The Roman Catholic Church and Marriage.

To the Editor of the Advertiser: In your issue of Friday in a paragraph relating to making the Roman Catholic the established church in Malta, and the claim that the English Government cannot arbitrarily make marriage lawful in Malta without the intervention of the Roman Catholic Church, you say, "Were the same right secured to that Church in the Province of Quebec there would be some cause for such agitation as is being kept up in certain quarters."

All Protestants at any rate ought to agree with you in the doctrine that such a right enjoyed by the Roman Catholic Church would be good cause for agitation. Your deliverance suggests another point, viz. that such right is not secured. Now, the question whether you or the agitators whom you condemn are right, the question to be settled. If they are right on the points, you admit there would be cause for that agitation, and as a good citizen you ought to add there would be cause for that agitation. I am much pleased at your deliverance, for I am persuaded that on investigation you will find that the Roman Catholic Church makes the claim, and the courts of Quebec uphold that claim in its entirety.

ONE WAY OF DOING WELL.

Quebec is in a worse plight than any other member of the Confederation, yet Quebec was doing well financially until a Liberal Government obtained power here.

It seems to us that this is the champion whopper of the fishing season. With the exception of a year and a few months, a dozen years ago, no Liberal Government had, since the Confederation, held power in Quebec till 1886 when Mr. Mercier was chosen to conduct the affairs of the Province.

Mercier will be a very bad financier if he succeeds in leading the record for debt-making and squandering public money established by his predecessors.

TORONTO AND THE UNIVERSITY.

The city of Toronto has brought upon herself no little discredit in refusing to grant aid to the Provincial University, officially known as the University of Toronto.

The Ontario Prison Commissioners, on their visit to Cleveland, obtained valuable information on the subject of the effect of imprisonment on what are known as short-term prisoners—the drunks, disorderlies, and offenders of that stamp.

The Mennonites in the Northwest are a sober and industrious people, but they will have to reform their methods if they mean to keep the soil which they control permanently fertile.

Cholera, according to late cable reports, is steadily spreading along the Mediterranean coast of Spain, as well as into the interior of New Castle, where both Madrid and Toledo are more or less infected.

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showing an increase of \$20,000,000 in five years. Manufacturers of wool are also increasing steadily, their value in 1885 being \$35,776,559, and in 1890 \$56,582,412.

Cotton manufactures, however, increased in the same period by less than \$5,000,000, their value in 1885 being \$27,197,241, and in 1890 \$23,918,055.

Manufactures of flax, jute and hemp increased in the same period from \$29,492,379 to \$28,431,279, manufactures of silk from \$27,467,565 to \$38,856,374.

Manufactures of leather from \$10,416,885 to \$12,436,090; manufactures of wood from \$9,103,041 to \$12,999,831, and manufactures of iron and steel from \$38,610,093 to \$41,673,241.

The highest point in iron and steel imports was reached in 1888, when the value was \$48,992,757. Of raw products imported, flax, hemp, jute, etc., were valued in 1885 at \$12,362,498 and in 1890 at \$19,844,087.

Wheat and wheat flour stand third, being valued at \$102,312,074, or about \$23,000,000 less than in 1885.

But exports of cattle have increased from \$12,906,690 in 1885 to \$21,281,121 in 1890, and iron and steel manufactures from \$16,592,155 in the former year to \$25,542,208 in the latter.

PERSONAL AND GENERAL. The latest device for making money out of the recently bereaved, is for a stenographer to attend the funeral and take down the good things said of the deceased, from which ornamental copies of the remarks can be prepared and sold to friends.

The grievance of a parishioner in a prominent Congregational Church in Connecticut, as stated in a letter to his pastor, not that the sermons preached by the latter are uninteresting or unattractive, but that they are unhelpful—nothing in them to teach a man how to live a better life.

The Citizens' Athletic Association should be able to save Tecumseh Park from being cut up if any organization can, for it is most interested in the preservation of the park. It should take action now.

Another centrally-situated ground on which athletic sports can take place should certainly be obtained before Tecumseh Park is abandoned, if abandoned it must be.

In looking over some of our exchanges, we cannot but wonder at the frequency with which the discussion of public questions is mixed up with attacks on contemporary newspapers.

To put it in another shape, do not too many journalists conduct their newspapers as if their constituencies were other newspapers? Of course the real constituency is the public, and it is the constituency to which appeal should be made.

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cholera, either in Western Europe or in America this year—the summer season is too far gone for that—but it must not be forgotten that when the plague visited Italy and Southern France in 1884 several cases were treated in Paris at the middle of November, and then all dread of a further advance of the disease were not removed, though fortunately its progress west was at that time stayed at the French capital.

Cholera should again come our way, we should be prepared to meet it. Cleanliness is its most effective antidote. Let that not be forgotten.

It is now fully expected that Lord Harrington, leader of the Liberal dissidents in the British House of Commons, will be removed to the House of Lords many months have elapsed.

The Marquis is the eldest son of the Duke of Devonshire, who is now in his 83rd year, and in so feeble a state of health that it is not likely he will survive the autumn.

Lord Harrington, by the transition, will lose his influence as manager of the fast decreasing wing of the Liberal party which has held aloft for the great leader on the question of Irish self-government, but he will become one of the greatest territorial magnates in the kingdom.

As head of the house of Cavendish, he will inherit 193,315 acres of land, much of it in the rich shire of Derby, and bringing to his possession a yearly income of nearly \$1,000,000, not including valuable royalties on minerals, which should go to the State, but under landlord-made laws are pocketed by the owners of land.

The noble lord will also have the patronage of no fewer than 40 livings in the Established Church.

OTHER NEWSPAPERS. THE TRUTH ABOUT NEWSPAPERS. Saginaw Journal. Every line in the newspaper costs something. If it is for the benefit of an individual it should be paid for.

If a grocer was asked to donate groceries to one abundantly able to pay for them he would refuse. The proprietor of a newspaper must pay for the free advertising if the beneficiary does not, and yet it is one of the rarest things to be found in any newspaper that a newspaper has space in its columns to rent, and must rent to live.

To give away or rent it for anything less than living rates would be certainly fatal as for a landlord to furnish house rent free.

ELECTION RUMORS. Godefrich Signal. The Toronto Globe of the 12th had an article on the probability of a general election. It said:

For some time a rumor has been in circulation that Sir John Macdonald was plotting a political coup d'etat in the shape of a sudden appeal to the people and a dissolution early in autumn.

The Mail speaks of rumors of an early session of Parliament. This is much more likely and we have ourselves heard a rumor to this effect and from a reliable quarter. We have very high authority for saying there is no intention of going to the country this year.

But Parliament has only about a year and a half to run and this naturally gives rise to election rumors. The census will be taken next year and there will have to be a rearrangement of the constituencies. One can hardly think of a reason for a general election now and we may be sure of this, that if it is contemplated it is still a secret in Sir John Macdonald's breast.

GET AT THE POPULAR WILL. Streetville Review. We are pleased to see at least one of our leading dailies take a firm attitude in regard to compulsory voting; we refer to the London Advertiser. The Reviewer says to "second the motion." Every ratepayer should be compelled to poll his vote, unless he (or she) can furnish some valid excuse for not doing so.

The exact sentiment of a constituency, or a Province, as to great issues, or minor ones can never be ascertained until our legislators have taken a step in the direction indicated. Take the Sect Act, for instance. It was carried in some counties by large majorities, but even that fact was not sufficient to convince statisticians that the sentiment of the majority of the voters in those places was in favor of the Sect Act.

It simply showed that a majority of the votes cast was in favor of the act, and not that a majority of the entire vote, as shown by the voters' list, had been polled in its favor. Why, the writer knows of many municipalities where very few more than half the number of persons entitled to vote ever exercise their franchise. In any of these places, how would you ascertain the popular will in the premises? By all means let us have compulsory voting.

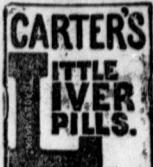
