SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT REPLIES.

After recess Sir Richard Cartwright replied to Minister Foster, being loudly cheered on rising. He began by congratulating Mr. Foster upon his changed tone. There was no longer that braggadocio about the "glorious results" of the high tariff policy, and the Opposition were no longer called upon to fall down and worship that policy on the ground that the people were in love with it. Perhaps the Finance Minister had heard the president of the Young Conservatives in Toronto declaring that Canadians were being annexed in job lots, and had also found the man who was once described as the brains of the party denouncing the holy tariff and even blaspheming the sacred gerrymander itself. (Cheers.) It appeared that the Finance Minister was willing to follow the example of the Vicar of Bray and worship any power that would keep him in office, but was not quite sure whether the tariff reformers or the protectionists were the strongest. Mr. Foster had commenced his career as a professional philanthropist, but Sir John Macdonald once said that such persons soon became in need of extensive moral repairs. (Laughter.) Debate on the Home Rule Bill. London, Feb. 14.—In the House of Commons to-day the Right Hon. A. J. Commons to-day the Right Hon. A. J. Ballour, Conservative leader, arose amid loud Unionist cheers and began his reply to Mr. Gladstone's speech of last evening. He said: The House, first of all, has the right to inquire why is any bill, good or bad, required? By universal admission, said Mr. Ballour, there are two causes of trouble in Ireland: one, the agrarian condition of the country; the other the fact that it is possible owing to the unhappy history of the land question for persons with a political object to serve to arouse criminal agitation throughout Ireland. I do not care which of these alternatives is chosen. Whichever is chosen it does not point to the necessity of home rule, but rather to the impossibility of its adoption. By what right, he asked, were they to proceed to cut of Ireland from the rest of the United Kingdom because a majority from an arbitrarily selected area wanted home rule? When Protestant Ulster with an absolutely unanimous voice declared against the measure with a version and abhorence, then majorities mous voice declared against the measure with aversion and abhorrence, then majorities ought not to count; they became mere ebullitions of feeling. Ulster, at least, deserved exceptional treatment for which contilitions of feeling. Fifty Per Cent. Reduction From the Discriminating Rates Against United States Shippers.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—An extra of the Official Gazette relative to the canal tolls for the coming season of navigation reads as follows: For the season of 1893 the canal tolls will be: Wheat, Indian corn, the contract of the canal tolls will be: Wheat, Indian corn, the canal tolls will be: as follows: For the season of 1893 the canal tolls will be: Wheat, Indian corn, peas, barley, rye, oats, flaxseed and buckwheat, eastward through the Welland Canal 10 cents per ton, and for passage eastward through the St. Lawrence canals, only 10 cents per ton, payment of said toll of 10 cents per ton for passage through the Welland Canal to entitle these preducts to free passage through the St. Lawrence canals." The new arrangement is apparently more favorable to Americans than Canadian shippers. Last year all grain which was not carried through to Montreal had to pay 20 cents per ton. This discriminated against Ogdensburg, N.Y., the rebate of tolls on shipments to Montreal being 18 cents per ton. In future United States grain unloaded at Ogdensburg will pay only 10 cents per ton, a reduction of 50 per cent. over last year's rate. THE HAWAIIAN SITUATION. United States Minister Stevens' Action Indersed by His Government.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Secretary Foster this afternoon telegraphed to Minister Stevens at Honolulu an approval of his action in affirmatively responding to the request of the Provisional Government of Hawaii for the establishment of a protectorate over the islands pending negotiations for the annexation of the islands to the United States.

Instructions for the guidance of his future action were also included in the telegram. These instructions will leave San Francisco for Honolulu to-morrow by the steamer Australia. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Secretary

It is the understanding to-night that the treaty providing for the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands to the United States, which has been negotiated by the commissioners now in the city and Secretary of State Foster, will be sent to the Senate to-morrow. The treaty, it is said, contains a provision for its reference to the Provisional Government of Hawaii after its ratification by the United States Senate, to be returned to this country with the approval of the Hawaiian Government within two months after its arrival in Honolulu. Then, upon the return of the treaty, the legislation necessary will be initiated.







GENERAL HERBERT ON CARON'S MANAGEMENT OF THE

MILITIA. Mr. Lister, Mr. Davies and other Par liamentary critics of militia management in Canada did good service for the citizen soldiery when they exposed the rotten condition of affairs that has existed for years, and had become so bad under the regime of Sir Adolph Caron that the Premier was moved to send him to another department. Why a man who had proved so incom petent, and who had been shown by public investigation to be untrustworthy, should be kept in the Government, must be puzzling to the average observer. Many in Ottawa believe that Sir Adolph would have been promptly dismissed from the Ministry before now if he did not possess damnatory secrets affecting his colleagues that would render him far more dangerous to them out

of office than in it.

At the time of the rebellion in 1885 and in the years since then Parliament has voted money like water, as Mr. Davies pointed cut, and what have the taxpayers got for it? Let Major-General Herbert, the independent head of the force be the witness. In his annual report just laid before Parliament, he says:

fore Parliament, he says:

"The condition of a large proportion of the equipment, in use in the militia, is even worse than I have already represented. Not only is a great part of it worn out with age, but much of that which is issued as new is of the worst possible quality. I have seen saddlery and other equipment, when issued fresh from store, which failed to endure the ordinary usage of a twelve days' camp. I have seen boots that had been issued to soldiers, the leather of which had no more consistency than paper."



SAD AND SUDDEN.







Enos Moynahan Taxed \$80 for His Little Escapade.

A Petition from Leading Men in the West Asks Leniency Towards Him, Windsor's Chief of Police to the Contrary-Mrs. Barnes Hands Over \$50 and is Real Mad.

Enos Moynahan was arraigned for sentence at this morning's Police Court on the charge of assaulting and threatening to shoot the Grigg House night porter and on the charge of carrying a loaded revolver.

Mr. P. Mulkern appeared on Moynahan's behalf, and produced a letter from the police magistrate at Windsor, in which the latter expressed much surprise that Moynahan should have got into trouble, and stating that he could scarcely believe the newspaper accounts. Ordinarily Moynahan had been a quiet and respectable citizen, and he had never been before him for an offense of any kind. A petition in the prisoner's favor was also produced, It was signed by the mayor of Windsor, the police magistrate, the chief of police at Walkerville, a license inspector, some councilors, and several other respectable citizens of Windsor, Walkerville and Amherstburg. Mr. Mulkern pleaded for leniency, for the imposition of a fine on the breach of the Firearms Act, and for suspended sentence on the charge of threatening to shoot.

Chief Williams stated that he was the prosecutor in the case, and he did not think Mr. Mulkern would ask for leniency if he had heard the evidence. It was a serious affair that a man should come into a city in the early morning, and, after insulting a woman in a respectable hotel, should assault the man in charge and threaten his life. "Whilst this conduct might be all right in Windsor," continued the chief, "it will not do for London, and the sooner it is known the better."

The police magistrate, replying to Mr. Mulkern's plea that the man was drunk, said that that was no excuse, for a pistol discharged by a drunken man would do just as much harm as one discharged by a sober man. "On account of the petition in your favor," said the police magistrate, in passing sentence, "and taking into consideration the fact that the Rev. Father Tiernan spoke favorably of you this morning, I will inflict a fine instead of imprisoment in the Central, as I first intended. A novel and remarkable point touching the international ethics in times of war is raised by a demand just made on the Italian Government by the municipal council of Venice for the restitution of some 6,000 pictures, which the council declares were stolen from Venice during the Napoleonic wars and scattered over Europe. LONDON AND PORT STANLEY.

M. C. R. Granted Running Powers Over the Road

On About the Same Terms as at Pres ent-The Grand Trunk Station to be the London Terminus.

A rumor circulated by a contemporary last evening made it appear that there was difficulty between the London and Port Stanley Railway lessees and the M. C. R. as to the price which the latter company would pay for running powers over the former road. It was hinted that the lessees were trying to exact exorbitant charges. This is not the case. A leading official states positively the two corporations have come to a satisfactory agreement by which the M. C. R. has been granted running powers on about the same basis as at present. This is a good thing.

It is also a settled fast that the lessees will use the Grand Trunk station as the London and Port Stanley Railway's terminus. The contract to that effect has not been signed yet, but it will be in a few days. This is a matter of great importance. It means a saving to the city of \$3,000 a year in rent, and an outlay of \$7,000 or \$8,000 on a temporary and a permanent atation. It was intended to build the latter, in case other terminal facilities could not be acquired, on the site of the old L. and P. S. R. depot on Barwell street. Passengers and excursionists will therefore appreciate having so convenient and accessible a place as the G. T. R. station for the terminus.

LIFE IN NEW YORK.

The Most Over-Crowded City in Chris (From the New York Review.)

There are in New York nearly four families (3.82) for every house in the metropolis. When it is recalled that there are miles of avenues and streets lined with one-family houses it will be realized to whate extent in other parts of the city crowding occurs, when to accommodate an average of nearly four families to each house the remaining houses only are available. In Philadelphia the average numof families to each house is one family and one-tenth. The death rate tells the rest. In New York in 28 in every 1,000, in Philadelphia 22 per 1,000. While New York has 19 people to each house London has only 7, with a death rate of 3 percent. lower than New York. Out of a population of 1,600,000 in New York 1,300,000 live in apartment flats and tenements. There are herded in what the Board of Health designates as the "tenement district" no less than 276,000 families.

This movement aims at amending the State constitution, so that legislative the State constitution, so that legislative bills of vital importance shall be put to a vote of the people before they become law. The Trade and Labor Council has already indersed the principle and will take up the question energetically at once.
