Sent to All Her Representatives-Heralded as "A Fortunate Event" For the World at Large.

Pekin, March 29.-M. Pavloff, the Russian charge d'affaires, when visiting the Chinese foreign office for the purpose of signing the agreement arand Talien Wan, was escorted by mounted Cossacks. A number of Russians left Tien Tsin, accompanied by a priest, to take part in and bless the ceremony of the taking over of Port Arthur and Talien Wan. St. Petersburg, March 29.-The Offi-

cial Messenger publishes a circular which has been telegraphed by Count Muravieff, the Russian minister for foreign affairs, to the representatives of Russia abroad. It is as follows: "By virtue of a convention signed at Pekin on March 27, Port Arthur and the Port of Talien Wan, and the territories adjacent, have been ceded to Russia in usufruct by China. You are requested to notify the government whereto you are accredited, adding that the above-mentioned ports and territories will be immediately occupied by Rusian troops and that the Russian flag will be hoisted by the side of the Chinese flag. "You may at the same time inform the foreign minister that the port of Talien Wan will be open to foreign

trade, and that the largest measure of hospitality will be extended to the ships of all friendly nations." An official communication issued to the press adds: "The cessions are for 25 years, but may be extended later by common accord. Farther, China has conceded the right of constructing a railroad to connect the ports with the



Estimates Tabled,

Such Is the Programme in the Dominion Commons.

Seme Public Improvements in Western Ontario.

Rainy River Railway and the All-Canadian Yukon Route Discussed.

Ottawa, March 29.-Just before the House rose last night, the estimates for the ensuing year were laid on the table by Finance Minister Fielding, who announced the budget would be delivered on Tuesday of next week. The total amount for 1898-99 is \$44,912,-571—a decrease of \$1,068,152. The chief increase is in the item of government of Yukon provisional district of \$396,-450—an entirely new item. Among the decreases are \$183,460 for public debt and \$763,000 for public works. In a few cases only under the head of civil government have salaries been in-creased. One new circuit judge is to be appointed in Montreal, \$3,000; one new appeal judge in Ontario. \$5,000; one new superior court judge in Quebec, \$4,000. Prison equipment at Kingston increased \$2,400, but salaries reduced \$1,000. For Paris Exposition preparations, \$20,000. The creamery aid vote in the Territories is reduced \$10,000, and dairy advances there reduced \$20,000. For compensation for slaughter of hogs and sheep \$5,000, but the tuberculosis vote is reduced by a similar amount. The superannuation vote is reduced by \$19,000; militia clothing increased \$6,000. For modern artillery, \$231,600. The canals appropriation is \$4,000,000—a decrease of half a million. Three thousand dollars appears for surveys and inspections of Crow's Nest Pass Railway; \$4,000 to defray expense of an exploring survey from Edmonton, and \$35,000 to survey for a railway from Stikine to an ocean port in British Columbia; \$5,000 increase in the St. Lawrence ship channel appropriation; \$50,000 more is required for western department build-





Washington, March 27.-Rev. Dr. Talmage's text in Matthew vii., 2: "With what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." In the greatest sermon ever preached -a sermon about fifteen minutes long, preached on the Mount of Olives-the people were given to understand that the same yardstick that they employed upon others would be employed upon themselves. Measure others by a harsh rule, and you will be measured by a harsh rule. Measure others by a charitable rule, and you will be measured by a charitable rule. Give no mercy to others, and no mercy will be given to you. "With what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." There is a great deal of unfairness in criticism in human conduct. It was to smite that unfairness that Christ uttered the words of the text. In estimat-

ing the misbehavior of others, we must take into consideration the pressure of circumstances. It is never right to do wrong, but there are degrees of culpability. When men misbehave or commit some atrocious wickedness, we are disposed indiscriminately to tumble them all over the bank of condemnation. Suffer they ought, and suffer they must, but in a difference of de-

In the first place, in estimating the misdoings of others, we must take into calculation the hereditary tendency. There is such a thing as good blood, and there is such a thing as bad blood. and there is such a thing as bad blood. There are families that have had a moral twist in them for a hundred years back. There have been escapades and maraudings and scoundrelisms and moral deficits all the way back. 



name is unknown. SAFE TRANSPORTATION. Vancouver, March 29. - The Klondike rush continues unabated. There are daily sailings from the Pacific coast ports, carrying large numbers of fortune-seekers and immense quantities of supplies. The lack of experienced pilots in the intricate waters of the northern coast, which, in the inner channels through the islands fringing the mainland, are difficult to navigate, add to the dangers of the trip, which is taken by some Klondikers with grave misgivings. This, of course, does not apply to all the steamers in the Klondike trade, but to enough of them, to make the addition of such staunch seagoing vessels as the Tartar and Atheninian, of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's line, to the fleet one of more than ordinary importance, and to cause their arrival here from the long voyage around the Horn to be looked forward to with expectancy. The Tartar should arrive in a couple of days, and the Atheninian a week or ten days later. It is understood that they will take the outside course on the route to Wrangel and entirely avoid the dangers of the inner waters of the Pacific. Their capacity is 500 passengers per trip, or 1,000 per week. With this acquisition to the carrying facilities, the great rush, which is anticipated to reach its height very shortly, will be amply taken care of from Vancouver and Victoria north-

Game Laws

Points for Sportsmen and Resi. dents of Ontario Generally.

Fish and Birds That May or May Not Be Caught and When.

The following summary of the provisions of the acts relating to fish and game in the province will be specially interesting to sportsmen and residents generally at the present time: Bass-Open season, June 16 to April 14 in following year.

Beavers may not be killed till Nov. Blackbirds may be killed any time. Brook trout-Jan. 1 to Sept. 15. Crows may be killed any time.

Deer-Open season, Nov. 1 to Nov. 15. Ducks-Open season, Sept. 1 to Dec. Killing of fish by firearms is prohibited. Fish may not be caught to use as manure. Every dam on a stream must have fishway. All game animals, not otherwise pro vided for, may be killed from Sept. 15

Geese-Open season, Sept. 15 to May 1.

Grouse-Open season, Sept. 15 to Hares-Open season, Sept. 15 to Dec. Hawks may be killed any time. Lake trout-Open season, Dec. 1 to

to Dec. 15.

Daring Bettors Climbed a Stack for a Box of Candy. Salinas, Cal., March 29.-Two daring women climbed up to the top of a smokestack, 227 feet high, the other day to win a bet of a box of candy.
