The board of education will require over \$3,000 more than in 1910. At a special meeting held yesterday afternoon, it was decided to ask the city council for \$209,089 21. Last year the board asked for \$199,575 45, of which they expended \$195,607 16, so the actual difference between what is asked this year and required last year is approximately \$13,500. The figures prove somewhat of a surprise.

The Collegiate Institute will need \$41,930 11 as compared with \$35,173 82. They were enabled to keep down the estimates for the Collegiate last year owing to the fact that the board commenced the year with a surplus of nearly \$4,000, most of which came from an increase of fees due to a new arrangement with the county.
