Gospel. By diligent study in the best available institutions, he acquired a good education, and having an apt and observant mind, his education broadened into an ability to understand and a capability to be a leader of men. He labored successfully as assistant preacher at Berwick-on-Tweed and Sunderland, among the primitive Methodists. Removing to Canada, his abilities and worth were at once recognized, and for two years he was stationed in Toronto, then at Niagara, and at Bowmanville.

He was united in holy wedlock to Miss Hoar, and found in her a worthy help-meet through the years of his earthly pilgrimage. Always tender and thoughtful for the interests of his family, he would endure any inconvenience rather than that they should suffer. A wife four

any inconvenience rather than that they should suffer. A wife, four sons and two daughters mourn the loss of their loved parent.

In 1847 he entered the Methodist ministry, in which he labored with great efficiency, occupying many of the best fields and enjoying the warm regard of his brethren. After ordination in June, 1848, he travelled the following fields: Elizabethtown, St. Catharines, Owen Sound, London North, St. Mary's, Cayuga, Strathroy, Paisley, Brussels, Thamesville, Holstein, and Walpole Island. Whilst laboring at the latter place his sight became impaired and he was thus reluctantly compelled to give up the active work. He settled at Port Lambton, where he became universally loved by those of every denomination, each vying with the other in rendering aid in his affliction. As a preacher of the Gospel he was solid, scriptural, earnest and edifying. Sensationalism his soul despised. He

looked for results to the power of truth applied by the Holy Ghost. As a revivalist he excelled. In delivery he was forcible and convincing. He held his own opinions and convictions firmly, but was ever respectful toward the opinions of others, and friendship whilst among his brethren was never endangered by any differences of opinion. To the last he expressed the greatest pleasure in the progress of God's cause.

The last years of life were spent in almost total blindness. But whilst not enabled to see the light of the material sun, the Scripture truth, "The Lord God is a sun and shield." became more a reality.

During the last year of life he often expressed the thought which seemed to possess his mind: "That he would soon be at home with his loving Saviour." (The brethren of the Sarnia District remember how keenly he enjoyed the last assembling with his brethren, and how joyously he expressed his faith in his Saviour, whilst attending the District meeting of May, 1897. The end came suddenly, but not unexpectedly. Speaking with his pastor the evening before his death, he said, "I expect to be called away by some accident." So it was. Next morning, September 10th, many hearts were saddened to learn that Father Preston had fallen down the stairway and probably met instant death.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Geo. Henderson, Chairman of the District, Revs. Stinson, Patterson, Fessant, Elias, and the pastor also being present. The remains were taken to Bownanville for interment, there to await the resurrection of the just. The following words of the poet beautifully express the last years of his life:

"Blindfolded and alone I stand,
With unknown thresholds on each hand;
The darkness deepens as I grope,
Afraid to fear, afraid to hope,
Yet this one thing I learn to know
Each day more surely as I go,
That doors are opened, ways are made,
Burdens are lifted, or are laid,
By some great Law, unseen and still,
Unfathomed purpose to fulfil,
'Not as I will.'"

1. That the Secretaries of Districts and the Secretary of Conference shall be a Tabulating and Statistical Committee, of which the Secretary of Conference shall be chairman, whose duty it shall be to meet on the day preceding the opening of the Ministerial Session of the Conference at 10 a.m.

2. That whenever it is impracticable for any District Secretary to be present at the meeting designated, he shall be required to forward his District books and schedules, properly filled, to the Secretary of Conference in time for said meeting.

3. That Chairmen of Districts shall instruct District Secretaries to exercise great care in preparing their statistics, especially to prove their totals; and that the auditors selected to examine the circuit schedules be urged to do the work assigned them correctly.

The business of the Statistical Committee shall be:

(1) To classify and arrange all memorials and resolutions from the several districts in such a way, that when called for they may be presented to the Conference, and be readily referred to the appropriate committee for consideration, or be acted upon by the Conference, as it may direct.

(2) To prepare and have ready for presentation to the Conference, when called for, a full report of all statistics relating to the Conference.

(3) That District Secretaries shall prepare separate copies of all memorials and resolutions referred by the Districts to the Conference, and also the copies of the District records designated for the use of the Secretary of Conference, correctly added and balanced, in order that they may be ready for the use of said committee.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending

July 31st, 1897.

To provide against an increase of indebtedness ten per cent. has been deducted from all the annuities.

The estimated receipts, carefully made at the beginning of the year, have fallen below the actual expenditure, \$3,373. The falling-off in receipts, as compared with the estimates, is largely due to the payment of a less amount from certain Circuits, the Book-Room, and the Missionary Society than was anticipated.

The returns show that the Circuits and ministers generally are loyally sustaining the Fund.

The arrearages during the last two years, amounting to over \$5,000, are chargeable principally to probationers.

The Board would remind Chairmen of Districts that probationers are under obligation to pay their subscriptions to the Fund annually, according to the years travelled, without regard to the credit given them in their studies.

The Permanent Fund has been increased during the year, \$8,230.

(A) CONSTITUTION OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

I.-NAME.

The name of the Fund shall be the Sustentation Fund of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

II.—OBJECT.

The object of the Fund shall be to supplement the amount paid by any circuit for ministerial support where this amount is considered to be insufficient to meet the requirements of the minister for the current year, in accordance with par. 468, sec. 8 of the Discipline.

III .- INCOME.

The Fund shall be maintained by collections and contributions taken annually in the month of March, at the morning, afternoon and evening public services in all our congregations on every circuit and mission throughout the Conference, and by bequests and donations; and each minister shall bring the matter fairly before his people and earnestly endeavor to secure for it their liberal support.

IV .- CLAIMANTS.

Any minister on a circuit whose income from all sources whatsoever is deemed insufficient to meet his requirements for the current year shall be entitled to make a claim upon this Fund; but only in special cases shall any claim be considered where such income exceeds for married ministers the sum of \$600 per annum, for single ordained ministers \$250, and for probationers \$200.

V .- MANAGEMENT.

 The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each district, elected by ballot by the annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee.

This Committee shall meet and consider the claim upon the Fund at such a time as will enable the secretary-treasurer to distribute to the several claimants the funds in hand during the sessions of the Conference.

3. No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the May District Meeting immediately preceding such distribution.

4. The Financial District Meeting shall each year inquire into the financial condition of each circuit reported as having paid less than \$600 the previous year, and, if deemed necessary, a special deputation shall be appointed to visit their Quarterly Board, so as, if possible, to develop a more liberal support of their minister.

5. No minister or probationer shall be entitled to any claim upon the Fund upon whose circuit the appointed contributions to the support of the Fund have not been taken.

 The Committee shall present a report to the Conference annually, including an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestion deemed necessary in the interests of the Fund.

7. And your Committee would respectfully suggest, that for the present year, the Conference proceed to elect a secretary-treasurer, without nomination from the Sustentation Fund Committee, and that the Rev. J. R. Gundy be so appointed.

(B) REGULATIONS FOR THE CONTINGENT FUND.

1. All claims upon this Fund for special affliction must be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting, and also by the itemized and receipted bills for the same.

2. All claims upon this Fund for extraordinary services incurred in the services of the Church must likewise be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting.

Your Committee met at the call of the Convener and organized with Rev. A. Cunningham as Chairman, and Rev. W. H. Butt as Secretary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

REPORT No. 1.

The Board of Examiners met the probationers and candidates for the ministry in Askin Street Church, London, from April 19th to April 21st, and conducted the usual examinations.

A public meeting was held on the evening of the 21st, when appropriate addresses were delivered by Revs. Dr. Williams and Joseph Philp, B.D., after which certificates of standing were presented to the probationers and candidates.

We recommend that Pastors be found as frequently as possible in the League meetings, and become sympathetic, tactful and helpful in the leadership of the same, and that Leaguers continue to be the helpers on whom the Pastor may rely with confidence.

2. We regard the work of the League in its four departments to be the same, i.e. to save souls. That this work be most successfully done, we recommend that where it is possible all our Leagues shall be organized, and the work diligently prosecuted, in all the four departments.

3. We have heard with glad satisfaction the report of the success of our excellent Epworth League reading course during the year, and we further recommend that as far as possible this course be introduced into all our Leagues.

4. Whereas much good has been accomplished among the children of our Church, in guarding them against the formation of evil habits and leading them on towards the work of the Church, by the establishment of Junior Leagues in certain places; and whereas many of our Churches have not yet introduced said department:

We most urgently recommend the formation of Junior Leagues in all the Churches of our Conference, and that the purport of this resolution be brought before all the Senior Leagues by the Ministers or the Presidents of the Leagues.

5. That in view of the interest taken in the Forward Movement for Missions by our young people, we recommend that an effort be made to introduce this movement into all our Leagues, and we would urge greater liberality on the part of our young people toward the Missionary enterprises of our Church, according to the plan laid down in the Forward Movement plan.

We would further recommend that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to so arrange the constitution of the Forward Movement for Missions, as to bring it more directly under the control of the officers of the Church:

1st. By making the Pastor of the Church treasurer of the moneys so raised, to be handed to him quarterly by the League Treasurer; and,

2nd. That when a District shall have reached an amount sufficient to support a missionary in the foreign field, that the General Board shall assign a missionary to such District, if requested, who shall maintain a correspondence with the E. L. Secretary of such District.

6. Your Committee recommend that the Rev. A. K. Birks be reappointed Treasurer of the General Epworth League Fund, and that this report be read in all our Epworth Leagues.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee report as follows:

We regard the proper observance of the Lord's day as an essential factor in our civilization, and vital to the life and perpetuity of the Christian Church; and being of Divine appointment for man it lies at the foundation of all our religious and civil liberty. "Verily, ye shall keep my Sabbaths and reverence my sanctuary," is a Divine injunction binding alike on prince and peasant, and it is with thankfulness we dwell on the thought, that among all the colonies of Great Britain none have been more law-abiding in this particular than the Dominion of Canada.

However, we are compelled to recognize the fact that that part of society which we properly designate the heathenism of civilization is in united effort and deadly purpose determined to destroy this holy day of rest and communion. The saloon power, infidelity, atheism, and other lawless elements, reinforced by the insidious encroachments of railroad companys and steamship corporations, also the selling of Sunday newspapers and running excursions, also camp-meetings including our Indian brethren opening gates to do business on the Lord's day; all of which

tend to destroy the sanctity of this divine institution.

We also deeply regret the running of street cars in some of our Canadian cities, and the increasing tendency to the use of the bicycle as well as horses and carriages for Sabbath picnics, visiting and other sources of amusements on the Sabbath; and we would urge upon all our ministers, Sunday-school teachers and Epworth Leaguers, and all members of the Church the importance of discouraging the same in every way possible, and that there must be on the part of the individual an absolute refusal to give patronage or to countenance in any degree any thing that would tend to desecrate the Sabbath.

Your Committee would also recommend that all our ministers preach at least one sermon during the year on the observance of the Sabbath, and that this report be read at the meeting, and that we seek to impress upon the minds of all our people the importance of guarding with greatest care the sacred day.

1. The general use of the new catechism.

2. That the schools guard more carefully the intermediate classes, and thus prevent lapses.

3. That greater care be exercised in the appointment of officers and

teachers to secure members of the Church for such responsible work.

The success of the Epworth League has been phenomenal in every department of its work, especially in the active membership, junior department, Forward Evangelistic and Forward Movement for Missions and reading courses.

We beg leave to recommend:

1. A Reading Circle in every League.

2. That each League adopt the plans of the Forward Movement for Missions and the Forward Evangelistic Movement.

All our Connexional funds are in advance of last year, the increase for missions being \$1,190.49; for education, \$185.08.

For these successes we thank our Heavenly Father and take courage.

TEMPERANCE REPORT.

Your Committee beg leave to report:

That we have considered the memorials received from the several districts which express appreciation of the fidelity of the Dominion Government in making provision, according to promise, for a plebiscite on the question of prohibition. We are fully in accord with the memorials thus presented, and in confirmation of the same would seek to impress upon our people the absolute necessity for such systematic arrangement and combined effort that all available votes may be polled in order to roll up a sweeping majority for the plebiscite, which we regard as an advance step in the direction of the complete prohibition of that diabolic system we call the liquor traffic. To let our opportunity pass unimproved would be criminal.

The question is, How to secure the desired results? We would respectfully suggest that means be devised to obtain and distribute plebiscite literature, and in every way possible to keep the great question before the people, by making it a special subject of prayer in all our society meetings, our Sabbath Schools, prayer services, Epworth Leagues, etc., also by preaching not only a sermon, but sermons. Agitate, agitate,

agitate!

We would further recommend that illuminated motto cards be secured and put up in prominent places; also that every Circuit Superintendent associate with himself his church officials and one special agent from among local temperance workers, so that each district may be thoroughly canvassed, voters visited, literature scattered, and arrangements made for bringing voters to the polls. We would urge close union with temperance organizations. In a word, let our machinery be as complete as that of any political campaign. We would call attention to the fact that temperance resolutions in the past have virtually died at the close of Conference, and there has been no general resurrection.

This we would submit to the earnest consideration of this Conference for its endorsation and recommendation to the attention of the General Conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Mr. President and Delegates:

We bring you the greeting of 21,000 women and girls who are united in 680 Auxiliaries and 277 Mission Circles and Bands. We thank you for your kind words on our behalf without which it would have been impossible to reach the hearts of the women of our churches.

We regret a decrease in income of \$126.98 due largely to the falling off in the Mission Band membership. No blame is attached to our workers, but the serious overlapping of methods and objects of work amongst the deplorably numerous young people's societies, calls for some re-adjustment, and we hope the General Conference may legislate on this point.

Our work in Japan is expanding, fifteen agents are employed in educational and evangelistic work in the cities of Tokyo, Shizuoka, Kofu and Kanazawa, while a beginning has also been made at Nagane. 172 pupils have been enrolled in three schools, while the King's Daughters school in Tokyo and the Industrial schools of Kanazawa are bringing to numbers of the very poor both material and spiritual comfort.

In West China a hospital has been opened and also a school with thirty children. Four little girls with unbound feet are supported as boarders by Epworth Leagues, and an orphanage is planned for to be erected by our Mission Bands in memory of our beloved worker Miss Jennie Ford. Before her death two little waifs had been rescued and adopted by Miss Ford and Miss Brackbill, and the need of such a building seems urgent. We have four ladies on the field at present, one being a qualified physician.

The work among the Chinese in British Columbia has developed in several directions. The "Home" in Victoria has become a centre of evangelistic work. A school has been established and a teacher engaged,

At Chilliwack we share with the General Society the care and expense of the Coqualectza Institute. The education and training of 104 girls and boys is no sinecure for those in charge. We are glad to know that

we rank high in the Government "Blue Book."

Grants are also given by our Society to Mr. Baley's Home at Kitamaat, and also to White Fish Lake, McDougall Orphanage, Bella Bella and Upper Skeena. These last two conditionally.

We share in the expense of the French Institute at Montreal, and also

employ evangelistic workers in other parts of the city.

A grant is given to the Orphanage in Newfoundland of \$500.

We commend to your notice the faithful work of our Literature and

Supply Committees.

The Supply Committee have distributed \$5,000 worth of goods to needy missionaries, sometimes for their own use but more often for those under

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following report:

1. We are truly grateful to our Heavenly Father for the measure of success that has attended the efforts of Sabbath School workers during the past year.

2. We note with pleasure an increase in the number of schools, and in the average attendance of officers, teachers and scholars, as well as a

growing interest in the home department.

3. There has also been a marked increase of 2,946 copies in all the periodicals taken, published by our Methodist Book Room, except the Sunbeam, which has a slight decrease; and other publications have fallen off to the extent of over five hundred copies.

4. There has been an increase in the contributions for missions and

the Sunday School Aid and Extension Fund.

5. On the other hand we urge the importance of securing, if possible, teachers who are members of the Church, as we notice with regret a

tendency in the opposite direction.

6. Your Committee would recommend that at the Financial District Meetings ministers and competent laymen be appointed to visit every Methodist Sabbath School in the district at least once during the year, and urge that the Catechism and Triple Pledge be introduced, also to see if our schools are properly managed and supplied with the best class and record books, and to get the home department and normal work introduced, and to give a complete and full report at the May District Meeting.

7. With regard to a resolution from Wingham District, in reference to unorganized places adjacent to cities and towns, we would recommend

that ministers organize new schools wherever practicable.

8. We depricate the fact that thirty schools are reported as closing their sessions a portion of the year. We would, therefore, urge upon superintendents the necessity of continuing the sessions of the school the whole of the year.

9. That the Rev. J. E. Holmes be reappointed Treasurer of Sabbath

Conference, stating clearly those who pay their billet fee. 6. That in case of members of the Conference who intend to make their own arrangements for billets, such members shall be required to notify the Secretary of the Billeting Committee of such intention, and of the places where they intend to stay.

A resolution from Sarnia District expresses disapproval of the division of Missionary funds into Home and Foreign, and approval of all possible retrenchment in expenses of management.

Recommended that we endorse and forward to the General Conference. A memorial from the Wingham District is received, urging that for purposes of economy the publication of missionary lists be discontinued, and that local records be substituted.

Recommended that the memorial be forwarded, with the recommendation that no change be made.

A memorial from the Sarnia District requests that in Par. 35 of Discipline the word "note" be struck out and that said paragraph be incorporated in the General Rules; also that in same paragraph, after the word "beverage," the words be inserted, "Signing petitions for granting liquor licenses, or in any way aiding or abetting the liquor traffic.

Recommended to be forwarded to the General Conference for the favor-

able consideration of that body.

A memorial from the Goderich District requests this Conference to memorialize the General Conference, that in appeals as granted by Discipline, the appellant be compelled to proceed with the appeal within a reasonable time.

Recommended that this memorial be passed on to the General Conference without comment.

Another memorial from the same District requests that the General Conference embody in the Discipline a law to the effect that no Chairman shall hold office for more than two years in succession.

Recommended to be passed on to the General Conference.

A petition from the Wingham District prays the General Conference to so amend the Discipline as to provide that in the election of Delegates to the General Conference, one-half shall be elected by ballot and the other half by rotation, according to seniority.

Resolved, That the General Conference be respectfully memorialized to so amend the Discipline relating to the election of Ministerial Delegates to the General Conference as to provide for the election of one-half the requisite number by ballot, and one-half of the members to be appointed by rotation, according to seniority, provided that no one shall be eligible for such appointment who has not been an ordained minister for at least tive years.

A memorial from the Wingham District, on the study of the Catechism and the formation of catechism classes where Pastors shall, so far as possible, give instruction in our Catechism; also a request that the General Conference incorporate such a regulation as a law in our Discipline, that the usage may be universal.

Recommended that we endorse the memorial as to the larger provision for

the study of the Catechism.

A memorial from the Wingham District looks for the substitution of a card of membership for the Quarterly ticket now in use; also a memorial from the Sarnia District urges more careful methods for the annual revision of the list of members, greater care and regularity in the observance of the Lord's Supper, and the use of an annual ticket or certificate of membership in place of the Quarterly tickets now in use.

We recommend the substitution of an annual ticket of membership for

the present Quarterly Tickets.

With regard to a resolution from Exeter District, memorializing the General Conference to arrange for one Central Board of Examiners for the examination of all probationers for our ministry

Also a similar resolution from the Goderich District, with the additional proposal that all degrees held and conferred upon any of our ministers shall be under the supervision of said Central Board.

Recommended that we approve of such Central Board of Examiners,

said Board not to consist of college professors only.

A petition from the Sarnia District prays that the following words be struck from Par. 140, Sec. 4, of our Discipline: "In special cases where the necessities of the work seem to demand it.

Also a memorial from the Windsor District, another from Front Street, Strathroy, Official Board, and a resolution of Rev. J. R. Gundy, request-

ing a return to the three years' pastoral term.

A resolution from Rev. Dr. Antliff, for a five years' term, and a resolu-

tion from Rev. Joseph Deacon, for four years' pastoral term.

Recommended that the words "three years" be struck from lines two and three of said section, and that "four years" be substituted, and that all after and including the word "provided" be struck out.

Memorials from the Windsor and St. Thomas Districts, re the Constitu-

tion of the Stationing Committee.

Recommended that no change be made.

A resolution from Strathroy, Front Street, Official Board, re what is known as the invitation system; another from Rev. R. Redmond, on the same subject; another from the Rev. Joseph R. Gundy; and yet another from the Rev. E. Middleton, on same subject, have been considered.

It is recommended that instead of extending invitations directly to ministers, quarterly official boards be permitted to indicate to the Stationing Committee, through the chairmen of districts, the names of two or more ministers, any one of whom would be accepted by the circuit concerned.

Recommended that the request be granted.

A memorial from Windsor District requests that par. 249 of the Discipline be made to read as follows: "And three-fourths of the money shall be legally secured before any such building shall be commenced."

Recommended to be endorsed and forwarded.

A resolution from the Strathroy District Meeting requests the endorsation of the million dollar scheme.

Recommended to be forwarded with approval.

A resolution of the Rev. T. E. Harrison asks that the General Conference so amend the law relating to the trial of ministers and probationers for the ministry on questions of character, that all findings of such committees of trial shall be subject to examination and revision by the ministerial session of the Annual Conference.

This important educational institution of the Church is closing its seventeenth year with a brightening outlook for the future. The fine location of the College, its superior buildings and equipment, and the necessity for such an institution in Western Ontario continue to draw widening consideration promising important ultimate advantage.

The enrolment of students, while somewhat smaller than last year, has averaged-longer term, so that with retrenchments affected, not impairing the efficiency of the school, the best balance sheet for years is in promise for this year's business. Another encouraging fact is that the attendance has steadily increased every term during the year.

The candidates for graduation in the several departments number twenty-four, and an unusually large class is preparing for teachers music certificates. In Fine Art Examinations, by the Education Department, Alma leads all the Art Schools and Ladies' Colleges in teachers certificates and proficiency certificates in painting. The classes in elecution and business are large and enthusiastic, and in College course the larger number have chosen the Bible work option.

An effort is being made by the leading citizens of St. Thomas to wipe out the floating debt of \$15,000 at present embarrassing the College. The promise is good that the effort will be a success.

The hearty co-operation of the members of the Conferences is the most certain way to assure such patronage as will place the college in such circumstances of power for good as shall make it more and more a centre for that mental, moral and social culture necessary to largest influence and widest success.

Whi our git honors, elemen Students are prepared annually for all grades of teachers' certificates and for both junior and senior matriculation.

The departments of Music, Fine Arts, Elocution and Commercial Science maintain their efficiency and are largely attended. In each of these departments students have repeatedly brought honor to themselves and to the institution by taking the highest place, year after year, in competition with students of other colleges.

The aim of the Board of Management is, in the first place, to secure the highest possible efficiency and at the same time to make the charges as moderate as possible. A special examination is held for Conference candidates in May of each year.

In short, continued and increasing success marks every feature of the college work.

Hundreds of young men and young women have, during their attendance at Albert College, been brought to a higher standard of Christian helpfulness and have gone out to do splendid work for the Christian Church both at home and abroad.

We are profoundly grateful to God for the successes that have already crowned the work of this institution, and we enter upon the incoming year with bright hopes of still greater success.

REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

To the London Conference of the Methodist Church :

FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—It affords us pleasure, at the close of another year, to acquaint you with the progress of the important work committed to us by the Methodist Church.

During the year we have enrolled in our two faculties 315 students, 200 of whom are, properly, students in Arts and 115 students in theology. The total enrolment in Arts classes has been 255, and in Divinity classes, 171—111 students taking work in both faculties. The net increase of students for the year is 33. Our Arts stadents are distributed as follows: General course, 62; College honor courses, 51; University honor courses, 57; partial courses, 30. Our Divinity students have been distributed as follows: Graduate courses, 34; Conference courses, 81. These simple figures convey some idea of the extent of our work and of its influence on the future of our Church and country.

While aiming at the highest university scholarship in which many of our gifted sons and daughters are winning for themselves the highest horors, our College is becoming more and more a home in which every element of true Christian culture is regarded, and as rapidly as the means

The normal condition of such an institution as ours is financial embarrassment. A college with a surplus in its treasury would mean a decadent college, a college without the expansive strength of growing life. Last year we were sorry to report a deficiency of \$8,758, and the estimate for the present year was for a like amount. We are glad to say that the income for the year has been somewhat increased, notwithstanding a fall in the rate of interest—the fees this year being \$1,100 in advance of last year, and also collections on subscriptions being somewhat in advance. Our deficiency is thus reduced to \$7,878, an improvement of nearly \$1,000. This deficiency has, notwithstanding this slight improvement, been the occasion of the gravest anxiety and consideration on the part of your Board of Regents. In consequence of questions and suggestions made last year, and especially of a resolution of the Toronto Conference, a committee for the investigation of the entire work and expenditure was appointed early in the year. The Committee consisted of the General Superintendent, the Secretary of Education, the President of the College and Drs. Mills, Maclaren, Hough, Dewart and Sutherland. The professors in the various departments were called and examined as to the extent and character of their work, and information was obtained from sister colleges who are doing parallel work as to the strength and cost of their staff and the amount of work required of their men. After a most careful and anxious investigation, the Com-

After saying that "equal work is done much more cheaply in Victoria than in the other colleges," they say: "The whole scope of this inquiry has shown your Committee the importance and necessity of maintaining the full efficiency of the work now done in your University. Indeed, we are persuaded that such efficiency should be increased, rather than diminished. But if we are to do this, we cannot possibly employ either fewer or cheaper men. Honor work in all such institutions is expensive; but it is that which gives a college like ours its character and status, and if we abandon that part of the work we may as well abandon the teaching of Arts altogether. If progressive students cannot get their honor work in their own college, they will most certainly register where they can. As it is this which attracts the best and brightest students, its relinquishment would be the signing of the death-warrant of our College. The only suggestion offered to your Committee was that in some of the languages a lecturer might be replaced by a tutor at a lower salary. It was thought that at most \$400 a year might be saved in this way. The majority of the Committee did not see their way clear to support this suggestion, as it involves the risk of employing untried young men and probably frequent change, while the financial advantage is very slight."

Whereas, in the opinion of this Board, after careful examination, there is no possibility of further reducing our estimates without seriously impairing the usefulness of the institution; and

Whereas, it is also the opinion of this Board that there is no remedy available except by an increased endowment; therefore

Resolved,—That this Board earnestly appeals to the Methodist Church through the coming Annual Conferences and General Conference for the inauguration of a plan to seeme an additional endowment through the proposed Twentieth Century Million Dollar Fund sufficient to meet the current expenses of our University."

The project to which reference is thus made is one which has already commended itself to the most liberal and godly minds in our Church. As we enter upon a new century almost coeval with the second century of the history of Canadian Methodism, it is but right that we should pause and gird ourselves for the work and responsibility of a new and glorious era. The next century may see the conversion to Christ of the entire heathen world. The next century may see our emancipation from all the blights which now mar Christian civilization. It may witness the coming forth of a moral and spiritual perfection of Christian character as well as of institutions which shall be as the New Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God. And if so, "wisdom and knowledge shall be the stability of the times and the strength of salvation." What, then, more fitting than that in its dawn we should lay upon the altar of God an offering such as will enable our whole army to move forward to the final millennial victory and glory? With intelligence and spiritual power and consecrated men and means, let us go forward to possess the new age in the name of the Lord.

TEMPERANCE ANNIVERSARY.
