SERIOUS FIRE IN BATHURST

Combined Loss of \$75,000 in Blaze of Last Saturday Morning.

In one of the most disastrous fires experienced in Bathurst for a considerable time these stores and their contents were completely destroyed early Saturday morning last as the result of a blaze which originated in the shops of Messrs. J. Palmer, liquor vendors. The combined loss approximates \$75,000.

The fire broke out shortly after midnight and when first discovered had completely consumed the front part of the large wooden Palmer building on the east side and Comens & Comens on the west.

The hardware store of Hugh Kent and McKeown's Pharmacy which was located in that immediate vicinity were also slightly damaged but the splendid work of the fire department kept the flames from spreading beyond the three doomed buildings.

Palmer's loss is placed at \$10,000, on which he had about \$6,000 insurance. The Wilson Company lost \$30,000 worth of stock and \$5,000 building with a total insurance of \$17,000, while Comens and Co. suffered \$25,000 loss in stock and \$4,000 building with a total insurance of \$18,000.

In an interview with Mr. W. R. Stevens who lately acquired the business of M. E. Moore here and who is joint partner of Comens and Co., the Graphic learned that the loss sustained by that firm was somewhat heavier than first estimated. For the last two weeks previous to the fire large quantities of woolens, foot-wear and other commodities had been arriving in daily shipments to meet the winter trade and the insurance on the stock had not been increased accordingly.

Their loss in the present blaze will be heavier felt by the concern on account of the small stock of goods after their establishment in Bathurst.

EEL RIVER CROSSING

As a token of appreciation of his faithful services Mr. Wright made an appropriate response. Rev. E. J. Shaw in a few well chosen words expressed the delight of the audience which filled the hall. The entertainment came to an end by the singing of Christmas songs.

This place was saddened to learn of the death of Mr. Abel Beckingham at the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Campbellton, Dec. 22nd in the twenty-fifth year of his age, following an illness of but a day or two as a result of injury sustained from a split of wood which fell from a saw at a rotary mill, which he was operating in Hick's Co. mill, Dalhousie Junction. His cheerful and thoughtful nature drew to him many friends. He served overseas in the great war for three years; and won honors there.

The funeral service was held on Sunday Dec. 24th at his home in Dundee. It was very largely attended and conducted by the Rev. E. J. Shaw. He leaves a young widow, his father, mother, two brothers, and one sister, to mourn their loss.

The pall bearers were: Duncan MacDonald, Charles Beckingham, Wesley Hamilton, Robert McConnell, Lawrence Burs and Earle Atkinson.

BLACKVILLE STORE DESTROYED

Building of Max Lampert & Co. Burns and Contents Lost.

Newcastle, Dec. 29.—The store of Max Lampert & Co., Blackville, was completely destroyed by fire last evening. The blaze, which originated in the back part of the building, spread rapidly and it was impossible to save any of the contents. The building which was owned by Mrs. Jacob Layton was occupied by Mr. Lampert, is understood, is fully covered.

MOTHER AND FOUR CHILDREN POISONED

Mother and Four Young Children Are Victims of Gas in Syracuse.

Syracuse, N. Y. Dec. 30.—A mother and her four little children were found dead at their home, 350 Road avenue, by her husband at 2 o'clock this morning. Death was caused by gas poisoning. The victims were: Mrs. Katherine B. Simone, 33; Mary, 11; John B. William, 4 and Robert, 2.

Simone, completely unbalanced by her discovery, was taken to the psychopathic hospital.

First news of the tragedy was received at police headquarters at two o'clock when Lieut. Naumann got a telephone call from a woman in Road avenue, who said she had been awakened by the "raving" of a man in a house on the opposite side of the street. Lieut. Naumann had scarcely hung up when another call came.

"I found all my family lying on the floor," sobbed a man. "I guess they're all dead. For God's sake send help."

When detectives reached the house they found Simone insane with grief, being held in the front room by a neighbor. Officers bursting into the kitchen found Mrs. Simone prostrate on the floor and near her the body of four year old William, partly dressed. Doors were thrown open as the fumes of the deadly gas were still present to some extent.

Adjoining the kitchen in a bedroom the bodies of the three other children were found stretched on the bed. Mary, the oldest of the children was fully dressed and even had her hat on when she had been overcome.

A gas water heater and two jets of the gas range in the kitchen were still burning and on the stove was a percolator of coffee and a plate of toast, indicating the family had been preparing a meal when they were overcome.

Coroner Crane said it was his opinion death had been caused by monoxide gas poisoning but would not state an opinion as to how long the family had been dead. The mother and the boy in the kitchen had died after the children in the bedroom, the coroner said.

From the position of the bodies it appeared the victims in the kitchen were the last to realize the presence of the gas, which must have acted with deadly suddenness. Apparently Mrs. Simone had made her last effort to get to a window, but was unable to reach it in time to break it.

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DENY BIG DRUG PLOT IN N.B.

Carleton Co. Physicians Place Little Evidence in Maine.

That there has been wholesale smuggling of narcotic drugs from Carleton county into Maine is denied by physicians and others in that section of the province. Recently in Portland, Dr. Ervin C. Ruth, former United States government official, and Ralph A. Fry, United States government narcotic agent, were placed on trial on charges of conspiring to defraud the government. Fry took the stand in his own behalf, and during the cross-examination the official report of a raid at Mars Hill, Me., a border town, and the arrest of a Carleton county physician and a Mars Hill doctor was submitted in evidence. Fry alleged that one of the physicians arrested on the border was the ring leader of a big drug smuggling system, and that half a dozen others were engaged in the illegal traffic.

Fry's report named Canadian druggists and jobbers as being also involved and drank liquor occasionally.

Dr. Ruth, who was also a witness, told of funds used to obtain evidence against the alleged smugglers. The case is unfinished.

WOMEN OPPOSE NEW CHANCE GRANTED TO ARBUCKLE BY HAYS

Los Angeles, Calif.,—Roscoe ("Pat") Arbuckle, the comedian, is making ready today for his re-entry into motion pictures after a lengthy absence. He is the only member of the Los Angeles district federation of women's clubs announced that they cannot resist from their opposition to his plans.

A Mrs. W. H. Hays, titular head of the motion picture industry, announced today that Arbuckle might have another chance, the Los Angeles district federation affirming a previous one opposing his reappearance in pictures.

Mrs. J. C. Uehring, president of the district, stated that although Arbuckle at his trial in San Francisco, had been acquitted of causing the death of Virginia Rappe, a screen actress, the testimony "was of such a character as to bar him forever from appearing before a decent, self-respecting public."

Arbuckle, who was barred from the screen last April, will be re-employed by Joseph M. Schenck, producer, it was announced.

BREADED CUTLETS

Have a slice of veal cutlet sliced one inch thick each, then with a sharp knife cut them in strips two inches wide. Dip the strips in beaten egg, roll them in fine, seasoned crumbs, then place them in a hot frying-pan with two tablespoonfuls of butter. Cover the cutlet and cook, turning once then, over and brown delicately on each side. Serve on a hot dish, turning over the cutlets two cupfuls of Cuban sauce made the same as for the rice and sausage dish. Garnish with rice croquettes.

OSTER SCALLOP MODERNE

Drain and dry on a linen towel a solid quart of oysters, and have ready two small cupfuls of very dry crumbs. Select a deep, oblong baking dish and butter it well. Grate enough sharp cheese to make a quarter-cupful. Now make a cream sauce not too thick. Put a tablespoonful of butter into a small saucepan with two teaspoonfuls of flour and stir until the butter is melted, then add pepper, salt and a cupful and a quarter of rich milk or light cream, and bring to the boiling point, stir steadily. Let the mixture simmer gently for three or four minutes, then add the cheese and set aside to cool.

When this sauce is cool put in the oysters, place a layer of crumbs in the bottom of the mould, then a layer of crumbs, then a hard boiled egg put through the ricer, then the oysters, and so on until all are used. Bake this mixture, after dotting the top with butter, for about twenty minutes in a medium oven until it is browned delicately on the top.

IF YOU ARE WELL BRED

You know that it is better to be too conservatively dressed at any social function. If you are in doubt as to what to wear it is safest to select the plainest dress.

MINIMUM WAGE SCALE FOR CALIFORNIA WOMEN

San Francisco, Dec. 30.—The \$16.00 minimum wage scale for women in the California mercantile industries was sustained in an order entered today by the State Industrial Welfare Commission. Almost 30,000 women workers were affected by the decision. Minors receive less than \$16.00 as registered apprentices. In 1914 more than 52 per cent of the women mercantile workers received less than ten a week.

STUFFED STEAK

Select as thick a flank steak as the butcher has in stock and have a pocket cut in it for stuffing. Pour a half-cupful of milk over a cupful of dry crumbs and bring it to the scalding point. Then add the juice of an onion, pepper, salt, a teaspoonful of sugar and a tablespoonful of butter, a teaspoonful of powdered sage, and six oysters, cut fine with a sharp knife. Remove this mixture from the fire and cool it, then stuff the steak with it.

Oil the steak over with butter and broil it as usual. Rinse a dozen green olives, then pare them from the stones, heat a pint of stock or brown gravy and stew the olives in it for about a half hour, season to taste, then thicken with a little browned flour worked to a paste with butter. When the steak is done, lift it to hot dish, pour the gravy over it and garnish it with toast slices. This makes a heavy dish, and one that almost every one likes. Serve a little of the stuffing with every helping. Should oysters not be at hand, two tablespoonfuls of chopped or mashed nuts will do.

STUFFED LOAF

Chop the meat of a cold turkey fine and add to each cupful a quarter of a cupful of dry crumbs and one beaten egg. Season with pepper, salt and a cupful of brown gravy or the kind baked for twenty minutes, then unname amount of cream sauce. Shape this mixture into a loaf and slip it into a buttered tin or glass baking dish, brush it over with a little butter, cover and bake for twenty minutes, then uncover and bake a delicate brown in a "hot" ten minutes more. Serve this loaf with a good brown gravy or a smooth tomato sauce.

RICE AND SAUSAGE IN CUBAN SAUCE

Fry six sausage links as required in the usual way and have ready two cupfuls of freshly boiled rice. To each cupful of rice add a half cupful of a finely sliced onion, a half cupful of chopped celery, a few sprays of parsley, pepper, salt, a quarter-cupful of sugar and a tablespoonful of celery powder. Stew for twenty minutes, then strain, return to the sauce-pan and thicken slightly with a little cornstarch mixed in with cold water. Heap the rice on the centre of a hot dish, lay the sausage around the edge
