Street Railway Men in Brooklyn go Out-Rioting Indulged in.

New York, July 17.—Nearly all the conductors and motormen of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company struck at five o'clock yesterday morning. Those who had cars out left them on the track. The company endeavored fo run cars with non-union men on all lines, and there was much disorder. Wires were cut, rails torn up, non-union men hooted and stoned, and at the Marcy avenue stables a crowd of three hundred men resisted the police. Many arrests were made during the day. On some lines the company maintained a regular service, and on the others they failed altogether. Cars were unable to run to the Ocean Beach. The tie-up has not been nearly so complete as the labor leaders said it would be.



The whole of the New Testament, The whole of the New Testament, as revised, was telegraphed from New York to the Chicago Tribune, to be set sup as news for its issue of the 22nd of May, 1882. HOW A HANDWRITING EXPERT

When a piece of disputed or suspeed handwriting is submitted to an ex-pert, his first care is to note its gen-eral appearance, says Daniel T. Ames, in aral appearance, says Daniel 1. He observes what seem to be the characteristic habits of hand in the writer, the style, shading and connection of letters, the relation to the base line of the writing, and other significant points. The same process is applied to specimens of the allered writer's genuine hand.

Since that time the Times has re-

ceived a number of enquiries from friends of travellers on the trail, among those of whom intelligence among those of whom intelligence was most earnestly desired being W. J. George, of Port Elgin, Ont., and James Ferguson. A copy of the Yu-kon Sun, dated June 18th, received last night, brings the cheering news of their arrival at Dawson safe and

Inere they remained from 20th september until the middle of December, building cabins, sleds and prospecting.

Some 75 miners gathered at what they called Wind City, and 25 more were in winter quarters farther down. For these months the City was a wird of social events. Dances, socials, farces, music lessons, classes in German, French and telegraphy, lectures on astronomy and the circulation of the blood, glee clubs, chess and checker clubs, spiritualism, mock trials, autoharp recitals and such kept the columns of the dailies red hot. Church services were held every Sanday at 2 p. m. The community sent two Indians down to Fort Mc-Pherson, 255 miles, for the mail. Afterwards scurvy broke out, some 17 cases being reported, one man died and three or four more cases were expected to terminate fatally amonast the mixed nationality of Wind City. But this was after the pioneer parties had gone on for the Rockies about the end of December. They had two dog teams and relayed their supplies slowly up the pass. No white man ever went up Wind River before. They proceeded slowly up the river 137 miles to the divide or pass. It was 60 miles from Wind City to the base of the real mountains. They followed a very fine pass with an easy grade. On the divide they found a stretch of half a mile to separate the wasters which flow east into the McKenzie from those which flow west into the Yukon. The first part of the western waters they called Pass River and some of them named it Hell River. The party relayed all their goods through the pass and down the Pass River 3 miles, travelling 110 days, sleeping out when their thermometers about was swamped and all its dearly earned supplies lost under an ice jam. The destitate once were supported by their comrades.

MAPLES AND ELMS.

Heehan Tells How to Grew The From Seed. From Seed.

A correspondent wrote me recently, asking if it was advisable for him to sow sugar maple seeds in the spring, as he had 15 acres of land he would like to cover with sugar maple trees. I wrote him that it would be useless to sow the seed in spring if it had been kept in a dry condition, but if it had been in damp soil all winter, if only slightly damp, it might then be sown with reasonable chance of its growing. But as stated before in these columns, it is not wise on the part of amateurs to attempt the raising of tree seedlings unless it be of sorts which grow readily from seed, as it is not at all the same thing as raising vegetable or flower plants. It is much more satisfactory to obtain a lot of seedlings and set them out where wanted. A 15-acre lot planted with seedlings twe or three feet in height, and kept cultivated for a few years, would make a surprising growth. Cultivation is necessary, that no weeds take the food the trees should have. In this way a young forest of almost any kind of tree could be had in a short space of time. In this way nurserymen bring on acres of shade trees in a few years, and it is just as easy for farmers to do the same thing. There are but very few cases where it would not be very much more satisfactory to set out bought seedlings than to attempt the raising of the plants at home.

There are a few trees which ripen their seeds in early summer, and among them



But neither this nor the red maple is of much value in the way of timber, not as much as elms ars. The way to sow these seeds is to secure them as soon as they fall from the trees and sow them in convenient beds, from which they may be transplanted in a year or two, when of proper height. Beds four feet wide are of convenient size, permitting of the pulling out of weeds and the watching of seedings as they grow. The seeds are to be covered to about their own depth; and if all goes well they appear above ground almost at once. A somewhat singular fact is that if these seeds are kept till fail and sowed then, with other seeds at the usual time, rarely do any of them grow. Fresh white maple seeds grow so readily that it is quite feasible to sow a few seeds in squires, much as corn is often sown. If two or three seeds be sown together there would certainly be one plant to a hill, and if more come, the strongest one only should be left. There is some danger of missing altogether here and there under this plan, but on the other hand the young trees that do start do not receive the slight check which those do that have to be transplanted. There is much interest in watching the growth of seedlings, and this should lead many to collect and sow these seeds, aside from what there may be attached to it in the way of profit.



The Conduct of the Oregon Troops Is

ays: The officers of the First Oregon

regiment are trying to suppress a story told by the men' of the regiment about a slaughter of Filipino non-combatants to avenge the death and mutiliation of Oregon soldiers by rebels. According to these soldiers' tales three men of the regiment were captured by the rebels during the battle of Mario. The account of their subsequent murder and mutilation has been given in the cable dispatches from Mania.

The next day the Oregon regiment was taken off the firing line and given a day of rest after its hard campaign of two weeks. The men devoted this day to avenging the death of their comrades. Instead of remaining idle in camp they divided into squads, which scattered out in the neighboring country. Every Filipino — rebel, non-rombatant, man, woman or child — whom these squads encountered was put to death. The work of slaughtes went on from dawn until dusk, and some of the raiders did not return to camp until the following day.

The soldiers who gaye these details declare that scores of Filipinos were alain. They were proud of the schievement and had no regret to offer. The news was suppressed by the press censor.
