## IRRETRIEVABLE RUIN, FEARED BY GERMANY. BROUGHT PEACE MOVE

Government's Hand Forced To Prevent Economic Downfall and Privations That Stare Empire in the Face Through Or on Failure.

London, Jan. 5 .- A dispatch to the Daily News from Rotterdam says. "From a neutral in close touch with the Government and diplomatic circles in Berlin, I have received a clear statement of the general position in Germany at the present moment, the real motives which inspired the kalser's peace proposals, the probable effects of its failure and the attitude toward the prolonga-

tion of the war of the mass of the people.
"My informant's considered judgment based on close observation and ntimate knowledge of affairs as proved by previous communications, brings out

the following chief points: "That the German Government wishes for peace in order to prevent the economic ruin of the country. That the immediate cause of the peace proposal was the internal situation brought about primarily by the failure of the potato harvest and the consequent deprivations in the next few months, making the peace offer necessary in order

maintain the Government's hold on the people "That in this respect the device will succeed owing mainly to the fact that Herr Scheldmann, leader of the Social Democratic Reichstag majority party having previously played into the hands of the Government by posing as a pacifist, has regained his following in the country

"That the military position is not regarded as dangerous, "That what is really feared is irretrievable ruin as a result of the working of the civilian conscription, which was essential to the carrying on of the war. "That this fear, coupled with continual pressure from Vienna and Sofia, will lead the German Government to grasp every opportunity of offering a chance of making peace."

Wholesalers Find Themselves With Much Left-Over Poultry.

I have kept an accurate account of housekeeping expenses for rears, and know at the end of each week exactly how I stand.

"I also include in this account the clothing for myself and children. Keeping an account book has convinced me that money is saved by purchasing in arge quantities, when the money is available to pay for the large quantity.

## CHECKS OVER ALL BILLS.

Giving a comprehensive review of Our Consumers' League department at a ecent meeting of the St. George's Mothers' Club, Mrs. C. K. Bluett mentioned

recent meeting of the St. George's Mothers' Club, Mrs. C. K. Bluett mentioned that she had kept strict account of all money received and all money spent by her from the time of her marriage. Looking for "experiences" along this line, it was natural when planning this week's installment to turn to Mrs. Bluett for help. And she gave it most graciously. This is what she had to say: "I opened an account book as soon as I began housekeeping, a book in which I carefully put down every day the money received and money expended. In addition to the housekeeping account, I hept a personal account of money spent on clothing, etc. Until a few years ago I kept the account of money spent on myself and two children all together, and consequently did not know how much it took for each. I finally decided to keep a separate account for each member of the family. ember of the family. "My cash book is an ordinary hard-backed exercise book, with a large part

the beginning devoted to the debit and credit of housekeeping accounts owards the back are the separate personal accounts of myself and two children "I have found it most satisfactory to pay accounts by the month for gro-beries, meat, milk and bread. Of course, there are a number of incidentals such as laundry, things bought on shopping trips down town, and so on, which are paid for at once. I firmly believe that keeping an accurate account results in more careful buying. It is rather appalling to see how much you have speni when you have it down in black and white. Not a bill comes in but what I check it over as soon as it arrives, even before putting away the groceries of whatever it accompanies. Sometimes such a thing has conversed as a mittake hatever it accompanies. Sometimes such a thing has occurred as a mistal addition, which would have passed over unnoticed had I not been in the hab going over the bills so carefully. One time there was an overcharge of \$

"I had all the back bills and my account book with which to check up. ( irse, the mistake was immediately rectified when it was brought to the attion of the merchant. Other times there have been small errors, say tents or so, my loss. I have figured it out that the ten cents was worth quitt much to me as anyone else, and at once brought it to the attention of the from whom I had ordered. I would expect my grocer or butcher to expe ne to make it right should the mistake be the other way. These may be small things, but they are 'leakages.'

"At the end of every six months I go over the book most carefully to see I have been spending too much in one way, not enough in another, and now I may get better returns for my investment.

"Comparing accounts with those of even three years back, I find it costs just about half as much again to live. Clothing didn't advance appreciably till this winter. Stockings, of which a small girl has worn out five pairs this season already, formerly cost about 40 cents a pair. This season they have been 65 cents for no better quality.

"We have a division of responsibility in our household, my husband looking fter the ordering of coal and the paying of telephone, water rates, gas and lectric light bills, the accounts which must be met on a certain date. He is own town, and it is not always convenient for me to get out to attend to these ngs. We find this the most satisfactory arrangement."

## WOMEN ORDER TOO MUCH BY PHONE.

It was Mrs. J. W.'s husband who first told the editor of Our Consumer League about what a splendid manager his wife was and how, from the ver day they began housekeeping, she had insisted upon knowing what became of the pennies as well as the dollars eaten up by household expenses. "She actually taught me how to save money," he said, enthusiastically, "and I can tell you, it was a pleasure to me when I was able to increase her allowance."

Mrs. J. W. gave a convincing proof of her wisdom the very first thing she said when asked as prettily as possible, if she would please be so good as to help the Consumers' League Column to help readers, by telling some of the knowledge she had acquired through keeping household accounts.

"For one thing," she replied, "I think women depend on the telephone too much for ordering. It is very convenient to call up the butcher or grocer when one is busy, but I have come to the conclusion that I obtain much better value for my money when I see what I am buying. The most reliable butcher will sometimes send meat which isn't just quite what you have expected. Then, you get ideas by looking around. One of my New Year's resolutions is to try more to do my own selecting. ore to do my own selecting.

"O course, there are certain things, such as sugar, salt, spices and things like that, which can be just as well ordered by telephone. I have a pad and pencil in a convenient place on my kitchen wall, and when I notice that the salt, pepper, mustard, any of the staples are giving out, I jot them down, and when I want to make out a list, all I have to do is to refer to the pad. I don't wait till the cans are empty before ordering. I don't take the risk of running out of some essential when preparing a dish, and being obliged to waste time on this account. It doesn't cost one bit more to keep these things always on hand, and saves a great deal of worry.

"So far as keeping a household account is concerned, I have done this ever since I was married. Just the beginning of November, I also started keeping a personal account. It is so easy to imagine you have lost money when you have returned from a shopping trip, and find how little you have left in your purse. When you begin to recken up, you will almost invariably find you have spent it all. By keeping an account you will be more careful in your buying, even of postage stamps,"

Cast on 68 stitches; 4½ inches, 2 plain, 2 purl; knit plain 7½ inches (12 linches in all).

Heel—Knit plain 34 stitches on to one needle; turn, purl back these 34 stitches; slip 1, knit 16 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1 turn, purl back these 34 stitches; slip 1, knit to end of row. Repeat (always slipping the first stitch) till you have 34 rows in all.

Turn, slip 1, purl to end of the heel towards side of the heel piece.

Turn, knit 12 stitches, slip 1, knit 1; turn, purl 13 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1. Turn, knit 14 stitches, slip 1, knit 1; turn, purl 15 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1. Turn, knit 16 stitches, slip 1, knit 1 turn, purl 17 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1. Turn, knit 18 stitches, slip 1, knit 1 turn, purl 17 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1. 

Takes Over Field of American Inquiry Into Suspected Combine.

Washington, Jan. 4.-Attorney-Genral Gregory today took over the field f the Federal Trade Commission inuiry into the print paper market with a view to determining whether there s a print paper trust and to instituting civil and criminal proceedings against manufacturers or others who may have violated the anti-trust laws, For several weeks past department of justice officials have been in frequent consultation with the trade comssion on the situation, and are understood to have under serious consideration the early institution of grand jury proceedings, at which indictments charging violation of the criminal secion of the law will be asked.

Officials say they are handicappe

y the fact that more than half of the nt paper consumed in the United tates is produced in Canada by man ufacturers who would be outside the urisdiction of American courts in any ceedings that might be deemed advisable. This condition, however ould not apply to American agents of such manufacturers.

The trade commission's investigation was conducted in response to a congressional resolution, and a report to Congress will be made within a few days. The investigators went into American and Canadian paper mills for cost of production and profit figures, and at open hearings the commission sought to ascertain if a combination had been formed to control prices. Publishers charged at the hearings that the manufacturers had combined both to control prices and to restrict

The desperate economic situation of Austria-Hungary, the revival of the traditional Hapsburg antagonism to Prussia and the imminence of the fall of the Tisza ministry had led inner circles to believe that the emperor would make desperate attempts to secure peace.

Even a separate peace between Austria and Italy would save something out of the wreckage of the dual monprepared for some such move.

Coupled with this comes a general understanding among Allied diplomats that another German peace note, written in a minor key, is likely to arrive at any moment. Whether this note will be diected to the neutral powers or to the belligerents is regarded as of little count, especially as it is generally thought that President Wilson is already acquainted with its general import.
