CAR FAMINE IN THE WEST.

Hundreds of Thousands of Bushels of

HURON, S. D., Nov. 18.-H. J. Rice, chairman of the Board of Railroad Com-HURON, S. D., Nov. 18.—H. J. Rice, chairman of the Board of Railroad Commissioners, has just returned from a trip over the various railroad lines in South Dakota, and reports that at many points elevators, warehouses, barns, and all kinds of buildings, sheds, etc., are filled with wheat, and there are no cars to haul it away. Hundreds of thousands of bushels of wheat are piled in heaps or stacked in the open field, and not more than one-half of the crop is yet threshed. Wheat receipts at Duluth, Minneapolis, and St. Paul from South Dakota alone up to date far exceed the entire shipments of last year, and the crop can scarcely be said to have commenced moving. The daily demand for cars exceeds the supply by from 1,500 to 1,800 cars. The commission are at a loss how to relieve the present state of affairs and prevent its becoming worse. Dealers have to cease buying for want of storage facilities.



CITIZENS OF LONDON AND THEIR

The London Advertiser is making a flerce onslaught on the cumbrous and expensive Dominion franchise law, affirming pensive Dominion franchise law, amrining that it deprives both Tories and Grits of their right to vote. Only a little while ago the Advertiser had it that the same "iniquitous" law was directed against the Grits alone.—[Hamilton Spectator.

On the first point, in which our Hamilton Conservative contemporary apparently agrees with us, there can be no doubt. The experience at the London Court of Revision has impressed that fact upon members of both political parties. As to the other assertion, the ADVERTISER has pointed out that the law was arranged to give undue advantage to the party in power. It was promulgated as expedient at a time when the high the managers were in grievous trouble. That it was demanded by the populace, who had been getting excellent service from the lists compiled by the municipa officers, has never been asserted. If it had been asserted the best proof to the centrary would be found in the fact that not one petition, not one complaint had been made to Parliament up to the time the admittedly "cumbrous and expensive" Dominion Franchise Act was brought before Parlia-

Unlike its high-tax contemporaries, the ADVERTISER has taken care to show, from the proceedings of the revising officer' court, how the measure operates to prevent many of our best citizens from recording their votes in Dominion elections. Th fact that the high-tax organs take good care to conceal from their readers the re markable proceedings that affect so many sitizens is to us proof positive that even the are ashamed of the law. That would be a

good sign, were it accompanied by a confession that the law is, as the ADVERTISER has always held it to be, an expensive, un necessary, vexations and discriminating measure. Because we have said this, and because we have pointed out how intelligent citizens have been submitted to an

inquisition as to their private affairs and have been made the butts of the small wits of the high tax party, it has been represented that the ADVER-TISER has attacked the revising officer and the paid retainers of the small coterie in the Conservative party that is determined to render life in London as unpleasant as possible. The ADVERTISER has not misrepresented the proceedings. itorial proceedings are absolutely proper. Now, a law that works like the Dominion Franchise Act cannot be defended by any fair-minded man. This can be affirmed without reference to the revising officer or to the legal gentlemen who have aided in

the "purification" of the lists.

It is not right that idling sons of rich fathers should be given votes without ques tion on the sole qualification that their father owns property, whereas hundreds of young men, earning \$1 a day, but out of work for a week or two between seasons are deprived of their right to vote.

It is not right that an old resident, who has voted for many years, should now, by virtue of this infamous measure, be de prived of his right to vote because his earn ings are \$295 a year, and not \$300.

Even under the law as it stands it should be sufficient that a man solemnly swears his income is \$300 a year; he should not be called upon to lay bare his business affairs to an assembled crowd.

Better still, the grossly unfair measure should be swept from the statute book at the earliest possible moment, and replaced by a law that would permit of simple residential manhood suffrage. All the income voters have now to register; all those who do not get on the first list have also to register. Why discriminate?

In many cases young men have been com-pelled to wait, day after day, to secure their franchise. In others young men have left their work, at their own expense, waited on the court for hours, despaired of being heard, and have finally chosen to be
