THE CREAT STRIKE.

TROUBLE FOR BUILDERS.

New York, Aug. 2.—The decision of the Association of Brick Manufacturers to furnish no more brick to points where the boyoott (instituted some time ago by the Board of Walking Delegates of Building Trades of New York against the bricks of the Verplanks Point manufacturers) exists went into effect yesterday. The builders and dealers in this city have laid in large supplies of brick, but it is said to be impossible for them to store more than enough to last a week. At the end of that time if the brickmakers stand firm the lack of material will throw 60,000 men now engaged in building out of employment.

New York, Aug. 24.—The usual Sunday quietude prevailed around the Grand Central depot to-day. Vice-President Webb, referring to Powderly's latest manifesto, said all the statements bearing on the management of the road were untrue. On Monday he would investigate the charges made by the men whose affidavits are attached to Powderly's manifesto, and will make public the result.

Mr. Powderly talked freely about Mr. Webb's statement that the men were discharged for drunkenness and other cause. "That's what we want to find out," he said; "if they were, that's the end of the strike. But we know they were not. That's why we wanted an investigation. I will reply to Mr. Webb's statement later."

ONLY THE BEGINNING.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Local Assembly, No. 344, K. of L., was in session here all day. President Johnson said: "We are assured now that we are only at the beginning of the strike. Unless the concessions demanded are acceded to we expect tomorrow that a general strike will be ordered. We know that when the word is given for the general strike fully 9,000 men on the Vanderbilt system will walk out, and we know that these men—switchmen, firemen and yardmen—cannot be replaced under any circumstances, and this is not all. We expect the strike to prevail equally among other roads." Johnson said the strikers did not expect the engineers to join in the strike.

Educational Association. Build the Child's Education Up from s Physical Foundation—Public Schools
MNot Godless when the Scientific Truths

There are four great movements which in the largest way will lift the white cross of purity to its right place in the lives of our young people. They are (1) co-education—the training with each other of those formed for each other, that their intellectual sympathy may be increased and their mutual estimate based on a more thorough knowledge than society affords; (2) the financial independence of women, that they may not be tempted to marry in order to secure support; (3) a reform in dress, that women may have better health, greater vigor, and thus enter upon home life under more hopeful conditions; and (4) equal suffrage, that woman's influence and character may react upon Government so as to secure more just laws for home protection and heavier penalties against those who assail the physically

the public schools and wrought into the thinking of the young people. I do not mean that this should be done in any formal way, but as the outcome of that "public opinion" in a public school that is largely, developed from the teacher's influence, record, and most of all, his or her char-

Recent statistics in Massachusetts prove that "in the employments in which the very lowest wages are paid women constitute over 70 per cent. of the workers, while in the employments that pay \$20 per week women constitute hardly over three per cent. Women standing side by side with men are also paid less wages for the same work, the proportion being that a woman being 20 years of age and upwards is made to work for the same wages as a boy of 10." Public school children should know these facts and their indignation should be aroused against such a state of things.

The Word of God has been largely displaced from our public schools to the sorrow of Christians, but the God of the Word was never more vitally present than in the voice of science with its "Thus saith Nature," "Thus saith Reason," "Thus saith the Law."

Build the child's education up from a physical foundation. Bodily habits that are healthful and pure mean more to the republic's future than intellectual acumen or acquirements. The man wonderful lives in a house beautiful, but science teaches even as

quirements. The man wonderful lives in a house beautiful, but science teaches even as the Bible does, that "Whoso defleth this temple him shall God destroy, for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." The child should learn that this destruction is not wrought in vengeance, but as the inevitable sequel of violating natural laws so beneficent that obedience to them would

should thus be taught in our schools. This cannot be done in the direct manner that we teach them to let alcoholic drinks and tobacco alone, but by abolishing the recess and using that time for physical training according to the systems of Delsarte and other masters, circulating the White Cross pledge and literature (to be had at the W. C. T. U. Publishing House, 161 La Salle street, Chicago, whence millions of pages have gone out), and personally teaching the pupils one by one or in small groups of boys by themselves, and girls by themselves, the facts of physiology and hygiene in reference to a lite of personal purity. Fewer pupils should be assigned to each teacher, and physical culture should be the basis of all education.

Teach girls the gospel of dress that im-

physical culture should be the basis of all education.

Teach girls the gospel of dress that imposes no ligature, the vulgarity of that "death line" made in the waist that reminds one of an hour-glass or a "yellow jacket," and the danger of titled heels that throw all the vital organs out of their natural place. Let the teacher of physical culture, whom I like to call a "moral horticulturist," train the children not to permit the insignia of impurity upon the walls, and not to accept debasing literature upon the play-ground. Put women on school boards, that they may help the teacher to guard the little ones against these dangers.

To the Editor of the ADVENTISEN:

In your issue of Friday in a paragraph relating to making the Roman Catholic the established church in Maita, and the claim that the English Government "cannot arbitrarily make marriage lawful in Maita without the intervention of the Roman Catholic Church," you say, "Were the same right secured to that Church in the Province of Quebec there would be some cause for anch agitation as is being kept up in certain quarters." All Protestants at any rate ought to agree with you in the doctrine that such a right enjoyed by the Roman Catholic Church would be good cause for agitation. Your deliverance suggests another point, viz., that such right is not secured. Now, the question whether you or the agitators whom you condemin are right is the question to be settled. If they are right on the point, you admit there would be cause for their agitation, and as a good citizen you ought to aid them. I am much pleased at your deliverance, for I am persuaded that on investigation you will find that the Roman Catholic Church makes this claim, and the courts of Quebec uphold that Church in it. 1. They claim the right to dissolve the marriage when they judge proper. 2. They claim the sole right to dissolve the marriage when they judge proper. 2. They claim the sole right to dispense with publication of banns, so that a Provincial license has no authority.

Bishop Bourjet says: "It is for the Church and not the State to make laws concerning marriage; the civil powercannot in any way render null a marriage contracted by the Church; it can neither control nor annul the dispensations which the Church, judges proper to give for the purpose of removing the impediments which she alone can put in the way of marriage." In the case of Larramee vs. Evans both Justices Papineau and Jefte sustained these contentions. Justice Papineau and: "Marriage in the Roman Catholic Church is a sacrament and a spiritual and religious bond over which the Superior Court has

Justice Papineau said: "Marriage in the Roman Catholic Church is a sacrament and a spiritual and religious bond over which the Supreme Court has no cohtrol," and further that "the Superior Court has power to refer to the decision of the Roman Catholic Bishop of the diocese the question of the validity or nullity of the marriage of two Roman Catholics celebrated by a Protestant minister, and the decision of the Bishop may be, and ought to be followed by the Superior Court in deciding as to the civil effects of the ceremony," and Judge Jette said "That the license granted by the Civil Government is of no value in order to dispense with the publication of banns required for Catholics, and that in consequence the marriage celebrated by a Protestant minister in virtue of a license is a marriage null and wrongfully contracted." Here you have the claim made, approved and sustained, I think, in every particular. It is as absolute as anything needs to be. It such a state of things the civil power amounts to very little indeed. Is there no ground for complaint and agitation?

Fall Wheat Culture. Harvest secured the farmers' next care to prepare the ground for fall wheat seeding. The sooner and more thoroughly this is done the better. Do not waste seed by throwing it into half-worked, half fertilized soil. Many new varieties of seed are being boomed. Too much cap connot be exercised in selecting a variety well adapted to the locality and in clear-ing seed grain. Writing of the standard varieties in Ohio, Wm. R. Lazenby, of the

varieties in Ohio, Wm. R. Lazemby, of the Columbus Experiment Station, says:
"Comparatively little difference in productiveness is seen between the bearded and smooth wheats. As a rule, the bearded varieties appear to be a little more hardy, and slightly more productive, than the smooth sorts. This is not uniformly the case, for some bald wheats always yield better than some bearded ones. In the same way the red wheats, as a whole, yield a trifle better than the white varieties when we compare a large number of each. The a trille better than the white varieties when we compare a large number of each. The difference, however, is but slight, and the idea that is prevalent in many section, that red varieties are much better croppers than the white varieties, is not supported by our

the white varieties, is not supported by our experiments.

"At present prices no one can afford to grow a poor crop of wheat. Not an acre should be plowed for this crop the coming fall, nor a bushel of seed sown, that does not promise a good harvest. Better one half of the number of acres thoroughly prepared, liberally fertilized, seed well selected, and crop carefully managed throughout, than double the number so treated that at best they will give a meager return, and if than double the number so treated that at best they will give a meager return, and if the season is unfavorable, prove an absolute failure. With judicious management, barring accident, good crops of wheat can be grown nearly everywhere throughout the State of Ohio. Where good crops cannot be raised, whether it be in Ohio or elsewhere, time and means should not be squandered in making the attempt.

"The requisites of profitable wheatculture may be briefly summarized as follows: The best seed of the choicest varieties; thorough preparation of the soil by drainage, culture, raising clover, and the application of barnyard manure or other fertilizers; care in seeding as to time, method and quantity; an economical system of harvesting, threshing and marketing. "A disgusted purchaser" of pure-bred buster cows at high prices asks: "Is not feed more important than breed?" Both are important for large yield of butter or for a large yield of any other product. The improved breeds have been so long bred to develop aptitude for quality and quantity of beef that it would be squandering money to feed such animals highly for butter. The fat would be put in the carcass rather than in the pail. But, without liberal feeding, neither beef nor milk can be produced in paying quantity, no matter how long either of these special aptitudes have been bred for. If beef is required, choose the beef breeds; if butter, the cow that give the most butter. The best bred stock is none too good for the farmer and breeder. Breed and feed.—[American Agriculturist.



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

DROWNED IN THE THAMES. Coat, Vest and Overalls Found on the Bank Identified as Belonging to John Fonney, of Mt. Bridges—Searching for the Body.

Bank Identified as Belenging to John Fonney, of Mt. Bridges—Searching for Yesterday afternoon some persons were walking along the bank of the River Thames, about half a mile below the village of Delaware, and nearly opposite the farm of Mr. Richard Gibson, when just around the bend in the river, they discovered, lying on the bank, a black coat and vest and a pair of overalls apparently the clothes of a workman. In the pockets were found 8 3 in Canadian bills, some silver and a bottle partially filled with whisky. The alarm was given and Messars, Graham, Thrower and other residents of the village instituted a search, but up to last reports nothing had been found. Plainly-marked footprints were discovered on the bank leading to the side of the river, in the neighborhood of which there is known to be an exceedingly deep hole. The clothes were taken to Mount Brydges, and there identified as those belonging to a young man named John Fenney, who disappeared from the village on Friday last and has not been seen since. The residents of Delaware are excited over the affair, and nearly all the people in the village went to the seen and assisted in the search. There is no doubt that Fenney is drowned, but whether by accident or with suicidal intent has not as yet been ascertained.
