CAMPBELLTON GRAMMAR SCHOOL

The public examination of our town schools took place on Friday forenoon last, which was a few days earlier than formerly, owing to several of our teachers leaving town to attend the Teachers' Institute, which meets in St. John this week. The examinations in the different class rooms took place simultaneously from 9 to 11 a.m., after which the teachers, advanced pupils and visitors assembled in the Principal's room for the graduating exercises. Judge Matheson, Chairman of the School Board, presided, and after a brief address, called upon His Worship Mayor Murray to present the diploma to the graduates.

The "Class History" was read by James Maclean, the "Class Prophecy" by Annie Anderson, and the "Valedictory" by Gilechrist Allan. All members of the graduating class. The original sentiment and real genuine humor contained in these productions elicited very favorable comment and

brought forth much applause from the visitors present.

Brief addresses, appropriate to the occasion, were also delivered by Rev. R. J. Coleman, Mr. John M. Maclean, M. A. Kelly, J. P. and Chairman Matheson.

All the addresses were well to the point and were listened to with rapt attention. It was suggested that these public examinations should be held in the afternoon as then a much larger number of parents and especially the ladies, who take a very deep interest in our school work, but who cannot possibly be present in the forenoon, could attend and witness the closing exercises of the school. However, the number of visitors present, although not large, was distinctly representative and included many of our very best citizens, persons whose time is at least as valuable as that of any persons in the town, but whose interest in the education of our children is so great that they regularly attend these school examinations even at considerable personal sacrifice. It is a well recognized fact that in nearly all instances where work in the public interest is required to be done, it devolves upon those whose time is really the most in demand in their own personal affairs to make the sacrifice.

The absence of an assembly room, in which to hold these public functions is keenly felt. The room formerly used for that purpose had to be divided into class rooms to meet the requirements of the school.

There was a great gathering of the MicMac Indians Friday and Sunday at the mission of St. Anne de Restigouche to celebrate the tercentenary of the baptism of twenty-one members of the tribe, with their chief, Member Tou, which ceremony occurred June 24th, 1610, at Port Royal, Nova Scotia. Rev. Jesse Fleche, a French missionary of that time receiving those savages into the church. These conversations were followed by others, and in a short time the whole tribe, had enlisted under the banners of Christianity.

Representative MicMacs were present at the demonstrations from different parts of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, as well as Quebec, Bishop Bala, w. R. Mouski, in whose diocese St. Anne de Restigouche is situated, conducted the Pontifical Mass, Father Pacifique and Chief Denny of Cape Breton delivering an address.

On Sunday an immense concourse of people assembled to take part in and witness the service.

THE TWO PARTIES.

Mr. Borden's Ontario tour is ended for the present. He has been cordially received by political opponents as well as by his supporters. He is the leader of one of the great political parties and a man of marked ability and high reputation. As such he has been welcomed regardless of politics, though he went on a political mission.

Mr. Borden struck no new note in his campaign. To his general observations on the necessity and value of high ideals and a high sense of honor in public life, every citizen will readily assent. Such observations are commonplace. To Mr. Borden's credit it can be said that he endeavors to live up to his professions; but not more earnestly than other men, who are not on the same side in politics. Mr. Borden knows perfectly well that this is true, and that it is also true that if he were in power tomorrow he would be confronted by all the difficulties with which the present government has to deal. His followers are not any more scrupulous in regard to matters of patronage than the followers of any other leader.

Not is Mr. Borden any more desirous than Sir Wilfrid Laurier to advance the welfare of Canada. The latter has proved his quality, and the evidence is found in the history of this country since 1896, with its marvellous record of substantial progress. It is easy to say that too much money has been spent and to charge that there has been graft as well as extravagance, but what sane man believes the Conservatives would have produced any better results? The history of that party is not forgotten. Those too young to remember have only to ask their older neighbors. There was no great in Canada under Conservative rule, but there were also grave scandals, leading up to the utter defeat of the party, which has been kept out of power since 1896 because of its sins of omission and commission. Mr. Borden endeavors to persuade the people that a new Conservative administration would be above reproach, but when the cautious enquirer looks over the list of prospective Conservative ministers he is not encouraged to believe the story.

On the other hand the present government is led by one who is conceded to be one of the leading statesmen of the empire. He is surrounded by able and experienced men who give him invaluable support in carrying out a policy that has made good his memorable phrase that "the twentieth century is Canada's century." The progress made by Canada under Conservative rule was very slow in comparison with that of the last dozen years. This great development could not be accomplished without heavy expenditure in the opening of seaports and the interior means of communication, and constructing such public works as are made necessary by a rapidly increasing population. If the debt is increased, there is something to show for it, and the people get value. If the annual expenditure is greater, it is because of greater legitimate demands upon the revenue. But the revenue has also increased, the trade of the country grows at a remarkable rate, and thousands of new settlers with millions of capital are pouring in to aid in the work of national development.—St. John Times.

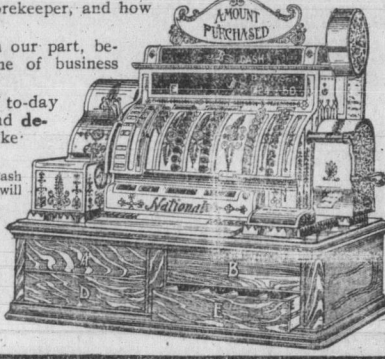

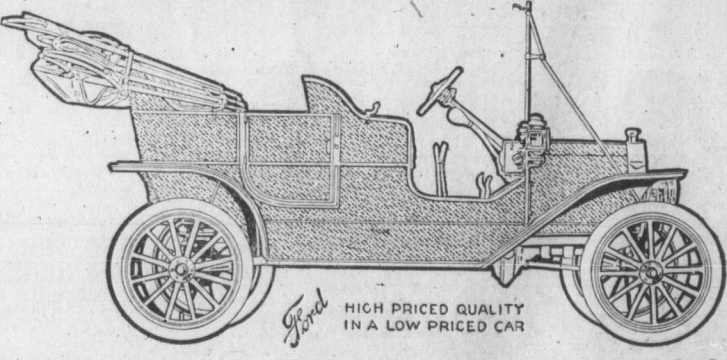

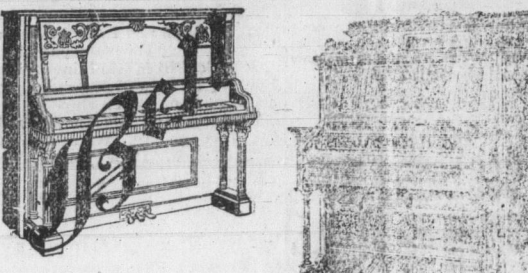
